As we commence our 103rd year, I suggest these immediate goals for our school and its Board of Regents:

(1) The fund raising appeal should be continued, expanded and completed



this year. We are fortunate again to have the talented Michael Donovan of the Class of '42 heading the Regents Foundation Committee and leading this endeavor. Mike has expressed that a sense of urgency is needed.

- (2) A viable and organized alumni association should be created. As an "outsider" with "no class," I feel free to proclaim our greatest asset is our alumni but a definite need also exists for an organization. For this reason, a special Regents Alumni Relations Committee has been appointed.

PSA crash claims Bill Francis '37

Christian Brothers' community was shocked with the announcement that Bill Francis, a local labor leader and loyal alumnus, was one of the unfortunate victims of the tragic PSA crash in San Diego. Bill had been a outstanding athlete at Brothers.

Since 1969, Bill had been General Organizer and International Representative for the United Organization of Plumbers Unions, and since 1975 represented the entire State of California.

Highly respected by his fellow members, he was recognized as an exceptional labor leader who had the interests of the rank and file at heart. He also served for 15 years representing the building trades as a member of the Sacramento City and County Appeals Board.

Bill will always remain in the hearts of his family, friends and fellow classmates. A large memorial fund has been donated in his name by friends, labor associates and business acquaintances.

CB #1 at Sac State


Officials at Sacramento State recently informed us that Christian Brothers ranks #1 over 74 Northern California high schools in percent of graduates who attend the University.

An interesting feature of the study is the fact that most of the CB grads enter Cal State as Juniors after two years at a community college. According to the 1978 survey, 20 grads entered Cal State as freshmen this year, 39 as juniors for a total of 59. This from a graduating class of 133 which gives CB a 43.6% ranking in grads attending the University.
