## CB Mourns Angie

Mrs. Angelina Burich, administrative secretary at Christian Brothers, died of cancer at Sutter Hospital on Saturday, December 16. The vivacious Angie had been very popular with students, parents and staff since her employment here in 1969.

Besides her regular duties as principal's secretary, Angie was data processing coordinator and coordinator of entrance exam. Because of her many contacts in the community, she was usually consulted for public relations projects of the school.

Like many of the staff, Angie willingly worked through her lunch hour, and late into the afternoon. She was particularly helpful in patiently but personally listening to the exacting questions of parents of prospective students. She always had a helpful word.

She also did secretarial work for the La Salle Club and served as liaison between the Club and the parents guild. During Le Salle functions, she was usually in the kitchen, cooking or cleaning.

When Angie came to Christian Brothers in 1969, she was hired as part-time receptionist. Following the retirement of Mrs. Julie Crawford, she took over the secretarial position in 1970.

Long associated with Christian Brothers, Angie was married to Jim Burich, class of 1943, who has been presi-

Regents Inaugurate Merit Scholarships

The Christian Brothers Merit Scholarships will award one full tuition scholarship and two partial, half-tuition scholarships to students who best demonstrate potential for excellence at Christian Brothers High School. These scholarships are not based on need but will be determined on the results of the entrance examination and criteria established by the school.

Scholarships are for four years, however winners must maintain a 3.5 grade point average and exemplary behavior. Failure to maintain these conditions will result in termination of the scholarship at the beginning of the subsequent semester.

Criteria for the scholarship will be based on the student's chances for excellence at Christian Brothers as indicated by the following: 1) entry exam, 2) school record, 3) written statement of the student, 4) discussion with student leaders, 5) discussion of prepared material with representatives of the faculty.

Finalists have already been notified, and scholarship winners will be announced before April 1.

As before, Christian Brothers High School will continue its policy of financial assistance to worthy and needy students. Last year, this assistance totaled \$20,000. For 1979-80, this assistance will be raised to \$30,000 thanks to the Board of Regents, the Development Office and the donation of the Christian Brothers Province of California.

# AlumniNews by Jack Stassi '40



# 237 Take CB Entry Exam

In February 237 students took the entry test for Christian Brothers, the largest number of applicants in recent years. Since enrollment is limited to 700, only about 200 will be accepted since the balance will be returning students.

Because of the enrollment squeeze, Brother Ronald has clarified the criteria for accepting students. First accepted will be those students who are coming from CBS families, that is families who have had members graduate from the school or who have been active in the school, or those families connected to other Christian Brothers schools. Second priority will then be given to CB's principal feeder schools.

On tuition, Brother Ronald stated that it would be \$875 for the 1979-80 school year. This does not include books or supplies. One hundred dollars deposit will be required for new students at time of registration, and for continuing students by June 8. That fee is non-refundable, saves a place for the student, and is deducted from the tuition, leaving a balance of \$775.

Christian Brothers continues a grantin-aid program to help those families who could not attend without financial assistance.

#### Students Fast for CROP

Christian Brothers is sponsoring the third annual CROP (Catholic Relief Overseas Program) 30 hours hunger awareness fast this weekend. Beginning 8 a.m. Friday, the volunteering students go through the school day without eating, then continue that evening and night through 2 p.m. on Saturday. Students are participating from St. Francis, Bishop Manogue, Loretto, Mercy and Jesuit.

As a result of the fast, students get a personal experience of hunger, the usual condition of a good portion of the world today. They also get a sense of helping through the funds raised for CROP. In the past two years, students have raised ove \$6500 for the hungry people of this country and the world.

If you would like to participate in a pledge for this activity, contact campus representative David Mahlman, the teacher who is directing the program.
