

# Pacers Will Meet CBS Eleven In Grid Duel Tonight

Clarke Massey has been pronounced physically fit and will open at left half for the Grant Union High School Pacers in their intracity football clash at 8 o'clock tonight with the Christian Brothers Gaels in Del Paso Heights.

X-rays revealed Massey's knee ailment to be nothing serious enough to prevent his handling the tailback chores in the single wing used by Coach Dick Kollenborn's charges. End Fred Thaden and fullback Curtis Perkins, however, still are listed as doubtful participants because of injuries suffered in last week's tussle against the C. K. McClatchy High School Lions.

## Quarterback Is Ill

Meanwhile, the Brothers learned they will have to operate without the services of quarterback Bob Sweeney. The youngster became ill yesterday. Sweeney is the Gaels' No. 1 punter, passer and linebacker and calls defensive and offensive signals. Charles Chatfield is his understudy.

The Pacers are anxious to snap a six game losing streak and gain their second victory of the campaign. CBS, under Coach Ray Clemons, would like to return to winning ways after losing to Yuba City last week and ending a five game victory streak. Both coaches rate the battle as a toss-up.

## Cocaptains Named

Tackle Bob Bastian and Massey will cocaptain the home eleven. Leading the Gaels will be flankmen Bill Ross and Will Towne.

# Unsung Preps Given Boost

All-city time is drawing near again and as we scan the list of candidates from the capital's four high schools several names stand out of players who will probably be overlooked in the final ballot-

ing, but, players who have done outstanding jobs for their respective football teams.

These gridgers aren't the stars who make the stories for laboring sportswriters or who are the targets of searching talent scouts from the nearby universities and colleges.

Their is an unrewarding job so far as the football glories are concerned but more than likely they're enjoying their football more than the more celebrated of their crop.

They work day after day on the practice fields doing a steady job but receiving little of any notice. But they're all good enough to make the first team and ask any coach which type player he'd rather have on his team.

It's in this cause that we take time out to salute the lesser known but probably most underrated players in Sacramento prepdom.

With the aid of coaches George Rellies of Sacramento High, George Bican of McClatchy, Ray Clemons of Christian Brothers and Grant Union's Dick Kollenborn, here's the four players this department has selected as not the "Saturday Heroes" but the Monday through Sunday gridgers.

Jasper Anderson, fullback, McClatchy High—Jasper has done a fine bit of running for George Bican's injury reduced Lions and has rarely turned in what could be considered a bad game. When other good McClatchy backs had been stopped in their collective tracks or sidelined because of hurts, it was Jasper, or "Bronco" as his teammates call him, who

came up with a smashing performance.

Bican has called Anderson his "mixer-upper," the kind of player who can get in there and drive when the going is roughest. Anderson is only a 155 pounder but hits as hard as many of the other bigger backs in the Sac-Joquim Conference. He plays offense and defense, is a good faker in the T-formation and a first class blocker.

Bob Sweeney, quarterback, Christian Brothers—A 180-pound senior from Carmichael, Sweeney has done an admirable job as a T-formation quarterback. He is a fine blocker and makes few physical mistakes when his team has the ball. While not in the sensational class, the Gael quarterback does everything well. He can pass, run and punt. On a single wing team his work might go absolutely unnoticed, his is such a workmanlike job. Sweeney is one of the Gaels' team leaders and was recently chosen one of four CBS season captains. Bob will end his prep career at Hughes Stadium tonight but faces the possibility of watching it all from the bench due to an eye infection.

# CBS Loses 18, Including All First String, As Season Ends

Eighteen youngsters shed their prep football gear for the last time two nights ago after the Christian Brothers Gaels ended their grid campaign with a loss to the Sacramento High School Dragons.

"We're losing our entire first string," said Coach Ray Clemons. "Several sophomores showed up well this year, however, and on them we'll depend next year."

The seniors are Gene Angelo, Bill Bell, Vic Bertolani, Dick Castro, Dennis Dorsey, Tom Gill, Don Kessell, Ken Noss, Tom O'Donnell, Lew Pebbles, Bill Ross, Edgar Sayre, Walter Short, Bob Sweeney, Will Towne, Dick Traversi, Ray Tucker and Francis Wallace.

"Six Wins, Four Losses  
"We finished with six wins and four losses," continued Clemons. "Looking back, I think the only game we definitely deserved to lose was the one to Sacramento."

The total margin of difference in the four defeats was 24 points. Serra of San Mateo turned the trick, 12 to 7; the C. K. McClatchy High School, 20 to 14; Yuba City, 19 to 13, and Sacramento, 14 to 7.

"I thought against Sac we were at least equal man for man," declared the Gael mentor. "As a team we were not, however, and that's what counts. We played a

poor game. We were supposed to be high but turned up flat y no zip. Our line was outchary but good, for the first time season."

Good Word For Several  
He had a good word for play of Ross, end; Towne, of five end and defensive tackle; Gill, linebacker; and O'Donnell, fullback.

"O'Donnell is my idea of best back in the city," he admitted. "He received very little block support last Thursday. His playing was off because he played with his right elbow hurt. But he had to do most of the passing because we didn't have Sweeney, our quarterback."

Clemons opines Ross, Tom O'Donnell and Angelo, a guard, are good college prospects. He rates Gill not far behind.

Lauds Dragons' Boys  
"Getting back to our game," he said, "I thought I'd letto, Sacramento's QB, a smart play selections. And a big end, John Parkinson, played a whole of a game, defensively and offensively."

With that Clemons decided let Coaches George Rellies of Sacramento, Dick Kollenborn, Grant Union and George Bell of the C. K. McClatchy High School Lions fret about local prep football the rest of the season.

# Led By Tom O'Donnell, CBS Powerhouse Runs Wild Over Grant, 31-0

Tommy O'Donnell, backed by an alert Christian Brothers School football team, last night personally accounted for 25 points as the Gaels ran roughshod over a bewildered Grant Union High School eleven in the Del Paso Heights Bowl. The score was 31 to 0.

## CBS Gets Ball

Third quarter—After a Grant punt the Brothers gained possession on the Pacers' 25 from where O'Donnell went over in one play. He kicked goal for the extra point.

The hard running Irish backfield ace was accorded help by Tom Gill, tackle; Gene Angelo, guard; Towne, and Ed Sayre, tackle. Gill made many of the Gael stops.

## Grant Heroes, Too

Even in defeat Grant was not without its own heroes. Hale at guard, Ronnie Watkins at end and Larry Bell, reserve end, did most of the tackling for the Pacers.

The Grant griders penetrated Brothers' territory only once in the first half and that was on a recovery of a fumble by end Bob Carbon.

The Pacer attack was hampered by injury to Clarke Massey, who did not see action during the final half. Charles Kuhl, back, packed most of the offensive load for the losers, who were held to 46 net yards on the ground and 20 yards in the air.

O'Donnell, with quick, explosive bursts, scored four touchdowns and kicked one conversion during his stay in the game which was witnessed by approximately 2,500 persons.

Fortunately for the Pacers, who have lost six straight contests, Coach Ray Clemons of the winners called off his horses during most of the second half, in which the Gaels counted only a single touchdown.

## 178 Yards Gained

Fullback O'Donnell etched his cleat marks in the Grant end zone four times in piling up the sensational mark of 178 yards net gained from running plays in 16 attempts at carrying the leather.

It was a tremendous one man show by the Brothers' backfield ace. He had an average of 11.1 yards per carry, which is covering the territory in a hurry.

The Gaels galloped to 24 points in the second quarter to sew up the contest. In the second half Clemons substituted freely. O'Donnell, after getting his fourth touchdown on a 25 yard sprint in the third period, retired to the bench.

## No Headway In First

Neither team could make any headway in the first period.

Charles Chatfield, a second string quarterback who handled himself as a veteran, caught the losing Pacers and most of the spectators napping on the opening play of the second quarter. Wingman Bill Ross smothered a Pacer fumble on the Grant 41 in the initial period. In two plays O'Donnell reached the 33 as the gun sounded.

Suddenly Chatfield struck. He used a nogo pass to end Will Towne, who raced into the end zone for the first six points.

O'Donnell then took over the scoring chores. His touchdown trips follow:

Second quarter—The Brothers started from their own 42 yard line and O'Donnell went to the one on an off tackle play. He was pulled down from behind by Gary Adams. Twice stopped at the center of the line by guard John Hale, O'Donnell skirted his own right end for the TD.

A penalty for roughness against Grant found the Brothers on the losers 29. From the nine O'Donnell cut off right tackle, reversed his field and went into the end zone unmolested.

Ross intercepted a Grant aerial and was downed on the Grant 38. The same off tackle play enabled O'Donnell to score as the gun sounded the end of the half.

# BROTHERS LOSE OPENER 12 TO 7

## Serra Rallies After Gaels Bid First

Serra High School of Belmont handed Christian Brothers of Sacramento a 12-7 setback yesterday on the Belmont turf. It was the season opener for both teams.

The contest was marred by a series of fumbles by both teams.

The Gaels started the scoring and held a 7-6 lead at halftime. Fullback Tom O'Donnell of CBS broke loose from his own 22-yard line in the first quarter on what appeared to be a certain touchdown. As he hit midfield, the ball squirted out of his arms and end Bill Ross scooped it up, running the remainder of the way to give the Brothers a 6-0 lead. O'Donnell kicked the point to make it 7-0.

**SERRA STRUCK** back in the second quarter with four straight passes that carried the drive to the one-yard line. Ted Welp plunged over from the one to knot the count. The conversion try was blocked.

Taking to the air again in the fourth quarter Serra pulled a screen pass to Ed Gallagher who raced to the Gael 15. The play started on the 50-yard line. Bob Winsiger then put over the winning touchdown with an optional bootleg play and pass to John Robinson.

**DEFENSIVE** halfback Tom Santos and quarterback Bob Sweeney drew CBS coach Ray Clemons' praise for defensive work. The Gael mentor said Dick Castro and Tom O'Donnell were outstanding on offense.

In Sacramento Clemons said he would give his line plenty of work this week while drilling for the McClatchy game Friday. "Fumbles beat us," said the Gael mentor. "Every time we got something going, a fumble would end it." Clemons was a spectator at the McClatchy-Chico game and said he was impressed with the speedy Lion backs.

**TOM O'DONNELL** and Bill Ross (on ground) teamed up for Christian Brothers' only touchdown at Serra yesterday. The speedy Gael fullback, candidate for the 1951 all-city team, was a consistent gainer in the Gaels' losing cause. O'Donnell was one of the best prep backs in Sacramento last year before an injury put him out of action. The game's result evened the Christian Brothers-Serra home and home series which started last season. The Gaels won the opener, 13-6, on the 21st and Broadway gridiron. Gael quarterback, Bob Sweeney, suffered a leg injury during yesterday's contest but is expected to be ready for the McClatchy encounter.





# Lions Get Break To Whip Hard Fighting CBS Eleven, 20-14

The C. K. McClatchy High School Lions converted a Christian Brothers fumble into a touchdown in the waning moments of the first half last night, then battled through two scoreless quarters to register a 20 to 14 football triumph before 6,000 fans in Hughes Stadium.

It was a fracas Coach George Bican's charges, according to the dope sheet, were supposed to win handily. Nobody told the Brothers, however, and they came close to springing a major upset in local prepdom.

### Punt Is Fumbled

The big break came with two minutes to go and the Lions trailing, 14 to 13, in the second period. Dick Castro, CBS halfback, got under Chuck Pollard's punt on his own 10, but bobbled the ball, Herb Jackson recovering for the Bicanites on the 16.

One play later Jackson snared Pollard's pass on the five and sprinted into the end zone. Pollard's perfect placement completed the scoring for the warm evening.

Actually, few spectators suspected the game would be fought so furiously after what had happened in the first five minutes. Within that time the C. K. McClatchy High School tallied 13 points and looked capable of waltzing home a winner.

### Score On Kickoff

On the opening kickoff Orland King accepted a reverse from Mickey Goncalves and raced along the sideline for 85 yards and six points. It was that easy. Pollard converted and the audience prepared for a rout.

Nothing occurred on the next series of plays to change anybody's mind. The Brothers got nowhere on three downs, so Bob Sweeney punted to Goncalves, who was stopped on the Gael 29.

The Lions, after being rapped five yards for offside, needed five plays, including Pollard's 19 yard aerial to Jackson, to reach the one. Goncalves went over from there. Pollard's conversion attempt sailed wide.

### Battle On Even Terms

Thereafter Coach Ray Clemons' gang from Twenty First and Broadway battled on at least even terms. Their hero, and the outstanding ball toter on the field, was fullback Tom O'Donnell, a piston legged 185 pounder.

Following the Lions' second TD, the Gaels marched 61 yards in six plays for their first six pointer. A 26 yard romp by Lew Pebbles on a naked reverse and O'Donnell's 28 yard blast through the middle, along with a piling on penalty against the Lions which put the ball on the one, did most of the damage. Castro collected the TD and O'Donnell the extra point via placement.

### Gaels Score Again

The next time Clemons' crew latched onto the piston, they again went all the way. O'Donnell tore off gains of 15 and 20 yards to spark a 75 yard drive featured also by four penalties, two against each team, with the Gaels gaining 10 yards in the exchanges.

O'Donnell passed to Towne for the score, the big end catching the ball on the seven and carrying two wouldbe tacklers across the payoff stripe. The play was good for 20 yards. Two tries earlier the Gaels had sent Pebbles across from the 12 only to have the effort nullified by one of the game's 19 penalties.

Thus, after O'Donnell had split the uprights, the Brothers were on the pleasant end of the score. But came the vital fumble. Jackson's alert recovery and the TD which proved to be the clincher.

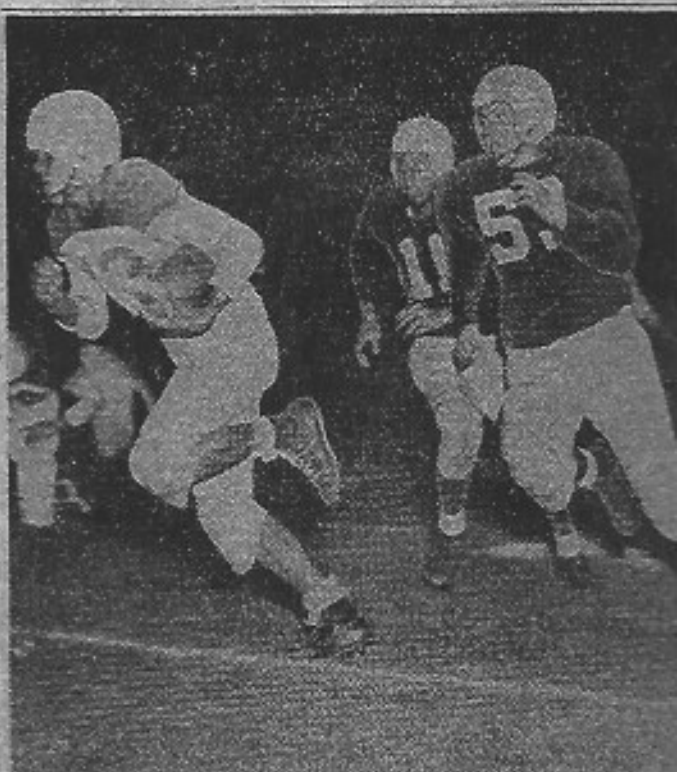
### CBS Threatens

CBS made a serious threat in the fourth quarter, marching from its own 28 to the Lions' 16 before being rocked by 20 yards worth of rule violations. The C. K. McClatchy High School eventually regained possession on its own 30, just 45 seconds before the final gun.

The penalties aplenty were distributed evenly. One hundred yards were stepped off against the Gaels, 50 in each half, and 58 against the winners, all in the first half.

Statistically, the losers had an edge, leading in first downs, 14 to 10, and in net yardage gained, 248 to 200. O'Donnell was the top ground gainer, picking up 121

# CBS Puts On Show For Old Grads, Blasts Riordan

The Christian Brothers Gaels showed a staunch defense yesterday in drubbing the Riordan High School Crusaders of San Francisco, 37 to 0, before 2,000 Homecoming Day football fans at Twenty First and Broadway.

A good idea of what transpired can be learned from the statistics. Riordan finished with 45 yards passing and minus 26 rushing against the Brothers' 84 in the air and 219 on the ground. CBS led in first downs, 13 to 1, the losers getting theirs midway in the fourth quarter on a 28 yard aerial from quarterback Ray Arata to halfback Joe Fraga.

## Gets Alumni Trophy

End Bill Ross took home the alumni trophy for being the outstanding Gael on the gridiron. His pass interception started the initial TD drive and his catch of fullback Tom O'Donnell's 27 yard pitch helped another. He played an especially fine defensive game, as did guard Gene Angelo, end Will Towne, linebacker and QB Bob Sweeney and halfback Tommy Santos.

The Brothers picked up two six pointers in the opening period, the first coming on O'Donnell's four yard smash to culminate a 37 yard march and the second on Sweeney's 45 yard runback of an intercepted pass.

## Socked With Penalties

A story for the books occurred early in the second period when, in the space of four plays, the locals had two touchdowns canceled and were socked with three 15 yard penalties.

Their tally in that quarter came on a 38 yard drive in three cracks at the line. Halfbacks Dick Travers and Bill Bell churned for 13 and 22, respectively, then O'Donnell went over from the three as the half ended, 18 to 0.

## Regulars Retire

Coach Ray Clemons' first stringers added another TD in the third stanza before taking the bench as far as work on offense was concerned. It was the result of a four play, 44 yard drive which started with the aforementioned O'Donnell to Ross aerial for 27 yards. After an incomplete pass, halfback Dick Castro picked up four to the 13 and Sweeney hit Towne with a short toss, the tall flanker going the rest of the way.

Gael reserves collected 13 points in the fourth period. Their first TD was scored by end George Thomas, who snared fullback Don Sanchez's pass for a 39 yard maneuver. Sanchez place-

kicked the extra point, something the regulars had failed to accomplish in four shots.

## Recovers Bad Pass

Tackle John Facino's recovery of a bad pass from center, intended for punter Al Serafino, gave the Brothers their chance for the last TD. Halfback Tony Latino earned it with a 15 yard jaunt.

Riordan's deepest penetration into CBS territory reached the 33 in the second period. Coach Tom Dineen's eleven, in the school's first year at the grid sport, just did not have the horses.

# Yuba City Back Is Praised By CBS Football Coach

"I still think we had the best team," declared coach Ray Clemons yesterday as he reflected on Christian Brothers game with Yuba City. The Honkers handed the Gaels their first loss in six games, edging the Brothers, 19-13, Friday night in Yuba City.

Christian Brothers outran and outpassed the scrappy Yuba team but fumbles and penalties thwarted their many attempts at the Honker goal line. The Gaels were stymied by penalties in the offensive battle, drawing 70 yards for infractions as compared to only five yards for Yuba.

**THE GAELS** gained 165 yards rushing and 217 passing for a 282 yards net total. The Honkers made only 269 yards net.

Christian Brothers were given a preview of what to expect when they meet Sacramento High in two weeks, however, during the contest. Yuba presented its star back, Francis Laney to the Gaels and he virtually ripped the Gaels line apart. Laney is a 200-pounder and is
