

# Lions And Pacers Look Like Capital Prep Teams To Beat In Sac-Joaquin Play

Prep basketball is under way with early signs pointing to the C. K. McClatchy High School Lions and the Grant Union Pacers as the local teams most likely to succeed in the Sac-Joaquin Conference. Sacramento's inexperienced Dragons could develop into a troublesome bunch, while the El Camino Eagles do not figure to cause much fuss in their first conference campaign.

Also, the Christian Brothers Gaels do not rate as title threats in the Northern Interstate League.

## Lions Are Cochamps

Last season the Lions were cochampions with Lodi to write a fine finish to Chauncey Wilson's career as their cage coach. This year Stan Dison is at the helm and he can start four lettermen.

"It looks as if we'll use Allen Wimberley and Jim Johnson as forwards," said Stan. "Each stands 6-1. Frank Geremia, 6-2, will be at center with Don Schultz, 6-3, a guard. One of our short boys, Jack McDaniel or Lee Farnsworth, will be the other guard."

"Schultz is up from the junior varsity and Farnsworth from the B's. John Echols, a good sized youngster, will join us in about a month when he recovers from a wrist fracture suffered in football."

"Geremia is a mid term graduate and will miss the last five games. Among the other boys, I think Bob Sutter, a letterman; Gordon Fisher and Jay Gould, with B team experience, and Rudy Harris will be very helpful."

The chief losses from the 1953-54 title outfit are Doug Pierce and Ray Davis, who made the first five at Sacramento Junior College. Ed Linn, Jim Cletus and Gus Glanulias.

## Grant Looks Good

Grant may have the edge on the Lions because Coach Ernie Marks has mighty smooth articles in Walt Torrence, 6-3, and Fred Scott, 6-2, and a potentially fine rebounder in Arnold Metcalf, 6-3 and 220 pounds. It should be a black and blue evening when Geremia, who also weighs 220, and Metcalf tangle under the boards.

"We plan to use Torrence and Scott at forwards," commented Marks. "Oliver Stevenson, a B player last season, will be at one guard position with Tony Contreras, a senior with no experience, or Jerry Corker at the other. Letterman Travis Montue

and B team graduates Charles Bell and Sherman Wafer are the first call substitutes."

While Contreras, 6-3, has not played high school ball, he compiled a pretty fair record in church leagues and two nights

"I think we'll be improved over last year," continued Ernie. "We have good size and experience but not much speed. Jack Henry, Jim Doris and Dale Hobbs are the boys we'll miss."

## Dragons Have Lost Two

Sacramento has dropped close non league decisions to Napa and San Juan. F. J. (Pop) Brorsen, in the 27th year at SJS, has a green club with the departure of such 1953-54 dependables as Ken Finch, Dick Hogge, Bob Kelly and Lew Cobb.

The Dragons have been starting sophomore Tim Buckendorf, 6-2, and Bob Zenor, 6-0, at forwards; Wally Predovich, 6-2, at center, and Bob Fickensher, 5-11, and Jay Cobb, 6-0, at guards. There may be some changes when Bill Reed recovers from a tonsillectomy and high scoring Penny Crocco and Aaron Newcomb work off their football muscles.

"We'll be hurt at mid term when Predovich and Crocco are graduated," said Pop. "We don't have much experience and are shy on height. But we're not playing any games with the idea of getting our ears pinned back

"We also have the first B five in Jack Bryant, Dick Dorman, Don Ford, Ron Manas and Jim Ward. And then there's Dave Carter, who has shown fine improvement."

Tentatively, Fred lists his starters as forwards Cracraft and Hall or Ward, center Bob Manas, 6-1, and guards Schilling and Smith.

# Pacers Defeat Gael For Fifth Straight Victory

The Grant Union High School Pacers chalked up their fifth straight basketball win last night by downing the Christian Brothers School 51 to 34 in Del Paso Heights.

Although the Pacers led all the way, the contest was close until the fourth quarter. Don Terra was largely responsible for keeping the Gaels in the running. He scored 17 points, half of the Brothers' total. CBS had only one Terra, however, while Grant had Walter Torrence and Fred Scott. Torrence scored 13 points and Scott 13.

The pair dominated the backboards. Torrence snared 25 rebounds during the evening.

One month of the basketball season has already gone by the boards and, although none of the Sacramento teams have started their league seasons as yet, it is evident who the "haves" and the "have nots" are. You will have to reach into the high school ranks to come up with a logical championship contender and that, of course, would be Grant Union, recent winner of the Sac-Joaquin Conference Tournament and unbeaten in nine games counting the tournament's 20-minute tilts.

McClatchy High rates very little chance to finish at the top of the Sac-Joaquin Conference heap and its cross-town rival, Sacramento High, is once again out of the race. New league member El Camino also shapes up as another also ran off its tournament showing.

McCLATCHY HAS an excuse with a new coach, Stan Dixon, in the driver's seat with a group of players who were used to Chauncy Wilson's system. He'll need another year or two to develop his own material.

Thus far, the Lions have won five out of seven but against only mediocre opposition. They couldn't handle Lodi in the tournament and shouldn't give Grant Union any trouble either, especially after mid-term when Frank Geremia departs.

"Pop" Brorsen and Sacramento High won only two games this year, beating Armijo and San Juan, and lost seven. The Dragons dropped a pair to league teams in the tournament, Lodi and Turlock.

## CHRISTIAN BROTHERS

must be rated some sort of chance to finish high in their first Northern Inter-state Conference basketball season, but they are still an unknown quality, having played only two games. The Brothers did give Grant a battle in a full length game before losing, 51-34, and the score could have been closer. In their other start, the Gaels whipped Courtland.

Just as he did a year ago, when he took home the first place trophy, Grant Union coach Ernie Marks made himself a marked man throughout the league for the regular loop season.

Last year, the Pacers faltered with virtually the same starting lineup. But the three top men, Fred Scott, Walt Torrence and Arnold Metcalf were only juniors. Their added experience and maturity should bring Grant the title this time.

GRANT WAS so impressive in the tournament that the Pacers caused one sports writer from the southern end of the conference to comment, "If Marks doesn't win the championship this year, he should give up."

The Pacers completely out-classed every team they met with the possible exception of Woodland, which Grant whipped, 26-22, in the finals without Scott. Woodland made the game close strictly on hustle and could duplicate the showing on its home court. But the long haul should leave a big separation between the two teams.

Possibly Grant's greatest asset is its "bench."

MARKS HAS at least eight good players and showed two starting combinations in the tournament. Grant has size, speed and eight players who can shoot. This includes Torrence and Scott who are no doubt the two outstanding players in the league this year. As a twosome, they can be terrific with Scott passing and Torrence shooting around the hoop. Both are good defensive players as well.

# Wolves Top Gaels; Face Reno Friday

The Shasta Wolves completed their first weekend of basketball play in the Northern Interstate conference with a sweep of the two-game series against the Christian Brothers Gaels. Their 51-41 victory Saturday night sends them into the coming week

Of the walks to the charity stripe, the Wolves converted 15 for a 47 per cent mark. The Gaels, a little more of a stranger at the stripe, hit on 53 per cent of their gift tosses but it was good for only nine points.

The Shasta Wolves have a hard job cut out for them this weekend as they meet the ever-dangerous Christian Brothers Gaels from Sacramento in a double-header at the college gymnasium. The Wolves with a 1-4 record so far this season will be trying for their first win since the game with Red Bluff. This is the first conference game for the home team.

"I think we should do fairly well," stated Coach Harlan Carter, "but it's hard to say—we haven't seen Christian Brothers play; we don't know how good they are. It's hard to predict when you don't have anything to predict on."

Coach Carter named the probable starting lineup as: Brent Leonard, Kent Carter, Eddie Bigelow, Dick Stuart, and Ron Bonneche or Gene Severson.

The games will be on Friday and Saturday nights. Preliminaries will begin at 7 p. m. with the varsity contest starting at approximately 8 p. m.

# Christian Brothers High School . . . .

The Christian Brothers High School of Sacramento is a religious order institution which was founded in 1876.

The school is under the principalship of Brother Xavier and its athletic program is directed by Brother Frederick.

The school plant is built along the mission style of architecture, and is very proud of their new annex which will house the subjects taught for the junior and senior students. Academically, the school bases its program on the standards set by the University of California and St. Mary's.

Unlike other high schools, Christian Brothers has a residence hall which houses approximately 65 boys from all over the nation during the school year. The total enrollment of the school is 550. Another interesting aspect of the school is the fact that although the school has been in athletic competition for about a half-century, this was the first time the school has ever become a part of any league.

Last year with only two returning lettermen, Dave Higgins and Don Terra, the Gaels were only able to compile a record of 7 wins and 15 losses. However, the Gaels competition comes from schools of the Sac-Joaquin league which is one of the toughest in all Northern California.

This year with the return of many of last year's varsity along with a group from a good "B" team, Coach Regis Hurley expects to field a good team as the season progresses. The greatest defect at present is the lack of competition. Going into tonight's game, the Gaels have only played three games, defeating Courtland 48-36 and losing to Grant 51-34. The outcome of the game with McClatchy is unknown as the programs went to press. The two boys to watch are No. 7, Bill Ferreirrae, and No. 77, Don Terra, who has averaged over 17 points per game to date.

# Shasta Wolves Officials and Gaels Gang Up on Locals To Gain NIC Win

Basketball turned into tune time Saturday night in Sacramento where the Christian Brothers Gaels, aided and abetted by a pair of 'whistle happy' officials, picked up a 67-60 victory over the Shasta high Wolves in Northern Interstate conference play.

Tootin' down 56 players during the game, officials Vic Zito and Bert Silva gave what coach Harlan Carter of Shasta termed "the most flagrant abuse of officiating that I've seen in my coaching career." He added that "basketball was taken back 20 years by the exhibition" and continued "I experienced the most deplorable officiating in my 19 years of coaching. It was inconsistent, unfair and in direct violation of all National Basketball association rules."

One of Carter's biggest complaints was that the referees were allowing CBS to complete their shots after fouls had been called and were counting the field goals thusly made. Also, he added, "CBS was blocking and charging and generally powering its way down the court, meanwhile gaining the fouls from Shasta, when in reality they should have been called the other way."

From a summation of observations by Redding people, the conditions under which the fiasco was played were terrible. Carter stated that the "gym was the worst that they've (Shasta) played in—during the last 10 years and he is going to try to avoid going back again." A few more packages to chew on—the timing and the scoring were handled by CBS affiliates and were constantly in rhubarb with the team scorer for Shasta.

Coach Carter has written a letter which he intends to send to the California Interscholastic Federation and to the Officials association, which he admits might not do any good, but may start them thinking. In addition, coach Carter will attend the meeting of the Basketball Officials association in Chico tonight.

GETTING BACK to the game, which wasn't considered as such by the Redding fans that made the trip, Christian Brothers picked up its first league win of the year and only its second victory of the season. The 87-60 score snaps a losing streak that started in the Gaels' second game of the season.

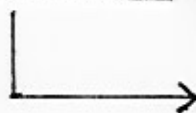

## Our Good Customers Always Write

Dear Bill: I was quite surprised and most aggravated to read the recent verbal attack by a Shasta cage mentor upon a local basketball official, Vic Zito.

Was it actually poor officiating by our local officials, or was this just an excuse, to be used as a crutch, by an irate Shasta coach whose high scoring five suffered a most humiliating setback at the hands of a local team that has only 2 wins to its credit in 14 starts?

Were fouls unjustly called against the visiting Shastans who found four of their five starters on the bench in the fourth quarter? Or, was it just that Young Carter Junior, one of the four, was unable to break his own scoring record of 33 points of the night before? Was "Daddy" just disappointed?

I don't want to take anything away from young Carter, or the Shasta team. They are good, and the coach's son shows great prospects. But, as for this so-called unsatisfactory officiating, Bill, I can't understand, nor believe it. I think Vic Zito and all our local officials have done a splendid job, and are, if anything, a credit to the sport. And, as for fouls against Shasta, Bill, let me remind our Coach Carter that, and correct me if I'm wrong, his son's high scoring 30 points of Saturday night included 22 free throws—which resulted from fouls.

I attended the Friday night game, Bill, and I saw fouls on both teams that were not called. However, there are only 2 referees on the floor, and 10 players. It is impossible to catch every infraction of the rules. I also witnessed the red faced Shasta mentor bellowing at the officials from the bench. Never have I witnessed such practices by local coaches and I find such entirely unsportsmanlike. He makes a fine example for his followers.

Let me again remind the Shasta mentor that on any one given day, any one team can beat another. That is what makes sports what they are. Actually, the Christian Brothers' five are not as bad as scores indicate. A review of past scores will clearly show that a majority of large point margins against the 21st Street boys were tallied during the fourth quarters when Regis Hurley, coach and former Sacramento State star, substituted his reserves against opponents' high scores. In the outing against Shasta, against a supposed better team, the game was close all the way into the fourth quarter with never more than 10 points separating the two teams who were making basket for basket. When Hurley substituted his reserves, the Shastans scored three to one, and so, the apparent rout. It has been the same all the way through the season, Bill. Only in the last two games has Hurley refrained from his "free" substitution policy, and the scores show Brothers as tough as any team in the city: Brothers 66, Shasta 60; Brothers 41, Sacramento 43.

No, Bill, I am not a former Brothers' student as it may appear. In fact, I went to Sacramento High, and Junior College. But, as I said, I am an average fan who enjoys sports. And, while I'm harping on all this, may I also bring to your attention, that your write-ups in the paper, in regards to Christian Brothers, hardly measure up to those of Sacramento, Grant, or McClatchy. In fact, never once have I read praise for the talents of Don Terra, who has paced the Gael efforts well enough to earn him the position of fourth highest scorer in the city—having played fewer games than his adversaries.

I have watched all of our young preps at one time or another, and Don Terra sets my nomination as the most underrated cager in the city. What chance has a youngster to get a chance at a college scholarship and bring some degree of honor to his city—when his own hometown paper fails to support him? Even the Shasta paper gives him more credit than we do. How about that, Bill? Let's try and do something about this.

Bill, I wrote this letter chiefly as a reply to Coach Carter's attack on Vic Zito. It's about time we stood up in defense of our officials who are doing their best—always.

Thirty seconds later Ferriere assumed the hero's role again by netting the game deciding free points.

The Lions led at the quarter 14 to 10. In the second period CBS came back to claim a 21 to 20 lead on Terra's 25 footer but Wimberley dumped in three from 20 feet as the home club gained a 29 to 23 lead at the intermission.

## Terra Paces Scorers

Terra paced the scorers with 19 points while Wimberley made 17 and Zuniga 12.

The C. K. McClatchy High School's league leading B team picked up a 48 to 46 victory in the preliminary tilt. Larry Kelley and Ardel Hamilton led the Lions with 16 points each. Bob Silva sparked the losers with 15.

Grant Union, which dominated the 1954-55 basketball season in the capital city area with its tremendous winning streak, added three of the first five and five of the first seven players to the Sacramento Union's All-City team.

Christian Brothers and McClatchy High were the only "outsiders" to break through the Pacer bloc.

Here are the boys honored as the best in Sacramento for the 1954-55 season:

Forward—Fred Scott, Grant Union, senior.

Forward—Don Terra, Christian Brothers, senior.

Center—Walt Torrence, Grant Union, senior.

Guard—Allen Wimberly, McClatchy, senior.

Guard—Oliver Stevenson, Grant Union, senior.

Reserves—Tony Contreras, Grant Union, center, senior; Perry Corker, Grant Union, guard, senior.

The all-senior team is one of the strongest in many years in the capital city.

Torrence, the only repeater from the 1953-54 squad, is probably the most versatile player on the team. At 6-4 he is as slick as most smaller men and is equally effective defensively and offensively. He won the scoring championship as a sophomore and this year has added a little more poise while scoring even better.

**OFFENSIVELY, BIG WALT** can score from anywhere and with a variety of shots. He has great spring in his legs (he's so a high jumper) which makes him a top rebounder and generally a nuisance for his frustrated opponents. Few players can give past Torrence when he's on the defensive. He just won't take a fake.

Wimberly, Torrence's chief rival in scoring this year, has been a one-man gang at McClatchy. He's done everything a coach could ask.

Allen jumped center on his squad but wasn't necessarily a post man. He can shoot from far out or drive under the basket, which makes him a real threat. The six feet, 1 inch Wimberly led the scoring race for most of the season but came to his best effort when he tanked 31 points against Modesto High. It was the same game in which he brought his team from behind with eight field goals in the last quarter to give the Lions a chance to win in an overtime.

**SCOTT PROBABLY HAS MORE** shots than any other prep player in Sacramento, which makes him a hard man to defend. He's a steady Eddie ball player who seems to get as much pleasure "padding" points to his teammates as he does tossing in his own old goals.

When the pressure is toughest, Scott will come up with the big play. At 6-2, Scott is a strong rebounder and good defensive player generally.

Don Terra, like Wimberly at McClatchy, has had a big load to carry for Christian Brothers and he's kept them from complete failure this season.

Playing on what was the weakest CBS team in many years, Terra has nevertheless kept the opposition honest. A 6-footer, Terra is not a flashy player. Rather he's the type of cager who will do a job for a coach and do it well at all times. The biggest man on the Brothers' starting five, Terra has had to do most of the rebounding on defense and scoring on offense. He never lets up.

**TERRA PLAYED A BIG ROLE** when he led the Gaels to their startling upset over McClatchy recently and outscored Wimberly, 19-17, in the contest.

### J. V BASEBALL

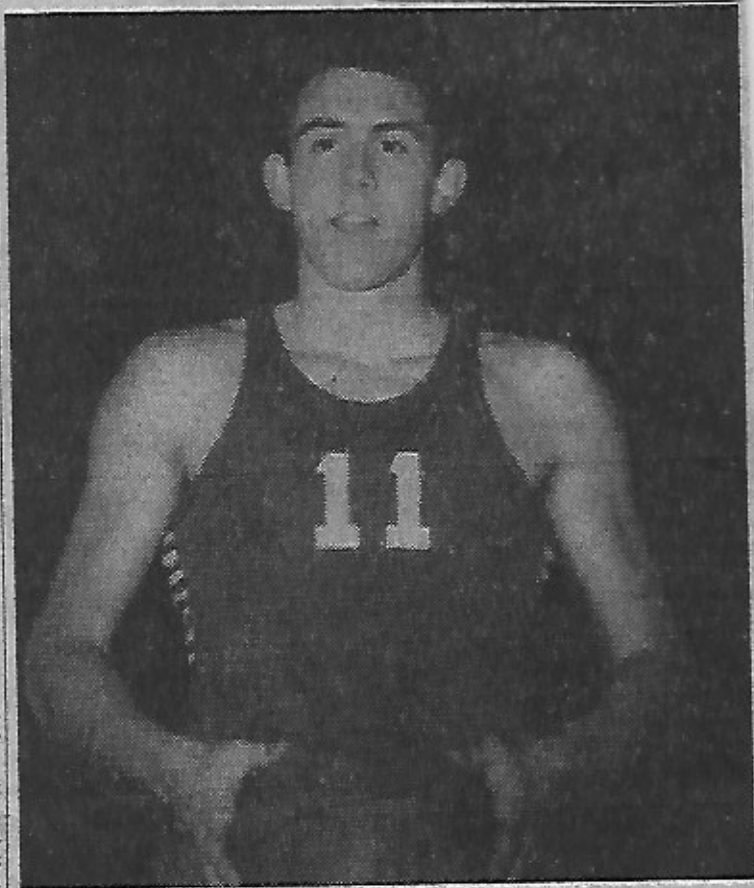

## Outstanding Club

Wimberley, Torrence, Contreras and Scott, who were unanimous choices, and Terra produce the requisites for an outstanding club. Each stands over the six foot mark with Torrence the tallest at 6-4 and together they have excellent scoring potential, tremendous rebounding and smart floor play.

Torrence has averaged 16.8 points, Wimberley 16.5 and Terra 12.7. Scott and Contreras have averaged nine points each but the former's consistent all around play has been vital to the unbeaten Pacers while Contreras' rebounding and tips leave nothing to be desired.

Torrence and Wimberley have been running first and second all year in the city scoring race with Walter having a seven point edge, 336 to 319, entering tonight's finales.

## Stands Above Record

CBS has won only three games this season but that does not take anything away from Terra. Workhorse Don has had to carry the brunt of the offensive load as can be seen by the fact 102 points separate him from the Gaels' second best

scorer. Furthermore, the Brothers rely on him for consistent rebounding.

Stevenson, at 5-9, is the little fellow on the mythical outfit. A smooth ball handler, southpaw Oliver is an effective shooter from the outside and a whale of a ballhawk.

Those six boys are seniors. So there is plenty of room for newcomers a year hence.

Torrence holds four school cage records at Grant. They are 36 points for one game and 386 for the season and 29 rebounds for one game and 375 for the season. . . . Al McFadyen's 32 points, however, still is tops for a Pacer in a conference contest. Big Al turned that trick in 1942-43. . . . A new class B scoring mark went into Grant's book when Cleo Shuler pumped in 32 points last week against the C. K. McClatchy High School.

The selection of Brother Xavier, CBS principal, to the Northern Section board of managers of the California Interscholastic Federation probably shocked some of the officials in the Sac-Joaquin Section. The Sac-Joaquin Section adamantly, by secret ballot, has refused to recognize the Gaels as regular members. . . . Del Paso Heights representatives stand a chance of capturing three hoop crowns. Victories tonight for Grant Tech over Napa in the Golden Valley Conference and Grant Union's Bs over the Woodland lightweights in the Sac-Joaquin Conference will give them a share of the crown. Grant Union's class A eagles already have clinched a tie for the title.
