Christian Brothers High School has a storied athletic tradition. But for fifty years, we've had to play our home games away from home. This past winter, someone asked, "Why don't we play home games at home?" The answer, because we've always done it that way wasn't good enough. That was it. The wheels were in motion to try something new. Thanks to the generosity of some alumni, the willingness of our parents, and the tireless work of our facilities crew and athletic department staff, six months later, the Falcons emerged from their own locker room to the roar of 1,000+ fans. The football flow through the brand new goal posts seven times. The again brand new scoreboard lit up a final score of 49 – 24, Falcons win.

The aftermath of Hurricane Katrina ... generous students

The day after the hurricane devastated the gulf coast, Christian Brothers High School put in a call to the Christian Brothers headquarters in Maryland. Our offer ... any displaced student from a Christian Brothers high school (there are two high schools in New Orleans) who wishes to attend Christian Brothers Sacramento is welcome to do so. Tuition will not be an issue. And if we need to find a home for his/her family and help mom and dad find work, we pledge to do our best. The staff person on the other end of the line was stunned. He'd pass the word along. There had been discussion of schools in Texas and the Midwest contemplating such an offer ... but none from as far as California. As it turns out, lots of other schools extended the offer. We all read about it in the news. But we did it because it was the right thing to do. And when people told us we should call the news and have our good words celebrated, we declined. It just seemed awkward to seek credit for doing the right thing.

About a week after the hurricane, the morning news featured a Catholic girls school in Pennsylvania. Their gimmick was to blast annoying polka music through the PA system until \$3,000 was raised for the Red Cross. Meanwhile, here in Sacramento, our students created a prayer chain and passed around a hat. No out of uniform days, no bake sales, no gimmicks. Almsgiving. Philanthropy. One group of seniors had the idea of inviting parents to participate. These seniors stood in front of the school with fish nets collecting money from parents. Again, no recognition or reward. Our school community raised \$8,400 in a week.

Some people say we should boast more. We will. But charity has to come from the heart. We're a Catholic school. Our faith tells us that charity is our baptismal calling.

Education tells us that we-should teach lessons that count. I think our students are learning the right lessons.

A new Catholic high school in Sacramento

By now you may have heard that St. Peter's and All Hallows grade schools had merged to create John Paul II School on the former All Hallows site. You may also have heard that the Sisters of Mercy, the Sisters of Notre Dame de Namur, and the Society of Jesus (Jesuits) were joining force to open a new Catholic high school on the vacated St. Peter's site. Well, the rumors are true. Plans are underway to open a Cristo Rey model high school in Sacramento. The Cristo Rey model high school is a Catholic, college prep school. Its students, all of whom are required to be poor, work one day a week in order to help pay tuition. The Christian Brothers' district (provincial headquarters in Napa) are familiar with this model, having opened similar schools in Portland and Tucson in the past five years. Some people question the need for this school, since Christian Brothers High School has been providing an excellent Catholic education the poor of Sacramento for generations. But we see it as we think St. John Baptist de La Salle would want us to see it ... as a welcome partner in the marketplace. De La Salle was an innovator who was focused on his mission. Board of Trustees plans for the future

The Christian Brothers High School Board of Trustees is comprised of eleven volunteers who are committed to our Catholic, Lasallian mission. They are chosen by the Christian Brothers (our legal and moral owners) to represent the Brothers and ensure that the charism of St. John Baptist de La Salle is carried out in worthy fashion. Earlier this week, over eighty people gathered at the invitation of the CBHS Board of Trustees to participate in a visioning workshop. The participants were faculty/administration, current/past/prospective parents, aluimni spanning 78 years, current students, representatives from our broader Lasallian, Catholic, educational, and secular communities. The response to the invitation was beyond anyone's expectation. What a sign of love for CB! The evening was electric. The group got 'outside the box' to envision what a Catholic, Lasallian education could look like in the year 2015! The Board will use the information gathered to create a vision and pass that vision along to the administration and me. Then it will be our responsibility to put the plans in place to make that vision reality.

Giving back, giving from the hear ... generous friends

Over the past couple of months, I have received three separate phone calls from two alumni and a past parent who wish to make a gift to the school. The first call came from an alumnus from the 1960's. He and his wife were putting together their estate plan and decided to include Christian Brothers as beneficiary. In his words, "I received a great education at Christian Brothers and I want to provide that type of education to someone else." Although this estate gift will not be materialized for probably 25 years, this couple

is pleased to know that their remaining assets will be used to establish a scholarship for a deserving student in perpetuity. The second phone call came from an alumnus of the 1940's. His son, a 1967 alumnus, had passed away unexpectedly. The father, now in his 80's inherited as estate worth over \$400,000. "I don't need it. I want Christian Brothers to have the money. Education is so important today. Use the money however you best see fit to help kids." The third call was from a man in his 50's. He lost his son and wife in a car accident. His son was fifteen when he died ... beginning his sophomore year at Christian Brothers. "My wife and I did not come from families that could afford tuition. We attended Catholic high school thanks to the generosity of others. Christian Brothers exceeded all of our highest expectations. At our time of tragedy we were so toughed by the outpouring of support from CB.

Kids are happy

At back to school night, I asked parents how the first couple of weeks had been going for their daughters and sons. "She came home and said "I Love School Mom." He's doing more homework than he'd ever imagined ... and he's not complaining." "In meeting his teachers, I wish I could go back to high school."
