Christian Brothers School adopts aggressive development program

For Sacramento's Christian Brothers High School, the second decade of its second century of existence is a time not idly to reminisce or complacently to revel in past achievements.

Instead, the school's administration and faculty, with the support of its alumni and friends, have decided to make the remaining 80s and 90s years in which to grapple realistically and creatively with challenges.

The 112-year-old school has a proud history. More than 7,000 students have graduated from its programs. Many of these have attained unusual success and have, in turn, left their marks on the community and beyond.

From the rigors of the 19th century, through the uncertainties of two world wars and the threat of the great depression, the Brothers' school has not only survived; it has thrived. This is not surprising, considering the 300-year tradition of Brothers of the Christian Schools, who received from their founder, St. John Baptist de La Salle (1651-1719), an inheritance undaunted by obstacles and firm in the conviction that the teaching of youth is a ministry of grace, achieved by the collaborative efforts of those sharing a common vision, motivated by gospel values and dedicated to the pursuit of goals that stand the test of time and eternity. De La Salle challenged his followers constantly to view all things through the eyes of faith. community of the institution's content and to persuade them of its value.

While 90 percent of Christian Brothers graduates go on to college, the school's curriculum is also deTraditionally the Christian Brothers of the California region have been able to subsidize their educational apostolates with revenue from the Christian Brothers wineries. A substantial portion of the annual short-fall at Christian Brothers High School is made up from this source.

Recent years have, however, seen a significant decline in wine sales along with a corresponding increase in production and labor costs. This has seriously curtailed the wineries contributions to the cause of education.

One fact that becomes abundantly clear from even a casual examination of the operation of the Brothers' school is that its operation depends heavily on the support of parents and alumni and their various fund-raising endeavors.

The LaSalle Club, the Parents Service Organizations, the CB 200 club, among others, sponsor several major events every year to benefit the school and to provide scholarship assistance for its students.

"It takes a lot of time and effort," says alumnus Doug Carson, vice president and general manager of Lorelei Productions, Inc., Sacramento. "However, it doesn't seem like work. We operate on the theory, 'Fundraising can be fun.' And as a matter of fact, that is exactly what it has been for me. It's been some 20 years since I graduated from Brothers, and yet I feel and know that I belong there. I guess it's true: 'Once a Brothers' boy, always a Brothers' boy.' I'm sure Christian Brothers School will be around another 100 years and more."

To provide such a program is necessarily costly. The current annual tuition charge of \$2,700 falls more than \$1,000 short of the actual per-student cost of operation, which is in excess of \$3,800, according to the school's accounting office. 
A second place winner will receive a fully restored 1966 Mustang, an award winner at the recent Sacramento Autorama.
