

Sacramento Dragons Sweep Track Meet With Gaels

The Sacramento High School Dragons, relying on reserves, won all three divisions of a track meet from the Christian Brothers School Gaels on the SHS field.

Yesterday's scores were 56% to 45% in class A, 61 to 39 in class B and 67 to 28 in class C.

Eagles Rate As Potent Threat For Cal Aggie Picnic Day Track Title

Local prepsters will be among the 1,072 entries slated to compete tomorrow in the 21st running of the Cal Aggie Picnic Day track meet in Davis and it looks as if the swift Eagles of El Camino High School stand the best chance to bring back the title.

El Camino, sparked by the sensational Al Kellogg and a 880 yard relay team which has

been timed in 1:30.9 and 1:31.1, rates among the top contenders in the large school division.

Kellogg, who was third in both sprints last year in Davis, has broken the tape in :09.9 in the 100 and :21.2 in the 220. He has consistently bettered 22 flat the furlong. With him on the relay foursome are Jon Beave, Tom Lionvale and Roger Silk.

The latter also is a fine hurdler. In his last outing against Woodland he negotiated the 120 highs in :14.9.

Dragons Have Chance

The Sacramento Dragons gave El Camino a stiff tussle before bowing in their debut meet and they have an outside chance if the Eagles fail to cor through. However, while the Dragons could capture many places they do not figure when it comes to firsts. And C. K. McClatchy High School Lions, in one of their lean campaigns, should not frighten anybody although they hope to pick up points with the likes of sprinter Warren Knight and hurdler Allen Wimberley.

Grant Union's Walter Torrence will be trying for his second straight triumph in the high jump. Last year he gained five points by clearing 6-1 1/2 and in 1953 he topped the class contestants. This year he has made 6-2 twice.

The Christian Brothers Gaels are entered in the middle school division. They lack depth but have point possibilities. Don Terra in the dash and Bill Ferraira in the half mile.

Class B Outlook

Sacramento looms as a potent threat in class B. The Dragon feature Dick Lemen, who recently ran the 75 high hurdle 10 flat; sprinter and broad jumper Prentice Gorman, and p vaulter Bob Wilson. Two days ago Gorman broad jumped 4 1/2 and Wilson cleared the at 11 feet.

The annual prep classic, directed by Woody Wilson of California Aggies, will draw from 66 schools as far north as the Oregon border and as south as Bakersfield. Thus establishing a definite favorite any division is tough to do.

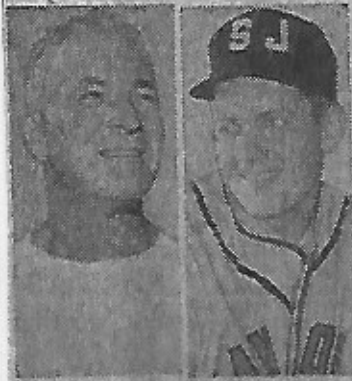

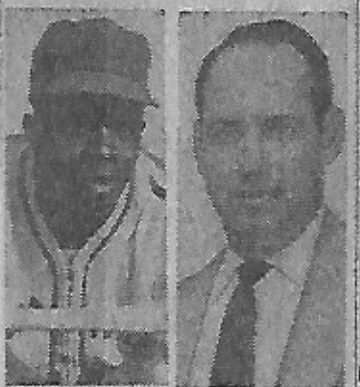
SCHOOL SPORTS NOTEBOOK

Shasta Vaulters Gladwell Clears Height of 12-3

Championship trophy of the first annual Northern Interstate Conference track meet rests in the possession of Reno High School Huskies.

Coach John Robb's balanced squad yesterday scored 47 points at Foster Field here to win the new bi-state circuit's 1955 title meet. Chico Panthers were second with 37½, Shasta's Wolves from Redding took third with 32½, and Christian Brothers Gaels of Sacramento were fourth with 24.

The Huskies took a slim lead early in the meet and clung to it all the way; although Chico was only a half-point behind at the end of six events, trailed just two and a half points after nine were con-

cluded. With 11 events completed, it was Reno 39, Shasta 32½, Chico 31½. In the last two contests the Huskies pulled safely away and Chico regained second from Shasta.

All marks made here yesterday will go down in the books as official NIC meet records, and at least one of them should stand quite a while. Russ Gladwell, pole vaulter from Shasta, cleared 12 feet 3 inches. Although he missed in three tries at 12-6, Gladwell's 12-3 stands as a stadium record for Foster Field, eclipsing the 12-1¼" by George Smith of Reno last year. It is believed that Gladwell's vault, nearly two inches above the official Nevada state meet record, is the best height ever reached by a high school athlete in this state.

Gladwell had the top performance of the day, but the leading individual was Christian Brothers' Don Terra. This 6'1", 180-pound senior scored three first places, winning both dashes and the broad jump. The tall bespectacled speedster, who was CBS' leading scorer during basketball season, edged Reno's scrappy little Hugh

shot put with some excellent performances. Brawny Bob Thompson propelled the 12-pound ball a winning distance of 47' 2½". He had three good heaves past the 46' mark. And Reno's sophomore Tom Clark showed exceptional promise with a second-place put of 46' 7". Noel Manoukian of Reno was a close fourth behind Sterling of Chico.

The mystery events of the meet—so labelled because no one knew what to expect of any entrants—were the hurdles. But Dick Thies, a big blonde speedster from Redding, left no doubt about the outcome. He won the high in 15.8 and the lows in 21.5 by decisive margins. The high jump wound up in a four-way tie.

UNDER CLEAR SKIES

The conference's first track meet was blessed with clear skies and warm sunshine, although, a stiff breeze blowing crossways over the field—and shifting from northwest to southwest—made it tough on the runners. Up to yesterday the Reno area has been swept by icy, rain-sprinkled winds; and the three California teams were unable to participate all week because of heavy rains in their respective cities. The win yesterday gave Reno two out of three championships for the first full year of Northern Interstate Conference competition. Christian Brothers won the football title, Reno the basketball and track.

Leading the Huskies were Bob Thompson, shot-putter; Dick Hughes, quarter-miler; and an 880-mile relay team for the three Reno first places. But Reno's depth provided most of the home club's points. Strength in the sprints, mile, shot put and broad jump also paid off for Robb's crew.

Chico High, running the 440-yard relay event for the first time, upset Reno's dash quartet by a yard. The time of 45.7 was the third best ever run on Foster Field. But the Huskies came back in the 880 relay to climax the meet, as Dick Hughes beat off pressing Dan Weston by four feet. Time of 1:36 was third best ever run on the local field.

Two Big Upsets

One of the biggest upsets occurred in the half mile where Shasta's Lundquist won in 2:13.3 in a blanket finish with Ferreira, CBS ace who had previously been clocked in 2:03. Another upset was in the broad jump. Chico's John Sterling had done 21' 10" earlier this month. But, corked from his efforts in other events, he was shut out yesterday. Terra of CBS got out 20' 3¼" to win, and Reno's Hugh Barnhill leaped and inched a half past Chico's Stapp for second place, which virtually cinched the meet for Reno.

An outstanding performance was that of Chico's tall, slim Frank Ramos in the mile run. He followed the fast pace set by Reno's Boyd Kelley for three laps (64, 2:18, 3:39), passed the tiring Renoite on the back stretch and loped home 30 yards. Sophomore Paul Campbell of Reno closed fast to beat teammate Kelly by 20 yards. Ramos' time was 4:52.7, second best mile ever run on Foster Field. (Last year Dan Pease of Tonopah did it in 4:49.)

Leads All the Way

Reno's Dick Hughes turned in a consistent run in the 440 to lead from start to finish. Clocking in 53.9, the Reno senior won by three yards over teammate Rod Moen. The Huskies dominated the
