"Most opted to continue their Catholic educations," said Brian Seymour, Loretto's athletic director for 17 years, now a corporate manager for a West Sacramento emergency services firm.

"Most of the older students chose Christian Brothers while the young students tended to go to St. Francis."

While there were no winners when Loretto High School closed following the 2008-09 academic year, another of Sacramento's private Catholic schools certainly benefited from the dispersal of the school's studentathletes.

Kayla Neto, The Bee's Player of the Year in 2008 now starting at Cal State Fullerton, was the Falcons' lone senior last year, and her graduation left a 6-foot-3 hole.

Enter 6-4 senior Megan Anders, who has started on the varsity since her freshman year at Loretto.

Joining Anders on the Falcons' varsity are setter Sara Biondi, libero Annie Peabody and outside hitter Kim Fazio.

"I was happy when I found out they were coming here," coach Jeff Deter said.

While Anders isn't expected to join the starting lineup until later in the season – she broke two vertebrae in her back playing for a Deter-coached club team in April – it appears the added depth has the Falcons headed to the state tournament again.

"I wanted the best opportunity to win," Biondi said. "I definitely I think I can help them make it back (to state)."

Deter's dilemma is what to do at setter. Returning is last year's first-team All-Metro setter, Kelly Pelz, who has received an equal amount of , repetitions with Biondi, a 2008 All-Capital Athletic League selection.

The Falcons have options. Deter could run a 5-1 offense (one setter who sets all the way around the rotation) or a 6-2 (two setters who set only
