Sports Medicine Program at Christian Brothers High School

Each day as the school day ends, between 15 and 20 young women report to the athletic training room at Christian Brothers High School. They are not there to have an ankle taped before a practice or to rehabilitate an injury. They are there to learn to tape ankles and assist athletes needing care before practice and during games. Darei Stark, ATC, the school's certified athletic trainer and physical education teacher facilitates and after-school sport's medicine program. Students learn to help athletes who may need to have an ankle or wrist taped before a competition. They also learn lessons in anatomy, exercise physiology, biomechanics, injury prevention and recognition as well as the importance of proper hydration during practice and competitions.

"This program is a great way to introduce our students to the world of athletic training and in a small degree, sports medicine," says Stark. "The students take it very seriously and really come in here to learn. They are a tremendous help before and during games and the program continues to grow."

One former participant, Stephanie Gabrielli '07, is now studying kinesiology at C.S.U. Sacramento and plans on becoming an athletic trainer. Gabrielli arranged to participate in an internship at CB and regularly joins in on classes after school.
