

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
#### THE CHRISTIAN BROTHERS CONNECTION

# **ALUMNI PROFILE**

# THOSE WERE THE DAYS FOR ED CAIN

There are few who can remember Sacramento's good old days.

When the Capitol Park palm trees weren't much taller than a lamppost. Or when tiny minnows came out the kitchen tap.

Or when Brothers' Boys took instruction in a two-story structure on 12th and K Streets. But as one of the oldest living graduates of Christian Brothers High School, Edward Cain ('18) remembers all this and more.

He remembers studying mathematics, chemistry, physics, civics, and literature in the "academic" curriculum. (The school also taught courses in a three-year "commercial" curriculum.)

"The Brothers were a dedicated group, very thorough in their instruction," Cain says.

The students at Christian Brothers, however, found time for levity, Cain recalls. Leland Hill, a classmate and "a real wag," one day disguised a handful of bullets in wads of paper that he left on the floor. Finding

the room amiss, Brother Euphrasius told Hill to put the paper in the class-room stove. Hill complied. "In three or four minutes, you'd thought it was the Battle of Verdin," Cain laughs.

Cain started at the Brothers school in 1912, the year his father moved the family from Oakland to start his own glass business. Young Ed worked in the business throughout his life. He was also a dedicated altar boy, serving mass for Bishop Grace in the Cathedral every morning for years.

Upon graduation from CBS in 1918, Cain entered Officers Training School, was honorably discharged at the end of World War I, and attended University of California at Berkeley. He returned to the family business in 1922 and later graduated with a Bachelor of Laws Degree from McGeorge College of Law in 1929.

He was one of the original charter members of the 20-30 Club, which was founded in Sacramento in 1922. He started the chapter's monthly magazine called the *Twenty-Thirtian*


and for years wrote editorials for the publication that was circulated to over 8,000 at the heighth of its popularity.

Cain played a central role in Sacramento's recent history. He was elected to the group that wrote the present Sacramento County Charter, and he successfully lobbied for its adoption. As a result, he was persuaded to go into local politics.

In 1940 he was elected to the

# CARISSMI IN SECOND TERM AS REGENT PRESIDENT

Christian Brothers is fortunate to have a dedicated group of men and women sharing their special talents and expertise on the Board of Regents.

One such talented person is Ron Carissmi, a leading Sacramento architect who served on the first Board of Regents ten years ago and is currently in his second term as Board President.

A native of Sacramento, Ron shares a long history with both the Sacramento community and CBS. He began his association with CBS in 1947 as an entering freshman, after graduating from Sacred Heart Elementary School. Four years later he was elected student body president. Upon graduation he was the recipient of the Bank of America Award in Fine Arts.

Ron attended St. Mary's College and later the University of Notre Dame where he graduated

Cum Laude in Architecture and received two gold medals in architectural design.

After a tour of duty with the U.S. Navy's Mobile Construction Battalion in the Pacific, he returned to Sacramento armed with architectural knowledge, and joined the architectural firm of Barovetto & Thomas. There he steadily climbed the rungs from designer to associate to President of what is now known as Carissmi Rohrer and Harper.

### **CAMPUS PROFILE**

#### A KEY TO CBS HUMANITIES? IT HAS TO BE ENGLISH

Tom English brings nine years of experience and national exposure to his history classes

Ask a student at Christian Brothers about Mr. English and his history class, and you are likely to get a strange glance, turning to a puzzled look, and—depending on whether or not the student did his homework the previous night—evolving into a knowing sneer. But the response among students is generally uniform—he's really hard but he's really interesting.

Tom English has been teaching at CBS for nine years, and he's developed a reputation among his students and colleagues that is both impressive and well-earned. With a unique and scholarly background, English has brought his learning and insight to the Humanities department, and left an imprint that is quickly discernible.

English has used his learning and sharp wit in a variety of courses at CBS, including history, public speaking, English, and the only philosophy course offered at CBS. He has also served as department coordinator for the Humanities department.

After attending Bakersfield Community College, English graduated from U.C. Davis in 1971 with a B.A. in history, and then moved on to CSUS, where he earned a M.A. in Ancient History.

In addition to his graduate work, English has spent two summers

expanding his humanities background by attending nation-wide seminars. In 1985 he attended the National Endowment for the Humanities Seminar Fellowship at Harvard, and in 1988 he invited again to the national seminars, this time at Notre Dame.

English took part in seminars on pre-Socratic philosophy, Plato, and Aristotle.

English has also taught at Sacramento City College for 15 years as an evening instructor in humanities and philosophy.

He has two daughters in college, and he and his wife, Priscilla, are adopting a 4-year old boy.

English came to CBS because there was nothing available in the public schools, and, like many who first arrive on campus, was immediately impressed with the environment and attitude of the students.

"Christian Brothers has a tradition, a sense of community and belong-

ing," English said.
"That's one of the things students take with them when they leave this place. It makes the experience more personal, which comes from the La-Sallian philosophy."

English has taken an active role in the CBS community, having been involved with numerous projects and activities. Currently, English is the moderator of the California Scholar-

ship Federation (CSF) and the National Honor Society. CSF has two big fund-raisers a year—the annual PAL Christmas basketball tournament and selling used books—and helps provide the students with what English considers one of the strengths of a Christian Brothers education—"more of a sense of who they are."

Which is what English thinks makes CBS unique. "There is more concern for students here, more support for the average student to succeed," English said. "The teachers are more interested in their welfare. The programs are more innovative than in public schools."

Many of the buildings Ron has designed have won awards from the American Institute of Architecture. Notable Sacramento buildings, designed by Ron and his firm include the Sacramento History Center, the Point West Building, renovation of the Senator Hotel, Presentation and St. Lawrence's Catholic Churches, and his own office, the Christofer Oaks Building.

Ron and his wife, Patricia have been constant and loyal supporters of CBS. In addition to his role with the Regents, Ron is a past president of P.S.O. Their eldest son, Kevin, a graduate of CBS, is currently attending Fresno State University on a golf schoolarship. Their daughter Amy attends St. Francis High School while their youngest son Steven attends Presentation Elementary School.

Ron's leadership on the Board of Regents has earned him high praise and honor by his fellow board members, CBS faculty, and alumni.

8th District Assembly where he served one term in the State Legislature, representing the "north" half of the City of Sacramento. In that short time, he initiated bills that led to the construction of the overpass across the American River (now the Business 80 freeway); the development of Capitol Mall; and the establishment of Sacramento State College.

Later, he was appointed by Governor Earl Warren to the State Unemployment Insurance Appeals Board, the highest authority for settling labor and managment disputes in the unemployment insurance field. He heard over 20,000 cases in his term.

In 1955, he returned to his glass company, which he sold in August, 1962 to pursue his hobby of writing magazine articles.

During a visit to New York in 1964, a friend invited him to see the New York Stock Exchange. Cain recalled a similar visit in September, 1929, "when the stock market was at its peak just before the Crash," he said, referring to the famous downturn of the stock market.

On the floor of the Exchange, Cain's friend demonstrated such a knack for selling and buying stocks that Cain was persuaded to stay on and learn the business. He has been a stockbroker ever since.

Today he is a financial consultant at Shearson Lehman Hutton in the Campus Commons Financial Center. Cain is reported to be the oldest stockbroker in Sacramento. At 89, he doesn't see any reason to quit. Louise, his wife of 68 years, agrees.



Students and faculty take steps to remember David Castillo


The following article is taken from a speech given by CBS Student Body President Michael Doctolero at the memorial service for senior David Castillo, who was fatally injured while jogging on the night of February 15.

I'd like to take this opportunity to say a few words on behalf of the student body of Christian Brothers. I think it was Anthony Molina, David's best friend, who said that he finally realized what Christian Brothers was all about because of the people who went to the hospital whom he really didn't know, and the brothers and teachers who were there for the Castillo family. This is just one example of how David had an

We aren't here physically forever, and neither is a tree, but this tree would be somehthing physical that represents a longer life than David had. David's physical life was short, but the life he has now is eternal.

Everyone has a dream that they will leave a mark—the dream that they will be remembered for something good that they have done. And although David did not live long enough to accomplish as much as he would have liked, he still deserves to be remembered just because of who he was. # CBS ANTICIPATES HIGH MARKS IN WASC VISITATION

From March 5th through the 8th, as the culmination of its accreditation self-evaluation process, Christian Brothers was visited by a team of educators representing the Western Association of Schools and Colleges. The five-member team was chaired by Sr. Catherine Sedgeman, Principal of St. Francis High in Sacramento. Accompanying Sr. Catherine were Br. Philip Clarke, Principal of La Salle High in Pasadena; Mr. Jack Howard, Head Counselor of Cordova High in Rancho Cordova; Mrs. Mae Carol Iriart, Resource Specialist from Patterson High

in Patterson; and Ms. Barbara Thomas, Principal of McLane High in Fresno.

In preparation for the visitation, Christian Brothers produced a 300-page self-study, consisting of over 22 individual reports written by departments and staff. This self-study was reviewed by the Visiting Team. During their visit, the team met with year term of accreditation. groups to discuss their reports; observed classes, programs, and operations; conducted interviews; and wrote a report of their own, commending superior performance and recommending actions or strategies for im-

provement. Finally, the Visiting Team made a recommendation to the Western Association of Schools and Colleges regarding the school's continued accreditation.

Christian Brothers last underwent accreditation review in 1983, at which time it was awarded the full, six-

# STUDENTS AND FACULTY RALLY FOR LASALLE CLUB RAFFLE SALE

For three weeks Christian Brothers students and faculty took on an ambitious challenge in the annual La Salle Club Raffle ticket sales. This year's efforts brought in some three to four thousand dollars more than the previous campaign, and earned the students a day off and four minimun days with modified dress. The school brought in a total of \$17,042, which was 242 percent of the quota set by this year's moderator, Kevin McGovern.

The money raised was of great importance for athletics at CBS. Funds brought in from ticket sales help defray some of the costs for equipment, supplies, and uniforms for CBS's athletic teams.

The junior class finished on top of the ticket sale competition, netting 274 percent of its quota. The freshmen were not far behind at 244 percent, the sophomores sold 192 percent of its goal, and the seniors 142 percent.

The top seller in the school was social studies teacher Bill Cerney, who sold 105 books. The top student seller was junior John Barone, who sold 57 books. Todd Armstrong was a close second with 56 books, while Kevin Riley peddled 27 books, and Josh Hutchens placed fourth overall with 21 books.

Each book contained 12 tickets. With each ticket, the holder had a chance to win vacation trips to Hawaii, Lake Tahoe, Carmel, and Las Vegas, as well as clothing and cash prizes.

In the class competition, Mr. Cerney's class brought in the most money, totaling \$2,159, while Greg Murphy's class made a rush at the end, finishing with \$1,858 in total sales.

The raffle ticket drive culminated on Feb. 12 with a Rigatoni dinner at CBS. Some 350 people attended the dinner and drawing, far more than in previous years.

All faculty and students should be commended for the effort put forth this year, it was an outstanding drive.

# **CBS STUDENTS** LOOK GOOD DURING THEIR DAY IN COURT

In only its second year of competition, the Christian Brothers Moot Court team made a strong showing in the city-wide contest held in January and February.

Team members Mark de-Vere White, Mike Doctolero, David Rose, Bob Benefiel, and Brian Scott defeated the Moot Court team from Mira Loma in January. However, in their next two contests at the County Courthouse on Feb. 4, they lost close battles to the teams from Jesuit and Del Campo.

This year's Moot Court cases concerned issues of First Amendment rights, the right to a fair trial, the right to privacy, and the right of the state to protect its members.

Co-moderators Virginia McConnell and Mary Jenkins feel that the Moot Court program at CBS will grow even stronger in the future. Their motto? "Wait 'til next vear!"


the F.B.I. list and Moonface's little moll.

# CBS OFFERS A VARIETY OF COURSES FOR THE SUMMER

This year Christian Brothers will hold two sessions of summer school: the high school summer school beginning on June 19 and running until July 21, and the pre-high school classes beginning on June 20 and finishing on July 21.

The course offerings for the high school summer school range from health education to math, to enrichment classes where students can take courses such as art, typing, and religion tutorials. There also will be courses offered in English, social studies, language, and science.

CBS also offeres an inten-

sive 10-unit course that covers a year's material. Tentatively scheduled are studio art, geometry, and chemistry.

The pre-high school summer educational program covers language arts, reading, and math to serve as a transition to and preparation for high school. Pre-high school courses are non-credited because they are taken before a student has actually entered high school.

# CBS ENDOWMENT AIDS SCHOLARS

The Endowed Scholarship Fund was established in 1978 for the purpose of providing assistance to those students who, while fully capable of benefitting from a Christian Brothers education, are not able to afford the full tuition rate.

Now in its eleventh year, the Endowed Scholarship Fund principal totals over \$500,000. This principal is never liquidated. Rather, these funds are invested and the interest generated is used to provide scholarships.

Since its inception, the Endowed Scholarship Fund has been built through scholarships established in memory or recognition of certain individuals, businesses, or organizations. While it is suggested that an initial pledge of \$10,000 be made in order to establish the scholarship, donations of other amounts have been received. Contributions to the various scholarships by friends and relatives of the donor are welcome.

The Development Committee of the Board of Regents, through its Endowment Committee, is currently making plans for a concerted 1989 endowment campaign in order to increase the current fund.
