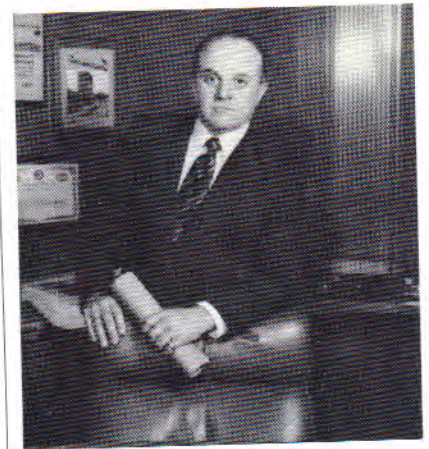

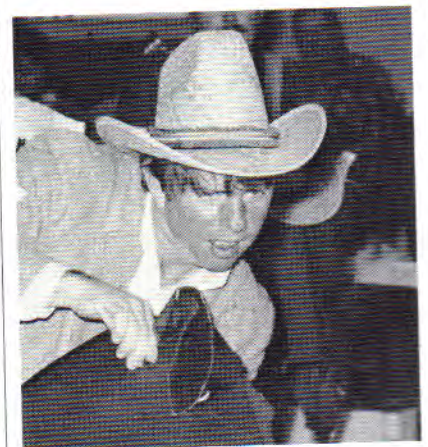

GRIFFITH TAKES LEAVE OF ABSENCE AFTER 15 YEARS OF TEACHING

Dave Griffith's background may not have been exactly compatible with the Christian Brothers, but it was so close to being a perfect match that the two enjoyed a tie that is only being severed by the lure of a new challenge.

Griffith will be taking a year's leave of absence to pursue private business interests. It is a loss that will be felt immediately by both students and faculty at CBS.

Griffith exemplified the quality of a teacher at CBS: intelligent, hard-working, dedicated, and appreciative of the educational atmosphere that permeates the campus. But Griffith is one that took those qualities one step further—and expected the same from his students.

"I believe in that old adage that says something like, 'If students see something, they forget; if they do something, they learn,'" said Griffith of his philosophy of teaching science. "I'd like to see more hands-on teaching, rather than allusion to science. Students need to experience more. High school should be an introduction to the rest of the world of science. They can't get a complete view in high school. We have to make them more eager, better prepared for what comes next, and not shut them down. I think that if they can't have fun doing it, it's probably not worth doing."

Griffith taught science primarily at CBS, but he has also dabbled with all but a few of the math courses offered, English, and an integrated sci-

ence course taught through the Humanities program. He had also been extremely active in extracurricular activities, handling such diverse duties as golf coach (1976-80), Assistant soccer coach (1975), Moderator of the school newspaper, Class Moderator (two years), and filming football games.

For the past nine years Griffith had been the director of the graduation ceremonies, a time-consuming task, even for the most detail-oriented person. Evidence of his work could be en-

joyed each June as the graduation ceremony and accompanying events flow on schedule.

And if all that wasn't enough, Griffith taught part-time for the Los Rios Community College District since 1979, and he also taught summer school at CBS for nine years. He is also working towards a Masters in Education, but work has been stalled with the illness of his advisor.

So how did he find time to dedicate to his students, wife Mary, and two children? According to Griffith, it worked because he runs on guilt—he just finds it difficult to say no to anyone or any job. But his frantic pace and self-imposed demands rubbed off on his students.

"I try to realize that every student has their own pace, and I have to tailor my teaching techniques to his pace," Griffith said. "There is no reason for a student to fail, but some do. That's the hardest part of my philosophy to reconcile, that some do fail. Any young person will learn almost in spite of the teacher."

REGENT PROFILE

REGENT FRANK RAMOS GETS INVOLVED WITH CBS

If a person didn't know any better, they would swear that Frank Ramos was born and bred by the Christian Brothers, so dedicated is his involvement with Christian Brothers High School. But not only did Ramos not graduate from CBS, none of his four sons attended the school either, a fact that still bothers Ramos.

"I made a big mistake not insisting my sons go to Christian Brothers," said Ramos, one of many very active Regents currently serving on the Board. "Once I saw what went on here, I wanted to get involved. I liked what they were doing—providing a quality Christian education, and they didn't discriminate on who could go there."

Ramos, who has been active in CBS activities for the past 15 years, was most impressed with the quality of students who graduated from the school. He sees that as one of CBS' strengths today. "The students that

come out are well-qualified to go to a college and be successful; it's the basic education they get going through CB."

An other quality that CBS has over most schools, according to Ramos, is the alumni and the feeling generated by the graduates of the school. "There is a closeness they [the alumni] have in the fraternity of alumni. With the winery cutting off all support, the slack has been picked up through the hard work of the alumni. That comes from the closeness you feel going through here, and that continues with a great sense of responsibility."

Ramos graduated from East Nicholas High School, but is just as

proud of his honorary diploma from CBS because of the hard work and dedication it represents.

After graduating from high school, Ramos's career took some interesting turns to get him to the position in which he now finds himself. He joined the Marine Corps and served in the Korean War. Upon his return to the Sacramento area, he went in to the oil business—the Ramco Oil Company—and worked 25 years as a jobber, buying and selling products.

While buying and selling oil products, Ramos was also buying agricultural land and land to be developed, foreseeing a boon on the horizon. That foresight has paid off. Ramos has moved into real estate development, and currently works to rezone land and subdivide it for development.

Ramos has also diversified his operations with two businesses, a

Griffith's philosophy of education had been molded from an interesting background. Born in Illinois, he moved to California at a very young age, and then to American Fork, Utah when he was five, where he was raised in the public school system. At the beginning of his sophomore year, Griffith enrolled in a private co-ed boarding school, Wasatch Academy, a Presbyterian school in Mt. Pleasant, Utah (population 2,000).

From there Griffith went to Utah State University, where he graduated with a degree in Physics. He had not considered a career as a teacher until his senior year, when the secretary of Wasatch Academy called him at Utah State and asked him if he would interview for the job of the man who taught him in high school. He did, he was offered the job, and he spent two years teaching science and math at his alma mater.

The decision was a family affair; his wife was also hired to teach history and English. As a prelude to the type of schedule the Griffiths would keep in the coming years, they cut it close getting to their first day on the job. Mary finished school on a Thursday in August, moved out on

Friday, had a wedding rehearsal Saturday morning, married that afternoon, moved to Mt. Pleasant on Sunday, and started school on Monday.

Two years later, Mary, who was raised in Roseville, was accepted to the U.C. Davis Law School, and the Griffiths moved west. Dave sent out numerous letters, but only two responded, one being CBS. And thus began a long-standing relationship.

Griffith was surprised about one aspect of life at CBS. "In Sacramento all the students had to have a car or they were out of it. At Wasatch, you couldn't use a car if you had one, so there was no conversation about cars. It's a funny thing to remember, but that's still the first thing I think about now."

CBS has many strengths, according to Griffith, and they revolve around the students and their families, a core of strong staff members, the alumni, and strong leadership from the Brothers.

"Traditions, things that never change," Griffith said. "Like strong sports, the involvement of parents, the energy the students bring to the campus, and the dedication of teachers."

The last point, of course, Dave Griffith speaks of with a great deal of experience.

moving in the right direction is leadership. "Brother Richard is an outstanding individual. CB has a man who understands the business end of things as well as the academic, and right now it's critical—you need someone with his expertise."

Ramos feels the rich tradition of the past and the challenges of the future are major factors why a person should get involved with Christian Brothers.

"If you were an individual that went to CB, it's very easy to see why you would get involved," he said. "But for someone who hasn't gone to CB, like me, I feel like I've missed something not being a graduate of CB. In a small way, through fundraising, I feel a small part of it all."

parts house and tool company, both of which are among the largest in Northern California.

As evidenced by his rise in business, Ramos is always up to challenges, and he sees many challenges ahead for CBS. The biggest, according to Ramos, is relocating the campus. "We're working hard to get a site," said Ramos, who favors a site in the North Natomas area. "I hope that the powers that be understand that the present location is the cause of the declining enrollment. Too many parents send their kids to other schools because of the stigma of the area."

sons. The Western Night at the Races is a major fundraiser that helps make this possible.
