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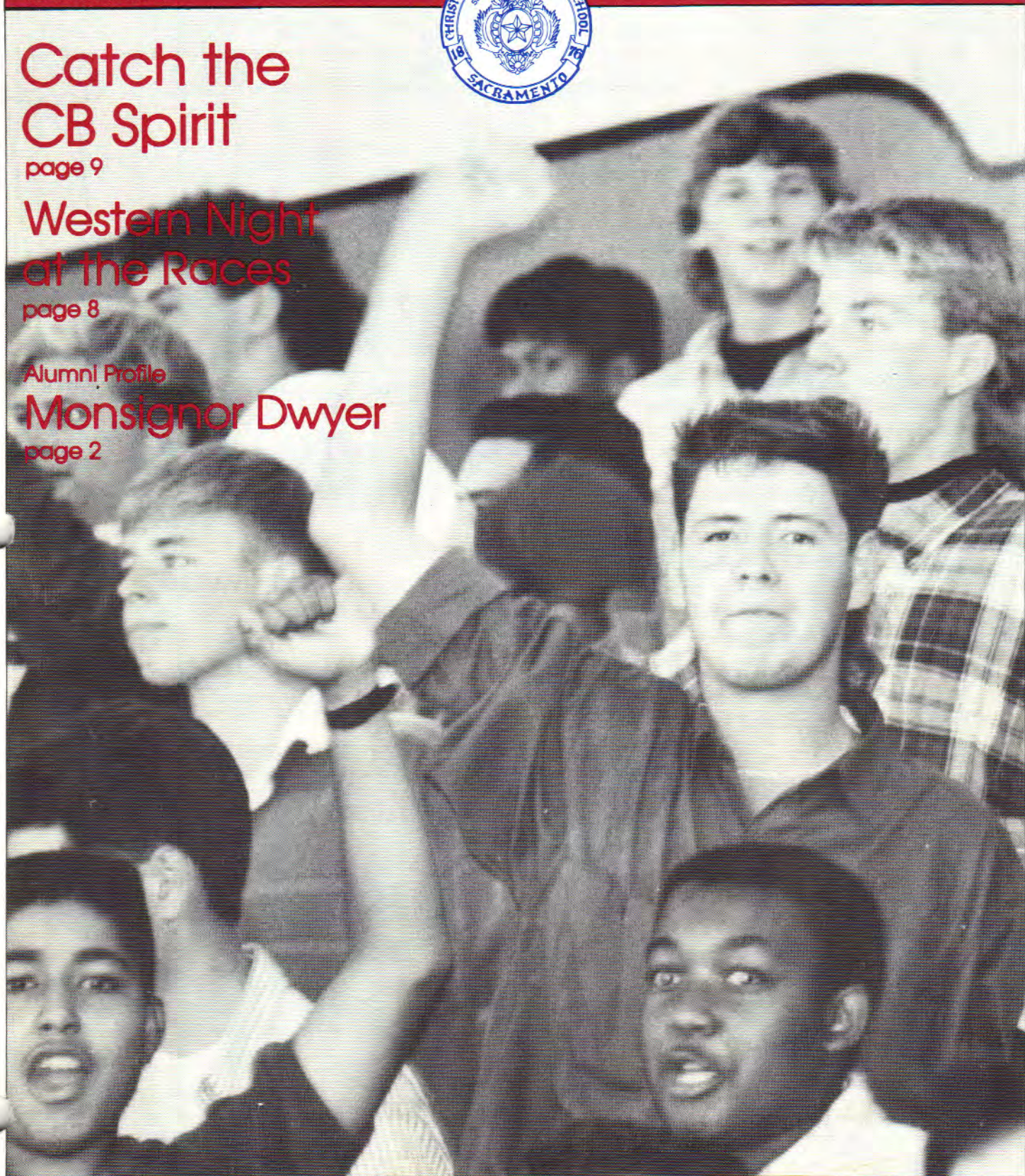

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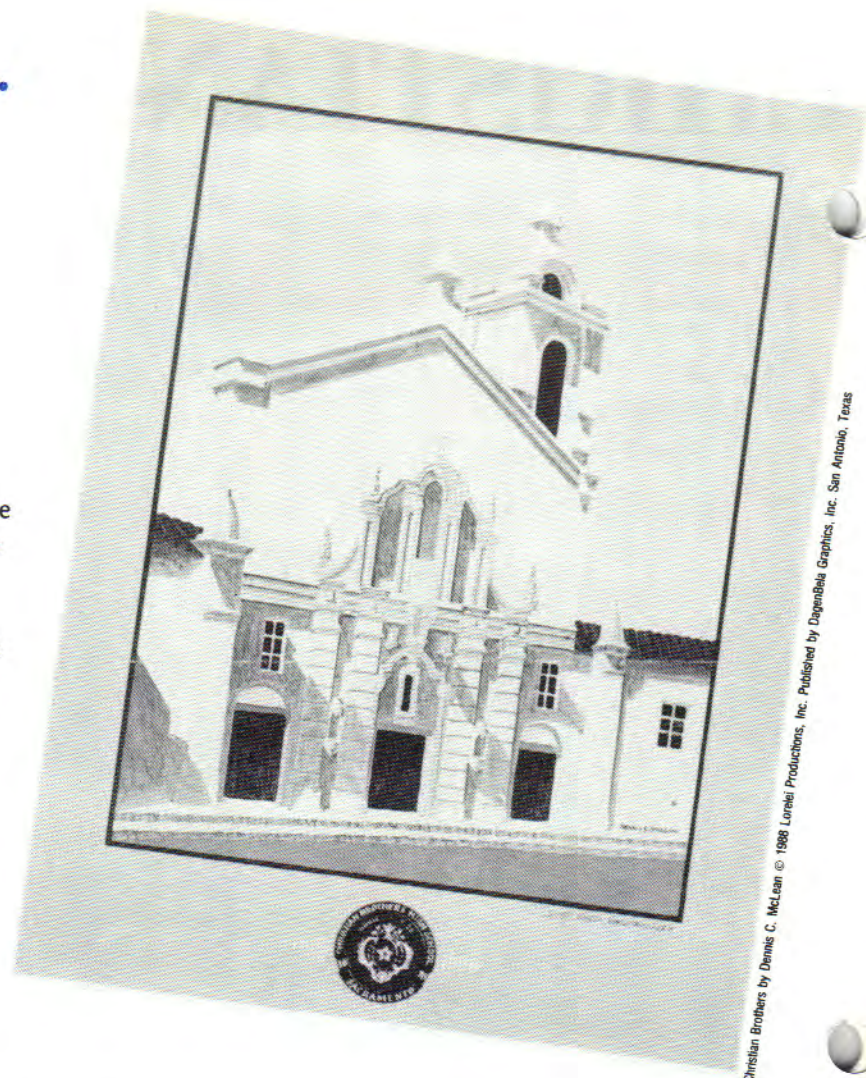

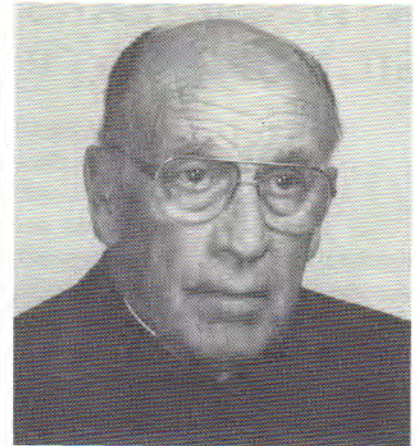

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THIS TIME IT'S FOR REAL

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AFTER 50 YEARS OF SERVICE, MONSIGNOR DWYER KEEPS ON GIVING

From the simple beginnings when he went next door to attend Christian Brothers High School to his active involvement with the Sacramento Diocese, Monsignor Richard Dwyer has made a significant impact in the 57 years since he graduated from CBS.

When Dwyer first enrolled at CBS, it was located next door to his house in an abandoned East Sacramento building at 39th and J St.'s, where it operated for the year during

which they had to leave the 12th and K site and wait for the school at 21st and Broadway to be completed. When he and his three brothers attended CBS, it was another step in the Dwyer family's rich involvement with the school that began over 100 years ago.

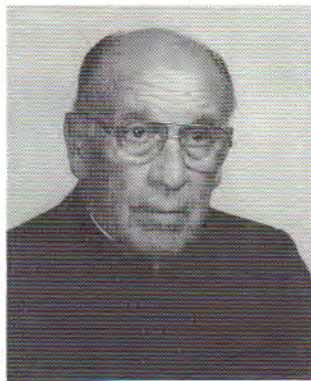
It is a relationship that has continued through the century with some members of the Dwyer family of his grandfather, Thomas Dwyer, in each of their generations attending CBS at the four schools located in Sacramento. The fourth successive generation is represented now by Peter Dwyer III, a sophomore at the current site on Martin Luther King, Jr. Blvd.

Dwyer's grandfather bought the property for Bishop Manogue on which today stands the Cathedral of the Blessed Sacrament. His father, William (who graduated from St. Mary's College at the age of 16, making him the school's youngest graduate to that time), was a co-chairman of the campaign to raise funds for building the school at 21st and Broadway. His family's interest in the work the Christian Brothers are doing in Sacramento continues among the surviving generations, having established a scholarship in the memory of William P. Dwyer. In addition, Dwyer recently

served on the Board of Regents.

"We are all extremely proud of our relationship with the Brothers and we're grateful for all they have given to us," Dwyer said.

After graduating in 1932 Dwyer attended St. Joseph's Preparatory Seminary, St. Patrick's, in Mountain View for two years, and then spent six years at the major seminary in Menlo Park, before being ordained in May of 1940. In the ensuing 50 years, he has slowed down little. He

has been very active in the Sacramento area, even in "retirement."

Dwyer was an Assistant Pastor for eight years before becoming the editor of the Catholic Herald, a position he held for 10 years. He then became Chaplain of the Newman Club for both Sacramento City and Sacramento State colleges,

and was the chaplain when the Newman Center was built on land donated by Dwyer near Sacramento State.

He then spent 23 years in the St. John Vianney parish in Rancho Cordova, again building from scratch. Under his direction, the parish erected a church, a school, and a rectory before he retired in 1980. But, since "the Bishop doesn't know the meaning of retirement," Dwyer continued to stay very active in the Sacramento Diocese.

He has been the Director of the Permanent Diaconate Program, which trains married men to serve as deacons in the church. It was the first time in about 1200 years that married men were allowed to serve as clergy in the church. Under Dwyer, 76 men were ordained. He has also served as the Director of the Office of Ecumenism and Interreligious Affairs, which works with the different

denominations to achieve more unity among religions.

Officially, Dwyer's only connection with CBS has been as a Regent, but his involvement goes much deeper than that. He has seen great change in

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NORMAN MONTGOMERY: A MAN ON THE MOVE

Few individuals are capable of moving things along like Norman Montgomery, a Regent of Christian Brothers High School. He is the president of Montgomery Construction Inc., and the fourth generation in his family to specialize in the transportation of large buildings and other heavy hauling construction activities. The business, started in San Francisco in 1875, is well renowned and one of the few like it in Northern California.

Back in 1951, Norman's father Richard heard of the freeway construction projects slated for Highway 50, and the 28th and 30th street highways planned for the Sacramento area. He expanded the company from Oakland and bought out three local house-moving companies for their resources and equipment. This enabled the Montgomery company to win most of the house-moving contracts that resulted from the construction of Sacramento's freeways.

Now, the local firm is recognized throughout the region for its specialized skills. "We're primarily in the house moving business, heavy hauling and a major portion of our business is with the heavy cranes that go up to 140 tons that construct about 85 percent of the tilt-up offices and warehouses in the Valley," Montgomery said.

Montgomery recently was called out to New York to consult on behalf of Madison Square Garden on some complicated structural design matters. Said Ron Carissimi, Past President of the Board of Regents and a partner in Carissimi, Rohrer and Harper associates — one of Sacramento's most prestigious architectural firms—"Norm is one of the tops in the business."

But some of Montgomery's most notable achievements have been his contributions to Christian Brothers

High School.

The two portable buildings on campus now housing the Development Office and Guidance Center

were acquired and relocated to the Brothers campus due to Montgomery's voluntary efforts. He plans this fall to bring two more buildings to campus from Rohnert Park, Calif. at his cost, valued at \$5,000.

His contributions haven't gone unnoticed. Last year, Montgomery was granted the school's much-coveted Honorary Diploma. Said Brother Richard Camara, F.S.C.: "Norm Montgomery is a wonderful example of a person who expresses affection, sensitivity and concern for people. He is a beautiful supporter of CBS.

"I regard him as a loyal and special friend, and a true source of inspiration to the Brothers' mission and myself. He believes in our educational commitment and lives it with the gift of himself. The greatness of CBS can be measured in a person like Norm whose faith in people is witnessed by his love for God in his life."

Montgomery, who sits on the Regents' Capital and Property Planning Committee, never attended Christian Brothers. But as a Holy Spirit parishoner his family knew of the values of the Christian Brothers' education. Each of his three sons, Steve, Tom, and John, wanted so much to attend CBS that they each earned tuition money by working construction jobs every summer. "I put my three daughters through Bishop Manogue," Montgomery said, "but I didn't help my boys.

That's how much they wanted to go to school at Brothers."

His two oldest boys, Steve ('73) and Tom ('74), followed in the family tradition and today both are vice presidents in the corporation. Montgomery looks forward to the day when he will turn over the business to them.

He is especially proud of his youngest son, John, who was Class Valedictorian ('81) at CBS, graduated from St. Mary's College with top honors, and then entered the Christian Brothers order. Brother John is currently teaching at St. Mary's College High in Berkeley and completing his Master's Degree in History at Pepperdine University. He was one of 30 graduate students nationwide who received academic scholarships worth \$17,500.

When asked what he does for recreational pleasure, Montgomery chuckles. "When there's time, my wife Helen and I spend time with our nine grandchildren. And we enjoy supporting the events at Christian Brothers."

Even then, Norman is always moving.

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the Sacramento area in the 57 years since his graduation, but the school remains basically the same.

"They've always done a great job of education," Dwyer said of the Brothers. "The strength of Christian Brothers is the Christian Brothers themselves. They are a strong force for good, and the religious and spiritual values that they're able to communicate to the students, to the faculty, and to the educational community is tremendous.

"The loyalty to principles and spirit of Christian Brothers is a factor that will be a strong force in student's lives after leaving Christian Brothers."

FRAGA BIDS CBS FAREWELL AFTER 27 YEARS OF SERVICE

Regardless of the name given her position at Christian Brothers High School, as of October 31, 1989, Louise Fraga will finally leave the friendly confines of CBS to pursue the pleasures of retirement.

Since first coming to work for CBS 27 years and three months ago, Fraga has worked under three titles, several principals, and eight years of attempted retirement. Initially hired as a part-time bookkeeper for five to six hours a day, Fraga quickly established herself as a necessity in the administrative office. Her title was changed to Treasurer in the mid-'60s, and then to Financial Administrator by Brother Richard Camara when he became

principal eight years ago.

"I could have gone back to the telephone company in revenue accounting—they were after me to come back—but I didn't want a full time job," Fraga said about her move to CBS in 1962. "A friend of mine told

me about the job at CB, and I applied and was hired. I've been here since."

What started out as "book-keeping" has devel-

oped into budget planning, salary schedule planning and projections, and coordinating the payroll and benefits for all employees. When Fraga began her stint at CBS, the school was at the old location at 21st and Broadway, with just the ninth and tenth graders there along with the Brothers Community. The juniors and seniors were at Bishop Armstrong.

There have been more than a few changes in the school during Fraga's tenure. She noted that there used to be more brothers teaching, more religious and less lay people working at the school. She pointed out the rise in employees and the addition of a retirement fund and employee benefits as major changes.

"It's been very educational and challenging. The responsibility was there and I enjoyed it," she said. "In most cases, working here is not even a job, it's more of a vocation."

Since 1981, Fraga has been repeatedly coming out of the retirement in which she was supposed to join her husband, George, in 1982. But Brother Richard asked her to stay, and it has been a continuous stay. The decision to stay hasn't been exactly hard for her.

"I could have done this job anywhere," she said. "But I feel we're more of a family here, it's different from a corporation. I stayed this long because I respected the brothers and what they were trying to do here. I felt very much a part of the Christian Brothers. They've been good to me."

The Fragas sent their two sons through CBS, John ('68) and Steven ('72). Along with their daughter, Laurie, the kids have provided the Fragas with five grandchildren, with whom she plans on spending more time once she does retire.

"I'll miss the brothers, the faculty, their love and kindness," she said. "Everyone's been so considerate. It's just been a tremendous experience."

CBS SENIOR TO SPEND HIS SENIOR YEAR STUDYING IN GERMANY

Long Nguyen, who under normal circumstances would be a senior at Christian Brothers High School this year, is currently in Germany courtesy of a full scholarship granted by the Congress-Bundestag Youth Exchange Program. Nguyen, a top student with a perfect 4.0 grade point average, was selected by the American Field Service Intercultural Programs this past spring to study in Bochum, a small town near Bonn, West Germany.

One of 60 students picked nationally for this program, Nguyen will be extending friendship across our international boundaries by expanding awareness of German and American social, economic, and political institutions.

Nguyen was assisted in the laborious application process by his German teacher, Jeffrey Corrigan, and Counselor Pat O'Brien. An alternate last year, he persisted in applying and was selected this spring.

Nguyen began the program August 15 with a flight to Washington, D.C., where he was given a week of orientations, including a meeting with his sponsor, Representative Robert Matsui of California. This first week was followed by another week of instruction in German on Long Island, New York, before he embarked on his trip to Germany August 29.

Besides his academic achievement, Nguyen was involved in a number of school organizations: Students Reaching Out (Anti-Drug Education Outreach effort), California Scholarship Federation, National Honor Society, Spanish Club, Science Club, Mathletes, Bike Club, Spirit Club, Falcon Service Club, and the tennis team. He was class president his sophomore and junior year. This past summer he was a CB representative at Boys' State.

A TALE OF TWO COUNTRIES

French Teachers Exchange Schools, Homes, and Experiences for 1988-89 School Year

As part of the Fulbright Teacher Exchange Program, Jocelyne Ferris taught French at Christian Brothers.

Based on a comparison between my two teaching situations, and understanding that there are basic differences between the American and French educational systems, I would say that there are numerous positive aspects to teaching in the United States. While the educational system in the U.S. has lower academic standards, it has its more positive aspects too—rather than attempting to simply create intellectuals, the U.S. system prepares teenagers for life. There is also too much routine in the way the

student's schedule is organized (every day the same classes, no break in the middle of the week), which leads to boredom. I also believe that learning is more efficient if it's intensive, especially in languages. From the teacher's point of view, there is not enough free time to update his or her skills (workshops or personal work); how can you keep up the same quality of teaching?

But there were many things I like about the American system. The U.S. is more student-centered, the student's interest is a priority. In Europe, I have the feeling that students are here to serve the teachers' interests, which usually center around the strong trade unions, lots of complaining, and lots of demands and pressure on the administration to have afternoons free, etc.

Also, it is more fun! There are more activities after school, more opportunities to bring together teachers, students, parents. School spirit doesn't exist in Europe. In the case of CB, I appreciated the moral standards evident at the school. Everybody is concerned with the necessity to work in some area other than what he or she actually teaches, which creates an atmosphere of respect for the other teachers, for the school, for the community in general.

There is also better communication between the students and the teachers. A student would hardly dare address a teacher in the street in France, where there's more fear and less confidence. Along the same lines, there is a better relationship between teachers and administrators. Both work hard in an excellent atmosphere, which is relaxed and friendly.

Since returning to France, I have tried to keep up many of the things I experienced at CB. I try to make sure, as much as I can, that students are not wronged, especially in the division for which I'm responsible. I try to keep my

As my transatlantic flight from Paris touched down in Chicago, I felt the gamut of emotions—certainly regret leaving my family, friends, acquaintances, and a way of life I would never again know.

My two children and I lived in a small town in the Southern French Alps. Its normal population of 6,000 explodes to 60,000 both during ski season and summer. One of its attractions is a large alpine lake at the southern end. The entire area lies in a valley much like that of Yosemite. The surrounding mountains are majestic and lush with lots of streams and waterfalls. They also house some of the best alpine and nordic ski resorts in the world. The local people whom I hiked with said that they had been exploring the region their entire lives and had never exhausted new territory to explore.

Life there would have indeed been perfect had I not had to work. But there again I can't complain. I taught English at the junior high level in a combination junior-senior high school which had about 1,500 students, 150 of whom boarded there. There were ninety faculty. My children and I were welcomed warmly, both at the school and in the town. We were the only long-term U.S. residents, so everyone knew us. I spent no more than twenty hours a week at the school. This amount of time is typical for a secondary teacher. My children, on the other hand, one 6th grade and one 8th grade, spent seven to ten more hours per week in class than they would have in the States. They did not speak French upon their arrival but by the end of the year communicated easily with their friends and even understood their teachers. For them it was a difficult year that turned out lovely and memorable.

The Fulbright Commission arranged my year exchange with the goal that I would learn something, become a better teacher, and encourage exchanges among students. What I did discover is that students and teachers in France are really no different than here. Faculty room conversations, both good and bad, are similar. Students behave and misbehave there much as ours do here. There were wonderful, inspirational teachers and some that we all worked around.

And now that the year is over and I am back, I have the experience to share with my students. I hope that both my French and U.S. students will correspond, perhaps visit

Christian Brothers Principal Brother Richard Camara, F.S.C., has announced new administrative, faculty, and staff changes for the 1989-90 school year.

Richard Weldon, former Associate Dean of Studies, has been appointed to a new position as Assistant Principal. Weldon has a broad background in administration and curriculum development, beginning with his work at Cathedral High School in Los Angeles, another Christian Brothers school, and continuing at Christian Brothers High School where he has been Associate Dean of Studies for the past six years. At CBS, he has been instrumental in planning and directing two successful WASC (Western Association of Schools and Colleges) evaluations, the last one granting Christian Brothers its current six year accreditation. In addition, Weldon has co-authored Houghton Mifflin's "Grammar and Composi-

tion" for high school English.

In other administrative changes, Jeffrey Corrigan has assumed the position of Vice Principal, Dean of Studies. Corrigan also teaches German. He replaces Kevin Matheny, who has become the Director of Development. Judy Budzenski, Math Department Coordinator, will assist Corrigan as Associate Dean of Studies, while continuing her teaching duties.

The new additions to the faculty are Gabriele Truhitte, who will teach German at CBS after teaching in the San Juan District, and Mike DiFilippo, who will teach Physics.

Jeffrey Knezovich ('76), returns to Christian Brothers as the new business manager, a position he assumed last June. In addition, two new secretaries have been added to the school staff. Nancy Rives is the new Attendance Secretary and Andra Drury is the new Special Events secretary in the Development Office.

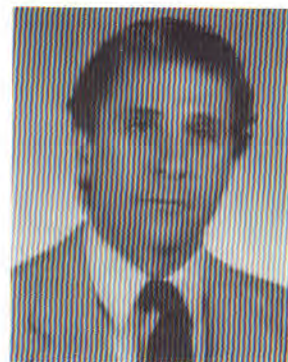

Western Night at the Races.

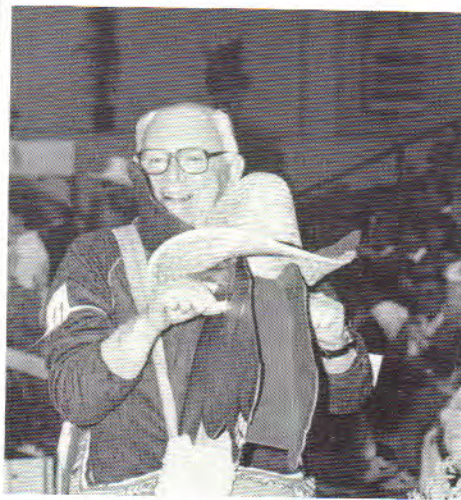

This year the Parent Service Organization will pay tribute and thank Brother Bertram for his leadership and direction as a former principal at CBS, his hard work and dedication as a former Director of Development and later a Provincial of the Christian Brothers District, and the founder of this triple crown event.

THERE IS SOMETHING REALLY UNIQUE AT CBS

Jeffrey Corrigan is the Vice Principal, Dean of Studies at Christian Brothers High School.

Well, it's happened again! We had a staff in-service today, and, once again, I heard a visitor say to us, "You have something really unique at this school. Your problem is that you are so reluctant to let others know about it." I can't count the number of times I have heard this same comment in recent years. I hear it from parents and from alumni. The Board of Regents echoes it, and time after time outsiders remark about the contradiction between the rumors they hear and the reality of what they experience on our campus.

Because of this reluctance to talk about ourselves, I wonder how much of the public, especially parents at our Catholic feeder schools, know that we have a wide variety of Honors and Advanced Placement courses for our top students as well as solid transitional programs for those who need them. I wonder how many know that, with our seven period required curriculum, we may well offer the most comprehensive high school curriculum in the area. As we read article after article in newspapers and magazines decrying the deficiencies of American high school students in their knowledge of history and geography as well as their weak reading and writing skills, I wonder how many know that our curriculum addresses these deficiencies with a two-year World History and Geography program in the lower division. In addition, our English program not only requires that students study English each year that they are in high school, it requires an additional semester of intense composition writing in both the junior and senior years.

And I wonder how many parents know of the accomplishments of the Foreign Language Department as it has sought to make foreign language learning accessible to students of all ability levels.

I suspect that the public is also largely unaware of the stability and longevity of our staff as well as its numerous professional achievements. Two of our faculty members, for example, have been selected as Fulbright Exchange Teachers. Two of our departments, Mathematics and Foreign Language, have received invitations to participate in state or national curriculum improvement grants at a time when invitations to private, and especially to parochial, schools are all but non-existent. In addition, the Math Department is currently involved in pilot curriculum implementation programs through the University of California at Davis. And the number of faculty from many of our departments who have been invited to give presentations at local and statewide conferences is impressively high.

Given the laurels listed above, and they are far from complete, why are we accused of being so reluctant to let others know about our school? Tom Peters, in *The Excellence Challenge*, offers, I think, a clue to this. Excellence, he proposes, does not result from comparing oneself to others in an attempt to meet their standards. Rather, it is the result of an honest evaluation

of any given situation coupled with an internal desire to make things better than they presently are. As he states, "There is no limit to the level of perfection one can achieve."

This attitude is readily evident when one talks to the staff at Christian Brothers. Discussion, both formal and informal, is ongoing as we examine what is and what is not working. It was clearly the attitude behind our curriculum revision five years ago, and it is behind the continuing revision of that curriculum as we seek to challenge every student we accept with the goal of being able to hand him a well-earned diploma at the end of four years. Most importantly, though, this attitude is evident in the frustration of the staff when we are not succeeding with a student. In fact, that may well be part of our problem. We are so much aware of the things that we want to do better that they cloud our perception of what we already do well. The consequences of this are that we often remain silent when we would do well to inform others.

It is time that Christian Brothers really begins to talk well of itself. We are truly a unique school with much that is positive to say about ourselves. As Dean of Studies, I know it would benefit the staff to take a breath and examine what it really has accomplished, and then, of course, dive back in and pursue a higher level of excellence than is already there.

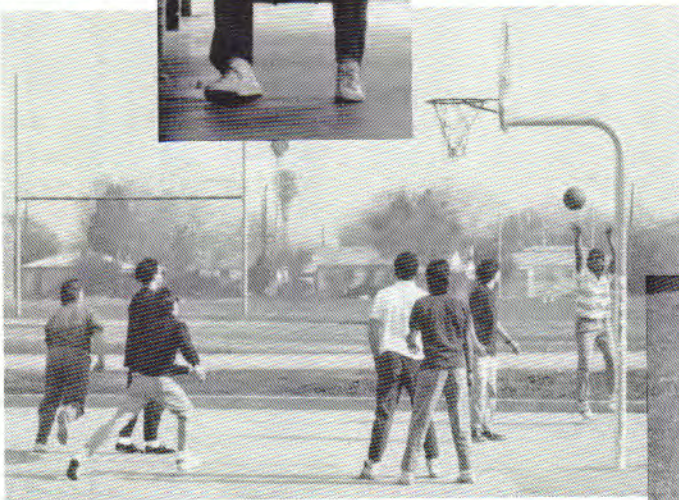

Keynote Speaker at CB Booster Golden Anniversary Dinner

'87 GRAD MIKE QUINN REFLECTS ON CBS EXPERIENCE

Mike Quinn, a 1987 graduate of CBS, gave the following speech at the CB Boosters Golden Anniversary Dinner September 13. Quinn, who graduated 10th in his class, was the starting quarterback his junior and senior year.

His senior year he took CBS to the Sac-Joaquin Section title game where the Falcons were defeated by Vintage of Napa, 14-0.

Quinn is currently a quarterback at U.C. Davis, where he is a sophomore athletically but a junior academically. He carries a 3.0 GPA in Managerial Economics, and is very proud that he is on track to complete his degree in four years.

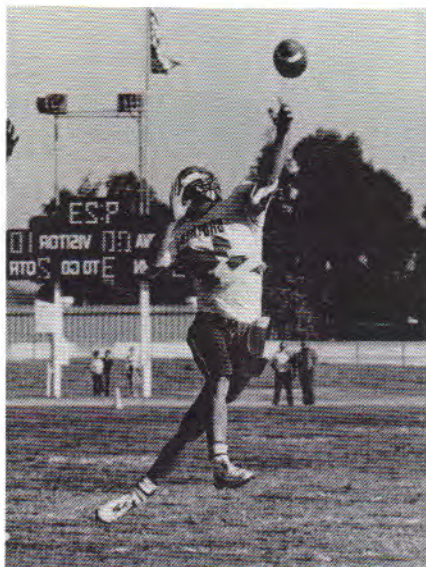
Last season Quinn stepped in as quarterback in the fourth game of the season, and then took the Aggies to the Division II playoffs. He

finished sixth in the nation in passing, throwing for over 1,400 yards, 10 touchdowns, and only three interceptions.

I would first like to thank Brother Richard and the Booster's for inviting me to speak at this special function celebrating the 50th anniversary of the Booster's. It is always great to return to CBS, as one of a proud and distinguished alumni. Like all of you, I too have friends and special ties here at CB. It's a great feeling to know you are part of 114 years of rich tradition both in the classroom and on the athletic field. I really do feel these special ties with CB as a result of my experiences here, which have helped me develop as a student, as an athlete, and, most importantly, as a man.

As a student here, I was offered many opportunities to excel in

the classroom. From the easy access to an excellent computer room, the wide variety of advanced placement and honors courses offered, to the quality of the teachers who guide and prepare us for college—the components of a great

education were available for me and continue to be available.

But education at CB goes beyond that—CB prepares you to make that difficult transition from high school to college. Not only do you learn math, history, and English, more

importantly you learn discipline, perseverance, and the ability to interact with different types of people. The individual attention you receive and the sincere concern that the teachers give you set CB apart from other high schools. By making you feel that you are an important individual, the faculty and staff at CB give you a heightened sense of self-confidence and awareness that helps you become a better student and a better person. I attend U.C. Davis now and, thankfully, I was well-prepared for such an academically competitive and demanding school. My maturing process at CB helped me to make that difficult adjustment away from high school and the comforts of home to the rigors and pressures of college life.

The experience here at CB is not just one-dimensional. It does not only involve time spent in the classroom but includes the trials and tribulations, the

camaraderie developed, as well as the victories and defeats on the athletic fields. I personally had my bad and good times playing football, basketball, and baseball. Good or bad, win or lose, what CB offers is an opportunity to play for a highly respected school that has a tradition of producing highly competitive, high class athletic teams. Not many schools have opportunities to play in the traditional rivalry games such as CB vs. Cordova, or the great Catholic classic, the Holy Bowl. Just being able to have played in those games, win or lose, is a valuable experience.

At the heart of the experiences at CB, though, are the friends you make, the people you meet, and the close associations you develop on the field. The blood, sweat, and tears you share with teammates are many of the indelible memories that you take with you after leaving CB. Coaches, too, play a part in those memories. They are the ones who put in the long hours, sacrificing time with their families. They are the ones who shape and mold us as competitive, disciplined, and sportsmanlike athletes and persons.

Two of my former coaches come immediately to mind when I think of who made my athletic career at CB extremely satisfying. One of those coaches is Coach Ron Limeberger. As you all know, Coach Limeberger has been a coach and the Athletic Director here for about 105 years. He epitomizes what athletics at CB is all about. He doesn't do this job for himself, he does it for the student-athletes. I have tremendous respect for him. He sacrifices his time generously. I never once saw him favor any player and he never yelled at anyone who didn't deserve it. He is a man of integrity and class, an example I will follow and a status I someday hope to attain.

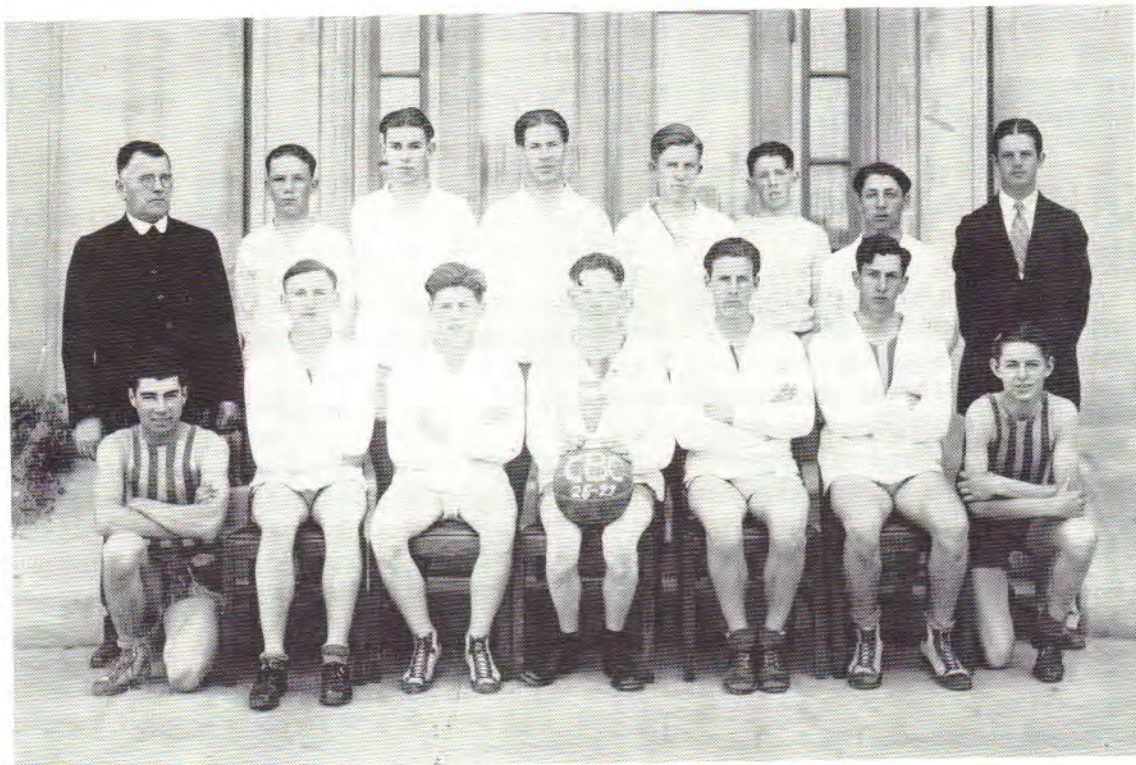
FRIENDS RALLY TO HELP CBS ALUM

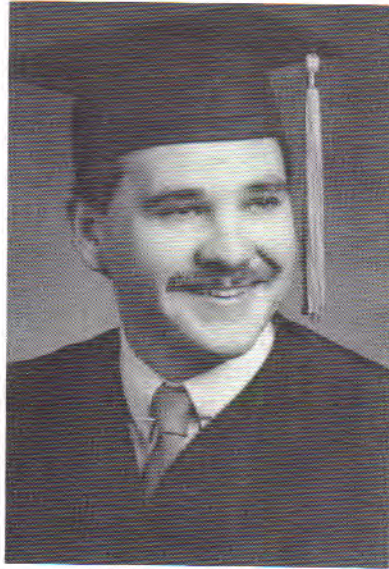

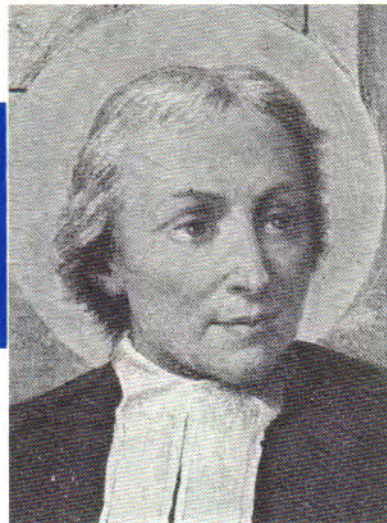
