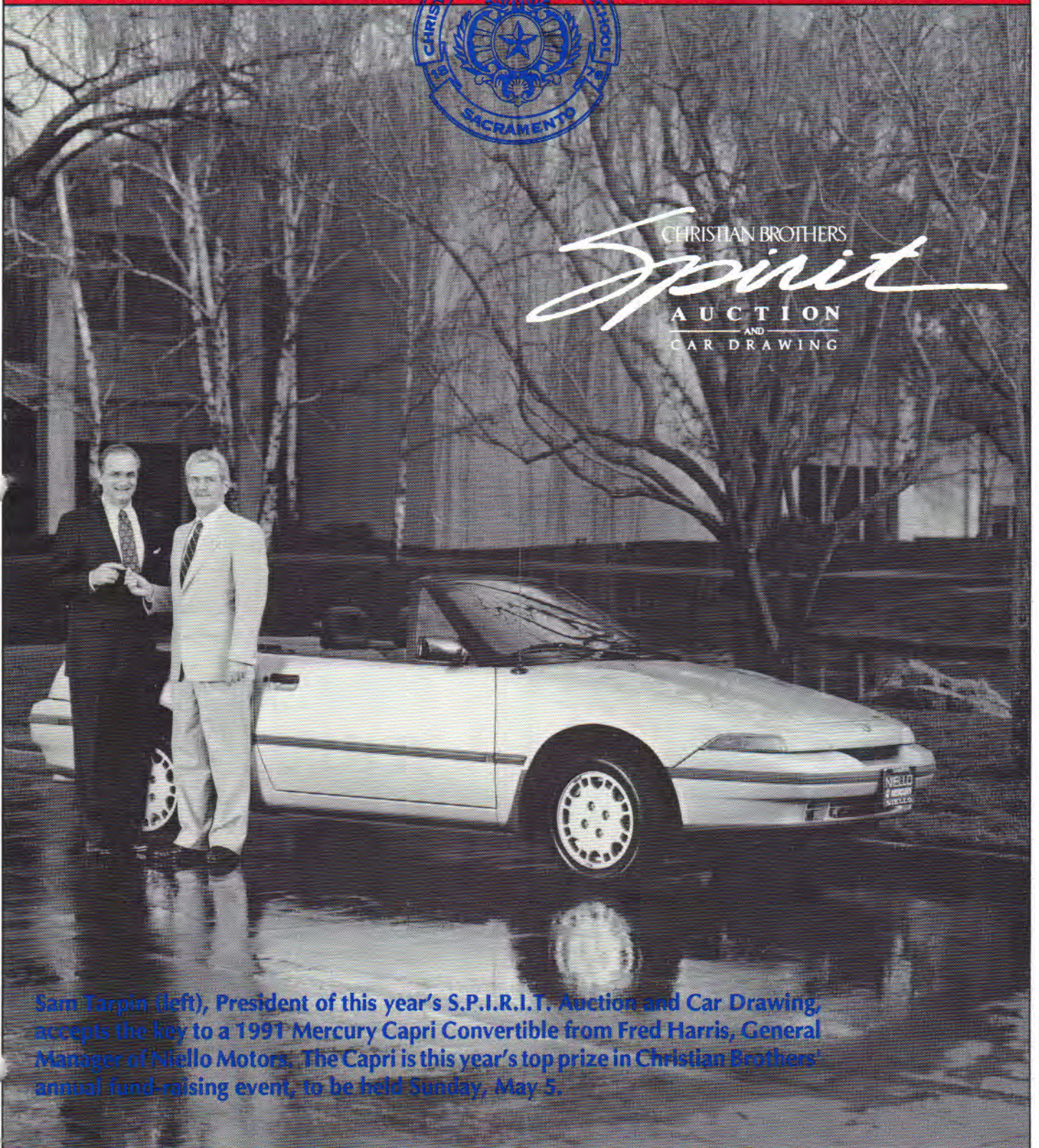

# Education Through Law Enforcement

*Chief Kearns Honored by Diocese for Contributions to the Community*

It doesn't take long for one to recognize the fact that a good number of Christian Brothers High School graduates enter the field of law enforcement. Some say it is due to the disciplined environment provided by the Brothers; others may point to the quality role models currently found on the city and county payrolls.

In the case of one CBS graduate, however, both arguments apply. The Chief of the Sacramento City Police Department, Mr. Jack Kearns (Class of 1951), came out of the structured educational system provided by CBS and followed his father into law enforcement.

Still, according to Chief Kearns, those footsteps were not supposed to lead to a job which makes him responsible for the daily operation of the Police Department by planning and managing a \$60 million budget, directing deployment of over 1,000 employees, overseeing the administration of numerous programs, and ensuring the safety of over 350,000 citizens of Sacramento.

"I started police work because they had night shifts, and I wanted to go to school," said Chief Kearns of his decision to join the force after spending three years in the Marine Corps.

But from 1956 to the present, law enforcement has been a central part of Chief Kearns's life. He worked his way up the ladder of jobs: Police Officer to Detective, Sergeant to Lieutenant, Captain to Chief of Detectives, Deputy Chief of Police to his current position, which, he says, is the most rigorous of all.

"Don't ask me how or why I'm Chief of Police. I spent 15 years as a Detective, and I thoroughly enjoyed that. I enjoyed my time in uniform. There's that spark of you're doing something for the community. There is tremendous gratification with this job. It is demanding because you have to be

all things to all people, like trying to have people understand there is a list of priorities we adhere to," Chief Kearns said of the dilemma the police force faces every day when people whose house has been robbed sometimes wait hours before a police officer—who may have had to act on a "hot" crime such as a murder—arrives to take a report. "It's not that their crime isn't important, it's just that we have to make the best use of limited resources."

The Chief sees the field of law enforcement taking a new direction; one in which he has been steering Sacramento for years: proactive law enforcement.

"Law enforcement for years was just what it says. But the fact is we know we have to get into schools and teach the kids. We have to do more than just enforce the law and arrest people," he said of the services he has implemented in the city. "We have to try and get ahead of the train before it runs us over."

Chief Kearns has started programs such as "Partners in Prevention," where officers go into the schools and teach children self discipline and responsibility; "Adopt a COP," where officers are assigned students as role models; and a

new program scheduled to begin the first week of March, "Expressions," where social service groups gather at a local high school to try and attract young people and then teach them about drugs and Sacramento's rapidly-

growing problem—gangs.

All this concern for the community is a natural part of law enforcement for Chief Kearns, who, in January was honored by the Catholic Diocese of Sacramento as the 1991 Distinguished Catholic School Graduate for his outstanding contributions to the life of the community. This concern, he says, is a product of his educational experience with the Brothers.

"The Brothers were a role model, they were doing something for society. They taught us that everybody has an obligation to society, that you owe something back to the community and society in general," said Chief Kearns. "There is tremendous satisfaction being a police officer. It's not an isolated career that doesn't benefit society, you feel like you're doing something. The Christian Brothers made it seem natural to go into a field like law enforcement."

Chief Kearns was born and raised in Sacramento, attending Sacred Heart School and then CBS. He has nothing but fond memories of the Sisters of Mercy at Sacred Heart and the Christian Brothers. "When I left home to go to school, it was like an extension of my family, they really cared," he said.

"At that time of your life, I don't think anyone appreciates discipline very much. Reflecting back, it was a very positive point in my life. The standards required by the Brothers, whether in athletics or studies inside the classroom, were tremendous. They basically said, 'this is what you're here for, and we expect you to do it.' The maturity of the environment, I feel, really prepared you for the real world." he said.

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# Hoey Leaves Them Thinking

Do you know how to tell when a bucket is sick? Do you know what is green and has wheels? Do you know algebra and geometry and how to relate them? Can you work within a group and still rely on your own judgement? Do you seek to improve problem-solving skills rather than rote functioning? Do you prefer a challenge to a "skate" course? And would you prefer to place yourself in control of your own education rather than someone else?

If you are uncertain about any of your answers to these questions, then the place to find the answers is in Mr. Brian Hoey's mathematics class, for in this class all of these questions are resolved through practical experience and innovative teaching strategies.

To get a good picture of Brian Hoey and his teaching, envision an imaginary visitor and a guide going to one of his classes and the ensuing scene and dialogue...

When our visitor and his guide arrive on time for class in room 304, Mr. Hoey begins his class with a conundrum (riddle), as he does every day, to gain the attention of his students and to get them thinking.

Standing near

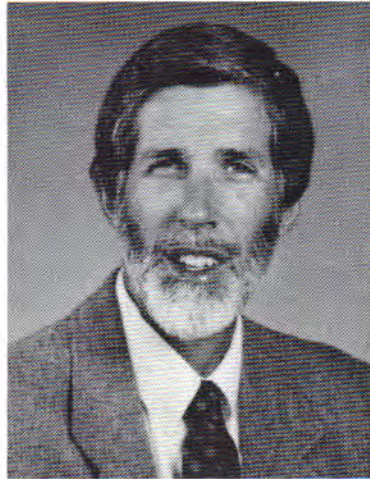
the back of the room, our guide points out that most of his students are well acquainted with riddle solving and are anxiously thinking or offering their answers. His students are attracted to the idea of solving problems by thinking about the answers. Everyday Mr. Hoey challenges his class to solve these little riddles. Of course, you have been asked a few of these riddles at the top of the story.

Within a few minutes of the opening of class, our visitor seems to be startled by all the shuffling of desks and students. But not to worry. Undoubtedly, Mr. Hoey has just said, "Brothers," the command for all students to form into groups. Within the space of a few seconds, the students are busily working to solve the problems that have been assigned.

"What miracle of modern education has been wrought in Mr. Hoey's class?" asks our visitor.

This miracle, our guide says, has been fashioned through a lot of hard work and students working cooperatively. Mr. Hoey often begins class with a short explanation of the material, and then he directs the students into their groups. Once

in their groups, the students must "teach" themselves. They must ask each other for help. This is why you will very seldom see a student raise his hand, and, if he does, Mr.

Hoey addresses the entire group, not just one student. The reason for this is that no student may ask a question of the teacher unless everyone in the group has the same question—meaning that they are all unable to answer the question without the teacher's help.

As our visitor sits and observes class, where will he see Mr. Hoey while all these students are working? Naturally enough he will be snoozing at his desk, right? Wrong. He will be circulating around the classroom encouraging students and answering their questions.

"Why are all those calculators being used by the students anyway?" our mythic visitor might ask his guide. "I was never allowed to use one in my math class."

That is true, our guide responds, but then again your teacher probably never emphasized problem-solving over functional skills. The emphasis in Mr. Hoey's class is to spend more time solving problems

creatively than on the functional activities of multiplying and dividing. So he encourages his students to use calculators.

Growing tired of standing, our guide gestures for his guest to have a seat near the back of the room.

"All this is well and good," our visitor says, squeezing into a desk, "but how well does students helping students work? Do they really learn?"

According to Mr. Hoey, they learn better, in most cases, than they do from a single teacher in a large classroom setting. Everyday his students are getting individual at-

tention, tutoring, if you will, from fellow students and the teacher. But one of the main benefits of this method, beyond learning math, is that the students are in control of their own work while helping each other succeed in a cooperative, rather than competitive, environment. This collaboration provides added meaning to the words "Brothers" and "Sisters."

"Mr. Hoey seems to be a very special teacher," our visitor concludes. "What exactly has made him such a creative and successful teacher?"

Our guide thinks for a moment and says that he could say it is luck, but that wouldn't be nearly true. He could say genius and that wouldn't be totally true, either. He could say experience and work, and this in itself would not be enough. But some mixture of these qualities might come close to the truth of the matter.

Sitting up straight, the guide continues by mentioning some of Mr. Hoey's accomplishments. He has been employed at Christian Brothers 21 years as a teacher of social studies and mathematics. He was the writer and director of the American Studies interdisciplinary

program (history and English) taught from 1976-84 at CBS. Mr. Hoey presented this program at the 1981 conference of the California Council for Social Studies and again the following year to the National Council for Social Studies.

"Wait a minute," the visitor interrupts, "you said he was a math teacher, not a social studies teacher."

True, but he has taught social studies, too. And that is where he gained many of his innovative ideas that he is using in the math program he's writing.

"What program is that?" asks the visitor.

In 1985 Mr. Hoey was invited to the summer intern program of the Northern California Mathematics Project (NCMP) and has been a teacher con-

sultant with that project ever since. He co-authored *Transition to College Mathematics* in conjunction with the California Academic Partnership Program. He also co-authored the

test series that accompanies *Geometry: A Guided Inquiry*, Sunburst Publications. In the summers of 1988-90, Mr. Hoey worked with a team of 30 high school teachers in the College-Prep Project (CPP) as an author and editor. (CPP is a mathematics curriculum based on the State Department Mathematics Framework.)

Mr. Hoey has given presentations about teaching methodologies and mathematics curriculum at

the National Council of Teachers of Mathematics, Western Region. He has also conducted workshops at U.C. Davis, CSU Sacramento, and the Sacramento Area Mathematics Educators meetings.

"I'm overwhelmed by his accomplishments," the visitor says. "Christian Brothers is lucky to have a teacher like him. By the way, can you tell me, before I go, the answers to the riddles about the bucket and the green thing?"

A bucket gets a little pail and that's how you can tell it's sick. And, of course, grass is the answer to the second question.

"What do you mean grass? Grass doesn't have wheels."

I know. I'm just kidding about the wheels, but I'm not kidding about Mr. Hoey.

"The motivation and direction by the Brothers was extremely important. It was a great thing to carry over in your life," Chief Kearns added. "I look back on high school with a lot of positive memories, it was a great time in my life."

Given those deep roots with school,

Chief Kearns was left with some mixed emotions when it was announced the school would go co-educational last September.

"Christian Brothers had the identity as a boy's school. That camaraderie that started when I was there is still alive today, it never leaves you. I was concerned that this

identity would be gone, but it's probably better having the females' influence. It's a more natural setting with girls. It's better in the long run," he said.

Chief Kearns felt great influence from other sources as well. Beside his father, Chief Kearns's biggest influence was another CBS grad, Joe Rooney (Class

of '25), the Chief of Police when Chief Kearns joined the force. He also noted Brother Gilbert was "the guy who'd come over to see me in the summer and sit down and have long talks. He gave good advice," he said.

Chief Kearns sees the main problem in not only the city, but the country as well, as

the "epidemic of addiction to narcotics. I firmly believe that if we had a cop on every corner, we'd still have the problem. We can only stop it through education."

An education Chief Kearns is willing to provide to the Sacramento community.

## CBS Responds to the Needy

The Christian Brothers High School Campus Ministry, under the direction of Brother Martin La Bastida, F.S.C., once again practiced what it preached as CBS responded to the needs of the less fortunate during the holiday season.

During the Thanksgiving Drive, the students and faculty at CBS delivered to the Sacramento Food Locker over 1,540 pounds of canned and non-perishable foods.

Five families were fed by Mrs. Lee Wurschmidt's math classes as they collected and arranged food for specific families in the Sacramento area. Each of Mrs. Wurschmidt's five classes stocked the pantry of a family for one week.

The students brainstormed on what foods were necessary in such a week's pantry, and then the students volunteered to bring in what each one felt he/she could for the family. At the end of the four-day drive, enough food was collected for the original five families plus another family that one of the students knew had recently come upon misfortune with six children to feed.

Over \$920 was collected from students and other donors and used to purchase Brothers Bucks. The food vouchers were presented at the Thanksgiving liturgy to Wellspring Women's Center. Over \$1,000 in baby food, formula, diapers and articles of baby clothing were also given to Wellspring.

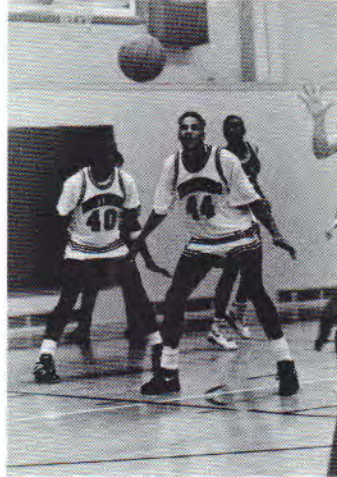

## CBS Musical Set for April 24-26

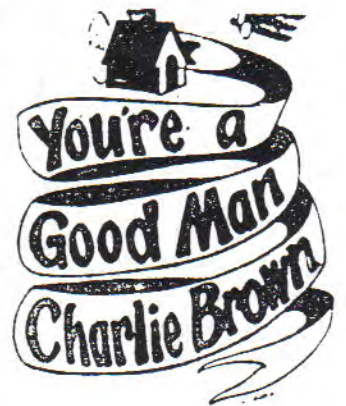

The freshmen, with quarterback Danny Elorduy and running backs Brian Boal and Kermit Davis keying the offense, dominated opponents en route to an 8-0-1 record, 4-0 in Metro. The team piled up 236 points on the season while allowing a meager 41.

The varsity soccer team, coached by Father Michael Carroll in his last season, was no less successful as the Falcons placed third in the Sac-Joaquin Section playoffs. The team truly dominated opponents, outscoring them 115-10, and taking the prestigious pre-season

Del Campo Tournament. Led by junior Guillermo Jara and seniors Ruben Mora, Aaron Moreno, Tom Donohue and goalie Kirk Stinson, CBS finished 21-1-4—the only loss being a heart-breaking 1-0 setback to Jesuit in the Section semifinals.

The JV soccer team finished 8-3-4 overall, 5-3-4 in Metro.

In cross country, senior Carlos Bobadilla did something no CBS runner has done in three years—competed in the State Meet. Other outstanding performances were turned in by senior Guillermo Guerrero junior Todd Cook. The JV squad, led by Darren Keast, Gino Valdez and Mark Mendoza won the Metro League title.

The first year for girls athletics at CBS showed a great deal of promise. The tennis team, paced by seniors Laura Ellis and Nicole Limon took great strides in establishing itself as a team to contend with in the future. Ellis finished the season with an 11-3 mark and placed

third in the Metro League tournament. Tracy Donalley, the Falcons' No. 2 player, Dawn Leesha and Sonja Martiney each showed great improvement over the season.

The volleyball team had to overcome some unexpected problems early in the season, namely having to practice and play all their games but one at Bishop Manogue because the CB gym was being renovated. But the players overcame the frustration, highlighting the season in the final match with a strong showing in their one and only home game at CBS. Seniors Dawn Van Hamersveld, an All-Metro selection, and Bodar Drucker led the squad.

mark, the Falcons won their first two league games and a non-league contest before losing the next six games on the road (one game in triple overtime, another in overtime, one by one point and

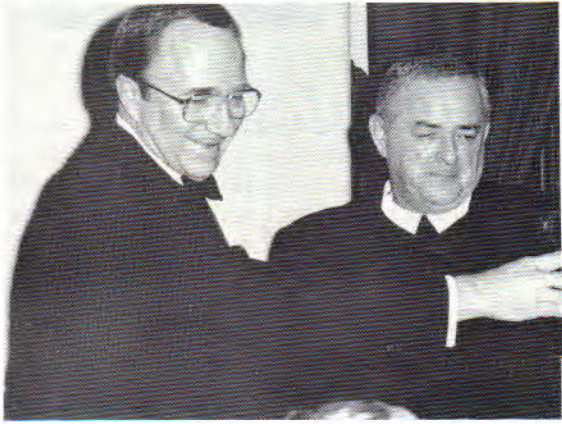

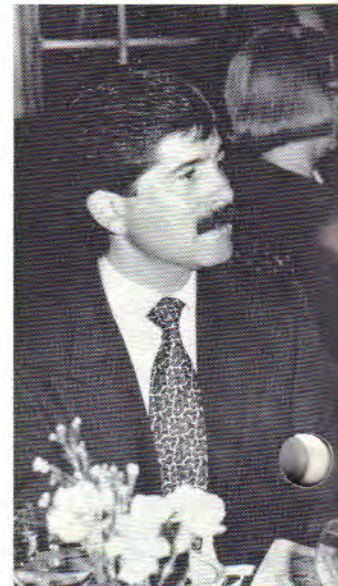

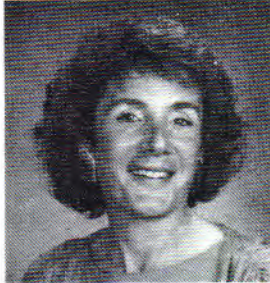
# Reunion Coming Up for Class of '66
