Teachers and Aims

The School is conducted by the Brothers of the Christian Schools, members of a Religious Order devoted exclusively to education. They are men of attainment and experience who have made teaching their life work. The aim of the Brothers is to form their students to be loyal sons of the Church, worthy and devoted citizens of the State, and efficient and serviceable men in practical life. Although the essential purpose of the School is the education of Catholic students, non-Catholic boys are not refused admission. It is not a military school and no special uniform is required.

Departments and Courses

The School has two distinct departments, the High School Department and the Grammar Department.

High School Department

The curriculum and requirements for graduation are standard. They are based upon the recommendations of Saint Mary's College, the University of California, and the State Board of Education, thus affording graduates who attain a recommending grade adequate preparation for a general college or university course. Boys who do not wish to go to college or university but who desire a good general high school course are admitted. For these, the Commercial Course is recommended and they may graduate from high school after the normal period of four years with a good preparation for business life.

Grammar Department

The Grammar Department begins with the first grade and includes all grades to the high school. The courses of study, year by year, are substantially the same as in the public schools, except that possibly more time and attention are given to oral reading, penmanship, arithmetic, and spelling, with the hope that when our pupils complete the eighth grade they will not be obliged to review these subjects during the crowded years of the high school course.

Plant and Equipment

The School is housed in three spacious concrete buildings of the most modern type of construction. Existing buildings were started in 1924 and completed in 1927. A gymnasium, the last word in structures of the kind, has just been completed. All furniture and equipment is new and up to date.

Athletics

All students are expected to take part in the organized athletics, not only for the physical exercise thereby gained, but also for the experience in team work and active association with fellow students. To accomplish these purposes the School has daily organized practice in football, basketball, or baseball, according to the season. C. B. S. teams are generally victorious in their games with other schools. All of these activities are under the direct supervision of the Reverend Brother Moderator of Athletics and competent coaches.

Boarding Students

Sleeping rooms are comfortable, well ventilated, steam-heated, and supplied with hot and cold water. Beds, bedding and furniture are new. Bathrooms, ample to accommodate the capacity number of students, are conveniently located, allowing choice of tub baths or showers.

Wholesome food is served, and in quantities sufficient to satisfy the keenest appetite. The cuisine is in charge of experienced women who take great pride in the attractive preparation of the menus. No pains are spared in this department, since dissatisfaction generally prevails in boarding schools where the dining room is operated in a conservative or careless manner.

A matron lives in the Grammar Department with the smaller boys and is in constant touch with them. She shows a motherly interest in them, insisting on regular bathing, proper care of teeth, the changing of soiled clothing, the eating of proper food, etc.

Discipline

The methods of discipline in vogue at the School are such as develop selfrespect and individual responsibility. Nothing is exacted which would be deemed unreasonable in a well ordered home. Students are allowed the fullest measure of liberty consistent with good scholarship and gentlemanly deportment. The Reverend Brother Director of Discipline is in immediate charge of all boarding students.

Admission Requirements

The School will not knowingly receive bad, vicious, or unruly boys, and it is useless to send such boys as they will not be allowed to remain in the School. A transcript of credit (to be mailed by school official directly to the Reverend Brother Recorder) is required of all students coming from other high schools. In case no vacancy exists, applications will be filed and applicants will be admitted in the order in which the applications have been received.

Tuition and Other Expense

It is the policy of the School to have as few "extras' and "incidentals" as possible.
