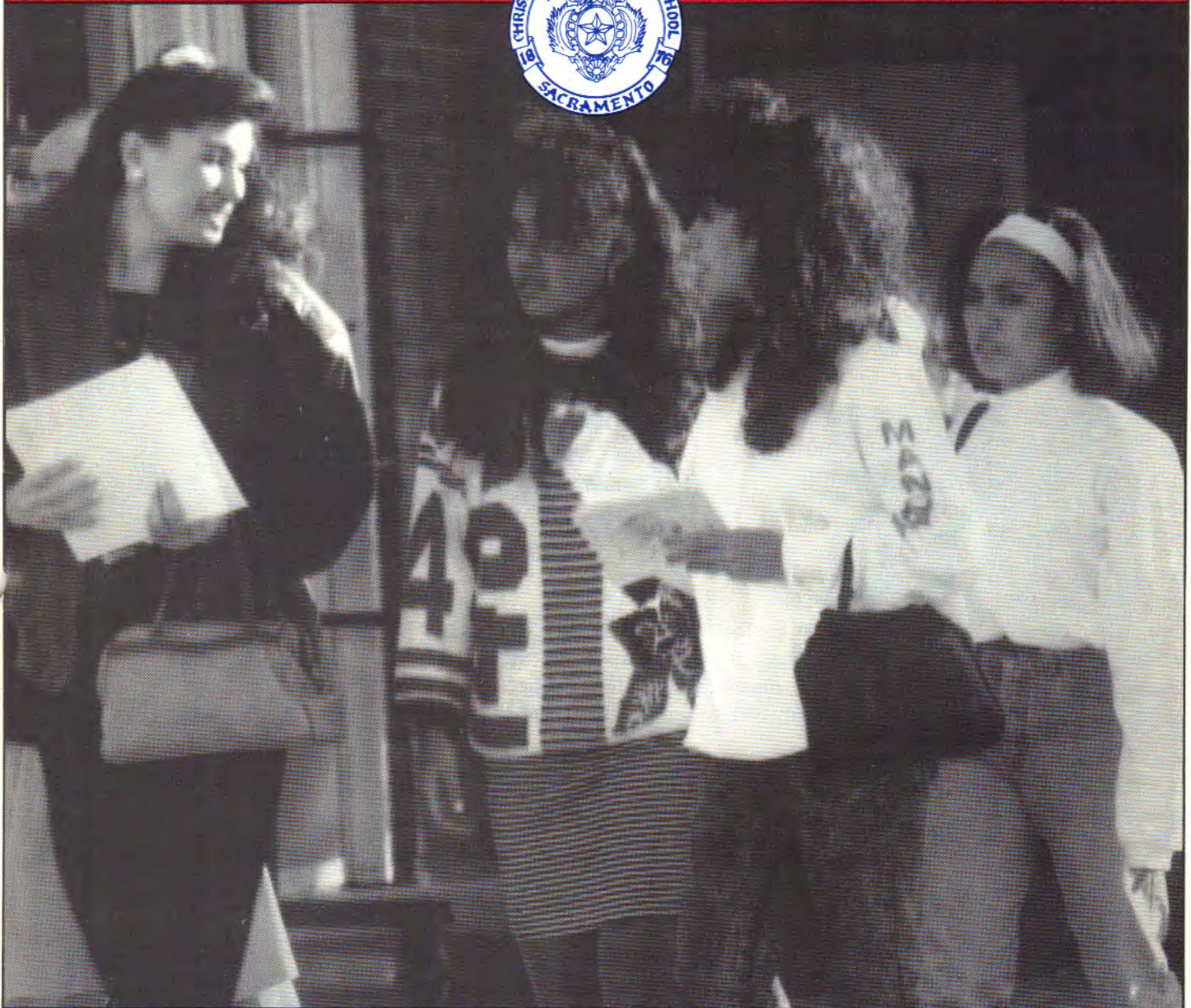

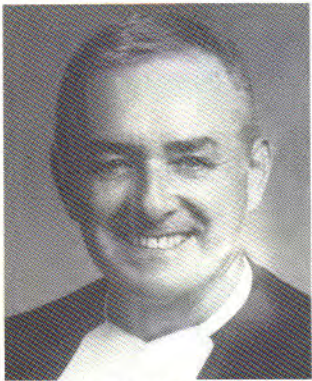

CBS EXPANDS FAMILY WHILE TRADITION CONTINUES

Dear CB Alumni/ae,

By now I'm sure you're aware of Christian Brothers' plan to become co-educational in the fall of 1990. All of us here at CBS are busily engaged in making the transition to co-education a highly successful

one. The level of anticipation among students, parents, and staff seems quite

high. At the same time, there are a great many preparations to be made and the everyday needs of the school to be attended to, so our workload these days is challenging, to say the least.

In the months ahead we will be keeping you posted about co-educational developments and our future planning. In this issue of *The Connection*, I'd like to acquaint you with the general process and various considerations that prompted the school's decision to become co-educational.

As I'm sure you can appreciate, the decision to alter Christian Brothers' 114-year tradition of male-only education wasn't arrived at easily. Quite the contrary, the process was long and exhaustive, involving two major task forces (the first in 1982), various demographic studies, community and school surveys, financial analysis and projections, collaborative planning with the Diocese and other Catholic high schools, and countless meetings by CBS administrators, regents, faculty, and other groups. Ultimately, our proposal for co-education—

made in conjunction with a larger proposal for eventual relocation and construction of a modern, expanded facility—was based on the strong recommendation of the CBS administration and the Board of Regents. Major factors underlying the recommendation were the following:

- A comprehensive assessment by the Christian Brothers West Coast Province of its various entities, resources, and needs, and the implications of that assessment for the future allocation of Brother personnel to schools.

- The mandate of the Christian Brothers Province to all of its nine secondary schools to establish long-range plans assuring each school's viability into the 21st century.

- The nature of the Brothers' mission, which is to extend the opportunity of La Sallian education to as many students as possible.

- The very positive experiences the Christian Brothers Province has had in operating co-educational schools. (Four of the Brothers' west-coast schools currently are co-educational, and two others are about to become so.)

- Critical financial issues, including escalating operational costs, student enrollment projections, tuition rate limitations, financial aid requests, declining subsidies, staff salary needs, and vital capital expenditures.

- The major growth trends in Sacramento, and the Brothers' desire to assist the Diocese in responding to the emerging educational needs of parishes and families.

- The results of comprehensive studies by the Diocese indicating a strong desire in the community for the option of a Catholic co-educational high school.

- The preference for a co-educational CBS expressed (through professional surveys) by a clear majority of the school's current male population (80%), CBS parents (70%), and Catholic

elementary school parents (76%).

- The opportunity to expand and diversify the school's college preparatory curriculum, particularly in the areas of fine arts and business education, and the positive impact of female participation on the quality of certain courses (e.g., discussion of issues in religion classes).

- The significant advantages of a co-educational student body in the operation of effective co-curricular programs: student government, clubs and activities, athletics, and religious functions such as liturgies and retreats.

- The concerns of CBS faculty that single-sex education is not always conducive to students' best personal and social development.

- The fact that if CBS were to become co-educational, single-sex secondary education options would still exist for the Catholic families of the community.

Weighing all these factors, it became clear to the administration and the Board of Regents that a co-ed CBS was "an idea whose time had come"—a change that would serve the best interests of the Brothers themselves, the Diocese, and, most important, the Catholic students and families of Sacramento.

As graduates, I'm sure that some of you have mixed feelings or reservations about CB's change to co-education. I know from last year's survey that a majority of CB graduates favor the decision and are looking forward to sending both their sons and daughters here. At the same time, there are concerns on the part of some that CBS may come to lose those special qualities that have endeared it to students for so many years. All I can offer you in this regard is my own strong conviction that, while certain aspects of the CBS experience will doubtlessly change due to co-education, the essential qualities will re-

SOME COMMON QUESTIONS ABOUT CO-EDUCATION

With the decision to make Christian Brothers High School co-educational in the fall of 1990, many questions have been asked of the CBS administration. Here are some responses to frequently asked questions.

How will the school be identified?

The school will continue to be called Christian Brothers High School. This name reflects the religious order that owns and operates the school (not the gender of the students), is a familiar reference throughout the Sacramento community, and is a source of pride not only for the current students but for thousands of alumni as well. Christian Brothers also will continue to have the Falcon for its mascot and will maintain its traditional school colors of red and blue.

Will Christian Brothers be accepting new students at all grade levels?

Yes, the school will be accepting qualified students at all four grade levels. While the school's admissions policies assign priority to Catholic students and schools, CBS also welcomes the applications of non-Catholics and of students from public schools.

What will be the overall student-teacher ratio for 1990-91?

CBS has always sought to provide conditions that allow for effective classroom instruction and individual attention to students. Next year the school will continue its practice of maintaining a low student-teacher ratio. (The current ratio is 23-1.)

What will tuition be next year, and will it be the same for all students?

Tuition for CBS next year will be maintained at its current rate of \$3,200. This rate will apply to all students, male and female. Christian Brothers makes a concerted effort every year to provide financial assistance to as many needy families as possible. Funds are awarded on an equal-opportunity basis to those with demonstrated financial hardship. It is the school's goal to make a Christian Brothers education possible for every qualified student who wishes to attend.

Will all classes be open to both girls and boys?

With the exception of physical education, all classes will be open to both sexes. PE classes will be single sex but will combine at times for certain sports or activities.

What type of athletic program will be provided for girls?

The school's intent is to offer girls the same high-caliber sports program that it has traditionally provided boys (and for which it is so well known throughout the area). CBS expects to field girls' teams in eight sports next year: softball, soccer, cross country, volleyball, basketball, swimming, tennis, and track. Christian Brothers' approach to girls' sports will be the same as its approach to boys'—to encourage participation (except where it interferes with academics), to provide adequate support (including fully qualified coaches), to promote healthy activity and enjoyment, and to teach values and foster growth.

Will girls have opportunities to become fully involved in next year's student government, clubs, and activities?

CBS is already making plans that will enable its new female students to participate fully in student government and clubs and to help shape next year's activities program. A student committee, composed of both girls and boys, will be making recommendations regarding student body and class election procedures, activities coordination, possible summer programs, and so forth.

Will CBS sponsor a drill team next year? Also, will cheerleaders be chosen from among its own students?

Yes. CBS's drill team will be modeled along the lines of Bishop Manogue High School's very successful program. The team will be open to all CBS girls who wish to try out. Only CBS students will have the opportunity to try out for cheerleaders.

What type of dress will students be expected to wear next year?

CBS will require a dress code of all students that reflects the school's philosophy towards student attire—specifically, that such attire should:

main. Academic excellence, personal growth and development, attention to individual needs, student-teacher friendship, the *esprit de corps* of the student body—qualities such as these are fundamental to the Christian Brothers experience, and I can assure you that they always will be. CBS is about to expand its family, but the tradition goes on.

Details of next year's dress code are still being reviewed by the CBS administration, with input from students (both boys and girls), parents, and staff. The following general features have already been determined:

CBS will require comparable dress codes for girls and boys, consisting of guidelines, options, and restrictions related to everyday school attire and to "Dress-up Day" attire. The dress code will be equitable, providing a reasonable degree of flexibility and choice but at the same time adhering to the principles of dress and appearance cited earlier.

Students, both girls and boys, will have the option of wearing a CBS uniform. *Note:* In designing the girls' uniform, CBS will attempt to incorporate various items of apparel currently worn by students attending Sacramento's other Catholic high schools (so as to reduce the expense of entirely new uniforms for transfer students).

The dress code at CBS will be reviewed on an ongoing basis.

Will CBS relocate within the next four years?

No. Incoming freshmen can be assured that CBS will remain at its present site during their four years of stay at the school.



The Sacramento media focused a great deal of attention at Christian Brothers' Open House in January, including interviews with prospective students.

What changes will occur to the school plant and facilities?

CBS is consulting with architects in planning appropriate changes to the plant and facilities. These include an increase in the number of classrooms, additional storage units and restrooms, renovation of the shower/locker rooms, reconfiguration of the athletic fields, construction of a softball facility, expanded faculty work areas and coaches' offices, and provisions for parking and traffic control. The estimated cost of renovations is \$400,000 (of which the Diocese will pay 75%), with all work to be completed before school opens in the fall.

In general, how is the transition to co-education being handled?

Several months ago the CBS administration, working with consultants, designed a co-education transition process featuring the following:

A special co-education steering committee to oversee the transition process and make final recommendations to the administration.

Seven faculty and staff committees, each focused on a particular element of the transition: culture; strategic planning, marketing, and evalu-

ation; curriculum; staffing; students; plant and facilities; finances.

Three advisory committees involving representative groups of students, parents, and Regents/alumni.

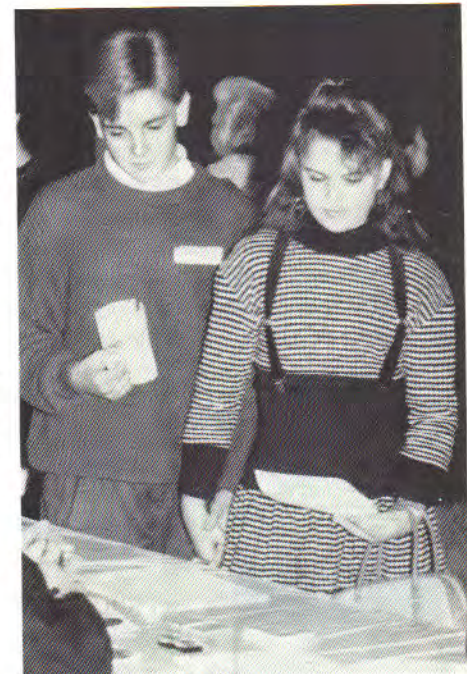
Information programs aimed at students and the public.

Admissions policies, procedures, and timelines for incoming freshmen and transfer students.

Ongoing consultation with the Diocesan Office of Education, other

Catholic high schools, and Catholic elementary schools.

Because it actively involves all elements of the school community, this process is proving an effective means of planning and decision-making for the CBS administration.

KEEPING IT ALL IN THE FAMILY

CBS Math Teacher Lee Wurschmidt's Daughter Enrolls in First Co-Educational Class

Christian Brothers High School math teacher Lee Wurschmidt has the reputation of being a demanding, difficult, caring, and fair teacher. The reputation of the school in which she teaches has helped her to decide that her daughter, Anne, may be among the first female students admitted to CBS.

Not that being a pioneer of sorts is new to the Wurschmidt family. Lee arrived on the CBS campus in 1982 along with two other "trailblazers," Judy Budzenski and Kathy Rosenfield. She remembers those early days of being in the minority of three as being a period of trial and error, but the changes have been positive and many.

Wurschmidt taught one semester at Vallejo Senior High School before coming to CBS after several years in the San Juan District, primarily at Del Campo, for several years prior to arriving at CBS on that "first wave" of female teachers. In her seven years on campus, she has taught almost every math course offered, is the moderator of the Mathletes, and handles the task of managing the CBS Bookstore.

She is pleased with her switch to CBS because of the basic philosophy of the educational system. "We're here about the whole kid. I'm not just teaching math, I'm teaching boys who happen to be in a

math class. You can't cop out and say 'my job is to teach math.' At this school your job is to teach the whole student.

Wurschmidt doesn't see any change at all in that basic philosophy once the girls arrive on campus. But she does see a change in the overall atmosphere of CBS. "I see a change in the comraderie aspect, that might be lessened somewhat."

Still, Wurschmidt sees an abundance of positives in going co-ed, primary of which is the fact that her daughter can now attend the school.

"The school she was supposed to attend is too large, and I'm afraid she'll get lost in the cracks. Also, the counseling at larger schools is often limited to what courses you're going to take. She's more than an academic statistic."

And while the thought of going to an all-boys school in transition didn't exactly sit well with Anne a couple of years ago when the idea was first thrown around, it's beginning to feel a bit more comfortable now.

"She's concerned girls will be guinea pigs, afraid they won't fit," Lee

said of Anne, who is currently attending Barrett Junior High School, where she plays the trombone in the school band, and participates in softball. "She'd like to wait a year or two and see how it goes—she'd rather not be in the first group. She still thinks of it as a boys school. Also, her mom teaches at the school."

But none of this has served as a deterrent to a mother who was never

shy about being in the first group. Lee has three other children, two daughters and a son. She had her son in class at Del Campo and few of the other students knew they were related, so she knows how to be understanding of that type of situation.

The bottom line is that Lee wants Anne at CBS because it will benefit her daughter in the long run. "It's a good school with a good

overall program where the arts and religion are considered along with the academic. It all goes back to what I said about education of the whole person, that's what we do here."

Barrett Sizemore, senior: "I think it'll be a good change of pace. I think Christian Brothers is a good tradition, but having the girls

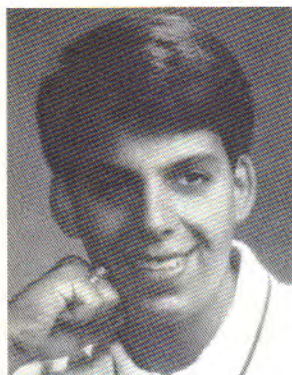
here might increase openmindedness."

NAMES, FACES, AND ACHIEVEMENTS AT CBS

CBS senior **Walter Rawlins** has been selected to attend the Sacramento Links Beautillion, to be held April 14 at the Hyatt Regency Hotel in Sacramento. Rawlins qualified for the formal event by maintaining above a 3.0 G.P.A. and by performing 20 hours of community service. Rawlins has invited Tamu Pepper to accompany him to the formal ball for young black men, similar to the Cotillion Ball held for young black women. Rawlins, a highly respected student at CBS, is an active member of the National Honor Society and the California Scholarship Federation. He is also Senior Class Treasurer and was recently honored by the Sacramento Optimists as Student of the Month...

Two CBS students, **John Barone** and **Justin de Leon-Horton**, will have their writing featured in a major new high school textbook series soon to be released by Houghton Mifflin Company. The series, *Houghton Mifflin English*, consists of four basal texts (grades 9-12) each of which begins with a multi-page display of the work of an outstanding student writer. The displays are designed to illustrate key stages in the writing process and to testify to the importance of investing time and effort in one's writing. Barone's work, a research-based article on computer viruses ("The Bug That Bites the Bit"), leads the grade 11 text; de Leon-Horton's work, a personal essay about radio disc jockeys ("Annoying DJ Blues"), is the opening feature of the grade 9 text. In addition to presenting and describing the work of Barone and de Leon-Horton, the textbooks provide a biographical sketch of each student-author. Houghton Mifflin plans to market the textbooks nationally...

CBS seniors **Joe Aguilar**, **Andreas Christensen**, **Frank Montes**, **Lee Pennill**, and **Michael Montejano** went on a retreat to Tijuana, Mexico from November 9-15. Teachers were **Mike Hebda** and **Brother Jesus Lara**, Language Department Coordinator. "It was a real neat trip, an awakening for the boys," said Hebda on their return.

Lee Pennill related this about the trip: "Tijuana is developing pretty fast. It's a contrasting country with some parts poor and some parts rich. Houses there were very run down; some of the houses were made out of cardboard or tin metal with car tire foundations. The shopping areas are well developed, but most of Tijuana was one vast slum. At the Casa del Migrante (Migrant's house), the people were friendly, and we all got along because we were all there for the same reason.

"At the border we watched the 'border jumpers' being chased by cars and helicopters. At the Bogata Church, people sang their hearts out and kept coming in even after the service had started. A baptism was celebrated in Spanish. When we visited the orphanage, the kids called me father. We played games; ate with the kids, gave them piggy-back rides.

"The visit to the Casa De Los Pobres (poor house) was revealing to us. We all helped make the food, surprising the cooks. Everyone seemed grateful that we came. At the prison, we helped feed the prisoners, again making the food. The prisoners looked helpless and sad. I was shocked to see a woman in jail with seven men."

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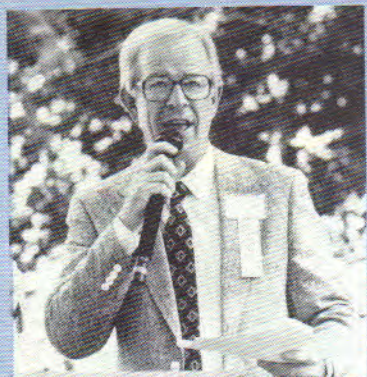

VALINES START A NEW FAMILY TRADITION WITH CBS

When Christian Brothers High School announced this past fall that it would admit girls next year, Kevin Valine ('73) wasted no time in signing up his oldest daughter, Jenni, an eighth grader at St. John Vianney school. "There was never any question about whether she would go," Kevin said. "We just weren't expecting that the school would be ready in time for her."

Jenni Valine, like other girls her age, now has the option of attending a co-ed Catholic high school in Sacramento. Beginning in 1990, the school will teach girls and boys in class together for the first time.

"I know Christian Brothers is a good school, and I want to go to a school where there are boys," she said. She comes from an active Catholic family where both parents attended Catholic schools. Jenni's mother, Susan, graduated from St. Vincent's in Vallejo. Kevin, however, probably had the greatest influence on Jenni's choice.

Kevin is the youngest of Joseph and Lorraine Valine's four children to be taught by the Christian Brothers. His sisters, Rosemary Valine Wood and Carol Valine Zarek, attended Bishop Armstrong when the school was "co-instructional." His brother Roger graduated from Armstrong in 1967 after it had reverted back to all boys. Rosemary Wood's four boys all graduated from CBS, further adding to the family tradition. Finally, Kevin's parents have been active and long-time supporters of the Christian Brothers.

Following graduation in 1973, Kevin and several classmates decided to join the Brothers' order. He credits his high school teachers, especially Brothers Martin DeMartini, Philip Keavney, and Edward Welch, for having a profound influence on him. "They taught me how to think, intuitively and creatively," he said.

"They were also the first ones to show me that being a Christian didn't mean having to leave your intellect at the door."

After three years Kevin left the Brothers' order to pursue a family-oriented lifestyle. He returned home, graduated from California State University, Sacramento, and went into the insurance business. Eleven years later, he is now a Vice President with McGee & Thielen Insurance Brokers, Inc. of Sacramento.

Like his parents, Kevin has been active in his local parish. He is currently serving a term as President of the St. John Vianney School Board, and has been involved in parish activities such as CCD, Parish Council, and the parish chapter of St. Vincent De Paul.

Kevin and Susan have two other daughters enrolled at St. John Vianney. Heather is a fourth grader and Natalie is in kindergarten. Jenni will have completed all

nine years at the school.

Although Jenni will be among the first students next year to attend the new co-educational Christian Brothers school, she doesn't consider herself a pioneer. 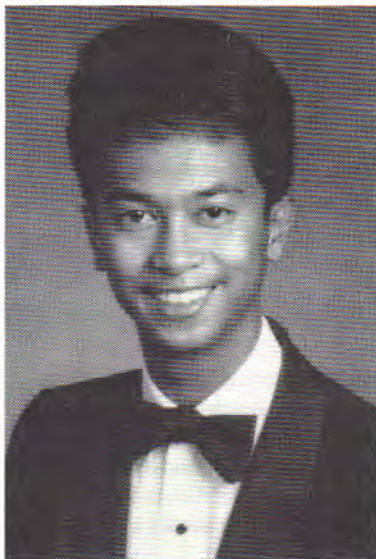

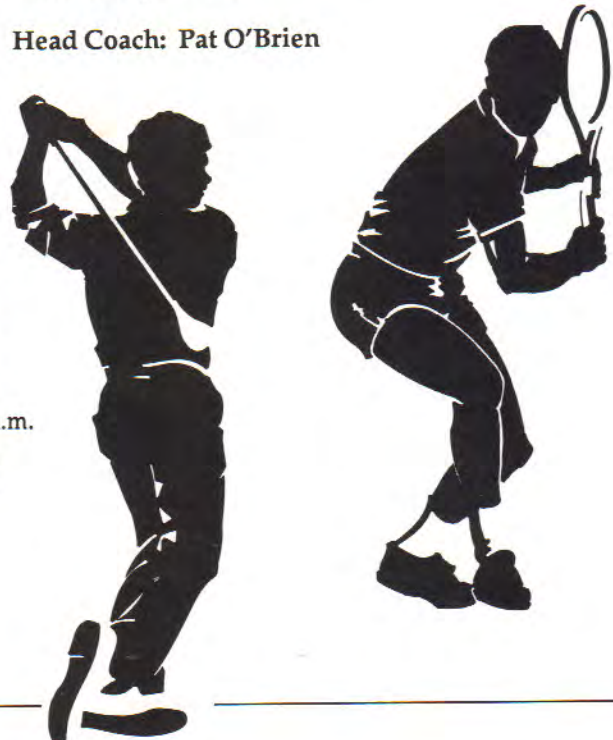
