When writing the sports history of a school, particularly one celebrating its centennial, like Christian Brothers

High School, two things quickly come to mind -- forst, you realize there is no way to touch all the bases, and, second, you don't even know where to start.

Christian Brothers College at 12th and K, where now stands weinstock's, was represented on athletic fields to for many years without a recognized coach. That was changed in 1919 when Peter Mitchell, back from St. Mary's College, accepted the task of coaching football, baseball and basketball, along with teaching classes.
