In 1876 Archbishop Alemany of San Francisco dedicated St. Patrick's Institute at 12th & K Streets in Sacramento. The new school, later to be called Sacramento Institute, was the result of five years of hard work by Miss Maggie Cunningham and Father Scanlan. Miss Cunningham, the most energetic benefactor of the time, raised the \$24,000 needed to establish the school by going door to door in an effort to bring the Christian Brothers to Sacramento. She was later rewarded for this tremendous accomplishment by receiving Letters of Affiliation with the Institute. The original school had four classrooms with seats for 260 pupils. Br. Cianin, one of the original Christian Brother pioneers to California, opened the doors as first Director-Principal along with his original staff of six Brothers. The first graduating class received their diplomas, 10 months later, in the Assembly chamber of the Capitol with Governor Irwin presiding. Brother Cianin was succeeded by members

of his Institute whose names; Sabinian, Genebren, Walter Erminold, and Victor Ambrose . . . are now footnotes in history. In 1896, at the urging of Bishop Grace of Sacramento, the name of the school was changed to Christian Brothers College.

Christian Brothers In Sacramento Since 1876

On July 15, 1876, seven Christian Brothers arrived in Sacramento for the purpose of taking charge of a new school, erected at 12th and K Streets by Father Patrick Scanlan, for the Catholic boys of the city. The following day the institution was solemnly dedicated under the name of Saint Patrick's Institute by the Most Rev. Joseph Sadler Alemany, Archbishop of San Francisco.

ON MONDAY, July 17, 1876, the Brothers began to receive students whose numbers soon reached the 250 mark. A boarding department with an initial population of 10 boys was also maintained.

THE NEW school at that time was regarded as the finest building in the city. The seven Brothers who comprised the original faculty were Brothers Cianin, the principal, Alexander, Samuel, Patrick, Finton, William and Wendell.

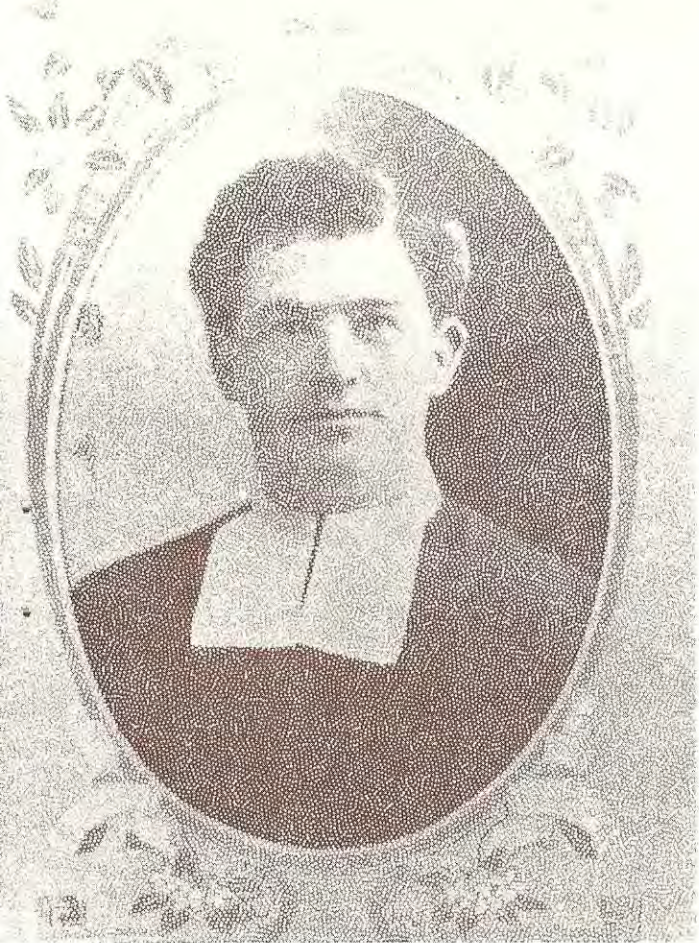
The Brothers dormitory had seven beds with spring mattresses, a bolster and pillow, two pairs of sheets & pillow slips, one blanket & two spreads for each, to which the community had to add a pair of blankets for each brother in the course of a week.

The only classroom apparatus procured were two Franklin globes, a terrestrial and celestial, two dozen blackboard brushes, and two dozen pointers.

Community Record.

In 1903, a new wing was added to the main building at an expense of nearly five thousand (5000) dollars. This addition was a generous gift of Mrs. Bethel of Sacramento, who must be regarded as a benefactress of the Community. She also furnished means to decorate the chapel and donated two beautiful statues, one of the Sacred Heart and the other of the Holy Founder.

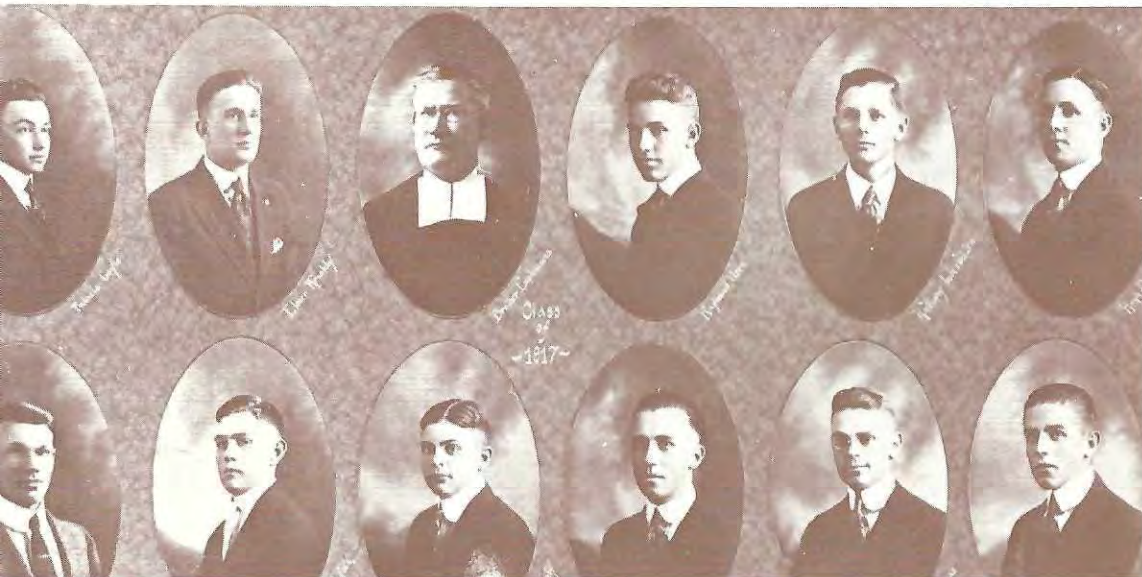

Commercial Class, 1918 Christian Brothers College.



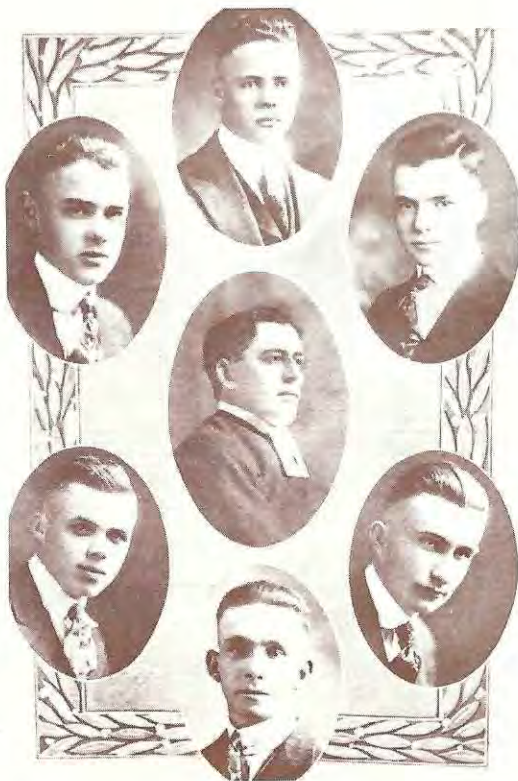

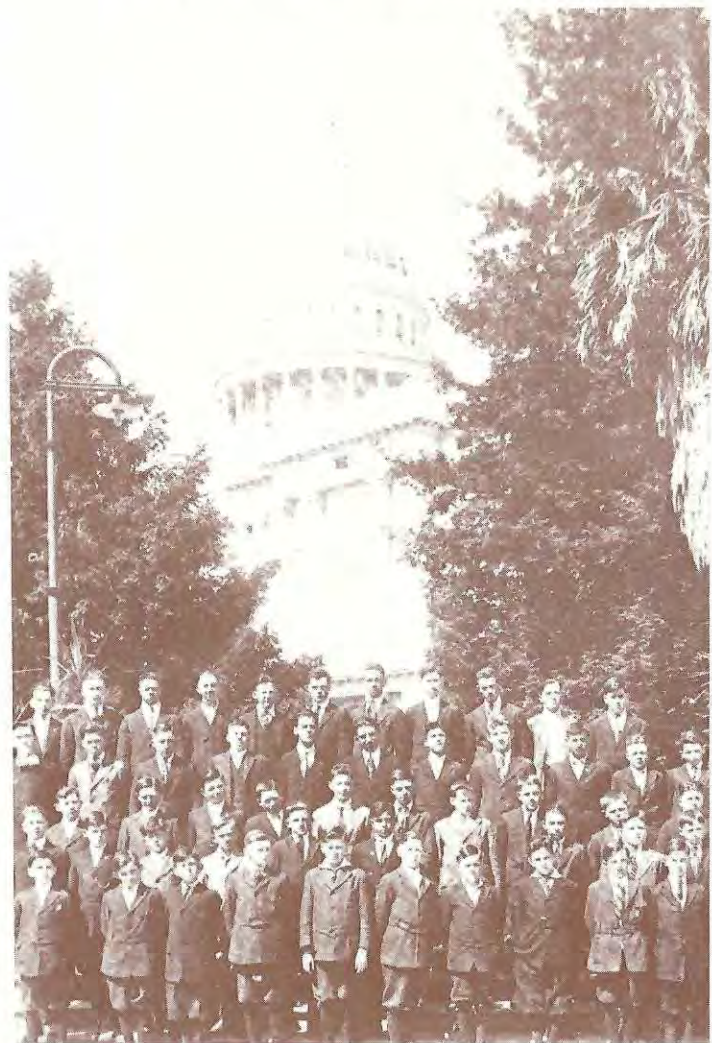

Christian Brothers College from 1923-1924 in the temporary location of the East Sacramento Public School building at 39th & J Streets.

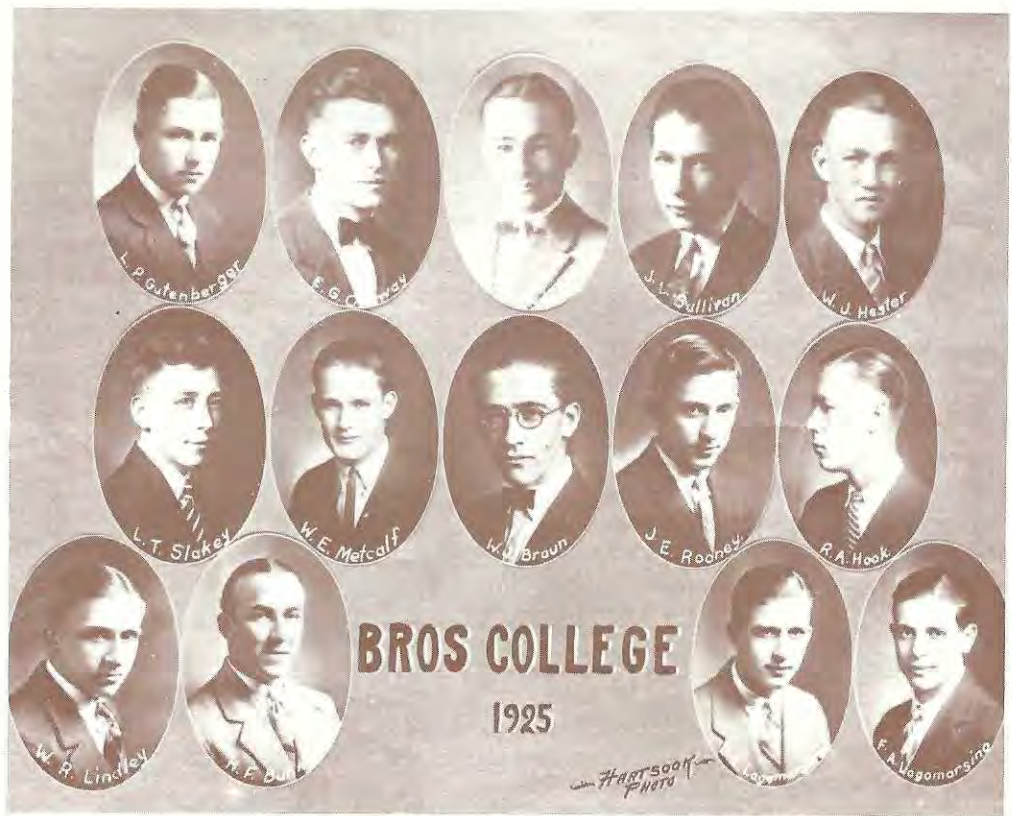
The years 1920-1929 were one of the more active decades for Christian Brothers in Sacramento. The early part of the twenties were difficult years for the school itself. The old building at 12th & K Streets was in a sad state of disrepair, the property itself had high commercial value and was sold in 1923 to the Weinstock - Lubin Company.

A one year interim period at 39th & J Streets provided classrooms for the pupils while the new CBS was being built at 21st & Broadway. During this one year period teachers and thirty boarding students rode on two buses twice a day from their temporary quarters at 20th & T Streets. The new school at 21st & Broadway saw groundbreaking on February 11, 1924 . . . the cornerstone laid on May 18th . . . and the students in their classrooms as well as Brothers and boarders in their quarters by September 15th. of 1924.

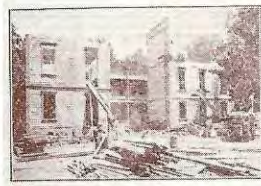

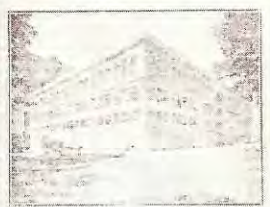
Twelfth and K Streets for Years Past The Home of The Christian Brothers School

On May 18, 1924 cornerstone ceremonies were held on the grounds of the yet to be completed campus of Christian Brothers School at 21st. and Broadway (then Y Street). Judge Peter J. Shields, Class of 1882 and Chairman of the Day, provided the opening remarks. The major speeches of the ceremony were given by; The Honorable Albert Elkus, Brother Z. Joseph, Provincial of the Christian Brothers, and The Honorable Thomas J. Lennon, Class of 1881 and Associate Justice of the California Supreme Court. The ceremonies drew a large crowd including such early pioneers as Maggie Cunningham who remembered well another dedication held 48 years prior. The cornerstone ceremonies were preceded with a parade that began on twentieth and T Streets and included a division of "Old Boys" as well as all of the Catholic organizations of Sacramento.

Though an invalid for several years, she is still alive and is as keenly interested in the new school today as she was in the success of the new one established forty-nine years ago. She is now under the constant care of her devoted niece, Miss Mary Doyle, at the Mater Misericordiae Hospital. Ever since the arrival of the Brothers Miss Cunningham has been their good Angel and constant benefactor.

If Providence spares her another year she will witness the golden glory of her early endeavors, as the Golden Jubilee celebration will recall in a vivid manner the courage, endurance and self-sacrifice of the pioneers to whom the present generation owes so much. They sowed the seed; we are reaping the harvest. They worked under disadvantages that we of today can hardly conceive; but we appreciate their heroic deeds, their pluck, their spirit of fearless adventure, their wonderful foresight and their generous sacrifices. The chief purpose of a golden jubilee is to commemorate these things, and we will not fail to celebrate the **Golden Jubilee** of the Christian Brothers, in Sacramento, during the **Year of Our Lord, 1926.**

Has Fast Line.

Coach Laurence Janssen of the Sacramento High School is inclined to agree with Flynn about the situation.

"While our line is made up mostly of veterans they have taken on fifteen pounds of weight to a man since last year and they are pitifully slow," said the Dragon mentor. "Our backs are untried."

Sees Little Scoring.
"I look for a good, close battle with little scoring," said Janssen. "We don't expect to get beat, but it will be a tough assignment for us so early in the season."

So the local season will open with the traditional big game between the Sacramento rivals. A defeat will not break the losing team, but it will badly bend it.

The rival coaches announced their starting lineups to-day. Bobby Williams will be the sparkplug for the Twenty-first and Y Street aggregation and will bark the signals from the quarterback post. The halfbacks will be Adrian Bennett and Bill Diage, with Leo Ezzetti holding down the fullback job.

Many Changes Are Made At Christian Brothers' School

Brother Patrick Succeeds Brother Lewis, As Principal

Changes In Faculty And Methods, Many Improvements In School Plant, And Reduction In Tuition Fees Announced

Sacramento.—With the reopening of school on August 26th, the Christian Brothers' Primary, Grammar and High School, 21st and Y Streets, faces its high purpose as the only Catholic High School for boys in the diocese, with a reorganized staff, new methods of administration, and changes in procedure which those responsible for the school feel will be to the best advantage of the boys entrusted to their care.

NEW PRINCIPAL.
Brother Lewis, M. A., former principal of the school, has been promoted to the teaching staff of Sacred St. Mary's College, and has been replaced by a veteran educator and a master in boy psychology, Brother Patrick, M. A. Brother Patrick is a former member of the staff at the school, having taught the senior class in 1933 and 1934. He is a member of the New York Province of the Brothers of the Christian Schools, and taught in the schools of his congregation in New Hampshire before coming to California. The new principal held the important post of assistant director of the Novitiate of the Brothers at Mount La Salle, Calif., last year. While there he was mainly responsible for the training of the future teachers of Catholic youth in this state.

Changes In Faculty.
Brother Joseph A. B., will continue as vice-principal, the work done so ably in former years by Brother Chasins, who goes to Los Angeles, Brothers Leonard, Mark, and Odian have also been transferred. Brother Philip, A. B., remains as director of Resident Students at the school. Other new members of the faculty are Brothers Kevin, A. B.; James, A. B.; Benedict, A. B. and Robert, A. B., all of St. Mary's College and Brother Agathe, A. B., until recently dean of the Commercial Department at Cathedral High School, Los Angeles.

Resident Students Welcomed.
The school has a splendid group of buildings, fully and thoroughly equipped for its purpose. Communal quarters are provided for resident students. Board and tuition fees are moderate and Catholic

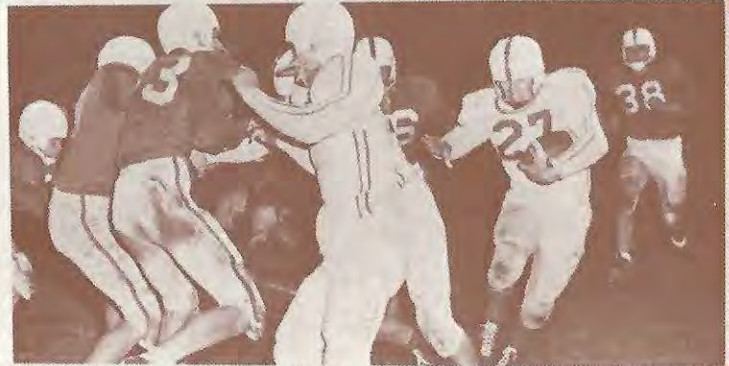

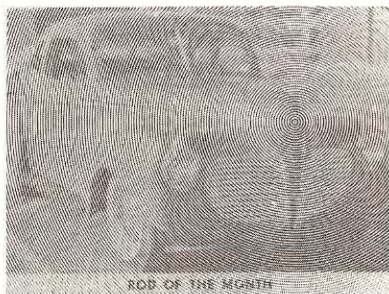

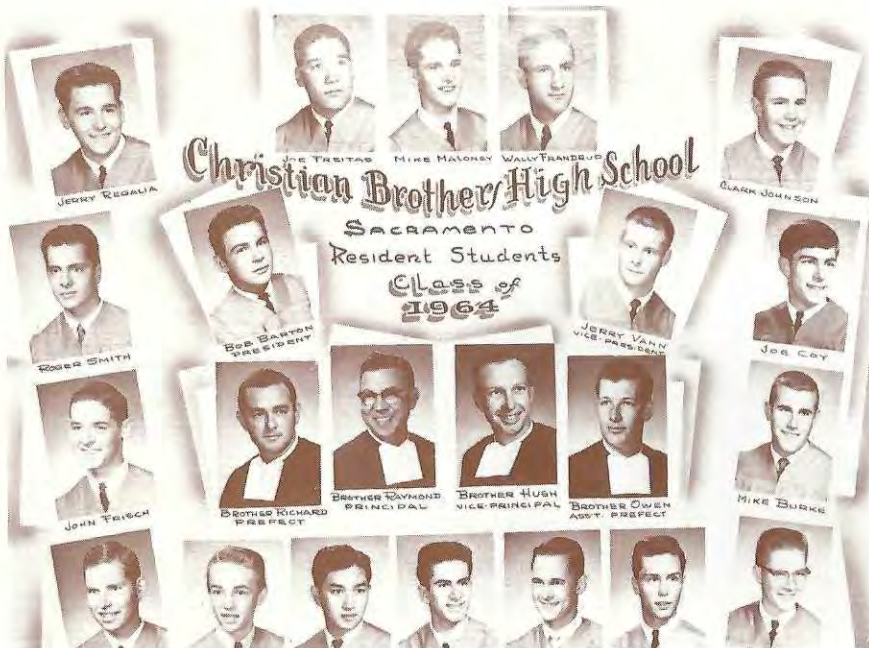

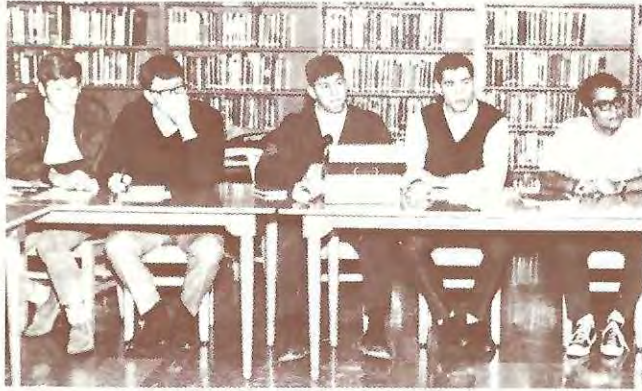

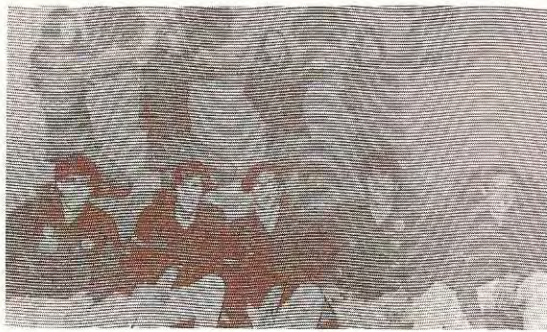

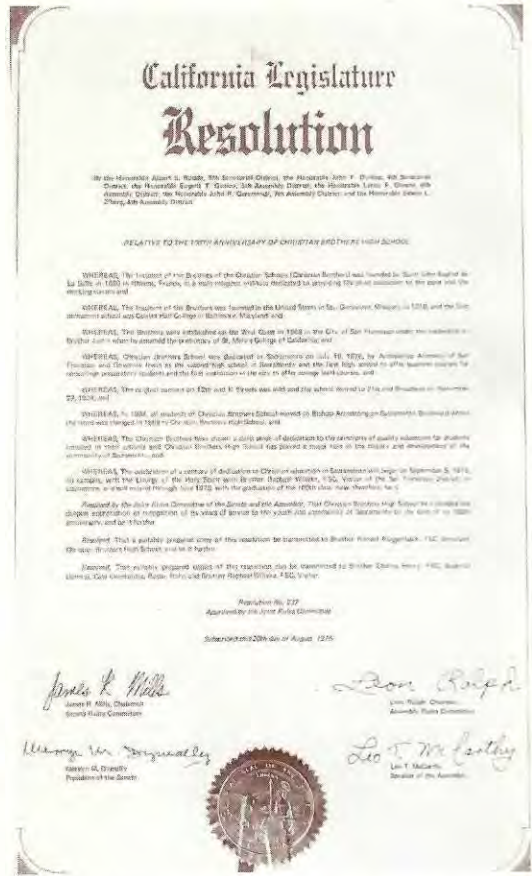
