La Salle Club Hall of Fame: Biographies

George Babich -- Sacramento

Native Sacramentan pitched and played first base in minor league baseball from 1941 to 1948. The Sacramento High School graduate (1941) played for Pocatello, Vancouver, Salem, Spokane, Victoria. His career culminated with a one year stint with the St. Louis Browns in 1947. The following year, Babich left the Sacramento Solons camp with a sore arm.

Active in youth baseball, Babich served as president of Pacific Little League and was on the Board of Directors of Land Park Pony League.

Dr. Bud L. Beasley -- Reno

Former Solon pitcher enjoyed claim to fame in 1946 when he won the longest game in professional baseball by beating Seattle in 17 innings and hurled in the Pacific Coast League All-Star Game. Later pitched for Seattle and Vancouver, Canada. Career lasted from 1942 to 195?

A gridiron stalwart from the University of Reno, he made All-Time, All-Conference in the Coast Counties Athletic League in football, while playing on the Conference Champions team in 1934.

Awarded Nevada Coach of the Year in 1951 and later coached the state champs in football, basketball and baseball (What school????)

Longtime supporter of Sacramento youth baseball as member of Sacramento Bushers and local Kiwanis Club. He is a Life Member of the Stockton Old Timer's Boosters Youth Baseball.

Eddie Booth -- Chico

This Chico State College graduate is best known for his journalistic career at the Chico-Enterprise Record, serving as sports editor (1953-1964), news editor 1964-1978), assistant managing editor (1978-1983) and editor in charge of community relations.

Refereed Chico-area youth football and baseball leagues throughout the 1950s and 60s. Booth was an active member of: Orland Park and Rec Committee; Chico Area Recreation District; Optimist Northern California All-Star Football Game selection committe and Northern California Old-Timers' Sports Association, among others.

Tony Ferrara -- Yuma, Arizona

Native of Brooklyn and graduate of Sacramento High School, Ferrara went on to pitch and win the first game of the California State League for Merced in 1940. Also pitched and won the California League's first All-Star Game in 1941. Later, played for Idaho Falls in the Pioneer League in 1942, making the All-Star team. Played for Victoria in the Western Int'l League in 1946.

Played on numerous local semi-professional teams including Al's Clothiers, the Sacramento Recreation Dept. Municipal Winter League Champs in 1941. That year, he tossed a no-hit, no-run game agains Julius' team.

Now living in Yuma, Arizona, Ferrara has managed Little League for two years.

Mente Latino -- Sacramento

This Sacramento High School grad played semi-professional baseball from 1930 to 1950. Handled the hot corner position for Winter League Champs Al's Clothiers in 1939 and Klumpps in 1944.

A multi-talented athlete, Latino also starred in local softball and soccer leagues, but reached his athletic pinnacle as a horseshoe pitcher, garnering world champtionship status from 1980-1982. Once scored six goals in a soccer game and 48 goals overall for Broadway Garden during 1948 season.

Sam Latino -- Sacramento

Younger brother of Mente, Sam Latino pitched in the minor leagues from 1944-1947, playing for Portland, El Paso, Spokane and Santa Barbara. Like his older brother, he excelled in several sports, including fast-pitch and slow-pitch softball, and golf.

Once struck out 16 batters while pitching for Julius in Sacramento Winter League.

Al Lazzarone -- Reno

The McClatchy High School grad played outfeld for Reno in the Sierra League in 1947 and Harold's Club in 1948 and 1949. Also performed in baseball and basketball for the U.S. Navy from 1943-1946. Lazzarone was a member of the Argonaut Liquor team that won the Sacramento Winter League title in 2227 year.

Ed Reeder -- Placerville

Sacramento High School graduate played outfield for local bushers, including Central Outfitting Co. in 1931, Kimball & Upcon-?? in 1933, and Julius in 1935.

George Relles -- Sacramento

This Cal-Berkeley grad coached Sacramento High in football from 1935 to 1959 excluding the period of World War II. Played baseball and football for the University of California from 1932 to 1934 and made All-Conference for the Bear Nine. In 1934, he played halfback for a semi-professional football team in San Francisco (pre-49ers) and roamed the outfield for the Sacramento Solons. Played five years for Victor in the San Joaquin Valley League.

Relles is a Hall of Fame member of the Sac-Joaquin Football Coaches Association and the Northern California Athletic Hall of Fame.

Eugene "Mad Dog" Sullivan -- Sacramento

A graduate of Christian Brothers High School and St. Mary's College, Sullivan played semi-professional baseball from 1930 to 1950.

Signed by the Boston Red Sox organization, Sullivan played outfield for teams in Moultrie, Georgia, Danville, Virginia and Lewiston, Idaho from 1938 to 1940. He played baseball for the U.S. Air Force from 1942 to 1945.

Also played in softball leagues from 1932 to 1950 in Sacramento, Los Angeles and San Francisco.

Was a member of the Julius' Winter League Champs in 1939 and 1940.

Henri Warren, Sr. -- Sacramento

Former Sacramento High grad played shortstop for the Solons in 1934 and the Los Angeles Angels of the Pacific Coast League in 1933. Played in the Sacramento Winter Leagues from 1928 to 1942, including a stint on Julius' championship team.

Also played on the Sacramento Police Baseball team.

An avid golfer since 1935, Warren has three holes in one to his credit.

The-Cal-Berkeley grad coached Sacramento High School in football from 1939 to 1959, excluding the period of World War 11. Played baseball and football and football from 1932 to 1934 and made all-Conference for the Bear Nine. In 1934 he played half back for a semi-professional football team in San Francisco (pre-49ers) and roamed the outfield for the Sacramento Solons, Played five years for Victor in the San Joaquin Valley League. Also played two years with Yuba City in the Sacramento Valley League.

Relles is a Hall of Famer of the San-Joaquin Football Coaches Assi and the Northern California Athletic Hall of Fame.

HENRI WARREN

Former Sacramento "igh School grad, played shortstop for the Solons in 1934 and the Eos Angeles Angels of the Padific Coast League in 1933. He also played in the Sacramento Winter League from 1928 to 1942, including a stint on Julius championship teams.

In 1935 the xxx golf bug bit him when he attended the University of Pacific.

That year he competed in Scotland representing the United States. His skills on the links brought him three holes in one during his career.

After he joined the Sacramento Police Department, he won a spot on the Police Department and he annually performed a game against the Stockton Police Department for the benefit of the Widows and Orphans Fund.

EUGENE "MAD DOG" SULLIVAN

A graduate of Christian Brothers High School and St. Marys
College, Sullivan played semi-pro baseball from 1930 to 1950, A

outfield for teams in Moultree, Georgia; Danville, Va; Lewiston,

In addition to his prowess as a baseball player, Sullivan played football, baseball and Rugby while attending St. Mary's College. While performing as a semi-pro ball player, in the winter league he excelled in baseball with two of Julius championship teams of 1939 and 1940.

A Christian "rothers youngster all the way, Gene was instrumental in the formation of the La Salle Club which is the sponsoring group for tonight's Hall of Fame Night. Sullivan received five letters at St. Mary's and 4 letters at Christian "rothers High School.

Mn the business world Sullivan enjoyed a long career with Sears -

TONY FERRARA Yuma, Arizona

Native of Brooklyn and graduate of Sacramento High School, Ferrara went on to pitch and win the first game of the California State

League for Merced in 1940. Also pitched and won the California

League's first All-Star game in 1941. Later, played for Idaho Falls in the Pioneer League League in 1942, making the All Star team.

Played for Victoria in the Western Int'l League in 1946.

Incorparing himself for a professional baseball career, Tony did not take too long in asserting himself as a first rate pitcher in the local semi-pro league by leading the Al's Chothiers to a pennant in the Sacramento Winter League in 1942. When entering the later that year service inxximix he continued his excellent mound work by maxing becoming the No. 1 pitcher for Mather Pield.

After World War 11, Ferrara had a brief tryout with the Cakland Caks in the Pacific Coast League.

One of outstanding pitching efforts during his career was pitching a no-hitter against Julius in 1941.

Ferrera was cited by the Sacramento Recreation Department for his accomplishments in the field of baseball.

Now living in Yuma Arizona Ferrara has managed Little League teams for the lat several years.

MONTE LATINO

The Sacramento High School grad played semi-professional baseball from 1930 to 1950. Handled the hot corner for Winter League chempions Al's Clothiers in 1939 and Klumpps in 1944.

A multi-talented athlete, Monte also xxx starred in local softbal and soccer league, but reached his athletic pinnacle as a horseshow pitcher, garnering world championship status from 1980-1982. Once scored six goals in a soccer game and 48 goals overall for Broadway Gardens during the 1948 season.

Was inducted into Softball Hall of Fame in 1979; soccer Hall of Fame in 1980; Horseshoe Hall of Fame in 1975.

SAM LATINO

Younger brother of Monte...Attended Sierra Elementary Stanford High and Sacramento digh School. Sam pitched in the minor league for Portland, El Paso, Elementary Spokane and Santa Barbera. Like his older brother, he excelled in several sports, including fast pitcher; and slow pitch softball, and golf.

While pitching for Julius in the Sacramento Winter League, Sam struck out 16 men. In golf, he had one hole in one. During his entire baseball career he had three no hitters and many one-hitters.

During his long career in softball, Sam won over 15 championship

trophies.

OPERSTONAL OR OTHER

A native Sacramentan pitched and played first baseball in minor leagues from 1941 to 1948. The Sacramento High School graduate (1941) played for rocatello, Vancouver, Salem, Spokane and Victoria. His professional career outlinated with a one year stint with the St.

Louis Browns in 1947. The following year kix Babich left the Sacramento Solons camp with a sore arm.

Babich is still active in baseball serving as president, Facific Little League and board member of Land Park Pony League.

Eddie Booth of Chico, a newsman for more than four decades, has long been one of amateur and semi-pro baseball's most enthusiastic boosters in Northern California and the Sacramento Valley

A native Nebraskan and later a fine allaround athlete at Orland High School, Booth was well known as a Sacramento Valley League umpire for six years ... while doubling as sports editor of newspapers in Orland and Chico.

For 22 years ... through the 1969 season ... Booth was one of the Mid-Valley Area's most prominent baseball-softball umpires. Early on in his umpiring career, he worked as a substitute in the Class D Far West and Class C California leagues and for 15 years was one of the top ball-and-strike men to work in the intercollegiate Far Western Conference

Chico citizens singled-out Booth by naming him to the Chico Sports Hall of Fame in 1974; and 10 years later, community leaders again cited him by naming the prime baseball facility in a 32-acre community park ... after him ... as an acknowledgment of public thanks for his many contributions to the community and its young athletes over a period of more than 30 years

Congratulations ... to the Chico Enterprise-Record's present-day director of community services, Eddie Booth Booth is a 1946 graduate of Orland High School where he earned varsity

letters in five sports.

He attended Chico State College for a year prior to embarking upon a journalism career.

He worked briefly on newspapers at Coos Bay, Ore., and Richmond,

Calif., prior to joining the staff of the Orland Unit in June 1949.

Booth joined the E-R news department July 6, 1953, as sports editor and in October 1964 was promoted to E-R news editor. In mid-May 1978, Booth became assistant managing editor. In March 1983, he was named editor in charge of community relations.

Booth's self-participation and spectator interest in all types of physical education, sports and recreation is well-known, as is his interest in the youngsters and adults on whom he focused his journalistic attention as they

competed.

Among his participatory interests was serving as an striped-shirt official at football and basketball games for a brief time in the late 1940s, and for 22 years he was one of the Mid-Valley Area's prominent baseball-softball umpires.

Through the '50s and into the mid-1960s, he was active in Chico's

Little League, American Legion and overall youth basebll programs.

Booth was a (1951) charter member of the city of Orland's Park and Recreation Committee and later served more than 14 years on the Chico Area Recreation District's directorate.

For 19 years, Booth was a member of the Al Malakaih Shrine Temple-sponsored North-South Shring High School All-Star Football Game selection committee. The annual midsummer high school all-star football game was played for 22 years in the Los Angeles Coliseum and Booth served as executive secretary of the North team selection for 12 years.

Also in the late 1950s and early '60s, he was a member of the Optimists' Northern California All-Star Football Game selection committee. The annual game matched graduated high school gridiron greats of the prior

season in a game played in Sacramento's Hughes Stadium.

Booth's other memberships and affiliations include the now-defunct Northern California Sports Boosters' Association, Chico State University Century Club, a 30-year member of Chico Elks Lodge No. 423, Butte County Local Agency Formation Commission alternate, and director of the Marysville-based Northern California Old-Timers' Sports Association, Chico State University Athletic Hall of Fame selection committee and the Chico Community Scholarship Association.

Some signal occasions in Booth's professional, personal and public

service career included:

In February 1963 and again in February 1964, the California Newspaper Publishers' Association's 1962 and 1963 Better Newspapers Contest singled-out the E-R sports section as being the second-best for outstanding coverage by newspapers in the 10,000 — 50,000 circulation class;

In May 1974 when he was named to the Chico Sports Hall of Fame; in January 1975 when he was cited by the California Park and Recreation Society as "lay director of the year for outstanding contributions to the field of recreation" at a banquet in Sacramento;

In March 1982 when the Orland High School Alumni Association bowed in his direction as its "outstanding alumnus of the year for 1981;" in May 1984, Chico Area Recreation and Park District named its prime playfield facilities (soccer, softball, flag football, etc.) — Eddie Booth Field — at its East 20th Street Community Park in his honor; in January 1989 he was named to the Northern California Old-Timers' Sports Association's Hall of Fame; and in October 1990 was named to the Chico State University Athletic Hall of Fame.

Booth's has been married to Bobbie Jean for more than 33 years. They have one son, Ed.
