

The enduring story of the Frake family going to the lowa State Fair began as the 1932 novel by Phil Strong. The following year, a film was made starring Will Rogers. In 1945, Rodgers and Hammerstein were commissioned to musicalize the story for a film featuring Charles Winniger, Dick Haymes and Vivian Blaine. For some reason, another Hollywood treatment with the Rodgers and Hammerstein score was released in 1962, starring Pat Boone and Ann Margaret. The default version in all of this history is the charming 1945 film and the basis for the Broadway stage script, which finally came along in 1996. As STATE FAIR was never intended for the stage, it required additional songs, dance arrangements and orchestrations. Several songs that appear in the stage version came from lesser known places of the Rodgers and Hammerstein catalogue, such as "Boys and Girls Like You and Me," which was cut from OKLAHOMA! and almost ended up in the film, MEET ME IN ST. LOUIS (the Judy Garland recording survives), finally found its place as a sweet moment between the father and mother in STATE FAIR. The Broadway premier of STATE FAIR in 1996 caused an interesting situation, for the show was put into the "new musical" category for the Tony Awards since the script and score had never been used on stage before. That year, Rodgers and Hammerstein, who had long ago passed on from our world, were nominated for "Best New Score" of a musical—a score containing songs that had been well known and well recorded standards through half of the 20th Century.

I was in New York to see that 1996 production of STATE FAIR and it had multiple connections to my life at that time. I was invited to see it by the orchestrator Bruce Pomahac, who happened to be the Director of Music at the Rodgers and Hammerstein Organization at that time and who was also my main contact and facilitator of my graduate school thesis project to restore the Rodgers and Hart musical JUMBO from 1935. I was in New York on a research grant to reassemble the show, which had not been produced since its original Broadway run and Bruce spent hours with me going over the incomplete JUMBO materials they had in the archives. Tom Briggs, the book writer for the stage version, was instrumental in working out the legalities of my staging JUMBO at CSUS in the fall of 1997. Additionally, the STATE FAIR cast happened to feature actors Donna McKechnie, John Davidson and Susan Egan (replacing Andrea McArdle as Margy), all of whom I had worked with at the Sacramento Music Circus. That combination of people bringing a 1945 musical film to life on stage in 1996 was a sentimental affair and so I have had a fondness for the show ever since.

That said, anyone would put STATE FAIR into a secondary category from the other R&H classics, such as OKLAHOMAI, CAROU-SEL, SOUTH PACIFIC, KING AND I and THE SOUND OF MUSIC. I would say the score matches anything else they wrote, but the story doesn't explore the social issues and contain the gravitas of the other classics. And yet, there is a down home, true to life honesty about STATE FAIR. The story might depict a simpler time before TV, iPhones and the internet when a State Fair really could be an eye-opening and mind expanding experience, but I liken it to my own childhood. I grew up in Placerville, where the El Dorado County Fair was a highlight of the year and the State Fair could still show you the wave of the future. Today, with internet globalization, the window to the world is at your finger-tips, but our CB kids are still like young Wayne and Margy Frake in a way. Wayne and Margy step out of their small town farm life and their world opens up at the fair. They meet new people, are introduced to new ideas, their childhood ways are challenged and they find they must suddenly make grown up decisions for themselves. Our CB kids are about to experience the same thing as they go off to college, so the State Fair serves as a metaphor for taking that next big step in life and I would bet that the musical STATE FAIR endures for that very reason-we've all been there and each new generation has to face that next big step.


