Managed and played for the Woodman of the World Lodge of Rio Linda. Entered the team in Farm Bureau league and won the championship that year Cy Young

1930 - 1931

Managed the Mapes and Mordecia ball
club in the National Div of the
Sacramento winter league for 2 yrs.

Summer 1931

Managed and played for Mapes &
Mordecia team in the Orange
league, winning 14 games with
no losses. Joe Marty batted .462
with 8 homers 4 triples & 7 doubles.
Tom Plummer and Lefty Rambaud
were the shookers.

1933

Managed and played for the
No. Sacramento American Legion
won the championship of the
Texas Division in the Sacramento
Winter league.

1939

Sponsored and Managed my
own team "Earl's Club" in North
Sacramento's "first" night soft

ball league. Won the championship
in play off games. Manuel Frates
was the star pitcher.

1934 to 1957

Organized and started American
Legion baseball team
for the Haggins Grant Post #521
of Rio Linda. Missed managing
the team for 2 1/2 years while
in the Navy during World War 2.

I was American Legion Jr base-
ball Commissioner for 2 yrs.

I served in the Army in
World War I

Since - again I want to thank you
for your efforts (also the committee)
in getting me into the LaSalle Hall
of Fame. I'm very proud and happy
about it.
