Dear Vince:

Lou Bordisco called me before last Hall of fame Committee meeting and told me I was going to be elected next Feb. 1980. But before they passed me by, I was very disappointing to say the least, to be ignored again. I would like you to tell me Vince why they are passing me by? I was never one to brag or blow my own horn but I know I was a better ball player than many of those players chosen by the Committee the past 3 dinner parties since I reached 65 years of age - I was 67 years old last Dec. 1st 1979.

One day when I talked to you a year or two back, you told me the reason I hadn't been nominated was because the Committee was picking older fellows before they died off. You told me this when I was 65 or 66 yrs old & eligible - However this has not been the case - I am older than Morty, Bordisco, Snidell, Beckenrich and probably others ~~you~~ ^{the Committee} have picked the past two years, by at least a year.

I cannot understand why Enos, Anila, Morebeck, Bordisco and the others most of them old friends of mine have passed me by.

Is it because there is some personal grudge against me? maybe because I may have stepped on some toes when doing my job as a Fish & Game warden? This is supposed to be picking out good ball players who played Bush league as well as profession baseball, not penalizing a man because of his chosen life's work or profession - Verne Hodge was older than me and played ball with my brother Jay Jr. I remember years ago Verne came out and told me face to face I was not as good a ball player as my brother. Even if he felt that way, he should have kept these feelings to himself as I have remembered it all these years. Why he said it I will never know but he may have some grudge against me which I have never known about. I tell Verne I was a better hitter than Jay and being left handed sticker gave me a great advantage to have a better average. I know I was bigger and had more power than my brother. Believe I tell you Vince that

it is a shame that the La Salle Committee doesn't recognize
 The Hughes family's great donation to City of Sacramento history
 in baseball - all three of us represented Sacramento baseball
 history for over 50 years - My Dad Fay Sr. beat the
 Baltimore Orioles (John McGraw, Willy Keeler & Co.) at Snowflake
 Park - 28th & Rst in 1897 - The only loss they had as world
 Champions on their barnstorming tour of the U.S. The Ruthville
 Gil Edges made history that day & put Sacramento on the map
 so to say. My Dad only played 4 years in the Majors but as
 you mentioned in your writings he is still the best pitcher to come
 out of Sacra. area yet and the record still stands (most wins)
 after over 80 years - I believe he should be the first and
 only Sacra Hall of Famer (posthumously) elected but so far no
 soap, tho I have told you this years ago. It has received no
 recognition for his 80 wins in but 4 yrs with Baltimore and
 Brooklyn - Brother Fay took up the reins in the teens and
 1920's - I came along as he was quitting the sport and my
 last year at age 36 I still batted cleanup, 4th spot for
 Cornishel frenen in 1947 my last year in baseball.
But remember my Dad Fay Sr. was playing bush ball & semi
 pro before 1897 - I would say he was playing since 1890 for
 sure - All three of us were born in Sacramento; I am the
 last of the Hughes's and the Committee is even picking a
 out of towner like Lou Vezelich over me. Lou only played to
 gether on the 1936 Salton team and he is a good friend of mine
 also was a good ball player - But I feel that the Committee
 should have picked me over Lou and some of the others - I feel
 the Hughes family should have been represented by picking me
 the last of the Hugh's before it's too late - I feel the Hughes
 family represented the City of Sacramento comparable to
 the DiMaggio family to City of ^{San Francisco} Sacramento. Can you
 imagine leaving any of them off if San Francisco had

a City Hall of fame in baseball history? its unbelievable and certainly impossible. Now I must blow my own horn a bit.

For my own baseball history I believe you know it quite well Vince - you have through the years given me many fine writeups in Behalf the Bushwicks - Recklers in Legion ball - Great ball club at C. B. S. Marty, Kaiser, Sperowitch et all. We beat hell out of most ball clubs, including SoCal. H. and 4 yr. Colleges such Davis aggies - Chico State & others.

I was with Van Tassell (Moshbeck's team at Albert Elkins 9th & where I was leading League (National Div.) in 1934. I was hitting .611 at the time when Al Putnam & Charlie Graham (S. F. Seals) signed me with the S. F. Seals. I had about 10 1st basemen to beat out at Seals Stadium in spring training, but I did, hitting well from the South Paw side. I asked for my release just before being sent to Muskogee, Okla., because I had been contacted by Carl Lamlock (former catcher) who was Cleveland scout. I never told Charlie Graham this of course - told him I wanted to return to my Fish & Game job. He gave me my release but had his friend Jay Cobb talk to me first trying to get me to stay with S. F. Charles never forgave me for this after I signed a much better contract with Cleveland Indians. Billy Evans General manager signed me after Lamlock did the ground work - I was in 7th heavens. I took the S. P. Overland Limited and departed for Cleveland, Ohio.

I was with Cleveland a month. Walter Johnson was manager he had me come to the office and told me I had a great future which made me feel good. Willy Hamm then 3rd baseman was one of my strongest supporters so was 1st baseman Hal Trosky whose job I was after, but he was too good, batted cleanup and hit many home runs - tremendous power. Monte Pearson & Thornton Lee were two others I talked around with, great fellows.

Anyway Johnson then told me I had two farms I could go to - Fargo N.D. or Butler Pa. in Penn. State assoc.

I batted cleanup for Butler after eliminating a bunch more first basemen for the position.

Evans sent me to New Orleans in 1936 Cleveland's main farm club triple A. Club in Southern Assoc ^{any} Larry Gilbert was manager then - I roomed with Jeff Heath, Tommy Heinrich, Eddie Fernandez and Mike McCormick. Jeff and I got to be real friends. Heinrich like Joe DiMaggio was rather a quiet type, more or less a loner in New Orleans - (he was declared a free agent later and of course made history to all reliable with the Yanks - Jeff Heath and I were alternating as cleanup hitter under Larry Gilbert in spring training, my arm (elbow) kept getting worse & worse from day throwing & hitting, and when I returned to Taft. I made 2 dozen trips to Boege Springs, ^{Snowy Co} and had Denny Doyle (former Detroit Tigers trainer) work on my arm - waste of money as he finally told me he could do nothing for me as it was a nerve problem in the joint. Next had X rays taken by Dr. Hain Sicks Orthopedic Dr. he told me I had better quit baseball, said he could operate but it might not be successful and would leave my elbow joint permanently stiff in those days (1936). They did not have the techniques they do now. Director of the Oakland team called me about this time and wanted me to play 1st base, but I turned him down. It was a terrible blow to me to have to quit baseball. Vince Sheely signed me to play 1st base in 1942 I believe or maybe 1943, for the Solons but after going into spring training for awhile decided to stay with me permanent warden position in Dixon. I was also 1A in the draft and expected a call anytime. That about it for now. Hope you tell the members of the Committee if you see them about my disappointment and would appreciate it if you could find out why I haven't been picked, kindly let me know. Anyways have a nice Xmas.

Vince: I will retire Dec. 31st of this year. I have number one badge as senior warden in the whole state. I will have 39 years in. Counting time I worked in the hatcheries in 1929 when I was still going to Christian Brothers. I was only 16 yrs old when I worked summers in the fish hatcheries in the Sierras. Then I finished hi school and Junior College - didn't go back to Fish & Game until April of 1934 - have worked for F.G.S. continuously since that year. Someone sent me the "Saga of Jay Hughes" you wrote in the Union and I wish to thank you for your continues mentioning the Hughes's as baseball players. I have always liked your column behalf the Bushers. If Bill Conlin wishes to mention my retirement after 38+ yrs on the Editor, I will be glad to bring in some pictures etc. and give them a good story on early day patrol especially around the Sacts. one where I was for 25 years. The Los Angeles Times contacted me a week ago and are running a story on the No 1 warden which is me. Believe it will be in Sundays Times Dec. 17, 1972.

My family are all gone of the Hughes's I am only one left. Lost 2 sisters in 1969 within a month of each other.
