Youthful Leaders

Br. Joseph Appointed President Pro Tem

Brother Joseph Desimone, FSC, has been appointed President Pro Tem of Christian Brothers High School by Brother Mark Murphy, FSC, provincial of the San Francisco District of the Brothers of the Christian Schools.

Brother Joseph replaces Brother Richard Camara, FSC, who resigned as President following the Easter Week holidays due to personal needs and work-related stress, as it was explained in Brother Mark's letter to the faculty, staff and regents of Christian Brothers High School.

Brother Joseph assumed the office on April 28, and as part of his new duties presided over commencement proceedings for the 116th graduating class of CBS.

During this school year, Brother Joseph has served as assistant to the president at CBS. He was the Vice Principal, Dean of Students, from 1981 to 1985. In the interim, he completed administrative assignments at Christian Brothers' schools in Napa and Fresno. Last year, he worked in the Development Department of St. Mary's College in Minnesota, where he earned a master's degree in Philanthropy and Development. He also holds a master's degree in Private School Administration from University of San Francisco.

Br. Richard's resignation ended a 14-year stay at CBS, in which he served as Vice Principal, Principal and President. "Brother Richard's leadership over the last decade has profoundly influenced the present and future direction of Christian Brothers," said Brother Mark Murphy. "Most notably, he guided the school through the very successful implementation of co-education in 1990-1991."

Brother Mark Murphy, in coordination with the School Administration and the Board of Regents, has begun the process of finding a permanent replacement for the President's position. Brother Mark hopes to finish the selection process by January, 1993. Brother Joseph, meanwhile, is confidently preparing for a successful beginning to the 1992 school year.

Development Department Restructured

In one of his first decisions, Brother Joseph Desimone restructured the school's Development Department. The restructuring included eliminating two positions, consolidating two others into a new post and reassigning responsibilities among remaining staffers.

The goal was to substantially reduce expenses in the Development Department's budget, thereby increasing the percentage of dollars raised to go directly to the benefit of CB students.

"These changes were taken in direct response to the Board of Regents' request to make the Development Department more cost-effective," said Brother Joseph. "Streamlining the department has resulted in savings of nearly \$150,000 in this year's operational budget, and is a primary reason we are projecting a balanced budget for the first time in several years.

"In addition, we are encouraging our support group volunteers to take a more active role in directing their group's activities. They are the backbone of this institution, and without their incredible support our primary job of educating students would be impossible."

The restructured staff of the Development Department starts the 1992-1993 year this way:

Brother Joseph Desimone—President Pro Tem: Is responsible for overseeing the entire operation of Christian Brothers High School. He works closely with the Board of Regents Executive Committee and Capital Campaign Steering Committee. In addition, he oversees the school Principal, who is responsible for academic, athletic and social activities of the high school. Brother Joseph will take a more active role in the solicitation of major gifts and public relations. As part of the new Development Department re-

structuring, he eliminated his former position of Assistant to the President and the Grant Writer position held by Richard Weldon.

Jean Lahey—Executive Director of CB SPIRIT Auction/Car Drawing and Ambassador Club: Formerly the Special Events Coordinator, Jean will focus exclusively on the Ambassador Club and the SPIRIT Auction and Car Drawing, the school's leading fund-raising event.

Tim Whalen—Director of Support Groups and Media Communications—This is a new position created to consolidate the duties of outgoing Development Director (Tom Davis) and Administrative Assistant (Nancy Wagnon). Tim Whalen will act as the main liaison between the Development Department and the school's four support groups: The

Alumni Association, Boosters Club, Parent Services Organization and La Salle League. In addition, he will spearhead public relations and publicity for the support groups and school administration, and oversee production of *The Connection*.

Shaelyn Hurst—Computer Data Specialist: Responsible for data input for alumni records, memorials, donor records, donor recognition and financial records for Development Dept.

Claire Matthews—Secretary to the President and Development Dept. Secretary: Responsible for secretarial assistance to Brother Joseph and the Development Department. She will coordinate all communications with the Board of Regents.

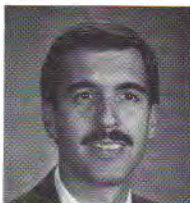


Support Group Leaders Elected

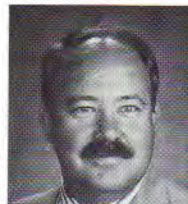


Kevin Valine, Alumni Association.

UCD Med Center Grants Two Fellowships to CB Students

The UC Davis Medical Center this summer awarded Fellowships to two students from Christian Brothers from among 37 college and high school applicants. Fourteen students received the Hugh Edmondson Fellowships, including CB '92 graduates Nga Dinh and Ryan-Michael DeGuzman.

Both students graduated this spring from Brothers with Highest Honors.

According to Guidance Director Pat O'Brien, the selection of two students in one year from the same school is remarkable, especially considering the competition includes college and university students.

Betty Andreos, UC Davis Business Manager who oversaw the selection process, said the CB students not only had high academic achievements but also demonstrated a commitment of service to the community. "We place great value on community outreach activities," she said.

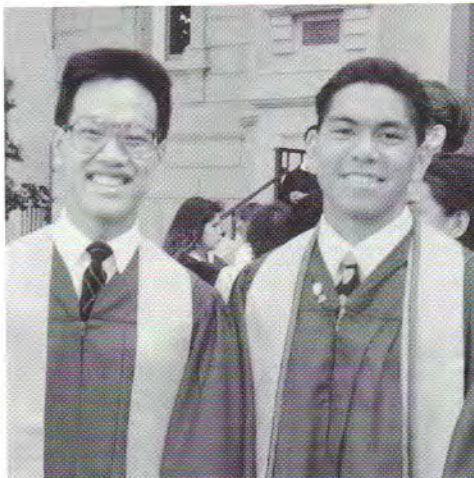
The students are often asked to set up new testing procedures the doctors wouldn't otherwise have the time for, given staff and budgetary constraints at the medical center. "This is a rich experience for the students and our staff members," Andreos said.

The Fellowships provide a \$1,000 a month stipend. The program, begun in 1987, is named for a deceased staff pathologist at UC Davis Medical Center.

CBS Confers 184 Diplomas

Christian Brothers High School celebrated its 116th Commencement ceremony on May 21 in the Sacramento Community Convention Center. One hundred eighty-four seniors gathered for the school's second co-educational graduation festivities.

Brother Joseph Desimone, President Pro Tem, presided over the presentation of awards. Mr. Domenic Puglisi, Principal, and Jeffrey Corrigan, Vice Principal, Dean of Studies, conferred diplomas to the graduates. Mr. Thomas English, Senior Class Moderator, was director of graduation activities.

The Class Valedictorian was **S. Paul Simon**; **Nevin Cheung** was Salutatorian. Both seniors shared in winning the school's prestigious General Excellence Awards—the highest academic award bestowed upon a graduating senior. Both students concluded their four years with a 4.0 grade point average.

Simon was awarded a merit scholarship to the University of San Francisco (USF) where he will major in pre-medicine. He also was given the school's department honors in Religious Studies, the Active 20-30 Club Scholarship and the Bank of America Award for Liberal Arts.

Cheung, who plans to major in computer engineering at University of California at Berkeley, was presented with the Omaha

Woodman Award, Air Force Math/Science Award, U.S. Marine Corps Academic Excellence Award, the CSF Recognition Award and the Bank of America Award for Math/Science.

Tamara Battle, who graduated with highest honors, was awarded the Bank of America Certificate in Religious Studies, Spirit of Youth Sacramento Bee Scholarship, Delta Sigma Theta Scholarship, CSF Recognition Award, Bausch & Lomb Honorary Science Award, Daughters of American Revolution Good Citizen Award and the Spirit of Youth Award from KXTV, Channel 10.

The Bank of America Award in Fine Arts went to **Michael J. Reed**, who earned a Creative Achievement Scholarship to the California College of Arts and Crafts.

Among the 172 graduates who responded to the Guidance Department's annual survey of seniors, 97 percent say they plan to attend college next fall. Ten percent will go to out of state schools such as Boston University, Cornell, Grambling, Hampton, Marquette, New Jersey School of Art, Notre Dame, Reed College and University of Madrid, among others.

Fourteen graduates will go on to University of California campuses at Berkeley, Davis, Los Angeles and Irvine, while 17 will attend private California colleges, including St. Mary's, USF, University of Southern California, Marymount, Stanford and University of the Pacific.

Gridders Clash at Holy Bowl Bash



CB Varsity football coach George Smith (left) is hoping his squad triumphs over Dan Carmazzi's Jesuit team at this year's 22nd Annual Holy Bowl game. Carmazzi's team won last year's game in the first meeting between the two head coaches and former CB gridgers. Smith ('81) played on CB teams that trounced Jesuit in the 1979 and 1980 Holy Bowls. Carmazzi ('71) quarterbacked Brothers to its first Metro League title in 1970, but his team lost to Jesuit in the second Holy Bowl game.

Beginning this fall, the traditional Holy Bowl football game, pitting grid-iron rivals CBS and Jesuit, will anchor a series of activities known each year as "Holy Bowl Week." This year's game is scheduled for Friday, September 18th at Hornet Stadium on the CSU Sacramento campus.

The 22nd Annual Holy Bowl game is being produced in cooperation with Aqua Productions, the promotional arm of the World Bowl Champs' Sacramento Surge football team, which controls a limited number of dates at the 24,000 seat Hornet Stadium.

All-sports radio station KSAC (1240 AM) is set to broadcast the game live, with talk show host Ted Green announcing play by play. Jack Youngblood, Sacramento Surge color analyst, is being touted for the second spot in the booth. KSAC plans to promote the event the week leading up to the contest. On game day they will post their tent in the north end zone area, decorating one half in CBS colors red and blue, the other in scarlet and gold for Jesuit.

A media luncheon is in the works, along with a trophy commemorating the winners of the Holy Bowl game. The goal is to stimulate the rivalry, heighten the game's profile in the community and attract alumni from both schools, says Doug Carson ('65), who originated the concept.

As the chairman of the Regents' Special Events committee, Doug capitalized on his

contacts with the Surge in persuading Aqua Productions to package the Holy Bowl game as one of its annual events, lending a promotional professionalism seen at the Surge events.

With Aqua Productions and KSAC committed, the two high schools formed the Holy Bowl Committee and agreed each year to alternate hosting the game at Hornet Stadium. Christian Brothers and Jesuit each will be allotted 10,000 tickets for sale, with the balance offered to the general public.

The day will begin at 3 p.m. with the frosh contest, followed by the sophomore game at 5:00. The varsity game is scheduled at 8 p.m.

"This game enjoys a natural rivalry with a great tradition and holds tremendous potential for showcasing the athletic success of both schools," said Dan Delgado, CB's new Athletic Director. "Now we just have to pack the stadium." And maul the Marauders.

The Family That Cooks Together...

Each year, members of the Cima, Bianchini and Carson families take time out from their daily jobs, slip on white aprons and report to work inside the kitchen in the school cafeteria. For these ten men (most are alumni; all are of Italian heritage), the Alumni Dinner affords them a unique opportunity to generate a significant donation to the endowed scholarship fund established in the name of their families.

Since 1981, Cima, Bianchini and Carson families have cooked the Christian Brothers Alumni Dinner, an all-day exercise in preparing meat, sauce, pasta and salad for hundreds. According to Doug Carson, "It's a labor of love."

For Vic Cima, Jr. ('61), the family's oldest cousin, the day represents a chance to shed his coat and tie and shift from managing employees to keeping the cooks in line. Cima, who is Managing Partner of PR&M Employee Benefits and Life Insurance Services, assumes the role of "kitchen supervisor."

Meanwhile, Doug Carson ('65) schedules no meetings with the Sacramento Sports Foundation or clients of his firm, D. Carson Marketing to tend to the meat and delicious marinade that will simmer throughout the day.

Cousins Frank "Mike" Cima ('69) and Larry Carson ('68) drop their shovels and rakes to pick up pairing knives and serving spoons to prepare the meat sauce. As owners of their own landscaping businesses (Cima Landscaping and River Oaks Landscaping respectively) they can appreciate a hard day's work. But it's no Sunday picnic, either,

chopping celery, onions, mushrooms and special herbs so that the sauce is country fresh.

Other family members who assist include Frank ('75) and John Carson ('80), Bob Cima, and Rodney, Tom, and Vic Bianchini, Jr. ('67).

But this isn't the only time the families assemble in the kitchen. They often prepare meals for the Elks Club, All Hallows Parish, St. Francis High School and various Italian clubs in town (Vic is President of Piemonte Reale, a 200 member Italian organization, and the East Portal Bocce Ball Club). Sometimes it's the whole group; other times just a few. So, how do the descendants of grandparents Mario and Dina Bianchini come by a culinary background? It's inherited, naturally.

Each of the family uncles, including Vic Cima, Sr., ('39), Frank, Dino and Vic Bianchini, Sr. and Bill Carson have cooked for similar social and familial gatherings. Doug Carson says his generation learned by assisting the uncles, usually at family weddings. The tradition in

the Bianchini family holds that the godfather of the bride or groom is automatically in charge of preparing the dinner. He, in turn, calls upon other family members to pitch in. To date, most of the 23 cousins have gotten married. That's a ton of pasta-and oodles of experience.

But for the Cima, Bianchini and Carson families (CBC for short),

the Alumni Dinner represents a special event.

It began in 1981 when Vic Cima served on the Alumni Association's Board of Directors. One night the Board was discussing how it could increase the dinner's profitability. Vic, a former All-City tackle in football, saw the potential for making a \$2,000 profit by volunteering his brothers and cousins to cook and serve the dinner. (The running joke among the family is that he did so without consulting them first.) He struck an agreement with the school: the families would donate their cooking services if the Alumni Association would donate the profits from the dinner to a scholarship fund established in their names.

Over the past decade the CBC families have helped raised approximately \$20,000. They expect the fund will soon generate enough interest income to provide a CB student with a full scholarship. "We really like the opportunity to give back to the school," says Doug. "We look forward to the day when we'll be able to completely fund a student's annual tuition to Christian Brothers."

When the families first started cooking the dinner, the main entree was always roast beef. Around 1986, Doug switched to chicken marsala.

Another time they served veal scallopini. Tasty Italian dishes.

This year, Doug plans to change the menu to barbeque ribs cooked Italian style with a "light" pasta. The ribs are marinated overnight in herbs and olive oil, then grilled without the tomatoey red sauce. After the pasta is drained, it is simmered in a chicken stock and then combined with pancetta, an Italian cold cut meat. "It's got a delicate, delicious flavor," said Carson, who regularly cooks at home.

After a dozen dinners, and with all those cooks in the kitchen, surely something has gone awry. "We've never burned the pasta," Vic Cima says, flashing a devilish chuckle. Once, however, Doug forgot to turn down the burner on the chicken. "When I got back there were no whole breasts; just bits of meat in the gravy. It was a challenge serving the chicken that night."

How long will the Cima, Bianchini and Carson families continue cooking for Christian Brothers? Well, a new generation of Bianchini descendants have graduated from CBS—Doug's sons Mark ('86), and Matthew ('91). So, figure a long time.

Although the main entree may change from year to year, one thing remains constant: at a Cima, Bianchini, Carson dinner they'll never burn the pasta.

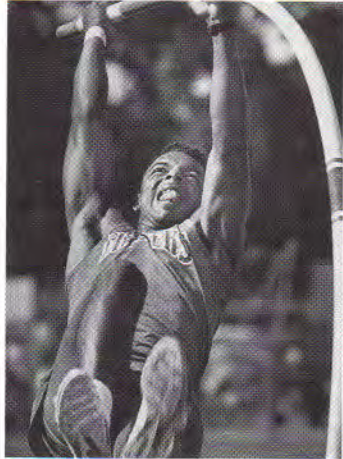


SENIOR VAULTS TO STATE TITLE

Softball: The women's softball team finished 1-22 overall and 0-14 in league play.

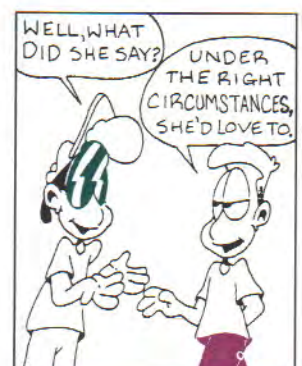
Golf: The team posted a 12-4 overall record and 10-2 in Metro League competition.

He graduated from CBS in 1918 and was one of the few remaining alums who could recall the school's original location at 12th and K Streets. He graduated from University of California, Berkeley in 1922 and returned home to Sacramento.

That same year when he and a group of young men were refused admission into the Rotary Club they chartered the 20-30 Club. Cain edited the club's periodical—*Twenty-Thirtian*—for over a decade.

Ed worked in his father's glass business, practiced accounting and taught public speaking.

In 1940 he was elected to the state Assembly and sponsored

legislation to create Capitol Mall, CSU Sacramento and the American River overpass. He was appointed to several other civic posts throughout the '50s.

Ironically, at retirement age in 1964, he became a stockbroker and remained active with Shearson Lehman Brothers until 1989. He is survived by his wife, Louise Cain.

In an interview last fall, Cain fondly remembered his days at CBS: "I have nothing but the highest praise for the Christian Brothers," he said.
