Ferguson, Madison Florist, Ed Jacobs escort; Mrs. Aldo Lovotti, Wiegman's Sacramento Floral Co., Charles Wiegman III escort; Mrs. William C. Sanborn, Flower Nook, Paul Masterson escort; Mrs. Francis J. Phillips, Mallery's Florist of Woodland, Carl Mallery, escort; Mrs. Jack Garibaldi, Sutter Florist, Erwin Hoesch escort; Mrs. Clifton Higbe, Foote's of Auburn, Wayne Foote escort and Mrs. Pat Vantress, Relles Florist, Jim Relles escort.

Creighton Sanders will be master of ceremonies and Clyde Mitchell's orchestra will provide music. A special treat will be a performance by the Kennedy High School marching band and drill team. The Bishop Mahogue drill team also will perform.

Mercy Guild ball salutes bicentennial

In a theme of "So Proudly We Had," as a salute to America's Bicentennial, Mercy Hospitals' Guild held its Flower Headdress Ball Saturday night in Quality Inn Woodlake with an elaborate pageant as the evening's highlight.

Filmed versions of "That's the Way it Wasn't" by local television personalities kept the crowd in laughter.

In a patriotic mood, set by the music of the Kennedy High School marching band playing during the cocktail hour and a performance by Bishop Mahogue drill team to open and conclude the pageant, Television Sportscaster Creighton Sanders introduced the seven pageant models, who wore flower headpieces designed by members of Sacramento Florist Association. They included:

Mrs. Allen Ferguson, depicting "The First American" in a flowered Indian ceremonial bonnet of carnations, gladioli and orchids, wore a gown of white. Ed Jacobs of Madison Florists created the headdress. The model carried a flowered Indian war club.

A soaring eagle with a 13-star flag was designed in flowers by Charles Wiegman III of Wiegman's Floral Co. for Mrs. Aldo Lovotti, who wore a gown of twilight blue. Bachelor buttons, orchids, carnations, gladioli and protia were used in the headdress and flag which swirled from her shoulder to knees, themed "American Heritage."

Mrs. William Sanborn's headdress was the Liberty Bell, created by Paul Masterson of the Flower Nook. Bronze pompons were used to fashion the bell, with deep carnations as the bell's crack and orange carnations the frame. Mrs. Sanborn's gown was ivory.

"Star Spangled Banner" was the theme of Mrs. Francis J. Phillips' headdress, designed by Carl Mallery of Mallery's Flowers in Woodland. The headdress was a replica of Fort McHenry under bombardment by the British in 1812, which inspired Sir Francis Scott Key to write the poem which later would be put to music and become our national anthem. Her gown was emerald green.

The period in America between 1872 and 1892 was saluted with "Ride a High Wheeler," a replica of an old fashioned

bicycle, worn by Mrs. Jack Garibaldi. Helen Gray of Sutter Florists created a headpiece of carnations, hyacinth flowers, chrysanthemums and orchids. She escorted Mrs. Heieck Garibaldi, who gowned in turquoise.

"Hawaii—Our 50th State" was the theme for the headdress designed by Wayne Foote of Flowers-by-Foot in Auburn for Mrs. Clifton Higbe, who gowned in amethyst. The headdress was an abstract of the Hawaiian trade winds with interlocking spirals and streamers of carnations, cattleya and vanda orchids.

Mrs. Patricia Vantress wore a headdress depicting the landing on the moon by the Apollo 11 astronauts. Jim Foote of Relles Florists designed the headdress of yellow gladioli, iris, carnations, orchids and silver glitter. Mrs. Vantress gowned in gray.

While the pageant models were in competition, headdresses of the guests were judged with awards presented as follows:

Mrs. Del Hayes, Statue of Liberty; Nola Castle, the Minute Man; Mrs. Clifton Higbe, Mr. and Mrs. Kelsey, Elizabeth Higbe and Bob Kotey, United we stand, Divided we fall; Mrs. Anthony Mangano, Liberty; Mrs. Katherine Heiber, Indian Dance; Mrs. Mary Marchand, George Washington cutting down the cherry tree; Mr. and Mrs. Fred Chapek and Mrs. Ted Cook, Spirit of '76; Mrs. Bobby, Statue of Liberty; Mrs. C. J. Key, U.S. postage stamp; Mrs. Earl S. 200th birthday party; Mrs. Fred S. Happy Birthday U.S.A.; and Mrs. McCoy, Statue of Liberty.

The stage from which the models stepped was framed with a huge patriotic banner of stars and stripes with colorful twinkling lights and the 1776 and on each side also were outlined lights. Tables were covered in red, each centered with an especially designed candelabra fashioned from old lamp holders holding glowing candles.

Mrs. Scott Schoenman was in charge of the ball, assisted by Mrs. R. J. Eaton. Mrs. Grove L. Duncan Jr. is the president.

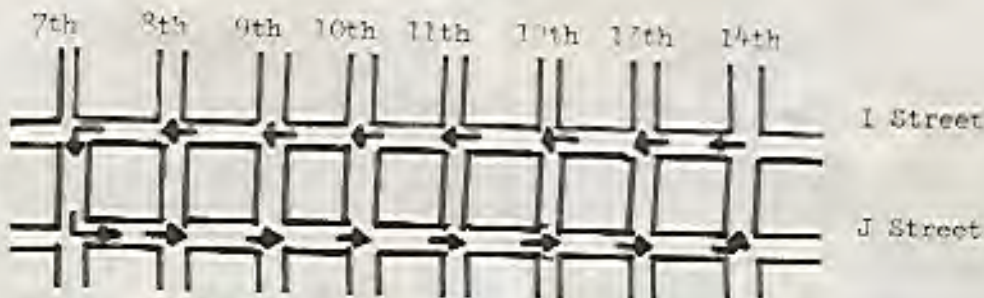

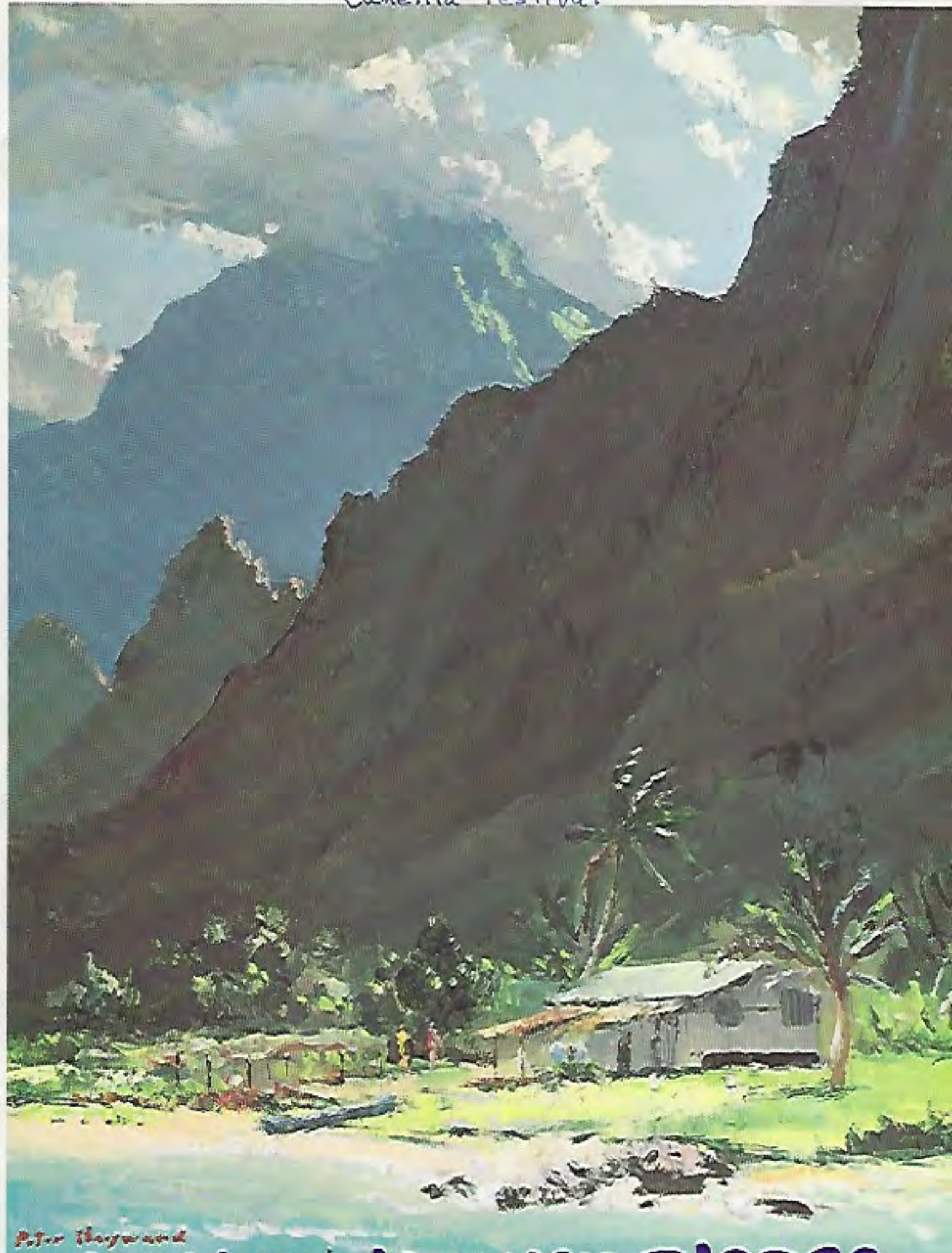
