

Sules Is Workhorse As CBS Claws Eagles

It wasn't necessary to remind anyone it was opening night. It was obvious as workhorse fullback Steve Sules bulled for a pair of touchdowns last night, helping Christian Brothers High School to a 21-6 win over El Camino at Abbott Field.

In a game that featured missed assignments, missed audibles and fumbled snaps from center, 23 penalties were whistled. First-game jitters seemed to get the best of everyone.

CBS managed to crack the ice in the second quarter. Quarterback Pat Sabori hit speedy flanker Dennis Kennedy on a 34-yard passing play to set up Sules' first score from the six. With Bert Cedros' first of three extra-point kicks, the Falcons led 7-0 at the half.

The Eagles sustained their only drive of the evening early in the second half. Backup quarterback Dan Clayson scrambled for 25 yards to the CBS 14. On fourth down Clayson again scrambled and hit Greg Sturgess for a 10 yard score.

Taking advantage of a pair of pass interference calls, the Falcons marched 36 yards in 11 plays to put the game away early in the final period. Sules scored from the one after carrying seven times on the drive for 71 yards.

notched his first touchdown. King Morris kicked the extra point and the Cougars led 7-0.

Midway through the quarter, Fairfield fumbled and Kennedy recovered at the Falcon 30-yard line. Lambert scored again six plays later, and with Morris' conversion kick, the Cougars led 14-0.

Kennedy's final score came with just 1:44 left in the period, on Tim Dutra's one-yard run. Morris added his third conversion to complete the Cougar scoring.

Minutes later, Militano hit Dave McCoy with a four yard pass for touchdown and Renato Raposo kicked the conversion, but the clock ran out.

Third-ranked Mira Loma High School pummeled Christian Brothers into submission Saturday afternoon at El Camino Stadium, and whitewashed the Falcons 14-0, before a sun-drenched crowd of 2,500.

The victorious Matadors, who evened their record at 1-1, were paced by Bob Hauser, who scored both Mira Loma touchdowns. Don Brown's Mats, two-point losers last week to another Metro League powerhouse, Burbank, out-gained the Falcons, 267-147, in the non-league contest. Brothers' record also is 1-1.

Mira Loma got its first TD on a 24-yard run by Hauser, three plays after the Mats recovered a fumble on the CBS 36-yard line. Hauser's second scoring jaunt, a 19-yarder in the third quarter, climaxed an 80-yard drive which began with the second half kickoff.

The Falcons' deepest penetration was a first-and-goal on the ML 10 in the third period. But then consecutive losses moved CBS back, and a fourth-down pass fell incomplete in the end zone. Brothers got to the Mats' 14 in the second quarter, but fumbled the ball away.

Mira Loma Grinds Out 14-0 Victory Over CBS

Mira Loma High School utilized eight running backs for 248 yards rushing while consuming large hunks of time on the clock as the Matadors swept by the Christian Brothers 14-0 yesterday afternoon in a nonleague football game at Abbott Field.

Alternating the running backs throughout the game, Mira Loma was able to control the ball for most of the game. Backs Bob Hauser and Pat Mills combined for 153 yards, while the Matadors ran 59 plays to the Falcon's 40.

Matador lineman Keith Kundert's fumble recovery at the Falcon 26 yard line set up the first touchdown. Following two running plays Hauser swept right end for 25 yards and a 6-0 lead. The run for the conversion failed and the Matadors led 6-0 at the half.

Mira Loma sent in first team quarterback Mario Lara at the beginning of the second quarter and the

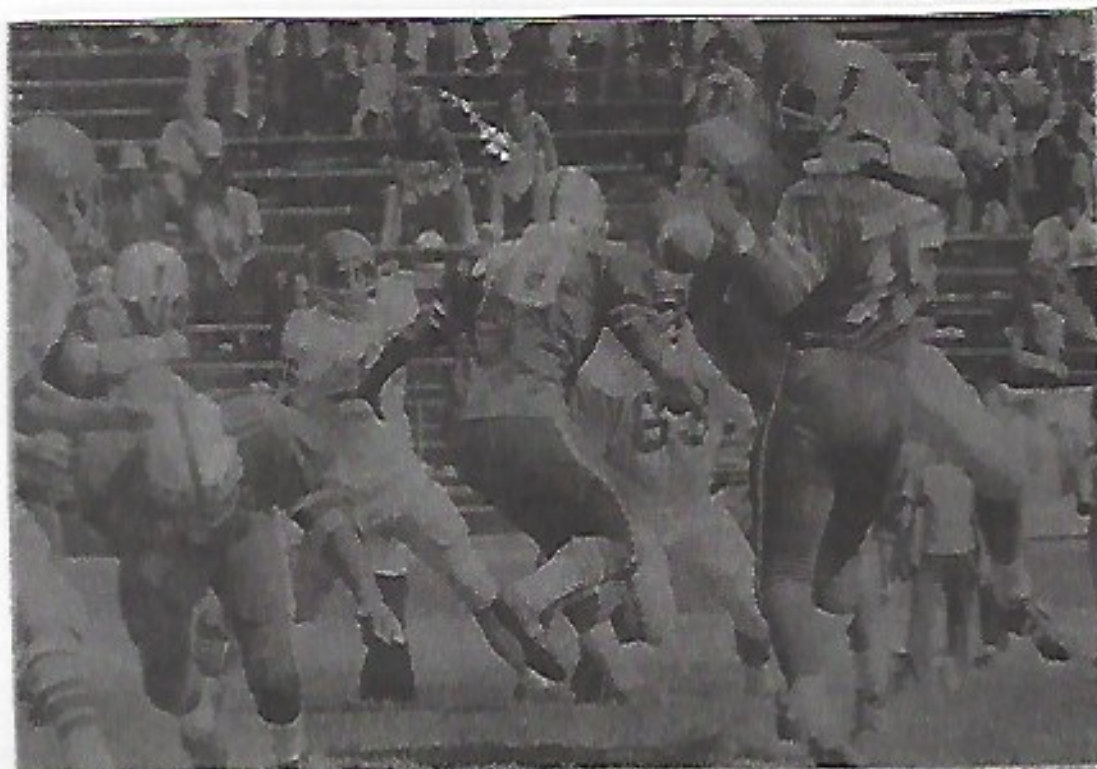

Mira Loma showed off sophomores Dave Samas and Rusty Utterback. Samas rushed for 40 yards on six carries and Utterback sparkled at linebacker.

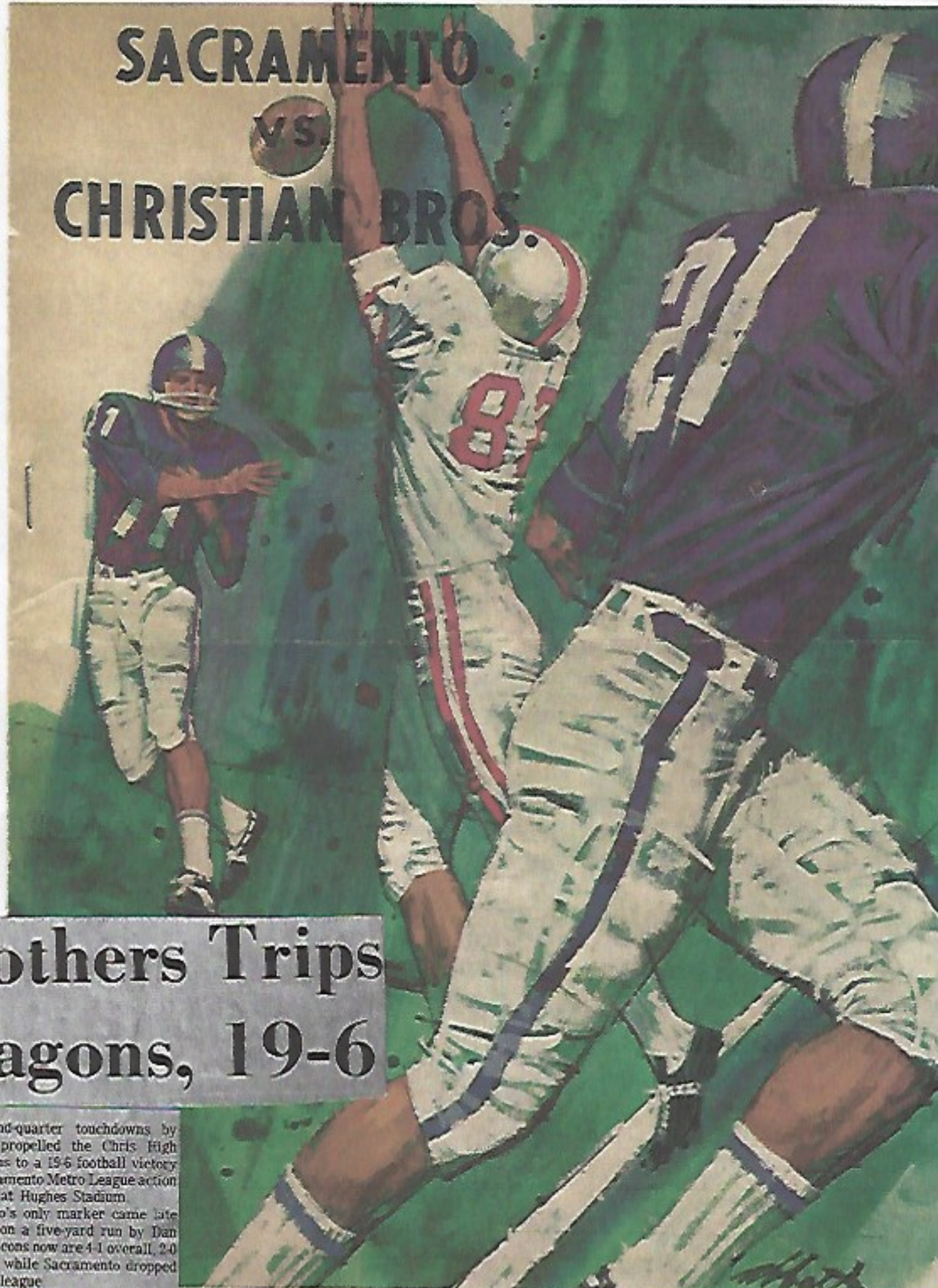

Scots Blank Falcons, 7-0

After 48 minutes of defensive chess, the Highlands High School Scots were able to holler "checkmate" and claim a 7-0 victory over the Christian Brothers Falcons in the opening game of the Capital City Football Playoffs Friday night at American River College Stadium.

The victory, the Scots' fourth shutout of the season, propels Highlands, a school which has never before won a football championship, let alone a playoff game, into next Friday night's finals at UC Davis. The Scots will face either Cordova or Bella Vista, depending on the outcome of tonight's semifinal game at ARC (See Story, Page D2).

As expected, Friday night's battle, witnessed by 5,200 fans, was highlighted by brilliant defense. Six times, the Falcons penetrated the Highlands 20, and six times Brothers failed to score. Once a fumble ended the Falcons' scoring threat, another time it was an intercepted pass. But for the most part, it simply was the incredible defense of the Scots that kept the Falcons' surprise offense from effecting an upset.

Up to Friday night, Brothers quarterback Pat Saberi had thrown the ball only 23 times all season, and completed only five of those with three interceptions. But against the Scots, Brothers coach Dick Sporbeck decided on the unexpected and went to the air 12 times. Saberi completed five of the 12 for 113 yards. Three of those went to Kevin Gallery for 91 yards.

Highlands, which stretched its season record to 9-1 while dropping Brothers to 7-4, also used the airways and although the Scots wound up with fewer passing yards, they scored the game's only touchdown on a screen pass.

The throw went from quarterback Tom Cooper to junior back Joe Figures, who

had more protection than he needed from his teammates and scooted into the end zone untouched with 6:03 left in the second quarter. Gene Green's point kick completed the scoring.

On the next series, Brothers threw the Scots' 11 before Saberi fumbled. Kevin Messenger fell on it for Highlands. The Falcons lost more than a foot on that drive, however. On the next play, junior running back Rich Sims hit hard by Darnell Chapman and had to be taken to Mercy Hospital for examination of an injured left leg. Sims was released by the hospital, but his absence from the line cost the Falcons their No. 2 rusher.

Twice in the third period, Brothers came close to the goal line. The first Saberi pass fell incomplete on the ground, the second time a run by Sales left the Falcons three yards short.

Two more times in the final period, Brothers knocked on the door. Figures got to the Highlands 10-yard line, only to have Chapman intercept a Saberi pass two yards deep in the end zone and run it back to the Scots' 10. With less than two minutes to play, the Scots had a fourth down on the Highlands 10 and a Saberi pass for Dennis Kent to the right corner of the end zone was intercepted by Mitchell Stewart.

Except for the one scoring drive, Highlands never threatened to score. The Scots failed to push the ball across the field in the second half, and got only 10 yards in the second half. Brothers 48 in the first half.

Brothers finished with 212 yards of offense to the Scots' 175. In all 10 playoff games, the Falcons had passed for 1,000 yards, but their 113 aerial yards were better than Highlands.



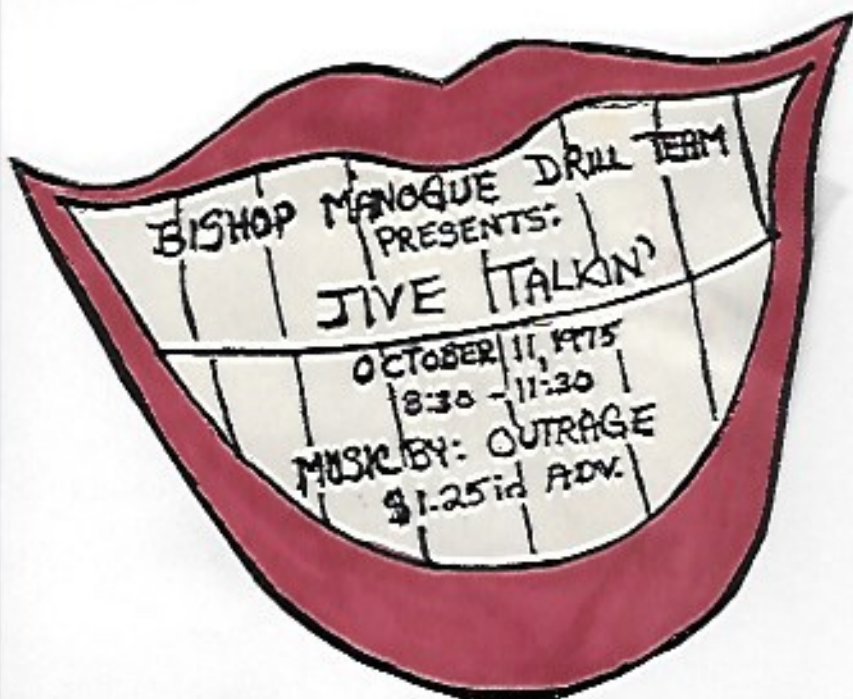
