## Fiscal Scandals Taint Republican Party

On September 28th, U.S. House Majority Leader Tom DeLay (R), along with two associates, John Colyandro (R) and Jim Ellis (R), received an indictment on the charge of conspiracy to break Texas laws regarding political campaign funding in 2002. The law forbids any corporations from giving donations to a Texas state candidate's campaign.

According to the prosecution, led by Travis County District Attorney Ronnie Earle (D), several companies, including Sears Roebuck, gave \$155,000 to Texans for a Republican Majority, a Political Essentially, this transfer of funds appears to be an act of money laundering, in which the PAC indirectly donated companies' contributions to Texas candidates within just 60 days of general elections. If found guilty of conspiring to take part in such a scheme, Representative DeLay will lose his position, be fined \$10,000 and could face up to two years in prison. As of now, he has temporarily stepped down as majority leader.

In Washington, another fiscal scandal has arisen involving Senate Majority Leader Bill Frist (R). With charges similar to those against Martha Stewart, Senator Frist has been accused by federal prosecutors, as well as the Securities and
