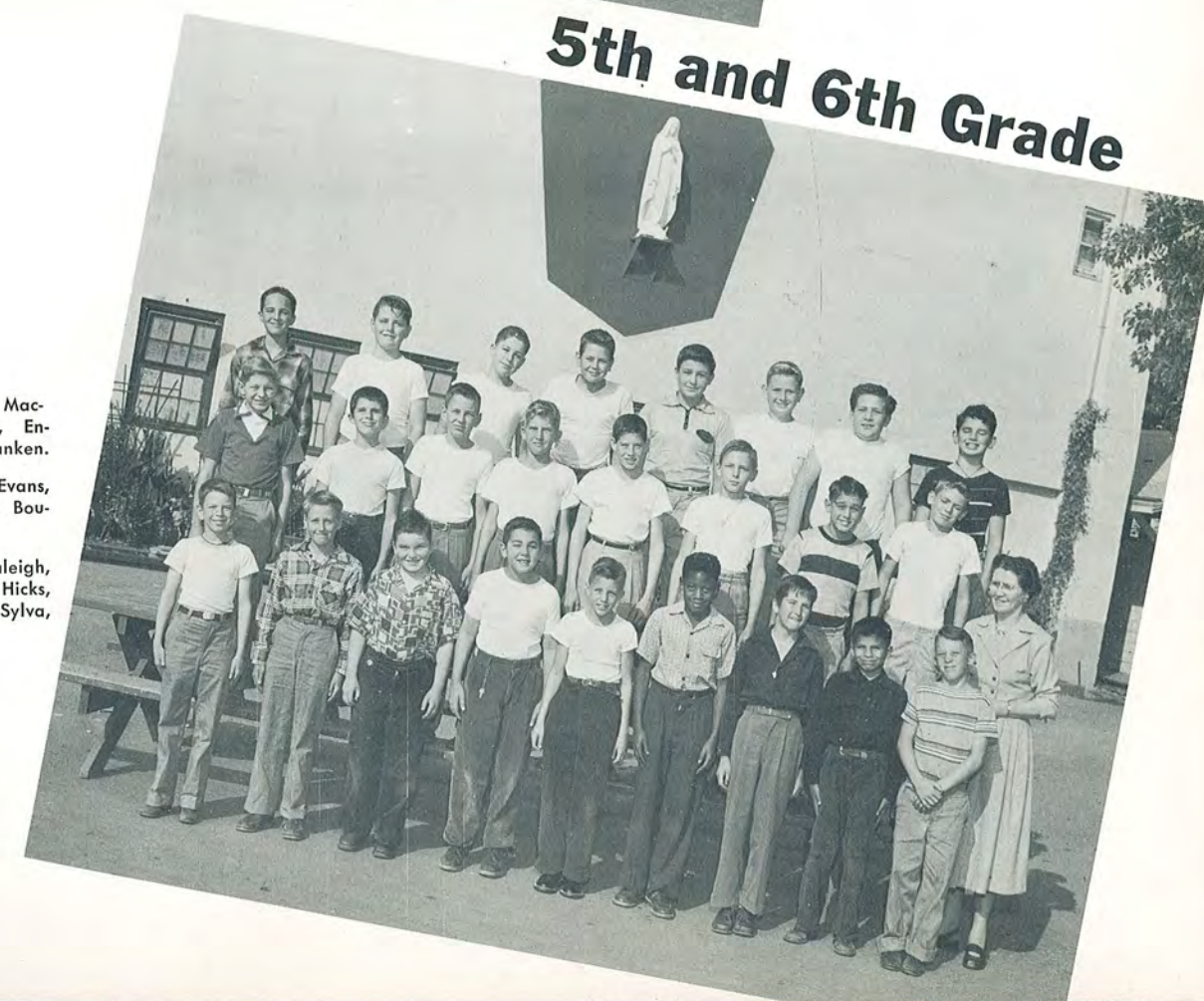
At their private graduation in the Christian Brothers auditorium Bill Boudier was chosen to be the Valedictorian speaker and Father Poole, the guest speaker.

VOLLEYBALL

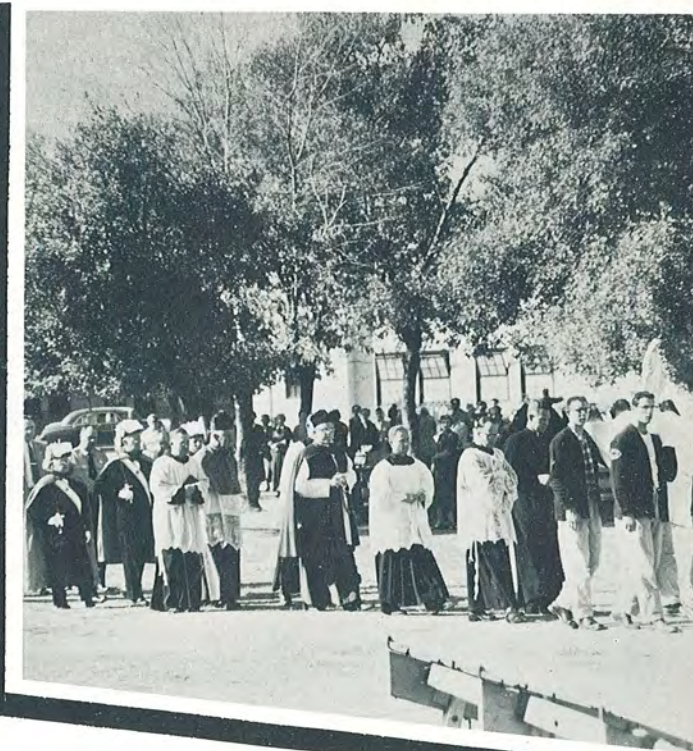
