# GUIDANCE DEPARTMENT NEWS

Ms. Doris Keller, retired from the California Student Aid Commission will be speaking. She is very knowledgeable and will go over the FAFSA, Cal Grant information, etc. See you there! Since this evening is primarily for parents, it is not necessary for students to attend.

About College Entrance Exams

Most colleges and universities require a college entrance test score as part of the application process. The two national tests are the ACT (American College Test) and the SAT (formerly known as the Scholastic Assessment Test, but now officially just the SAT Reasoning Test). While here in the West the SAT is more widely known (and three times as many students take the SAT as the ACT), ALL four-year colleges and universities will accept either score. Both tests are offered at local area high schools 6-7 times throughout the year. Christian Brothers is a test center for both the ACT and the SAT - we administer both exams on dates in October, April, and May.

Research indicates that students often perform differently on the ACT and SAT. The tests, while considered equally for admission, are different in the material covered. The ACT test content has four areas: English, Math, Reading, and Science Reasoning. The goal of the ACT is to measure academic achievement in the four areas and contains analytical and problem-solving exercises related to what has been learned in class. In addition, the ACT recently began offering an optional Writing section (which must be taken if applying to the University of California). The SAT determines critical reading, math, and writing skills, and is designed to measure academic aptitude in analytical skills, numeric reasoning, and writing. Current Juniors should use the next few months to prepare for the SAT and plan on taking it for the first time in March.

Though the trend seems to be to begin taking these tests earlier and earlier in a student's high school career, we do not see any significant benefit to this action. Taking the tests too early is not advised, especially if the student has not covered the course work necessary to gain the skills needed for a successful testing experience. Since Christian Brothers has all freshmen take the PLAN test (the practice ACT exam) and all sophomores and juniors take the PSAT (the preliminary SAT exam), we have avenues for students to explore the testing experience. There is never a penalty for taking a test early, however, or for taking a test more than once. Colleges will see every score (unless a student chooses SAT score choice, which we do not recommend), but always take the highest score. The UC system takes the best score from one sitting; many private colleges and the CSU system. will take a student's highest score from each section from different sittings and combine them into the highest possible score

Since colleges will accept either the SAT or ACT and take the highest score, we recommend that students take both tests at least once. A student who has had three years of science may do better on the ACT; a student who is strong in English and writing may do better on the SAT. It will help to compare results from the PLAN and the PSAT and see which score is stronger to help predict your score on either test. By taking both exams, students increase their chances of achieving a successful score.

SAT Subject tests are subject area tests that UC and a few selective private colleges require. Currently, the UC system requires two subject area tests that are the student's choice. (in addition to the SAT or ACT) - although this will no longer be the case beginning with the class of 2012. Students who plan to apply to highly selective colleges should check to see how many Subject Exams are regulred. It is important to register and take these exams by fall of the senior year. We recommend juniors take the tests in the spring of their junior year. They will then have time to take the tests again in fall of their senior year if they wish to improve their scores. Seniors should not take the tests into 2010, as these test dates are too late to be submitted with other application material. Students should register for the SAT test online at www.collegeboard.comandtheACTatwww.actstudent.org (or paper registration packets are available in Edward Hall).

Admission test scores are only one piece of information a college looks at when considering applications. A student's GPA, number and rigor of college prep courses completed, and other factors are also considered. These factors include co-curricular activities, the college essay, community service, and other aspects of the individual that make him/her distinctive. It should also be noted that a growing number of schools are accepting applications with no testing requirement; instead they are requiring writing samples or other data (go to www.fairtest.org to learn more). ## FINALS ARE COMING!!!!!

Upon correction of the final exam, the final grade will be entered into the student's transcript.

As I write this letter, the sun is shining on a quiet CB campus, Christmas is still three days away and last night, in an epic show of fortitude, the Kings pulled off the biggest comeback in Sacramento franchise history, shocking the Bulls with a 102-98 victory after being down by 35 points in the third quarter.

At times, I'll admit that 2009 felt a bit like the first half of that Kings game – albeit on a much more significant scale than a basketball "game." The mortgage crisis, corporate downsizing, furlough days, rising unemployment and a tumultuous stock market impacted many of our CBHS families.

For all our students and families, we are committed to controlling tuition increases without sacrificing educational excellence. The increase of 1.9 percent for the 2009-10

While none of this will be easy, like the Kings last night, we will harness the energy and enthusiasm of this wonderful community and continue fighting with renewed zeal to provide our students with the needed education, facilities and support as they prepare for success in college and beyond.

I hope that your Christmas was blessed and that 2010 is filled with good health, happiness, friends and family.

# GUIDANCE DEPARTMENT NEWS

# Parents, if your child has D's or F's on his/her report card, READ THIS!

As pages 9 and 10 of the CB Parent/Student Handbook emphasize. "F's" and "D's" are bad news on report cards! It is important for you and your student to understand that neither "D's" nor "F's" are acceptable. "F" grades must be repeated for credit in order to graduate from Christian Brothers High School. "D" grades, though worth 5 credits towards graduation, are NOT accepted by four-year colleges and universities. All California State University campuses, University of California campuses, and most private institutions require a "C" or above in ALL core courses (core courses are approved History, English, Math, Lab Science, Foreign Language, Visual and Performing Art, and Elective courses - also known as the "a-g" list of approved courses - see below for a chart of these requirements). If students have "D's" on the transcript in any a-g courses and do not remediate them they are not eligible to apply for admission to CSU and UC, and therefore are seriously limiting their choices for college.

If your child would like to keep his/her options open and remain eligible to apply to a four-year college, the Guidance Department highly recommends that he/she remediate (repeat for credit) any "D" grades earned in a-g approved courses. Students may enroll in a variety of classes during the 2010 CBHS summer school session in order to remediate a grade. While previous grades are never removed from a student's transcript, if a student completes the course in summer school with a "C" or above, his/her transcript will reflect the new credits and the new grade will be used when calculating the grade point average.

For example, if your child is currently enrolled in Biology and received a "D" the first semester, he/she should consider repeating Biology this summer. If he/she is currently enrolled in a Math course or foreign language course and received a low grade the first semester, it is important to receive a "C" or above at the end of the spring semester. CSU and UC will 'validate' (count as successful) the whole year of a Math course or a foreign language course if the student shows marked improvement the second semester (i.e., goes from a "D" to a "C," "B", or "A"). Therefore, students have a choice - work very hard this semester and bring the grade up, or repeat it in summer school to raise the grade. Since a full four years of English is a basic requirement for eligibility, any "D's" in English should be remediated. One year of World History is the minimum requirement for eligibility, so students should be sure to have a "C" or above for at least two of the four semesters of Frosh/Soph World History, Any US History "D's" should also be remediated.

Please contact your child's counselor if you have questions about remediating grades. If you intend to register for summer school, pre-reg forms will be available in the Main Office in early spring. Check the CB website in February for further information regarding summer school.

2 years (1 year World History & 1 year US History or 1 semester US History/1 semester government)

#### b English Requirement.

4 years including frequent writing

#### c Mathematics Requirement

3 years including Algebra II: 4 years recommended

#### d Laboratory Science Requirement

2 years; 3 years recommended (one must be a life science and one a physical science)

#### e Foreign Language Requirement.

2 years (of the same language); 3 years recommended

#### f Visual & Performing Arts Requirement

I year

#### g College Preparatory Electives Requirement:

I year; more recommended

If you wish to view the approved a-g course list for Christian Brothers, go to the CB website, click on Guidance/College Center under "Popular Links" and click on the CBHS UC a-g List folder.

Grade level counselors will be returning the PLAN test (9th grade) and PSAT test (10th and 11th grades) to students during class visits in January. Counselors will go over results with students by explaining and analyzing their scores and will also assist students with pre-registration for classes for 2010-2011. Please ask your child to see his/her exam results and also look for a mailing regarding pre-reg in early February.

# Seven Myths About College Admission - Advice for Students

Myth 81: "Colleges receive so many personal essays that they probably only glance at them." Facts: Private college admission officers read personal essays with great care. Writing about yourself in a way that makes you unique and distinctive is the one significant thing you can do to overcome lackluster test scores and a less than stellar GPA. Don't wait until just before the deadline and dash off anything to get it in the mail. Even at the University of California, a well-written personal statement can tip the scales in your favor; the personal essay does make a difference.

Myth #2: "Colleges do not look at the senior year grades." Fact: All private college admission committees analyze not only senior year grades in the first semester, but also the degree of difficulty of the senior year course of study. The UC and Cal State systems look very closely at the courses taken in the senior year. As for second semester grades, if there is a significant change in academic performance from January to June, the college that originally accepted you may require summer school work, put you on probation for the first semester of college, or rescind your acceptance on grounds that you are not the same student that they accepted.

Might #3: "It's important to have as many varied extraourricular activities as possible to impress college admission people." Feats Colleges are looking for quality of involvement rather than quantity. They want a well-rounded student body made up of students who are vitally interested in particular activities and haven't spread themselves so thin that they've demonstrated no commitment to anything. Go for depth, not breadth. Colleges prefer for example, the student who was a solely dedicated yearbook editor rather than the student who dashed in and out of ten activities. They call this "productive follow-through." Myth #4: "It is better to go to a big university that is well known than to a small college that few people have ever heard of." Paots All generalizations about large versus small schools are dangerous. A prestigious university like Stanford would be ideal for some students, but some would fare far better in a small, less widely known college such as Notre Dame de Namur in Belmont, CA. It is important to define the things you want in a college – to understand yourself and not to be influenced by others' opinions.

Myth #5: "Ny League colleges are the only ones worth applying to." Facts This is another cliché. The hy League colleges (Brown, Columbia, Cormell, Dartmouth, Harvard, Unix. of Pennsylvania, Princeton, and Yale) are among the most selective in the nation, but they may not offer what you want; besides, did you know that the hy League is simply an athletic league, like the Big 10 or Pac-107 Certainly the hy League is known for its academic quality, but it does not have a monopoly on academic excellence! It is worthwhile to explore other areas of the country and to remember that many prominent men and women have graduated from non-hy League schools, Suggested reading: Looking Beyond the hy League by Loren Pope and hy League Programs of State School Prices by Robert Sullivan.

Myth #6: "The financial aid altuation is completely hopeless this year."
Fact: Financial aid continues to be more readily available than you might think in the forms of grants, loans, opportunities for on-campus work, and merit-based scholarships. # Sadie's Dance






# CB Board f Trustees Approves a 0% Tuition "Increase" for 2010-11

Thank you for the sacrifices you make to send your daughters and sons to Christian Brothers High School. Tuition and fees are a significant investment, particularly in light of current economic conditions, and we appreciate your placing a priority on education in a faith-filled environment. We are grateful that you entrust us with the sacred responsibility of

his is what the season of Lent is about, about being born again, about follow ing the path of death and resurrection, about participating in Jesus' final Journey. To become somewhat more concrete, some of us may need to die to specific things in our lives-perhaps to a behavior that has become destructive or dysfunctional, perhaps to a relationship that has ended or gone bad, perhaps to an unresolved grief or to a stage in our life that it is time to leave, perhaps to our self-preoccupation, or even to a deadness in our lives. It is possible to leave the land of the dead. The journey of Lent is about being born again—about dying and rising, about mortality and transformation.

On Ash Wednesday, we Christians are reminded of our own mortality in a very vivid way, as the ashes are marked on our foreheads in the sign of the cross. In the sign of the cross we hear the words spoken over us, "Dust thou art and to dust thou wilt return." This is a reminder not just of our physical mortality, but of the very path of Lent itself. We begin this season of Lent not only reminded of our death but marked for death, and that path of death is about our transformation.

The journey of Lent is about being born again by participating in the death and resurrection of Jesus, about that journey from Galilee to Jerusalem. The journey of Lent, with its climax in Good Friday and Easter, is about embarking on the way of Jesus on that path of mortality and transformation that is at the very center of the Christian life. When you think of it, who of us does not yearn for this? Who of us does not yearn for a fuller connection to life? Who does not yearn for an identity that releases us from anxiety and self-preoccupation? To be born again corresponds to our deepest yearning. May we this Lent experience that internal transformation that is at the center of the Christian life.



# GUIDANCE DEPARTMENT NEWS

### COLLEGE NEWS

Graduating Seniors have been receiving letters of acceptance to colleges and universities across the country. Congratulations to the class of 2010! As many seniors already know, this has been a very competitive year for college admission. Since the class of 2010 is one of the largest graduating classes in American history (over 3 million), the number of students applying to colleges has seen exponential growth.

In addition, a new trend has developed that has more seniors across the country applying to more colleges than ever in order to "hedge their bets." This has resulted in record numbers of applicant pools - for example, the University of California received a record number of applications for admission to the fall 2010 term. Overall application volume for fall 2010 admission increased by 5.8 percent over fall 2009 (from 126,701 to a record high of 134,029). which includes a 2.4 percent increase (from 98,002 to 100,320) at the freshman level, and a 17.5 percent increase (from 28,699 to 33,709) at the transfer level. Since most campuses have from 45,000-65,000 applicants to fill freshmen classes of approximately 4500, one can see how difficult decisions have been for admission offices in 2010. In fact, for the first time, UC has instituted a 'waitlist' for stellar students who were not admitted. Since it is so new. it is difficult to know to what extent the wait-lists will be used. As a result, there have been disappointments - not only among our own students, but for tens of thousands of other California seniors.

Thankfully most of our seniors planned well and applied to not only 'reach' schools, but 'target' schools and 'safety' schools. As a result, CB students have options for next year and are able to begin their college careers at great schools. If any seniors are still grappling with final decisions, remember that Mrs. Hesser or Ms. Kambas are available to assist and support you.

The good news is that many of our students have been admitted to several prestigious universities and programs, including Stanford University, Duke University, Georgetown University, Notre Dame University, Williams, Wesleyan, USC, LMU, Santa Clara, Saint Mary's, etc., and many more too numerous to list. All the colleges students have been admitted to and those they will attend will be listed in the Commencement Program next month. Parents, be sure to have your senior go to the CB Family Connection online (see the letter mailed home to senior parents for details) as soon as possible, but NO LATER than APRIL 12 for scholarships and awards and MAY 3 for college admittance. Students need to list ALL colleges to which they have been admitted and ALL scholarships, awards, etc. We must have this information in order to accurately recognize your child at the Senior Family Liturgy on May 2 and at graduation on May 28.

Our two informative college information evenings were very well attended by Juniors and their parents in January and March. Seniors, please mark your calendars for Wednesday, April 28 at 7 PM in the C8 Cafeteria. We will hold one last meeting for the class of 2010. The topic will be transitioning to college. There will be general information about the practical issues related to going off to college, as well as breakput sessions. One breakout session will be for parents with a panel of CB parents of college students discussing "Letting Go" of your college-bound child; the other will be for students and consist of a student panel of CB alumni currently attending college who will share "What I wish I had known" before heading off to college.

#### SUMMER PROGRAMS -- DO SOMETHING EXTRAORDINARY THIS SUMMER!

Summer will be here before we know it! Summer is a wonderful time for students to expand their horizons, enrich their lives with fascinating experiences, and improve their readiness for college through academic pursuits. There are many summer opportunities for high school students: classes, camps, travel study, volunteer service, and employment. Opportunities exist locally as well as across the country and abroad. Check out the CB Family Connection site for details and contact information.

We hope you will continue to use two valuable tools for help with college planning: the CB website (www.cbhs-sacramento.org, click on Guidance/College Center under Popular Links in the middle of the page) ... a wealth of great information; and the CB Family Connection (https://connection.naviance.com/cbhs).

Sophomores and Juniors: This spring is a good time to take the SAT and ACT exams! Sophomores, if you are completing a course you feel you have done well in (for example, AP World History, Chemistry, etc.) and want to take an SAT Subject exam, be sure to register to take the June 5 SAT Subject Exams (the registration deadline is May 1; go to www.collegeboard.com to register). Juniors, if you did not register to take the May 1 SAT Reasoning exam by the March 31 de may still register late until April 15 (there is a late registration fee). Be sure to register for either the SAT Reasoning or SAT Subject June 5 date by May 5. The next ACT exam is June 12 - the registration deadline is May 7. Go to www.act.org to register

#### Why I love the arts at Christian Brothers...

One of our own in the community, St. Joseph Elementary School ended up with a noof that blew off part of the school. Sadly, one of the rooms that lost all of its equipment was the music room. In true CB fashion, the students in our choral department decided that the \$1,000 SKIP'S music gift certificate CB City Rhythm had just won in the KNCI radio competition "Choral Idol" would make a much stronger impact in the hands of the music teacher at St. Joseph School. So it was presented to the school and was humbly and graciously accepted.

Well, in late February this year, St. Joseph School participated in the Diocesan Choral festival, and accompanying their wonderful choir, was a ten piece instrumental ensemble. All of the instruments that they were playing were purchased with the gift certificate from Christian Brothers. Seeing the gift we had given come full circle was a magical moment that brought me to tears.

Just two weeks later, I received a call from Jeff von Kaenel, founder of the Sacramento News and Review. Since Honors Chorale was performing in the SNRR sponsored JAMMIES concert at Mondayl Center, he was hoping that I might know of a school that would benefit from some complimentary tickets to the performance. I suggested St. Joseph School, as it is just a few blocks from the new News and Review office complex. He was thrilled and took 100 tickets to the school.

This all took place while our Ceramics students, under the leadership of our amazing Ceramics instructor flob Boriskin, doubled the number of bowls made in 2009 for the Sacramento Empty Bowls Project to make up for the loss of bowls that had been provided by the Loretto High School art program last year. CB students made nearly 450 bowls for this event with each bowl selling for \$25. All proceeds benefit Sacramento's River City Community Services. This means that the bowls made by our students raised over \$11,000 for the organization.

I can certainly talk about the accomplishments of our programs. KBFT came back from the Student Network Television National Competition recognized as one of the finest in the nation once again. CB City Rhythm was considered a "Command Performance" ensemble at the Santa Carda Jazz Festival, receiving straight 1's for their set. 
