

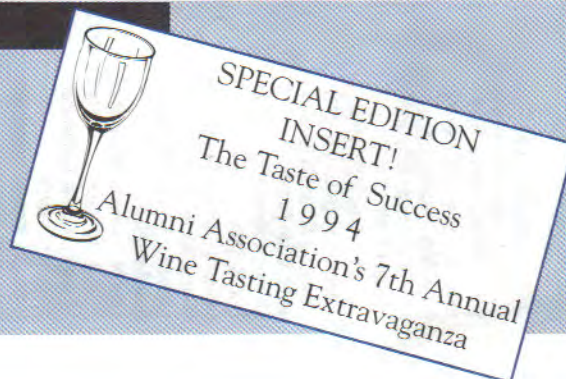

He has also served as an administrator, dean, associate professor of English, and residence hall director at St. Mary's College (a Christian Brothers college) in Winona, Minnesota. Previously, he was an assistant professor of English at Salve Regina University in Newport, Rhode Island.

In the short time Brother Stephen has been CB's principal, the faculty, staff and students have developed an appreciation for his non-threatening though industrious management style. His sense of humor is well documented by both faculty and students alike. Perhaps, it is his interest in the genre of satire, particularly the history of satiric literature, that fuels his classic wit. Brother Stephen considers himself a teacher first and that is apparent in his relationships with students and faculty at Christian Brothers.

Resisting the temptation to acknowledge his basic "in-office" transportation, I asked the usual series of "interview" questions one asks of a new principal. He politely responds but makes me aware most importantly that a large part of his responsibility at Christian Brothers is to get people (faculty, staff, and students) to be "reasonable." As Gomez Delgado gazes out of the window of his tenth floor office in downtown Sacramento, he overlooks the exact spot where he spent the early years of his youth. The streets where state workers and bankers now hurry blindly past each other are the exact same streets where he and his brothers used to shine shoes and sell shoelaces. His selling career began early, at the ripe old age of four.

Things were tough for Gomez and his family; he had eleven brothers and sisters, and his mother died when he was five. By the time he was six, his father was no longer able to care for the children. The youngest siblings were sent to foster homes, the oldest siblings set out on their own, and Gomez and two of his brothers were sent to St.

END OF AN ERA

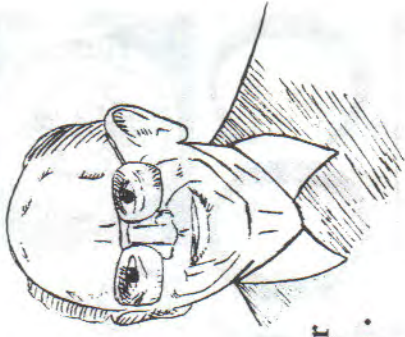
The Christian Brothers community lost one of its most valuable assets with the passing of Monsignor Richard Dwyer Monday, October 31, 1994. The following story, originally published in the November, 1989 issue of the Connection, will serve as our tribute to a wonderful "Brothers Boy."

From the simple beginnings when he went next door to attend Christian Brothers High School to his active involvement with the Sacramento Diocese, Monsignor Richard Dwyer has made a significant impact in the 57 years since he graduated from CBS.

When Dwyer first enrolled at CBS, it was located next door to his house in an abandoned East Sacramento building at 39th and J, where it operated for the year during which they had to leave the 12th and K site and wait for the school at 21st and Broadway to be completed. When he and his brothers attended CBS, it was another step in the Dwyer family's rich involvement with the school that began over 100 years ago.

It is a relationship that has continued through the century with some members of grandfather Thomas Dwyer's family, with each generation attending CBS. The fourth successive generation is represented now by Peter Dwyer III, a sophomore at the current site on Martin Luther King,

Who is this man?

What's the big deal about Brother Bert? Let's check him out. Brother Bert came to Sacramento in 1935. He started teaching at CBS - the "real" CBS at 21st and Broadway! During the next nearly 60 years, Brother Bert served three tours, or 20 of those years, assigned to Sacramento. The new kid on the block in 1935, he served as principal from '48-52. The intervening years saw Brother Bert come and go. He served at the Junior Novitiate at Napa, back to CB, on to St. Mary's College, back to CB, on to Cathedral High in Los Angeles as principal, back to Napa to serve in the District Administration. Then Brother Bertram served as vocation director, director of education, and provincial. O.K. so the kid from San Francisco made it to the top. Then . . . vice principal at Justin Siena and back to Sacramento to serve as director of devel-

Dwyer's grandfather bought the property for Bishop Manogue on which today stands the Cathedral of the Blessed Sacrament. His father, William (who graduated from St. Mary's College at the age of 16, making him the school's youngest graduate at that time), was a co-chairman of the campaign to raise funds for building the school at 21st and Broadway. His family's interest in the work the Christian Brothers are doing in Sacramento continues among the surviving generations. In addition, Dwyer recently served on the Board of Regents. ◆

In 1978 Monsignor Dwyer '32 and his two brothers, William P. Jr. '29 (deceased) and Peter '34, established the WILLIAM P. DWYER, SR. ENDOWED SCHOLARSHIP FUND as a tribute to their father.

"We are all extremely proud of our relationship with the Brothers and we're grateful for all they have given to us" Dwyer said.

After graduating in 1932 Dwyer attended St. Joseph's Seminary in Mountain View for two years, and then spent six years at St. Patrick's, the major seminary in Menlo Park,

before being ordained in May of 1940. In the ensuing 50 years, he has slowed down little. He has been very active in the Sacramento area, even in "retirement."

Dwyer was an Assistant Pastor for eight years before becoming the editor of the Catholic Herald, a position he held for 10 years. He then became Chaplain of the Newman Club for both Sacramento City and Sacramento State colleges, and was the chaplain when the Newman Center was built on land donated by Dwyer near Sacramento State.

He then spent 23 years in the St. John Vianney parish in Rancho Cordova, again building from scratch. Under his direction, the parish erected a church, a school, and a rectory before he retired in 1980. But since "the Bishop doesn't know the meaning of retirement," Dwyer continued to stay very active in the Sacramento Diocese.

He has been the Director of the Permanent Diaconate Program, which trains married men to serve as deacons in the church. It was the first time in about 1200 years that married

men were allowed to serve as clergy in the church. Under Dwyer, 76 men were ordained. He has also served as the Director of the Office of Ecumenism and Interreligious Affairs, which works with the different denominations to achieve more unity among religions.

Officially, Dwyer's only connection with CBS has been as a Regent, but his involvement goes much deeper than that. He has seen great change in the Sacramento area in the 57 years since his graduation, but the school remains basically the same.

"They've always done a great job of education," Dwyer said of the Brothers. "The strength of Christian Brothers is the Christian Brothers themselves. They are a strong force for good, and the religious and spiritual values that they're able to communicate to the students, to the faculty, and to the educational community is tremendous."

"The loyalty to principles and spirit of Christian Brothers is a factor that will be a strong force in students' lives after leaving Christian Brothers." ◆

So who better than Brother Bert to serve as archivist for the Christian Brothers (his current service). It seems like this fella can't hold a steady job. The names associated with Brother Bertram read like a Who's Who of Sacramento and beyond. One unique facet of the names of Brother's associates is their service. In all these associates, their families, education and personal circumstances forged their personalities. Yet, many of them will tell you how Brother Bert influenced them.

Maybe that is the big deal about Brother Bertram, that his influence has inspired the generosity of spirit that is the hallmark of his friends. Over the years it would be impossible to name a board or committee serving Christian Brothers High School that did not contain the names of Brother Bertram's friends. Whether the need is for financial assistance (there is always a student who needs your help), time, expertise, good counsel or support of a project, Brother Bert's friends always come through. ◆

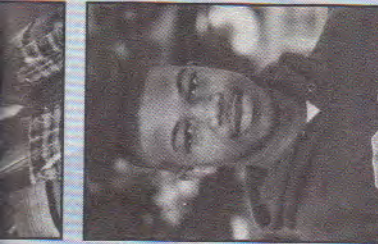

One of a Kind Don Gillott

Don Gillott believes that partnerships between academia and the private sector are essential to accomplish the educational mission. The resignation of Donald H. Gillott, dean of engineering and computer science (ECS) at California State University Sacramento, is seen as a profound loss by Sacramento's business and industrial leaders. Generally, scant attention is given to departing administrators at Sac State, which has experienced constant turnover in management personnel since the mid-1980's. Reaction is different this time because, during his 17 years as dean, Gillott was the university's most visible, active and positive community presence. Bruce T. Johnston, recently retired senior vice president for A. Teichert & Sons, describes Gillott as

That style, so at variance with the general campus environment, will be missed.

Gillott was a true visionary in virtually all high-tech areas. Dr. John Miles, former CSUS computer services director, says Gillott "was the first in the entire CSU to see the importance of distributing computing capabilities throughout higher education. He was fully five years ahead of everyone else."

W. Lloyd Johns, CSUS President Emeritus, extends the kudo: "The campus gained national renown for its cutting edge position in data-processing and telecommunications because of Don Gillott's vision and dynamism." The National Accreditation Board for Engineering and Technology recently judged CSUS as having the best computing system in the country. "That ranking is due to Don Gillott's leadership," states Cribbs.

Gillott's record would be a stunning success without considering his role in bringing the campus closer to the private sector. By factoring in that element, it is clear that former Chancellor Reynolds' remarks were

ing our curricula to better prepare our students."

His sincerity and his own tireless work in community service and charitable activities bred a high level of confidence and trust in Gillott on the part of the private sector. "He was genuine in his quest for technological knowledge and suggestions," states Roger Ramseyer, CEO of Aerojet. "It was obvious that he truly wanted to improve his school and that he believed the private sector could help with an infusion of ideas and information."

"Gillott was different," says Dan Hinrichs, owner of DJH Engineering. "He wasn't simply after money. He wanted intellectual participation and contribution from the private sector. He got that and it transformed the engineering program at Sac State. His loss is incalculable." Hinrichs saw Gillott's effectiveness from both sides — first as a student, later as a member of the Industrial Advisory Board. "As a student, I could feel how he electrified that sleepy little school. Students loved him and so did the faculty. Later, as an alumnus, I saw

in this field." Characteristically, the modest Gillott fails to mention that his leadership was the crucial element in gaining the support and participation of the private sector.

Professor Susan Holl sums up the feelings of his faculty for Don Gillott: "He is simply the finest university administrator I've ever met — the embodiment of all that is best about higher education." CSUS President Emeritus Austin J. Gerber states, "Gillott is an extraordinary person and a tremendous advocate for his school. He is irreplaceable," Bruce Johnston adds, "No educator has had more positive impact on the Sacramento community — no one is even close."

Indeed, Gillott's role in the growth and development of CSUS is unmatched. He is trusted, respected and held in genuine affection by faculty, students, peers and private sector alike. Don Gillott was truly one of the rare few who has made a lasting difference. His contributions to his school and to thousands of students—past, present and future—set him apart. His absence creates a huge void of leadership on the campus. He leaves behind a record of unparalleled accomplishment and no detractors. In that respect, as in so many others, Donald H. Gillott is truly one of a kind. ■

dean, the CSUS engineering program was relatively small and lightly regarded. "Gillott turned that around quickly," says David Hubka, manufacturing engineering manager for Hewlett Packard. "Today, our firm rates CSUS engineering students alongside graduates of MIT, Stanford and UC Berkeley."

That is pretty lofty territory for CSUS — or any campus. Gillott believed that developing partnerships with the private sector is essential in accomplishing the educational mission. One of his first acts as dean was to establish the School of Engineering Industrial Advisory Board. While other such entities were sprinkled throughout academia in the mid-1970's, most were perfunctory at best. Gillott wanted substance and populated his board with key leaders from across the region's private sector.

He admits that one reason behind the concept was to develop a source of augmented funding for his programs. "State budget allocations are not sufficient to push an engineering program to the cutting edge," observes Gillott. "I was determined to make our school as good as it could possibly be."

However, financial support was not Gillott's primary motivation for bringing together the diverse worlds of academe and industry. "I was convinced we could learn from the private sector," Gillott says. "I wanted to find ways that we, on campus, could gain global advice on develop-

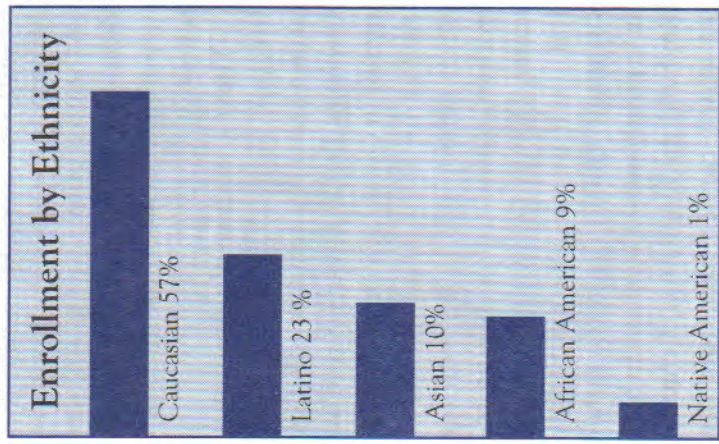
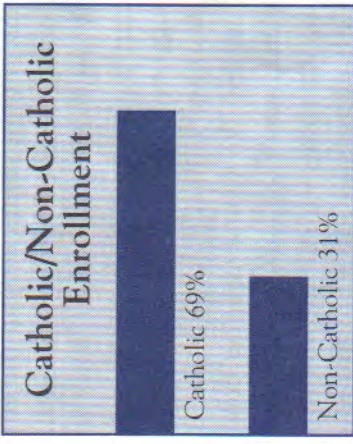
Private sector respect for Gillott did, in fact, help him become the campus superstar of fund-raising and development. He has garnered many millions in gifts and contributions for his school — far outdistancing other university efforts. He did it nearly alone, serving as his own best advance man. Gillott's formal campaign to celebrate the new ECS building on campus raised over \$5.5 million in gifts and donations for his programs.

Those views are echoed by a roll call of the area's top executives. "Don Gillott did more than anyone to promote friendship and understanding between that campus and the private sector," says Robert Cribbs, Folsom Foundation president. "His loss is a sin."

"Donations are important," Gillott says. "But we gained so much more from our affiliations with industry." As one example, he cites the participation of industry representatives on committees to judge senior projects. In addition, private sector representatives regularly advise on acquisition of laboratory equipment. "Their knowledge helped us spend our breakthroughs helped us spend our limited resources on only state-of-the-art items," Gillott says.

Gillott's efforts on behalf of women and minorities have been recognized as among the best in the country. Again, Gillott credits the contributions of the private sector as a key element in the effectiveness of those programs. "Businesses by the score participated, providing salaried and modern employment settings and marvelous career advising for our women and minority students," he says. "Those real-world work experiences can't be duplicated. The private sector has been crucial to our success

through the often-turbulent waters of four different campus administrations and more than a decade of declining budget support from the State of California. Under his direction, ECS tripled in size and all of its programs gained wide respect. Recruiting a top-quality faculty was Gillott's hallmark. Associate dean John Hester says, "Don always sought the best people available, helped them excel and publicly applauded their efforts." Gillott encouraged his faculty to succeed and never second-guessed them.

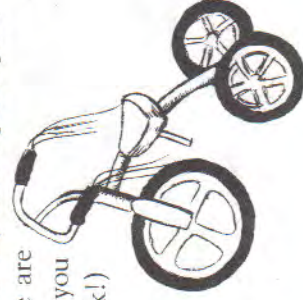

In the mid 1950's, the sons of Mr. & Mrs. A.G. Kassis (Frank, Lewis, Edward, Walter, and Dr. John) decided to create an endowment fund for the Catholic Diocese of Sacramento.

The fund was set up during the administration of Bishop Robert Armstrong. The fund was created to give something back to the community that had patronized the Kassis Brothers' principal business, Stop-n-Shop Markets.

Funds were distributed periodically to various diocesan parishes. In 1974, \$35,000 was given to Msgr. Kavanagh to expand the facilities at St. Patricks Home.

In 1975, with the endowment now at \$634,000, the Kassis Brothers decided that they would like to use the interest annually to fund High School scholarships for the five high schools in the Sacramento area (Christian Brothers, St. Francis, Jesuit, Loretto, and Manogue).

From 1975 to 1994, a total of \$881,900 in tuition assistance money has been distributed to deserving students in Sacramento's Catholic schools.

Christian Brothers students have received approximately \$215,000 thanks to the generosity of the Kassis family.
