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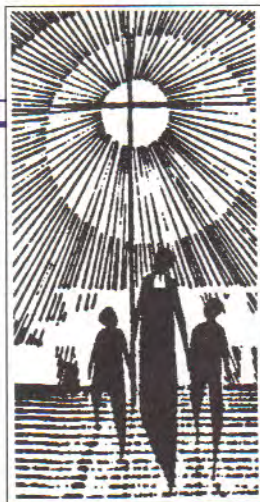

LASALLIAN SPIRITUALITY

The clue to understanding Lasallian spirituality is to be found in the spirit of faith. According to the Brothers' Rule, the spirit of our Lasallian family is a spirit of faith. For St. John Baptist de La Salle, the spirit of faith was the motivating force of his life. When De La Salle speaks of the spirit of faith, he means a profound and radical trust in God.

De La Salle's faith awareness came from the experience of God in his own life. Little by little, he became aware that God was working in him as persons and events led him from one commitment to another. He wrote in his memoir on the origin of the Christian Brothers: "God, who guides all things with wisdom and serenity and whose way it is not to force the inclinations of persons, willed to commit me entirely to the development of the schools. He did this in an imperceptible way and over a long period of time, so that one commitment led to another in a way that I did not foresee in the beginning."

It is against the background of such experience of the action of God in his own life that De La Salle insisted in his *Rule* that the spirit of faith should induce the Brothers "not to look upon anything but with the eyes of faith, not to do anything but in view of God, and to attribute all to God." It was the spirit of faith that led De La Salle to abandon himself and his Institute completely into the hands of Divine Providence.

Consider this example. In the face of a decision as to whether or not to use his personal fortune to endow the schools, he addressed his Lord in these words: "My God, I do not know whether I should endow the schools or not. I do not know what you want. So I will not contribute in any way to endowing the schools. If you endow the schools, they will be well endowed; if you do not, they will be without endowment. I beseech you to make your Holy Will known to me."

This radical attitude of faith in Divine Providence remained with De La Salle through his whole life. Here is one of his retreat resolutions: "I shall always look upon the work of my salvation and the foundation of our community as the work of God. Therefore, I will abandon the care of both to Him in order to act only by His orders. I will consult Him frequently regarding all I must do for the one or the other. Often I will say to Him the words of the Prophet Habacuc: Domine, Opus Tuum. Lord, the work is Yours."

CB Admissions Mission

Where will I spend my next four years? Will I be accepted? Will I like the activities and sports? Will I like my teachers and will I be able to handle the work load? Is it safe and will my child grow intellectually and morally? Will my child be challenged and be coached well? And will my child be able to get into college?

These questions and many more are the questions that motivate and compel most inquiries and visitors to CB during the fall semester each year. And this year will be no exception.

Responding to these many questions, delivering the message about the mission of CBHS, its academics, athletics, activities, and serving as host to hundreds of visitors each fall are the full-time activities of Jim Hughes, director of admissions, and Mary-Alice Delgado, secretary to the Admissions Office. "It is crucial that honest, accurate responses are given to those who are drawn to CB and that this is done with an experience of genuine CB hospitality and Christian community," says Jim of his responsibilities.

Many programs are in place for the sole purpose of carrying Christian Brothers admission services and to ensure the community is informed about the Christian Brothers' message.

The most popular is the one-on-one hosting of potential applicants. Matched in academic abilities, sports and activities, a CB student hosts a guest for a day through all seven classes with introductions to teachers, coaches and fellow students. Parents can also visit for an hour, part of a day or simply tour the school with Jim and students to drop into classes and see for themselves the CB educational traditions in progress.

Each year, shortly after the school year begins, Christian Brothers hosts an open house where interested candidates and parents may tour the campus with CB hosts. Here, they have the opportunity to meet faculty, counselors, coaches and administrators. This all-out effort to share the CB hospitality provides many

face-to-face dialogues with teachers, administrators and curriculum coordinators. Current students also volunteer to welcome guests at this most important event. This year's Open House is Sunday, October 13, from 1 to 3 p.m.

In keeping with the goal of introducing as many students as possible to CB, more than 35 elementary schools are visited each fall. During the visit, CB students along with the director of admissions serve to bring the CB story to eighth grade classes.

Upon deciding that Christian Brothers is the school of choice, eighth grade applicants must take a placement exam. All four Catholic high schools give the same exam the first Saturday in February.

Once a student is accepted into Christian Brothers, they are placed into one of three programs; Scholars, college prep or SAGES. Placement in these programs is determined by a variety of criteria: transcripts, test results, effort/conduct, teacher evaluation, responses on the application, a writing sample, letters of recommendation and interviews.

Each new ninth grade class is comprised of the most advanced student to the struggling student. There are 240 students in the class with some students placed on waiting lists. While CB gives preference in admitting Catholics, those of the families already enrolled and children of alumni, it also accepts many others who are drawn to the charisma of the Lasallian educational system. CB cannot accept all who apply because of lack of available space, and CB does not admit students who cannot succeed in the seven-period a day college preparatory curriculum.

All decisions on acceptances and denials are reviewed by administrators with the director of admissions. Teachers, coaches, curriculum coordinators and trustees also serve as resources to the admission of new students. All entering eighth grade students are notified by the first week in April of acceptance or denial.

In this season of intensive questioning by eighth graders and parents, many stand ready to serve their needs. A call to the Admissions Office at 733-3690 can help provide information and answers for those considering CB. The Admissions Office also offers the *Viewbook*, a comprehensive booklet about Christian Brothers which contains the required application forms. A copy will be mailed to you when you contact the Admissions Office. ♦

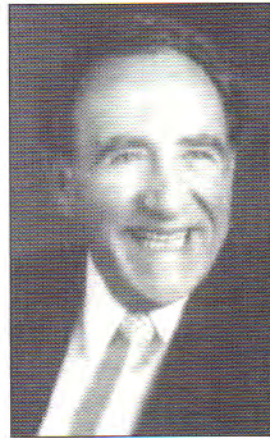

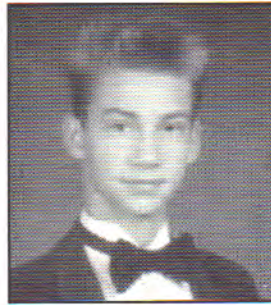

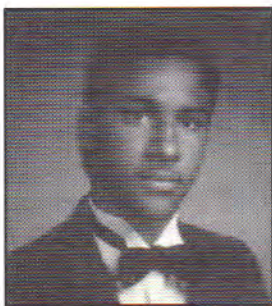
Charles Doyle was the bat boy. Thanks, Cathy, for the update.

basically two: The desire by Catholics to provide a religious education for their children and general dissatisfaction with the quality of public instruction as it then existed. Accomplishing the task took a good five years.

Finally, with impetus from Father Patrick Scanlan and doorbell-ringing and arm-twisting by Miss Cunningham, the great day arrived--establishing the first local high school offering both academic and commercial classes. Officially known as St. Patrick's Institute after the patron saint of the Sacramento (then Grass Valley) Diocese but commonly referred to as the Sacramento Institute by the brothers who staffed it, the school officially

Christian Brothers: A

One hundred twenty years! A long time, indeed, since an energetic young maiden lady named Maggie Cunningham saw her fund-raising efforts brought to fruition with the opening of what has, at various times, been known as St. Patrick's Institute, the Sacramento Institute, Christian Brothers College, Christian Brothers

School, Bishop Armstrong High School and finally--and hopefully last--Christian Brothers High School.

Despite those name changes--of which more later--and locations at four sites, there are two unbroken links spanning that century - plus: The continuous administration by the Brothers of the Christian Schools and a long

line--thin at times, but uninterrupted--of graduates, now numbering in the thousands and all proud to be known as "Brothers Boys," joined since 1990 by "Brothers Girls."

The reasons behind the establishing of a school by the sons of St. John Baptist de La Salle, the Christian Brothers, in Sacramento were

was dedicated July 16, 1876, by Archbishop Joseph Sadoc Alemany, O.P., of the Archdiocese of San Francisco. The next day the brothers began enrolling students and by the following Monday--July 24--200 of them began their first classes. They wasted no time in those days.

What sort of place was it, this school which opened its doors in the nation's centennial year at 12th and K streets on the site of what in later years was Weinstock's department store, now filled with offices. The past never can be judged in terms of the present, and what appears spartan today was rather opulent in 1876.

There were all of four classrooms, with seats for 260 students (all but 10 would be filled within six months). The most basic division problem indicates the teacher-pupil ratio was such as to put to the acid test even the

renowned disciplinary talents of the seven brothers of the fledgling community. For each classroom there also was furnished, according to contemporary accounts, a teacher's desk and a revolving chair. With classes averaging over 60, the latter probably were kept in a perpetual spin.

Because Father Scanlan envisioned boarding students as a source of revenue, the three-story frame structure had a dormitory equipped for 20 boys, beds and bedding for the seven members of the community and kitchen and dining room facilities to accommodate 30.

All of this required the expenditure of \$24,000, a substantial sum for that day, and may have

to be exact--in the Assembly Chamber of the Capitol, just two blocks away, with Gov. William Irwin presiding.

During the next two decades the school--still known as the Sacramento Institute--thrived until, in 1896 and at the urging of Bishop Thomas Grace of Sacramento, it became the Christian Brothers College.

Nor was the term "college" loosely used, for in those days it was possible for a student to spend his years from the first grade through three years of college right there at 12th and K streets before--if he wished a degree--transferring to Saint Mary's College, then located in Oakland.

Sacramento.

Brother Cianan was succeeded by members of his institute whose names--Stephen, Bertram, Sabinian, Bosonis John, Genebern, Walter Erminold and Victor Ambrose--are now footnotes to history. But in 1900 there came on the scene Brother Vellesian, still remembered fondly by many, who returned in the early 1920s to preside over the construction of the "new" school at 21st and Y streets and who into the early 1940s was a beloved figure on what by then was known as the Broadway campus.

Meanwhile, in those early days of the century, space became a problem. The cost of an addition came in the form of \$5,000

from Mrs. Michael Bethel, a benefactress in the mold of Maggie Cunningham.

By this time the brothers must have considered themselves

permanently established in the Capital City. Besides enlarging the school--it is noted by the well-remembered Brother U. Lewis in a history of the school through 1924--they owned, jointly with the Sisters of Mercy, a burial plot in St. Joseph's Cemetery.

Century Plus of Service

accounted for the fact that when it came time to furnish other classroom amenities, there was just enough left for two globes, 24 blackboard erasers, and 24 pointers. Early accounts make no mention of chalk--or of blackboards, either, for that matter.

Extra fittings for the brothers, whose director was Brother Clanan, were furnished by the San Francisco District. That came to \$250, a hardly princely sum, and another \$950 was spent to equip three extra classrooms and cut down a little on those class sizes. From the very beginning the brothers themselves contributed significantly not only in personnel but in operational monies.

While the brothers and their first "boys" were not exactly lolling in luxury's ample lap, they did have their moments of glory. In just 10 months the school conferred its first diplomas--two,

Thus it was that the concept of the junior college came to reality in the Sacramento area in the hands of the brothers a good 20 years before Sacramento Junior College, as an adjunct of Sacramento High School, began offering post-secondary school courses.

And all the while, in a two-track system later to be emulated by the public schools, the Christian Brothers were pouring, through the commercial and banking departments, a steady stream of young men into the business life of

The brothers' names now become more familiar to at least the older among the "old boys." The directors included Brothers Florinus Peter; the saintly V. Leo--"White Leo"--noted later both as engineer and poet; Ximines George, a memorable administrator who was not above the manual labor needed for maintaining what by then was an aging structure, and V. Jasper, later provincial of the San Francisco District.

The history of those years is minimal as to detail, perhaps because, as Brother Lewis noted with a rare touch of asperity, "Brothers Florinus, Leo and Jasper kept poor records." Maybe, by way of excuse, they were just too busy trying to keep board nailed to board in a crumbling edifice, which was three times threatened with destruction by fire in 1919 and 1920 while under the administration of Brother U. Vivian.

It must have been felt by his superiors that Brother Vivian had endured enough--or perhaps that he was jinxed--because after that near-disastrous year he gave way to a former director, Brother George, who presided over the disintegrating structure until December 1921, when, upon the return of Brother Vellelian, a new era was about to dawn.

The downtown school was falling apart and the value of the property--still owned by the diocese--was such that its sale--for \$210,000--imperative. Imperative or not, it put Brother Vellelian, his faculty and student body in a position that was, at best, somewhat awkward.

The property had to be vacated by June 1, 1923, and it would have taken a series of miracles to erect a new school in time for the start of classes in August.

Brother Vellelian, a practical man, and a not particularly demanding one, preferred to depend on his own resources rather than

to tax Divine Providence. The result was a move to the only available place in the city--a site, actually, almost out of the city, the abandoned East Sacramento Public School building at 39th and J streets, where Sacred Heart Church now stands.

That solved only part of the problem, however, because there remained the rather vital matter of living quarters for the faculty and some 30 boarders. These facilities were found in an old residence and adjoining cottage at 20th and T streets. Two buses conveyed teachers and boarding students to school each morning, home for lunch, back to school and home again during a year which must have seemed endless.

Meanwhile, even though it took seven months to iron out the details, construction of the new

facility and the dedication on that date drew a large crowd including, most fittingly, a maiden lady, no longer young, whose memory went back to another dedication 48 years before. Her name? Maggie Cunningham, of course.

The energetic Miss Maggie Cunningham had come to the fore as principal fund raiser for the new school. It was through her efforts that most of the monies necessary were raised from the community, the bulk of it from non-Catholic sources. Soon after, Miss Cunningham was granted Letters of Affiliation by the Superior General of the Brothers, making her an affiliate member of the Institute and the first woman so honored on the West Coast.

The curriculum having been reduced some years before to eliminate college-level courses, it

school advanced at breakneck pace: The contract was let on Feb. 4, 1924; ground was broken Feb. 11, the cornerstone was laid May 18 and students were in their new classrooms and brothers and boarders in their living quarters on Sept. 15. It would seem that Brother Vellelian did have his miracle, of sorts.

By Nov. 23 the finishing touches were put on the \$225,000

again was time for a name change, and on November 5, 1924, it became officially the Christian Brothers School.

A classroom wing built to accommodate 500 students extended along the Y Street (now Broadway) side of the campus; brothers' and boarders' quarters were on 21st Street; an arcade, later providing entrance to a gymnasium, connected the two.

Even in those days, an early photograph indicates, times were a little tough, because there on the corner, blocking complete view of the handsome structure, stood the first of several ugly--but profitable--service stations.

There, for some years, the brothers continued to provide educational excellence in their elementary school and their academic and commercial high school classes. They continued some old athletic legends, too, on the diamond, and they created some new ones on the gridiron and basketball court.

Long a baseball power, Christian Brothers football had a rather ill-boding inauguration back in 1917 with a 32-6 loss to Harkness Junior High School. Ten years later they were playing stronger opposition--Sacramento High School--but still losing by such astronomical scores as 87-0.

But by the mid-1930s the gridders, under alumnus Jim Flynn, were able to stun Sacramento High's Purple Dragons two years hand-running (at which point Sacramento High followed the only sensible course and hired Flynn), and Henry "Bud" Hanna's basketball and baseball teams played all comers on even terms.

It was also during those Depression years that the still new school suffered a premature aging process when maintenance money was just not there, and the saintly and well-loved Brother Arcadius Patrick kept the boiler together with bailing wire and magic to provide heat for the classrooms. Meanwhile, the Brothers, on too many mornings, were shaving with cold water.

But the years under Brother Patrick and his worthy successors were good ones with devoted teachers, and students were filled with pride in what by then was known popularly "the little school behind the big service station." brother Patrick was also respon-

sible for a major curriculum revision that revitalized the academic program of the school.

The toll of time finally was felt simultaneously by Christian Brothers and the two girls' high schools--St. Joseph and St. Francis--and thus it was that in 1957 Bishop Armstrong High School, a co-institutional experiment in Catholic secondary education, was opened, and the old Christian Brothers remained as a "feeder" school, offering freshman and sophomore classes only. It appeared that never again would a diploma bear the name "Christian Brothers School."

Tradition finally was served--and restored--in 1964, when two new four-year high schools for girls made it, once again, possible for a four-year high school (grammar school classes had been discontinued in 1957) under the Christian Brothers to exist in Sacramento. The culmination was the restoration of the old name, in 1968, with the addition of one word: Christian Brothers *High* School.

The first decade of Century II for Christian Brothers High was not without its unique problems, exacerbated when subsidies from the Christian Brothers' winery operations ebbed from a steady flow to a virtual trickle. It was over half a century ago that a Brother Joe Buckley could implore his friend Fire Chief Terry Mulligan for a bit of unofficial municipal assistance when things needed doing and the wherewithal to pay was missing; new avenues of revenue now needed to be developed.

And they were. An active Board of Trustees and a revived Alumni Association have helped provide the guidance necessary to make the school self-supporting. The unique La Salle Club and the Boosters have continued to serve the cause of the athletic program, while the Parents Service Organization has remained constantly

active. With the help of these support groups and such fundraising activities as the Ambassadors Club and the Brother Bertram Society, there's no mystery about Christian Brothers High School's continued strength during the first two decades of its second century. And with such backing it's easy to see why a second campus -- an addition, not a replacement -- larger than the other four combined is envisioned not too many years down the road.

Today Christian Brothers continues to offer an accredited college preparatory program as well as a full comprehensive educational program meeting the needs and abilities of all its students - including, since 1990, young women. Characteristic of the Brothers' schools, the students at Christian Brothers represent a wide range of economic and racial backgrounds, thus providing graduates with a realistic view of the society in which they are expected to live and participate.

The "old boys" from the Sacramento Institute are gone now and the ranks of those who still call it the "Brothers College" are thinning. But the graduates, young and old, will agree as one that what Daniel Webster once said in arguing the famous Dartmouth College case also applies to their alma mater:

"... it is a small school, but there are those who love it."

Indeed there are--they number in the thousands.

Invaluable in the preparation of the above, and in no particular order, were a master's thesis by Sister Marie Vandenberg, R.C.; an article in the "The Gael" yearbook for 1964 by Ted McKnight, Brother U. Lewis' informal history, old files of the Catholic Herald and Brother Maurice Flynn, FSC, late archivist for the San Francisco District.

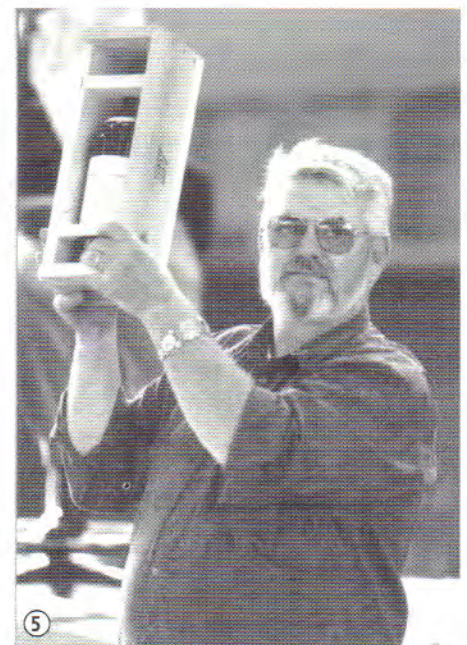
