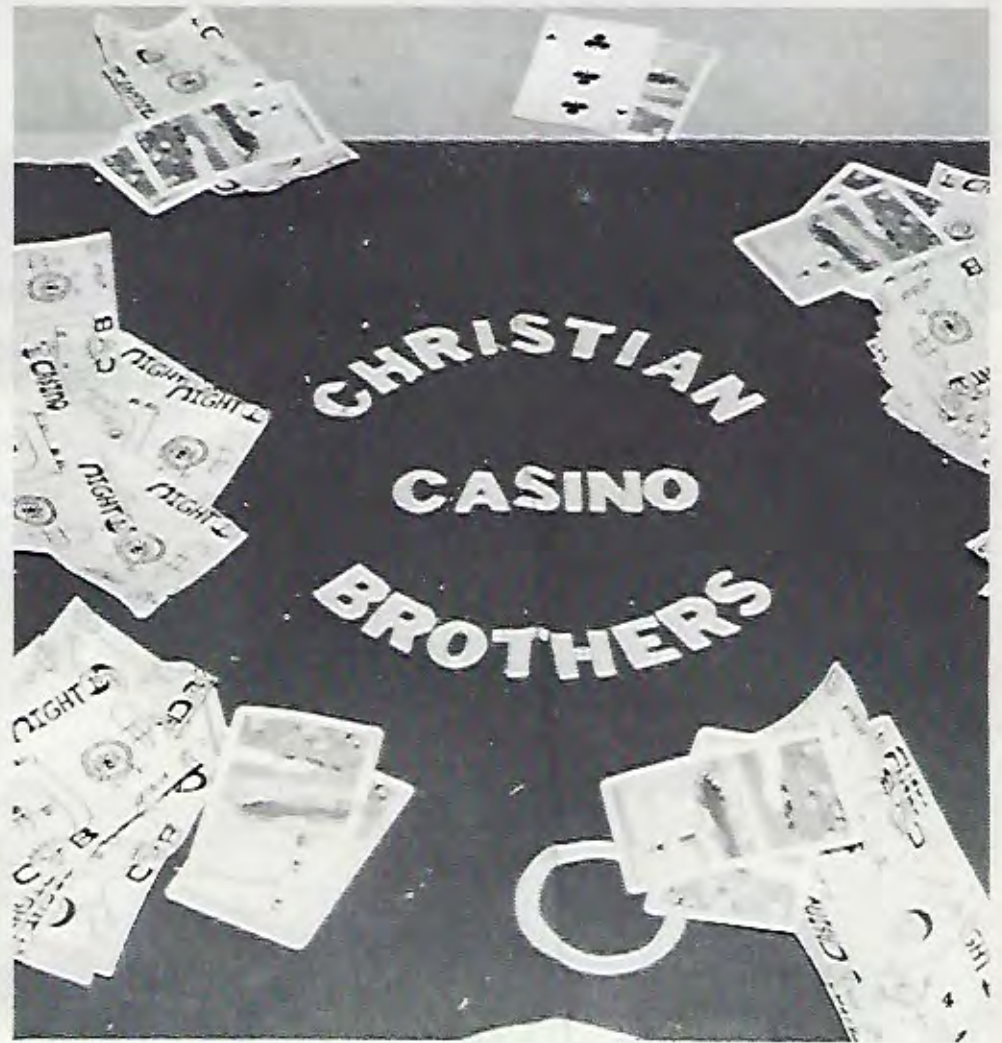


Following a wave of publicity, the 1983 Casino Night, sponsored by the Junior class, raised close to \$200.00 for future use.

All in all, the week, rally, and victories (both the homecoming games and the soccer championship) seemed to make the dance incredibly fun and thus, one to remember for years to come.

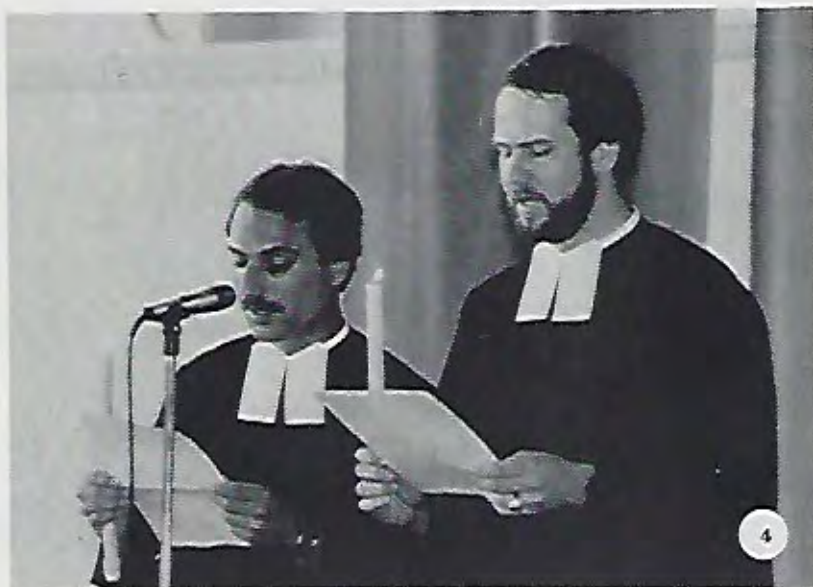

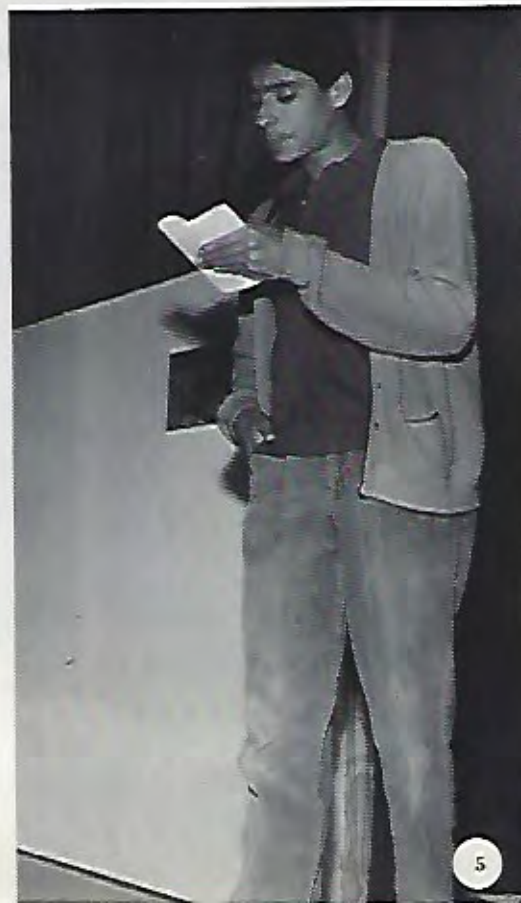

Retreats

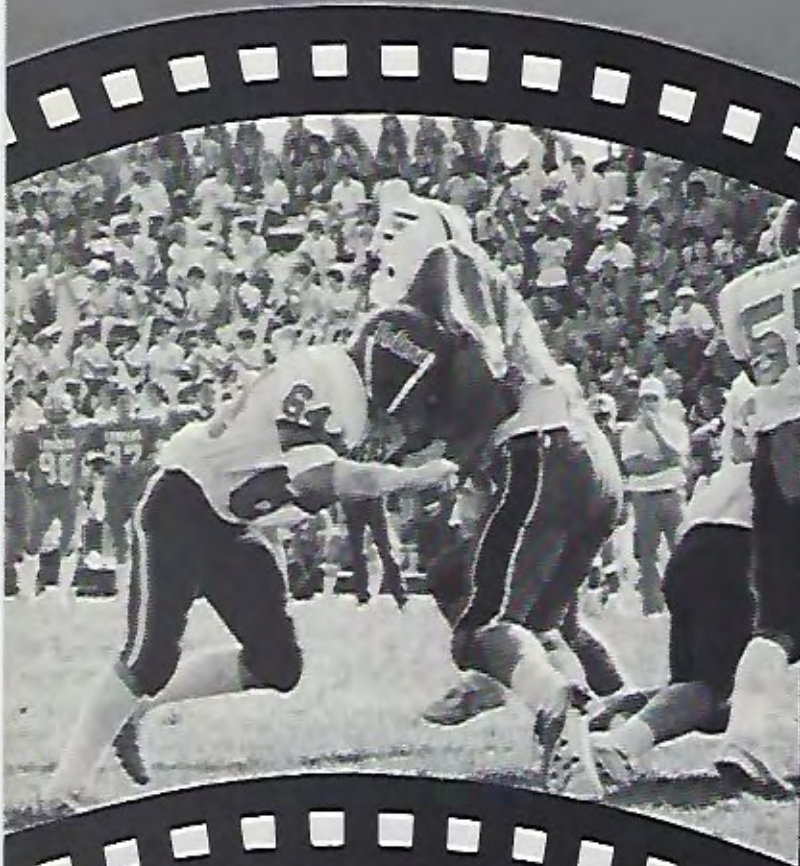

feeling of peace and serenity that cannot be experienced as readily in the mad hustle and bustle of our average lives.

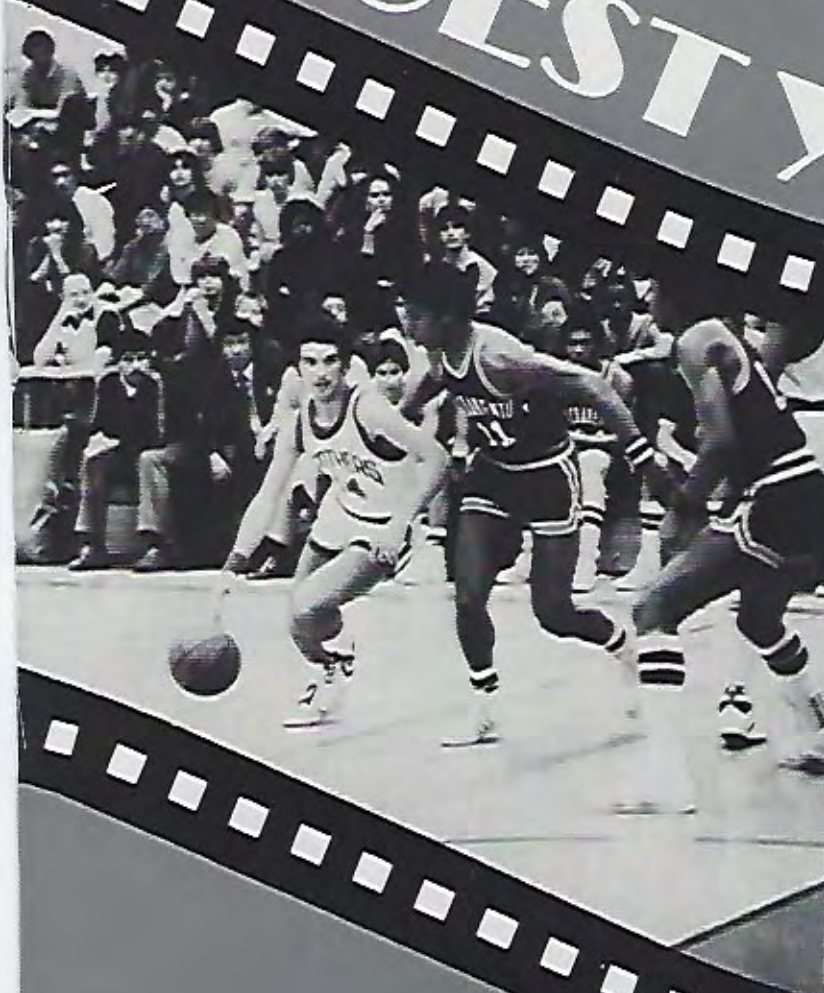
