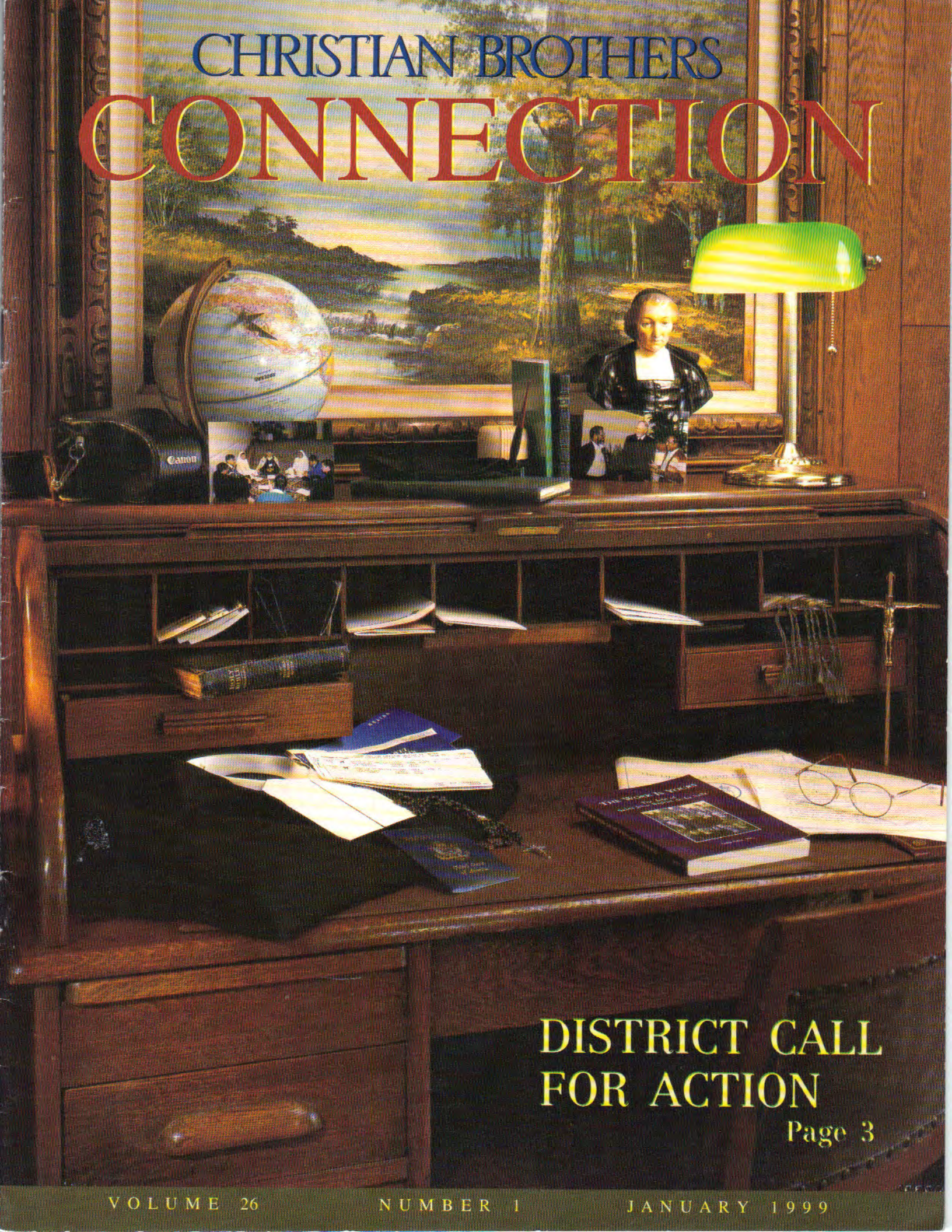
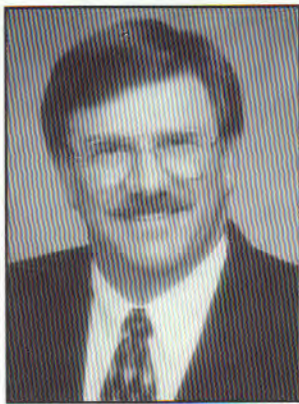

# DISTRICT CALL FOR ACTION



The District of San Francisco recently held an extraordinary convocation which included 600 participants — brothers, lay teachers, administrators, staff, trustees and students from all of the West Coast Lasallian high schools, St. Mary's College, and representatives from African and Asian countries. The convocation was designed to deepen the commitment of brothers, lay teachers, administrators, staff and Boards of Trustees with the mission of the Christian Brothers, while also reaffirming the promise of educating the poor.

"Shared mission is a reality; we must name it and embrace it as a gift of the spirit...as we move forward we - as brothers and colleagues - are all partners in the Lasallian educational mission," said Brother Visitor, Brother David Brennan, FSC.

The *Context for Action*, which borrows liberally from the Scriptures, Church teachings, and Institute and District documents, focuses on five separate areas:

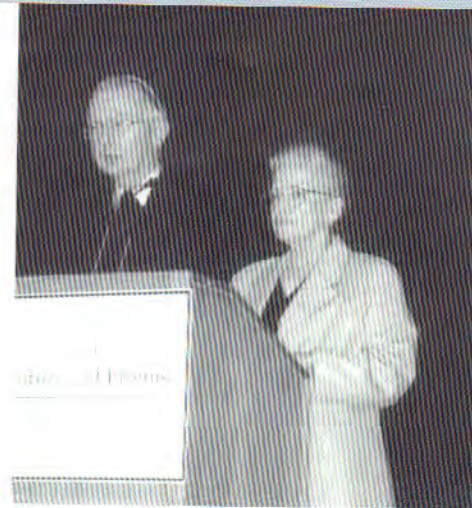
- Living our faith.
- Responding in faith to God's call in our time.
- Renewing, through shared mission, the vocation of educating the young, especially those that are described in the Brothers' Rule as "the economically deprived, victims of social injustice, delinquents, and those neglected by the rest of society."
- Revitalizing Brothers' Communities through vocations and revitalized community life.
- Recognizing and acting upon the need for a more global view of our mission.

The *Action Plan* has been divided into five separate sections that specify what should, what must, be done to answer the "call to action" detailed in the *Context for Action*.

- Vitalizing the brothers' personal, communal and apostolic life.
- Creating new works for helping the unmet educational needs of the poor in the communities in which Lasallian institutions are located.
- Strengthening the relationship between The Lasallian Educational Corporation and the Boards

of Trustees of the secondary schools.

- Recognizing the global mission of our apostolate and honoring requests to help communities that are struggling outside the United States, such as Vietnam, India, Pakistan, Sri Lanka, Malaysia, and Mexico.
- Practicing good stewardship of District funds to enable the continuance of Lasallian mission works.



The District of San Francisco's Convocation, an unprecedented gathering of Lasallian educators, brought focus to the mission of the Brothers of the Christian Schools and their lay colleagues, and renewed the focus on expanding work with the poor and working class of our society. Christian Brothers President Mark Warren, said, "In a time when the number of brothers is decreasing and most businesses faced with similar challenges would pull back, we are expanding our works. Twenty years ago we had 16,000 brothers and 7,000 lay colleagues. Today, we have 7,500 Brothers, many of whom are in retirement, and we have over 65,000 lay Lasallian educators. Lasallian education is healthy and growing. Absolutely fantastic." ♦

## John W. Jackson, Sr.

Sometimes even the sign in front of the campus doesn't tell the whole story. Not the Jacksons' story, anyway.

Sure, we're Christian Brothers – and sisters, too. But then there are all the Christian Brothers, fathers, and sons, mothers and daughters who form our community. In the Jackson family's case, it's father, son and grandson (so far) — and a family tradition of helping Sacramento's Catholic churches and schools that dates back more than three decades.

The patriarch is John W. Jackson Sr., who, along with his wife, Claudine, will be honored Feb. 4, as Ambassador of the Year when Christian Brothers holds its 14<sup>th</sup> annual Ambassadors' Dinner at the Sutter Club. His son, John Jackson, Jr. (Class of '68), is on the school's Board of Trustees. His grandson, John Jackson III, graduated from Christian Brothers in 1998 and now attends St. Mary's College in Moraga, where he is majoring in economics.

The Ambassadors' Club, which John Jr. helped organize in 1985 as a member of the Board of Regents, acknowledges the supporters of Christian Brothers who contribute \$1,000 or more a year to the school. It has grown in the past decade from an initial 82 members to more than 140.

"John and Claudine Jackson epitomize the selfless spirit of giving and faith envisioned by our founder, St. John Baptist de La Salle," says Mark Warren, President of Christian Brothers. "They have been supporters of CB from the mid-1960s when they sent their son, John Jr., to the Brothers for his education. As a community, we thank you, John and Claudine, for your many years

of dedication to our Lasallian mission."

For John Sr., giving to the Catholic community began long before the Ambassadors' Club was established — back when he was starting out as a masonry contractor in the early 1960s and worked with his close friend, the late Monsignor James Poole, who led the Diocesan School Department and was pastor at St. Charles Borromeo Church in South Sacramento.

"There's been a family tradition of helping the church with the skills that we've had in construction," says John Jr. "My father was tapped on the shoulder when I was a kid growing up to do masonry projects — whatever needed to be done in masonry, he would take care of that."

The family continued to pitch in after John Jr. graduated from Christian Brothers, earned a degree in civil engineering from the University of California, Davis, and returned to work for his dad before starting Jackson Properties on Power Inn Road, where John Sr. still shares office space.

"I've always told John that we take some out of the community, and we give some back," says John Sr., who has donated considerable time and effort to construction projects at Christian Brothers and other Catholic institutions — supervising his son's work in the 1970s to build St. Charles Church, for example. "If someone needs a helping hand somewhere," says John Jr., "quite often we get the call and help them out. That has included, certainly, Christian Brothers."

The family's charity has ranged beyond the construction site. The Jacksons and the Bordissos (Claudine Jackson's family) fund two scholarships for Christian Brothers' students.

John Sr. takes justifiable pride in being able to help. "Sometimes we get four or five letters from young boys and girls who are getting help from the funds in going to school ... nice letters thanking us for the money that is there to help them," he says. "It's very gratifying to see."

That pride extends to the campus itself. Comparing Christian Brothers today with the school he and his wife chose for their son more than 30 years ago, John Sr. says, "I think it's great. It has certainly kept up its academics, and if you look around town, you see an awful lot of good young fellows who came out of Christian Brothers. ... I think it's a wonderful education."

The scholarships' aim is to keep that education open to all, in the tradition of St. John Baptist de La Salle. "My father started out in the masonry business as a hod carrier," says John Jr. "When I attended Christian Brothers, he had a fledgling business. That business has grown, we're doing well today, and we're giving back to the community. It's important to maintain Christian Brothers so it's going to be there for other kids as they come up through the ranks, whatever their socioeconomic status.

"No one is denied an education at Christian Brothers because they can't pay for it. We weren't

**Paul Reese**  
CBS Graduate - Class of 1935

Given his druthers, Paul Reese, '35, will eschew travel by air, rail or auto every time in favor of what once was known as "shank's mare." You see so much more of the country that way, avers the retired Marine Corps lieutenant colonel, who has let neither age nor physical disabilities deter him from his coast-to-coast – quite literally – runs.

Now 81, the former teacher and school administrator has fought a lifelong battle with asthma, underwent 35 radiation treatments for prostate cancer (running in between times) when in his 70s and suffers from a chronic back condition. Still, he can lay claim to being a cross-country runner in the fullest sense. And to prove it was no fluke, he did it again.

What impels a man to undertake such physical feats? In Paul's case it was a desire to encourage both the elderly and the physically handicapped into activity and to see the land as the pioneers saw it – down low and up close. To frost his cake, that first run, when he was in his 70s, made him the oldest person to run across the United States.

That trip – 70 percent running, the balance walking – led to Paul's first book, "Ten Million Steps," published in 1993. It also led to thoughts of an encore. Because he had covered "only" eight of the

Western states on his first jaunt, Paul next traveled across by foot – and wrote about it in "Go East, Old Man" – the remainder of the 22 states in the West.

Coverage, by the way, averaged 26 miles a day, just about the length of any Olympic marathon. Little wonder that the supermuscular Arnold Schwarzenegger, in his foreword to "Ten Million Steps," nominated Paul to be the "first centerfold in Modern Maturity."

Currently getting its final polishing is Paul's third literary effort, with a tentative title of the "The Old Man and the Road" and covering Paul's experiences in traversing 26 Eastern states together with Hawaii and Alaska.

It seems quite likely that Paul may be urging an active annexation policy for the nation now that he has covered the existing territory so completely.

Most recently Paul had to switch from running togs to black tie in Chicago, where he was the recipient of one of the ninth annual Arete Awards for Courage in Sports. Paul's citation, as the nation's senior honoree, took note of his having overcome multiple physical ailments to log what amounts to four globe girdling trips – on the run, of course.

Having covered the "Why?" of Paul's pedestrian peregrinations, it might be well to consider the "How?" of things, and the answer to that is Paul's wife, Elaine. It was Elaine who sent him forth from their motor home at 7 each morning,

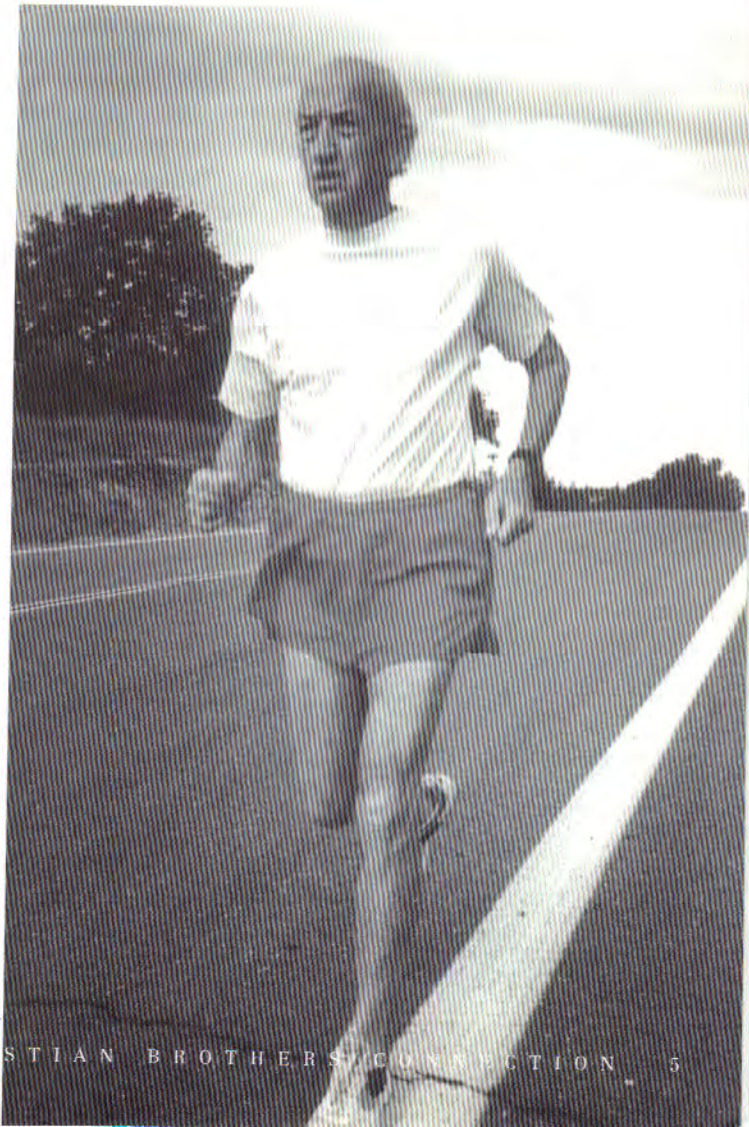
drove 3 miles ahead and then waited for him to catch up for breakfast. This routine would be repeated until that day's 26 miles had been covered. And so it went, as in "MacBeth," "tomorrow and tomorrow and tomorrow."

It was Elaine who watched Paul's diet so his weight never varied more than 5 pounds from his usual 145 pounds, sparsely distributed on a 5-foot, 10-inch frame.

Likewise it was Elaine who, when Paul wondered idly one evening what she'd do if he suddenly decided to quit, replied, "I'd kick your butt out of the motor home and tell you to get running."

Even for a battle hardened Marine that was enough to drive the thought from his mind and get him back on the road.

He's still there. And Elaine is right behind him, too. ♦

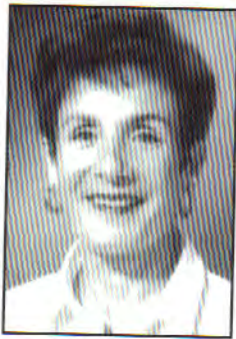


John Crane

And the committee continues to send various communiqués - from follow-up letters and registration forms to final psych-up letters.

Hopefully, you're encouraged to begin planning your next class extravaganza. My 20-year reunion was very satisfying and I'm sure our 25<sup>th</sup> Silver Celebration this year will be gratifying as well. 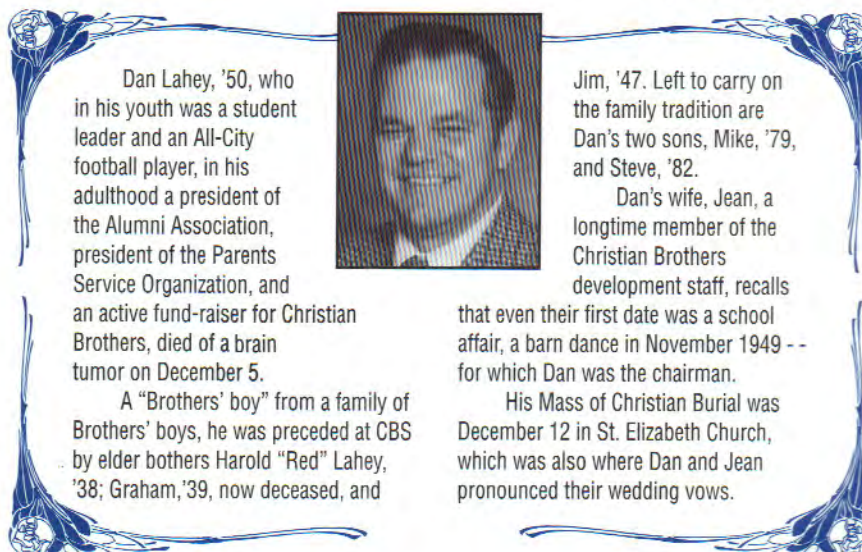

He moved on to play on the 1951 Sacramento City College State Championship team. After two years in the military, Jerry returned to Sacramento and played ball for Sacramento State College. recipients of financial aid at the time I attended, but it's really important to have that financial aid available. We've contributed to the school so that if any kid wants to go there, they can, regardless of their ability to pay. That's certainly the Lasallian tradition."

The Jacksons point out that the need to contribute to Catholic schools is even greater today than when John Sr. started helping out. "In the old days," says John Jr., "we had many vocations, so you had nuns and brothers staffing our schools. Today, we are hiring lay teachers, and they have to be paid an honest wage - if you want the best, you have to pay them. That's why it's so vitally important to help out financially."

As for the Ambassador of the Year award, John Sr. is humbly pleased. "I'm very honored to have it. It's a wonderful thing. I don't quite know whether I deserve it or

not."

But John Jr. knows what has brought his father to the head table. "It has been just faithful support" for Christian Brothers. "Whenever they've needed any help, he's been there." ♦
