GIRLS VOLLEYBALL TEAM LOOKS GOOD



Scholarships, continued

University of San Francisco on the basis of competitive examinations held on March 5, Reverend John H. Martin, S.J., Chairman of the University's Committee on Scholarships, announced today. The USF scholarships range in value from \$4,000 to \$2,400 to defray expenses for four years of collegiate study.




