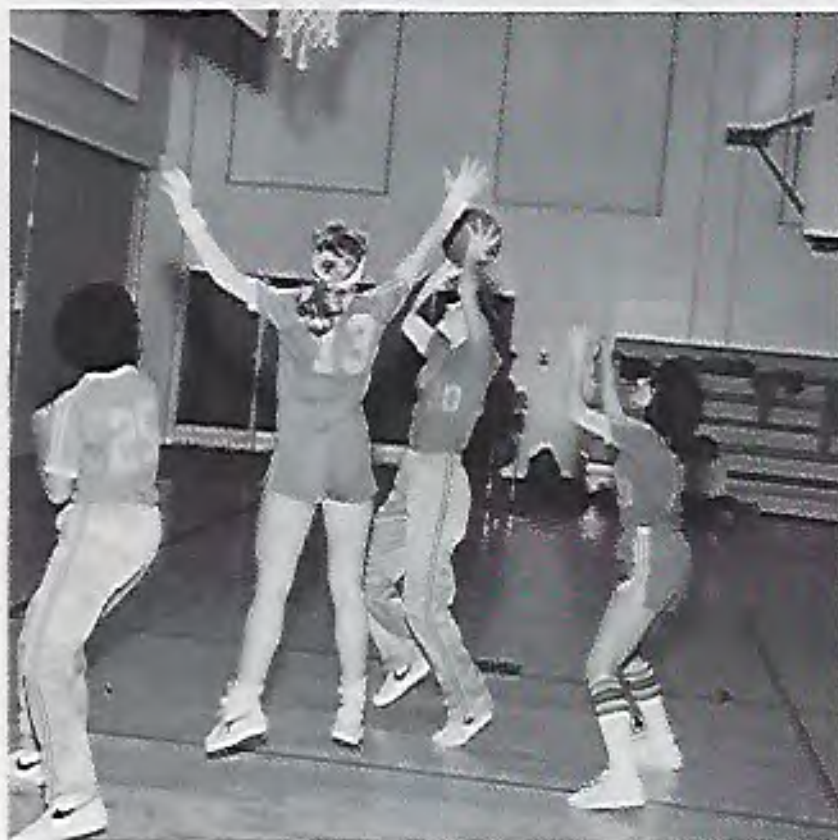

Girls who achieved academic excellence were eligible to be members of the California Scholarship Federation. The club's service was to tutor other students who needed help in various studies.

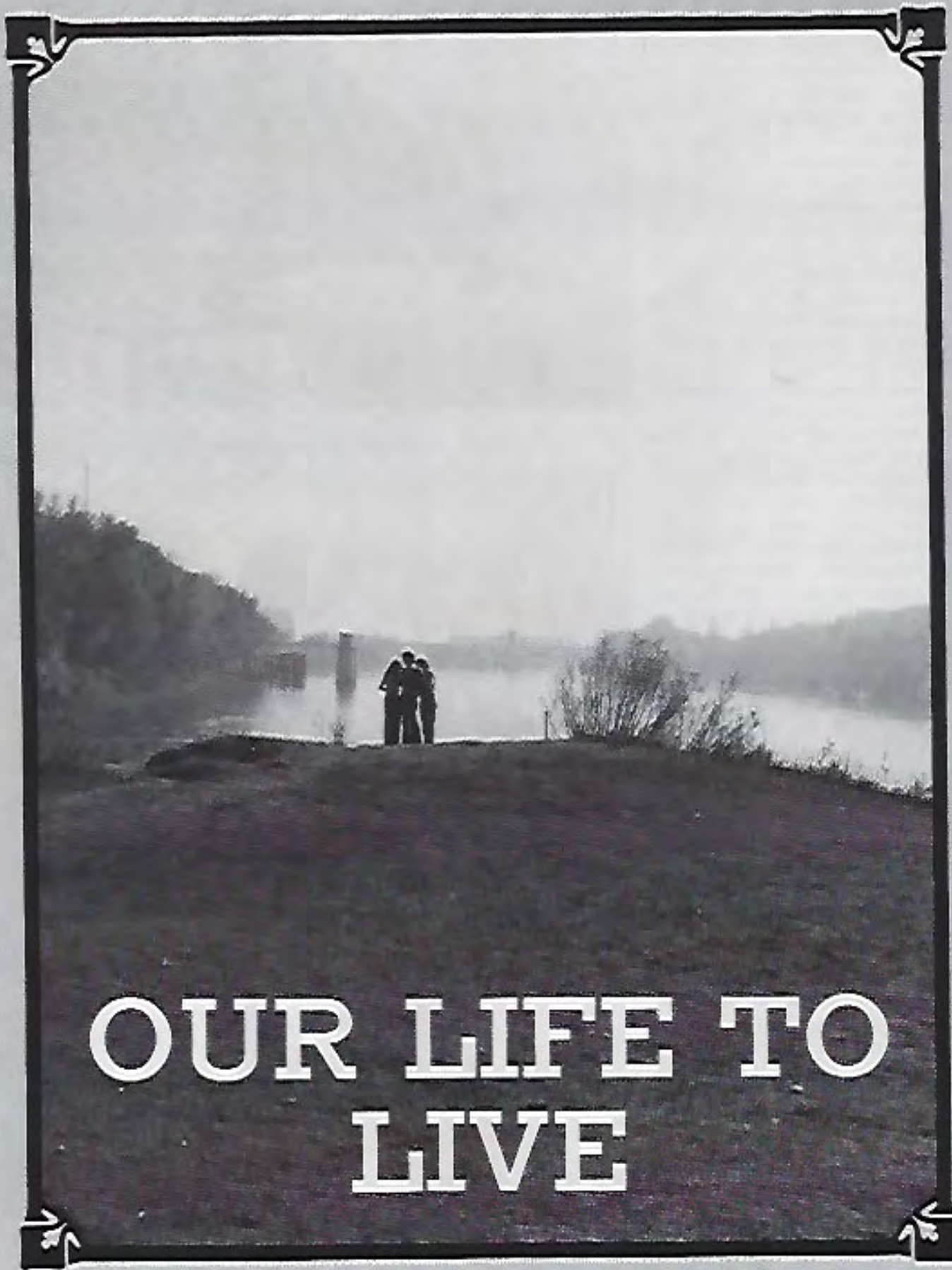

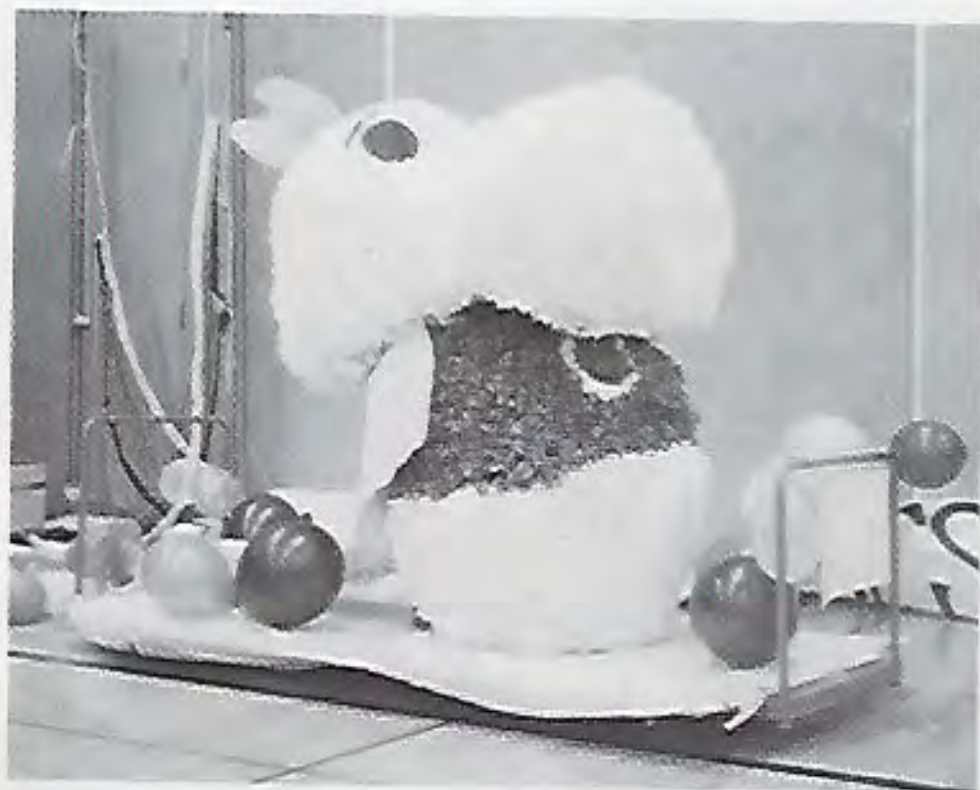

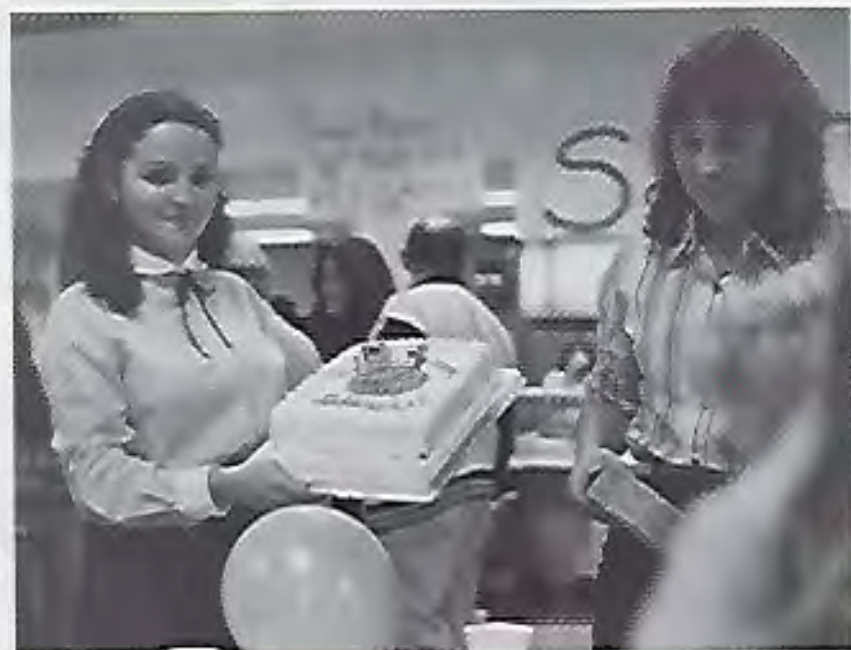
FATHER/DAUGHTER DINNER DANCE 11

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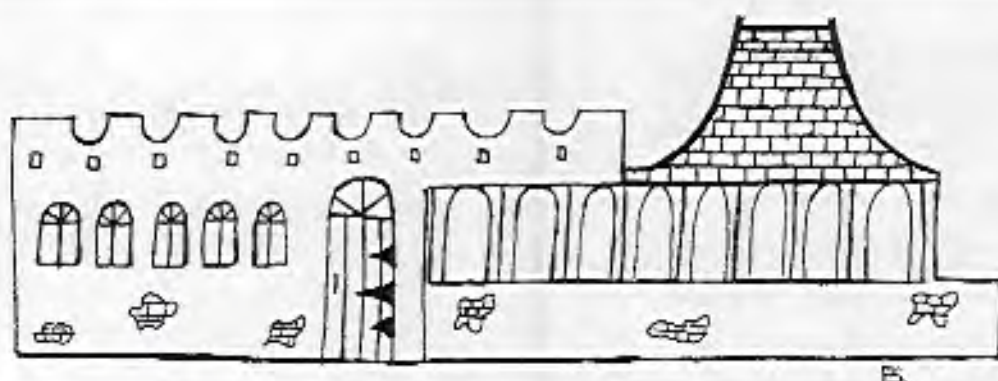

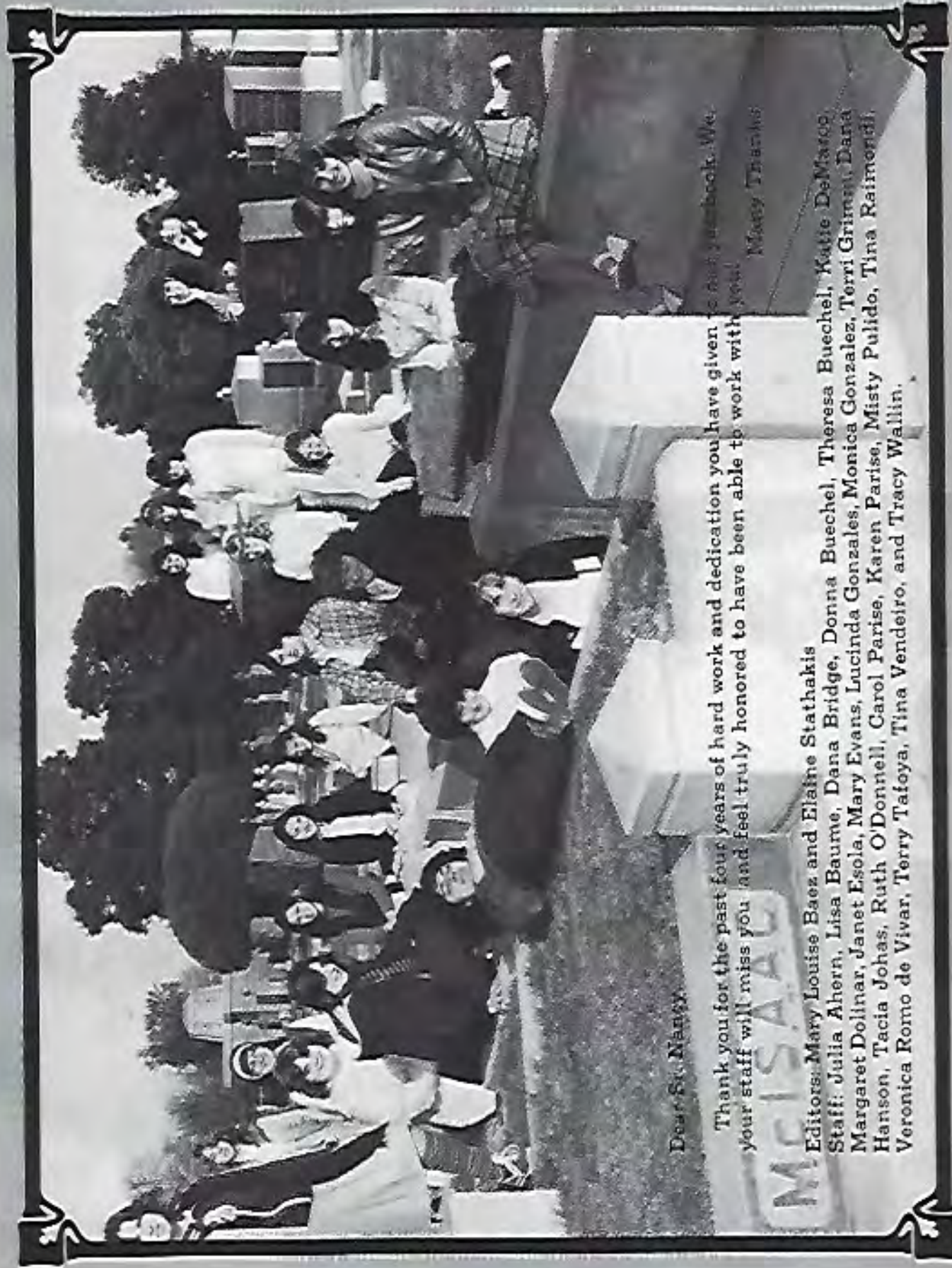
