Fair Gears For Holiday Weekend

A big Labor Day weekend at the 132nd year of the California State Fair starts tomorrow with an earlier-than-usual opening, 10 A.M., and a bevy of Camellia City entertainers, some of whom are appearing one time only at the 1974 exposition.

There's an added attraction over by the horses and the betting booths—a \$10,000 Camellia Stakes feature race.

And for the cooks and gardeners, The Bee's columnist, Mrs. Charles Coleman, will tell you all about growing and using herbs, at 1:30 and 6 P.M. in Building C of the Activities Complex.

Many of Saturday's entertainers represent the fair's effort to involve Sacramento people in the annual extravaganza at Cal Expo. Other California acts are scheduled for Saturday.

K. McClatchy and Bishop Manogue High Schools; the Roseville Jazz Ensemble; and Sundowners Square Dancers.

Also, 25 harbershop quartets will sing tomorrow night only at 8 outside Building C.

The popular State Fair Orchestra

will give two concerts—at 4:30 and 7:30 P.M. on the Lagoon Stage—and the State Fair Stage Band plays at 6 on the Plaza Stage.

Tomorrow is also a good time to catch the San Juan School Show at the Family Rest Plaza at noon and 2 P.M.; military bands galore; Penny Rogers's dance students in their first State Fair appearance; Britten, a Carmichael rock band; the State Fair String Quartet; Mary Ellen Dancers from San Jose; Moses, a gospel group; and, of course, the big Golden State Rodeo and the free fireworks.

Tonight's schedule features, in addition to the rodeo, the Caribbean revue, the New Horizon Singers from Loomis, The Clingers song and dance troupe and the nightly return to Vaudeville.

Attendance yesterday was 35,012, up 5,866 from the same day a year ago. Total attendance for 1974 is 335,697.

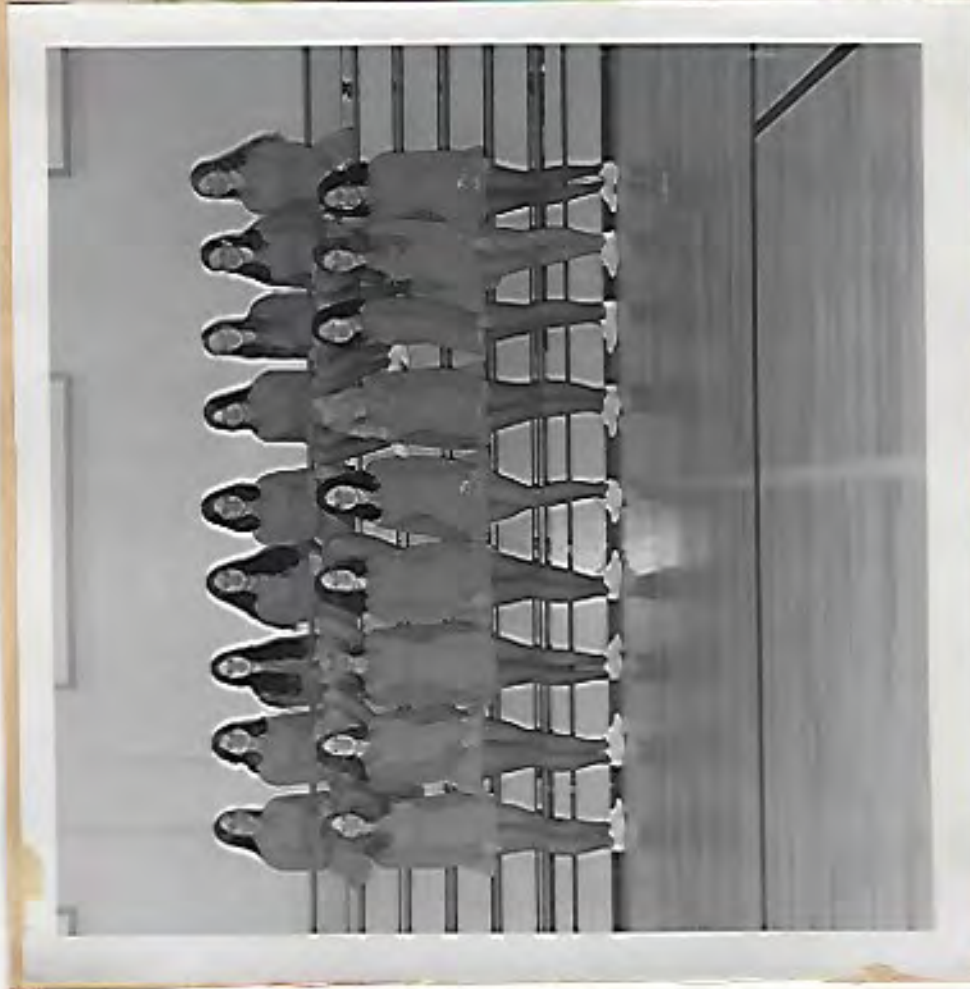

The ease with which Christian Brothers' basketball team handled the Jesuit Marauders last Saturday night had to come as a surprise to fans and players of both schools. A close match was expected. Brothers owned only one previous victory in their rivalry, that coming in 1969. Jesuit was ranked with a 12-5 record

compared to Brothers' unnoticed 10-8 mark. Jesuit had earned their way with balance of scoring while Coach Jack Witry's gang relied heavily on the area's second leading scorer, Rod Zanze, for a majority of their points. Stop Zanze and you stop Brothers, they said. But someone forgot to tell the little sharpshooter.

He hit his patented long

range bowitzer shots combined with some fantastic drives for a total of 29 points to end a personal four year frustration of being winless against the habitual basketball powerhouse that has never had a losing season. It was the third time this season that he has hit for 29 on the nose and for Brothers' fans it couldn't have come at a more opportune time.

His superlative efforts alone however would not have done the job. Doug Warren, a frail junior forward with a silk like touch, dropped in a season high of 21 points and it was his first half performance which kept the Falcons within striking distance at the intermission with a one point deficit at 34-33.

Hustling Brothers' guard Mark Gaytan had his best scoring night in 9 games as he hit for 10 and constantly kept pressure on the Red offense. That combined with Mike Wetklow's fine rebounding helped insure the anticipated close that turned into a laugh.

The Jesuit cause was not helped by the fact that they had played the night before, on the road yet, and had struggled to beat a Galt team that they are capable of beating with somewhat less effort. CBS, in contrast, had Friday night off. Two games in two nights is rough.

Lanky Bill Brody, a 6-6 junior forward, fitted a creditable performance with 17 tallies, his second highest of the season, his best of 18 coming the night before, giving him a nice weekend.

SHORT SHOTS Christian Brothers passing combo quarterback John Ramo and All American end Dan Farrell will team up again this summer's Optimist Star game against the boys from Northern California. Spring sports practices have commenced on the area campuses; hoping to vie with the best of them will be Christian Brothers' baseball team and Jesuit's swimming group. The latter will practice at Arden Hills, a likely place for a champion to train. They will be paced by national group champions Walt Hard and appropriately named Jeff Float. Both are all around swimmers and it is expected that Coach Bob Southward will get good mileage out of them in dual and big meet competition. Two others, Kirk Anderson and Bill Miller are of the same ilk versatile. Add to them freestyler Grant Heck and premier breaststroke Brian Reed and you have a group that could threaten for the section championship.



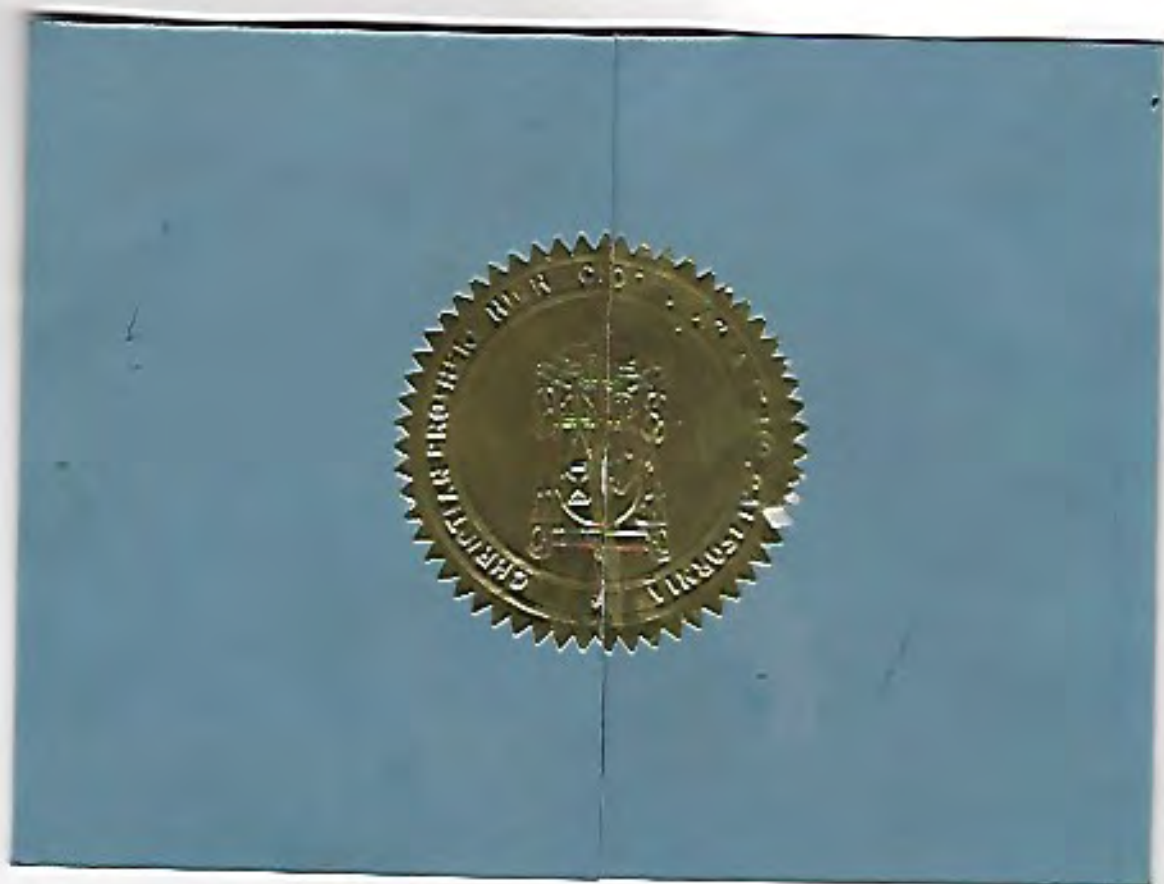

Sac Rips Brothers, 23-8

Senior running back John Ware terrorized Christian Brothers both on offense and defense Friday night to lead Sacramento to a 23-8 Metropolitan League win over the Falcons before 5,712 fans at Hughes Stadium.

Ware, whose brother Raymond was the rage of Sac High last season, scored two touchdowns while gaining 70 yards rushing and intercepted three passes, two leading to Dragon scores.

Ware had plenty of assistance on defense, though, from big defensive end Ralph DeLoach, who blocked a punt that resulted in a safety, had three quarterback sacks and knocked down two passes.

All of Sac High's first half points came as the result of CBS miscues. The Dragons opened the scoring on Ware's two-yard run, made possible four plays earlier when he intercepted a John Rame pass at midfield and returned it to the 13 of the Falcons.

Randy Wilson, the Falcon All-Metro prospect, then handled the ensuing kicks and the Dragons recovered scoring position at the 30 on first down. Jeff Manning connected with Mike Lambert for a first at the six. Two attempts at the middle failed and then Ware turned it on around right end after an inside fake to put the Dragons ahead, 13-0. Fred Dass' second conversion was good. With 36 seconds remaining in the half, DeLoach blocked a CBS punt, recovered in the endzone by CBS.

The momentum seemed to swing toward the CBS side after the half. Down 16-0, the Falcons scored after receiving the second half kickoff on a 15-yard pass from Rameriz to Dan Farrell, who avoided two would-be tacklers at the five. Rameriz then hit Dennis Kennedy for the two-point conversion to cut the Dragons' margin in half, 16-3.

Sac High fumbled on its next possession and the Falcons had another opportunity inside the 30 yard line of the Dragons. But on fourth and one from the 10, DeLoach, Dillon and Co. stopped Joe Greco shy of the first down marker and that caused Brothers head coach Dick Sperbeck to holler foul at the officials, who before measuring released the ball to the center of the field. "I've never seen anything like that in my life," Sperbeck related to the nearest ref.

The Dragons went on to fumble the next time they got the ball but the Falcons failed again to capitalize. A pass to Bob Wallace and Greco's slant off tackle netted 29 yards and the Falcons had a first at the nine. But two plays later, Kevin Ketchum stepped in front of a Rameriz pass in the endzone and returned it 101 yards for an apparent score, only to have it called back because of a personal foul on Sac High. Still, the Dragons were in possession at their own nine.

Ware's second pass interception highlighted the fourth period, a play which set up Sac's final touchdown. The Dragons put the finishing touch on with Tony Ayala's one-yarder and another Dass kick with 1:45 to go in the game.
