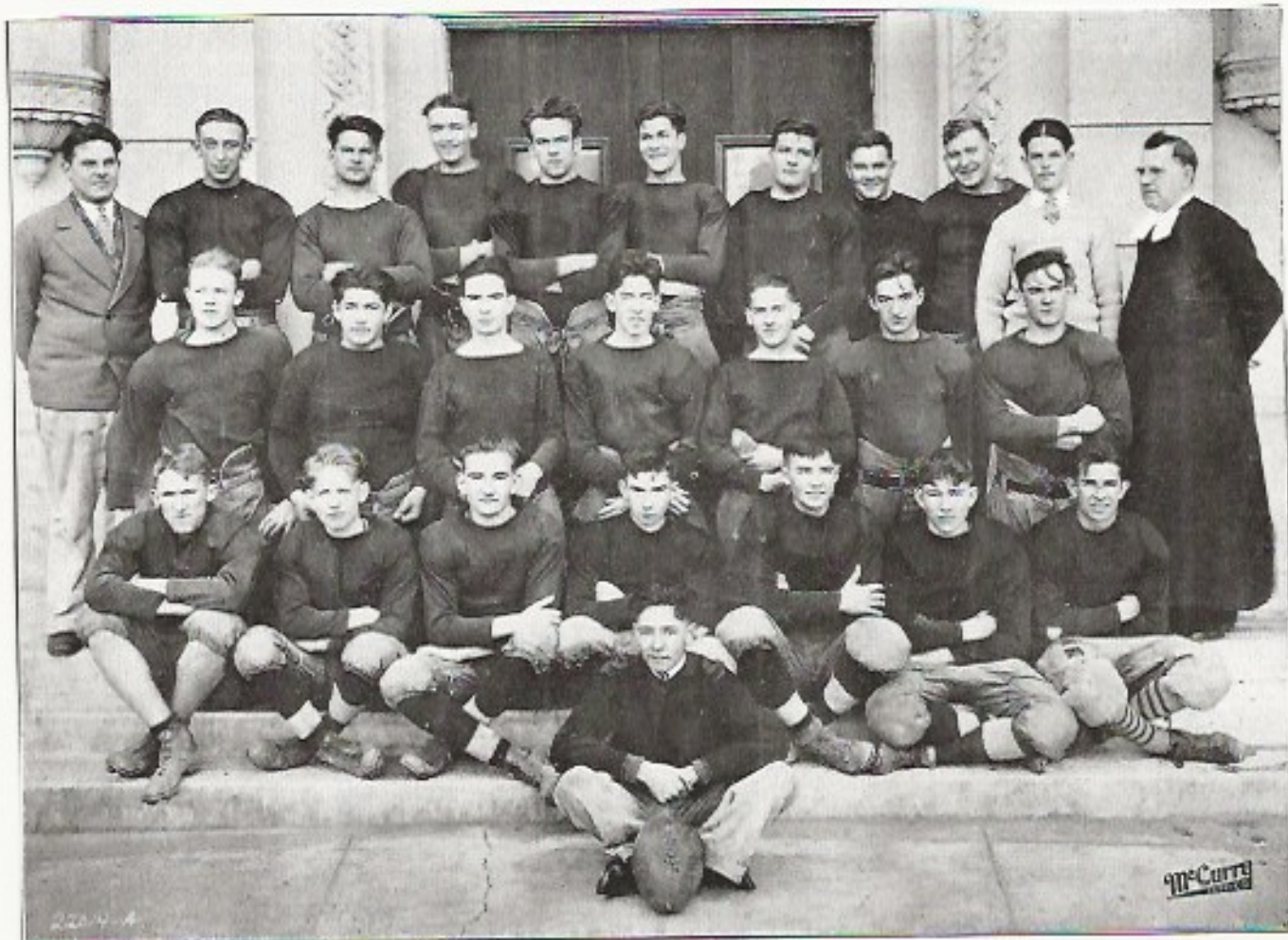


6—C. B. S. vs. Oroville—0
