An unusual attraction was added to the daytime fun, live checker game. With great incentive, Indians and Cowboys were "kinged" and "jumped" until the Indians won the match.





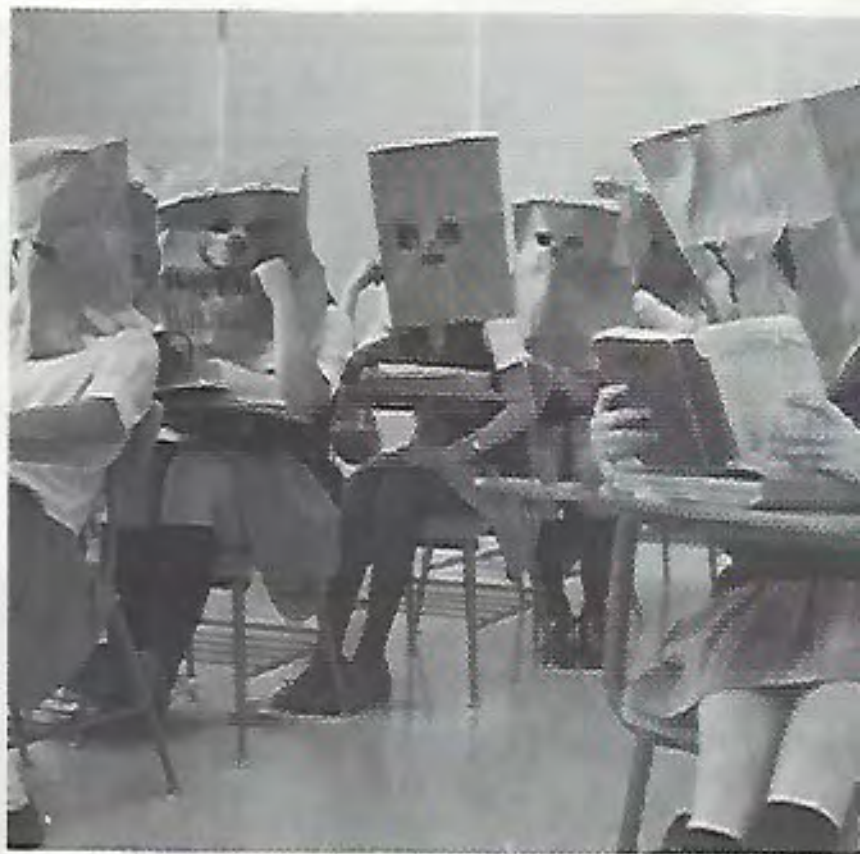
