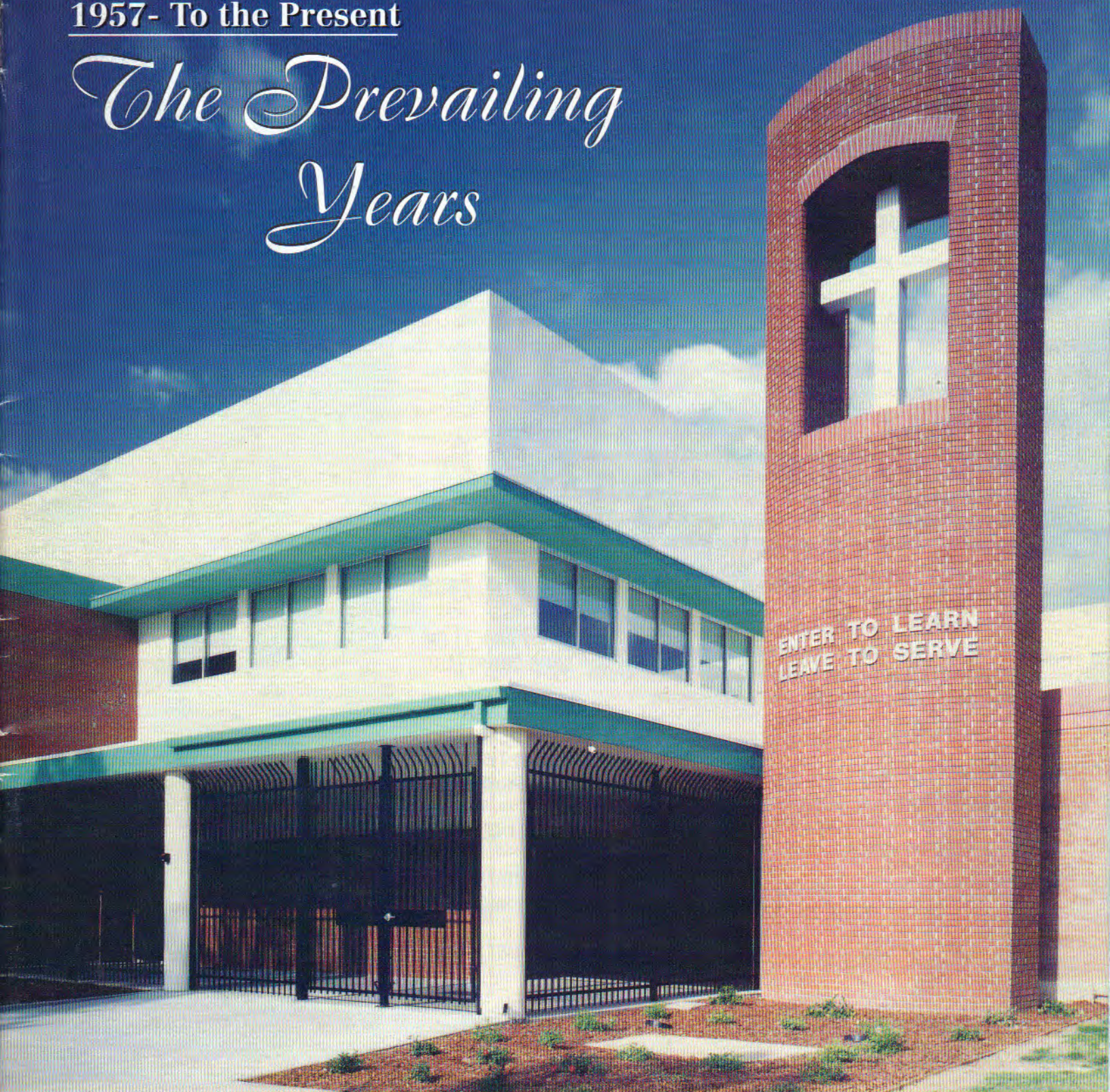

**C**hristian Brothers is a college preparatory secondary school.

With this graduating class, the class of 2002, we have students who have been accepted to Harvard, Stanford, Princeton, Saint Mary's, MIT, Northwestern, Santa Clara, Cal Tech, Purdue, Tulane, SMU, Loyola Marymount, Howard University, and many, many others.

Many of our students will attend California State University, Sacramento or Sacramento City College. The list goes on and on, but the point is solid. Christian Brothers is a college preparatory secondary school.

One remarkable fact – one senior from this year's graduating class is going into the military, a noble profession to be sure, and every other graduating senior will attend college.

We have read and heard a great deal lately about the difficulty of attaining admissions to the University of California and other top, prestigious universities. They call it Tidal Wave II – the coming of age of the children of the Baby Boomer generation. UC San Diego had 48,000 applicants for 3,500 freshman positions.

The competition is fierce. Some students have grade point averages in the 4.25 range. Today, students who take Advanced Placement and Honors Classes earn grade points higher than 4.0 – grade point averages that are recognized by the University of California system and most other leading universities. We Baby Boomers didn't have this opportunity.

One of the most difficult campuses in the UC System for admission is UCLA.

Enter Christian Brothers' seniors Christina Carrigan, Diana Nawi and Evan Nussbaum.

All three were accepted to UCLA because of a combination of high school preparation and unique talents. Christina auditioned with her trombone for the UCLA music education faculty. Diana submitted a portfolio of her artwork to the Art Department. Evan interviewed for the unusual major of ethnomusicology. Each of these young, Christian Brothers' graduates brought a unique set of skills and talents to the admissions effort.

Students would never get that far, however, if they were not prepared in a whole range of academic disciplines. Students must be competent in math, English, history, science, expository writing and critical thinking to even be considered for UC acceptance. Christina's, Diana's and Evan's hard work has paid off.

Ethnomusicology? I can barely spell it, but it did give Evan Nussbaum "an edge." And a huge congratulations to all of our 2002 graduates. A job well done.

**REMEMBERING OUR EARLY FEMALE STUDENTS**

**BISHOP ARMSTRONG HIGH SCHOOL**

For many years our late beloved Bishop Robert J. Armstrong recognized the need for expansion of catholic high school facilities in the Sacramento area. In 1954, there were three Catholic high schools in the City of Sacramento. Christian Brothers' High School (21st and Broadway), a four-year high school for boys. The two four-year high schools for girls were St. Joseph Academy High School (Ninth and G streets) and St. Francis High School (Twenty-sixth and K streets). From 1940 until 1954 no new high schools had been opened, yet the enrollment had soared, and of necessity many Catholic students could not be accommodated.

In the fall of 1955 the Diocesan School Board, with the Very Reverend Monsignor James D. Poole as chairman, under the direction of the Most Reverend Bishop Robert J. Armstrong, decided they could wait no longer. A drive for funds among the Catholic people within the City of Sacramento and its southern environs was made. Construction of the new high school was started in March 1956.

One of the most significant change to occur between 1956-1964 was the enrollment of female students at Bishop Armstrong High School. Their presence was invaluable to fellow students and staff. Boys and girls were on the same campus but never in the same classroom. ♦

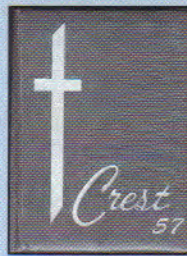

The Diocesan School Board decided to make Bishop Armstrong High School a co-institutional school for eleventh and twelfth grades only maximize utilization of the existing high school facilities for ninth and tenth grades, and to take advantage of financial economy in the provision for boys and girls in the eleventh and twelfth grades.

Bishop Robert J. Armstrong High School rests on a twenty-six acre site. It was dedicated by His Eminence J. Francis Cardinal McIntyre, Archbishop of Los Angeles, on March 24, 1957. The architect, Harry J. Devine, '46, received the Distinctive Design Award of 1959 from the Catholic Property Administration in cooperation with the National Catholic Educational Association. Total cost of the building and furnishings was approximately \$1,750,000. The school was originally designed to accommodate 1,000 students; however, this assumed the completion of the original plans of a music wing, home economics department, additional science laboratories, and girls' gymnasium.

His Excellency Bishop Joseph T. McGucken, was appointed coadjutor to Bishop Armstrong in 1955. Upon the death of Bishop Armstrong in January 1957, he became bishop and carried on the work. Staffing Bishop Armstrong High School were the Christian Brothers, Sisters of St. Francis, and Sisters of Mercy, together with members of the diocesan clergy, and lay men and women instructors. ♦

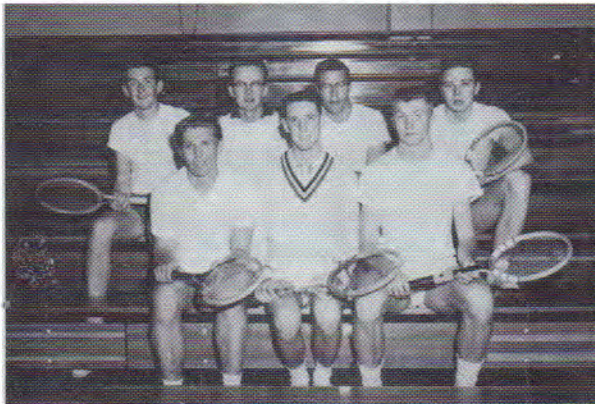

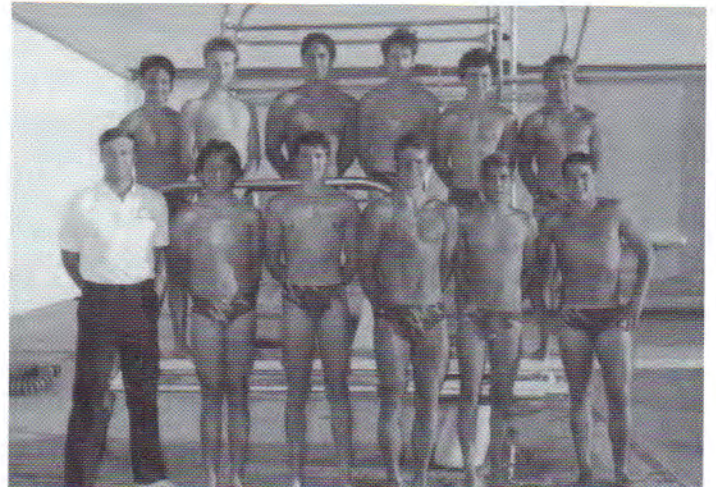

■ The faculty lounge has five work stations, equipped with faxes, copiers, and scanners. Teachers will be able to download internet resources and prepare lesson plans and Powerpoint presentations. They will have access to the central file server to download student grades and various information. All of the data ports are networked.

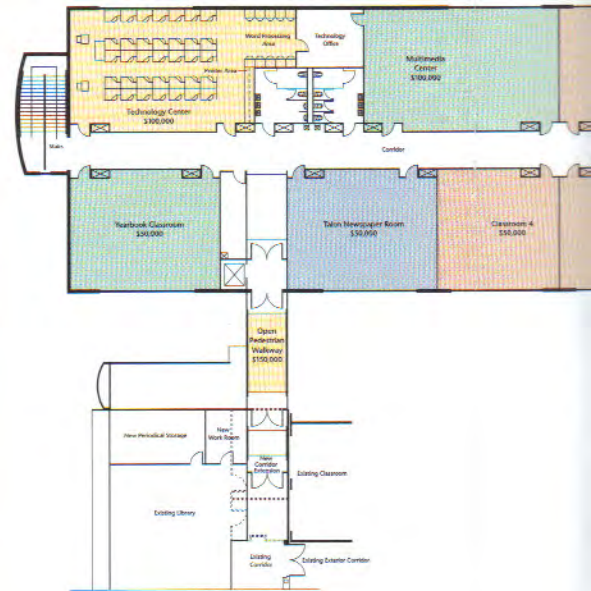

One of the best ways was to provide a means for helping CBHS, at least financially, in a significant way. So the Brother Bertram Society was formed for those who would name CBHS in their will or trust and then notify the Development Office. They would then get an extra benefit for their generosity by being invited to Brother Bertram Hall each year where they will warmly break bread with Brother Bert at a special dinner on his birthday. The first dinner was held 8 years ago.

Brother Bert is 87 years old and recently has had a second bout with cancer. In January 2001 he had radiation for cancer of the esophagus, which

cleared up in February 2001. This year he began chemotherapy for the cancer cells discovered in his lungs the day before Ash Wednesday, which he says allowed him to offer the chemo side effects for penance during Lent. He regrets not being able to be here for the exciting opening of the SMAT building but was present and spoke at the celebration of the 125<sup>th</sup> anniversary of CB. Twenty of his 70 years as a brother were spent in Sacramento between 1935 and 1986.

We invite all those who wish to show their love for him to join the Brother Bertram Society and share with others our appreciation by expressing a special, tangible, well-deserved recognition of what he has meant to the lives of so many. Through these gifts we will continue to honor him by supplementing his mission and providing an ongoing benefit to students who will inherit the effects of his legacy. All you need to do is to call the Development Office. ♦

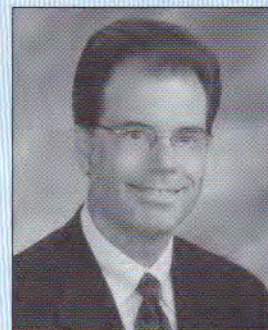
Our Lasallian Educator Award recipient has four sons all of who have graduated from Christian Brothers, Tom in

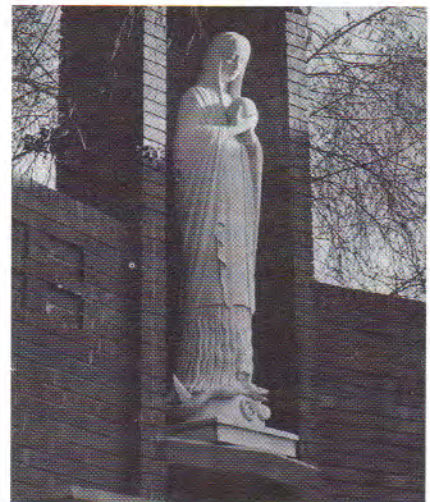

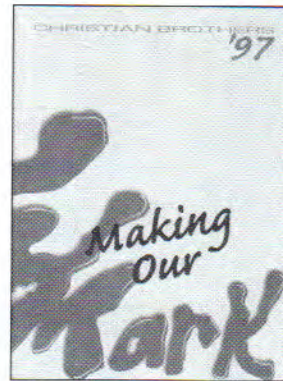

- bulk postage (200+) made available
- catering and hotel referrals and site materials
- campus availability: catered dinner on campus (in cafeteria or outside depending on the weather).

There is also a three page guide:

1. Decide on reunion format and date
2. The reunion committee give in-depth detail on what each committee member is responsible for and remember this can be one chairperson, as this keeps all the details funneled through one person.
3. Budget, which will help in the income and expenses and is very detailed as to all aspects of expenses.
