# Christian Brothers Upsets El Camino Eagles, 34-13

Unranked, un-noticed—but unbelievable, that's the Christian Brothers Falcons.

Dick Sperbeck's crew, overlooked by most in the pre-season league and section ratings, pulled a major upset Friday as they soundly trounced El Camino's highly-touted Eagles, 34-13, on the losers' field.

A crowd of more than 3,500 was on hand to watch the UNION's game of the week and Christian Brothers (formerly Bishop Armstrong) take command early, fall into a the only one, an then lead comfortably the rest of the way.

And from the looks of that CB ball club, perhaps it really wasn't that much of an upset, despite the fact that Hal Alton's Eagles are rated the No. 9 team in the section.

Rick Cabral, Falcon quarterback, did an extremely creditable job. Aid halfback Everett McMillan has to be one of the most dangerous runners in the area. Give him an inch, and he'll take a dozen yards.

McMillan scored the Falcons' first and last touchdowns, on runs of 14 and two yards, and also came up with a 19 yard TD reception from Cabral to break that tie

Falcons went the distance in seven plays, with flashy senior halfback Everett McMillan packing the ball across on a 14-yard sweep around right end.

Tim Clemens, son of Sacramento State football coach Ray Clemens, booted the extra point to make it 7-0 less than four minutes into the contest.

El Camino finally made the scoreboard later that same period, when Gary Wise picked up a fumble at the Falcons' 21. Two plays later, Bill Schauer completed a pass to Rich Moroy for 16 yards and the score. Schauer's PAT kick was good to knot the score at 7-all.

But then it was Christian Brothers' turn again, and quarterback Rick Cabral, un-noticed in most pre-season ratings, engineered an 11-play, 76-yard drive that was clinaxed by a 19-yard pass to McMillan for the score. Clemens' kick was wide to the left, leaving it 13-7, Falcons.

Then Sperbeck's crew scored "out of turn," again on a pass by Cabral.

# Ranked Christian Brothers Gets Past Cordova 6-0

Superior California's second ranked team, Christian Brothers, continued its winning ways by sneaking by the Cordova High School Lancers 6-0 in a nonleague contest yesterday on the losers field.

It was the Falcon's fourth straight victory. The loss dropped Cordova to 2-2.

A near-capacity crowd saw both teams fail to move the ball until late in the first period, when the Falcons started a drive on their 41. Everett McMullan led the attack with runs of four and 34 yards which brought the ball to the Lancer 22. After a penalty and an incomplete pass, quarterback Rick Cabral hit flankerback Kelly O'Connor with a 15-yard pass to put the ball on the two. Halfback McMillan then took a hand off from Cabral and plunged over left guard for the score.

The Falcon defense, which held the Lancers to 130 yards, squarbed. With only five minutes left to play in the game, Cordova drove deep into Falcon territory with the help of the speedy ground game of John Sierra and Arthur Solis. # Falcons Slip Past Pesky Cordova, 6-0

Christian Brothers' No. 1-rated Falcons ran into a determined bunch of Cordova Lancers Saturday afternoon, but managed to make a second-quarter touchdown stand up for a 6-0 non-league football game in a contest at Cordova's stadium.

Dick Sperbeck's Falcons, who are now 3-0 on the season, just edged past Dewey Guerrero's Lancers, the No. 8-ranked team going into the contest. Cordova now boasts a 2-2 mark, but a couple of breaks the Lancers' way could have produced a completely different picture.

Early in the third quarter, Cordova got all the way to the Falcons' nine before the CB defense tightened to stop Scott

Loughridge for no gain on a four-and-one play.

Then in the fourth period, the Lancers drove all the way to the Falcons' three before Art Solis piled into a solid wall of Christian Brothers linemen on a fourth-and-two, and wound up with a two yard loss and the Falcons in possession.

After a scoreless first period, Christian Brothers finally broke the ice with 11:16 remaining in the half.

Everett McMillan, speedy Falcons halfback, burst over left guard from the four to score the only touchdown of the first half. His plunge climaxed a seven-play, 59-yard drive that began on the Christian Brothers 41 second prior to the end of the first quarter.

After a short gainer by McMillan, he took a pitch-out around left end for 33 yards to

set the Falcons up on the Lancers' 22. An illegal procedure penalty against Cordova and another McMillan short gainer brought the ball to the 13 at the end of the period.

Then after the teams switched ends of the field, McMillan slipped up trying to go around right end and wound up with a five-yard loss. But on the next play quarterback Rick Cabral connected with Kelly O'Conner for 14 yards and a first-and-goal on the Lancers' four.

McMillan did the rest of the damage on the next play. O'Conner's extra point kick was blocked by Alan O'Brien and Scott Loughridge to leave it 6-0, Falcons.

# Falcons Chalk Up Big Win Over Dragons

For Christian Brothers and Jesuit High Schools, it has been a rewarding football season, but coach Dick Sperbeck figures a little more prosperity won't hurt.

Sperbeck's CBS Falcons, with a stunning victory over Sacramento High under their wings, make their bid for a Metropolitan League co-championship tonight when they battle the Kennedy Cougars at 7:30 in Hughes Stadium.

Jesuit has completed its schedule, winding up an "unofficial" second in the Golden Empire League race. Cordova finished atop the standings with a 5-0 record to Jesuit's 4-1, but the Lancers may be declared ineligible for the title.

### Issue Is Clouded

An investigation has been ordered to see if the Lancers did, indeed, use two out-of-district players this fall. It is probable they will be found guilty, thereby handing the crown over to the Merranders, even though Jesuit was beaten badly by Cordova in their league clash.

So, it is likely the Falcons will be denied a part of the co-championship, but they have some consolation in knowing they beat the club nobody else in the Metro could beat.

The Dragons' only previous loss was a one-pointer to El Camino, but Sacramento was operating with its star half-back and first-string quarterback on the sidelines with injuries.

CBS, which topped El Camino by 21 in a pre-conference clash, met the Dragons on offense at full strength, and it was quite a battle.

### Cabrera-Maita Might

Quarterback Rick Cabrera and end Bruce Maita hooked up to provide the tide-turning plays.

Cabrera's 27-yard touchdown pass to Maita with no time showing on the clock in the first half had to be the most crucial maneuver of the contest.

The winning points, however, were registered with a 40-yard TD pass from Cabrera to Maita with 3½ minutes left in the game. Everett McMillan and Dave Page ran for the other Falcon scores.

Tom Walsh gained 168 yards and also tallied. A Jim Daugherty to Mike Melanson pass accounted for the other Jesuit score.

The Jesuit sophomores won, 48-6, and finished the year with an 8-1 mark, pointing out that maybe even bigger things lie ahead for Marauder coach Mary Grim and staff.

Christian Brothers' underclassmen, who have won their championship, suffered their first loss to Sacramento sophs, 13-6.

Somehow Thursday night's prep football game at Hughes Stadium seemed a little unnecessary. Ridiculous at best.

Barely 300 persons showed up — including football players, hot dog sellers and one of the high school bands.

The Hughes Stadium turf was a sea of mud, dotted with islands of green.

It was so cold that everybody's breath was frosting — even those people inside the press box. And it was much warmer there than outside.

And speaking of outside, a steady wind blew in the open end of Hughes Stadium, carrying the driving rain horizontally across the field.

A hint of a bad night to come was an extra point try in the second period that flew a couple of yards into the wind, and

then 10 yards behind the kicker.

But somehow, they got the thing started, and when the mud had cleared at the end of four quarters, Christian Brothers' Falcons had come up with a 28-0 Metropolitan League football win over Kennedy

High's Cougars.

For Dick Spertbeck's mud-ders, the win boosted Christian Brothers' league record to 4-2. Just one-half game behind the two loop leaders, Johnson and Sacramento — and still gives the Falcons a remote hope of a three-way championship tie.

# Local preps football season begins

Speedy Bob Bingham returns to head the running backs whose corps includes a starting sophomore fullback in Joe Greco who only two years ago was being listed on our Provincial Athletic League honor roll as a St. Charles' running back. A surprise is that O'Neil is listed as a running back on the CB roster although he is not designated as a starter . . . studs of Bruce Nagurski, a defensive tackle and fullback.

Apparently there is quite a battle being waged for the starting quarterback spot as the lineup we received did not

list anyone at the position. It read "to be announced" like next week's late show. Chris Gandy and Jeff Tisdal are the only qb's on the roster and it was expected in most quarters that the former would seal down the position where he saw so much action last year while alternating with Steve Kitlas. But the soft throwing Tisdal apparently learned his trade well while leading the soph team for two years if the coaches are unable to name a starter at this date.

If the Falcons have a problem it may be with inexperience. The "probable" starting lineup names only four seniors: O'Neil, Cartwright, center Bill Pierson and defensive end Leon Marich among the offensive and defensive regulars. Three sophomores will take the field tonight; besides Greco there is Randy Wilson and Dan Farrell both of whom will start as wide receivers. Farrell, like Greco was receiving PAL accolades two seasons back as was another soph on the varsity roster, Gil Gonzalez. That leaves the bulk of the work up to juniors, but four of them were starters a year ago so they have the experience that would be Ragster, Bingham, Gandy and guard-linebacker Bill Boughton.

Of more concern to Big Red fans is what the new look in Jesuit football will be under new head mentor Bob Sevier and his staff which includes Mark Warren, a recent Sacramento State grad, and Frank Mooney who built nothing but champions at St. Patrick's for fourteen years.

Jesuit, too, has had solid teams in recent years, and like CBS will be in quest of their third consecutive title in the Golden Empire League, although they were a co-champion in 1971. They are favored to repeat but the circuit will offer strong entries in Ponderosa, Galt and Folsom.

The "Big Three" for the Marauders will be smooth quarterback Larry McGovern,

the best in the league; Dan Sacconi, the tackle who was named to the all-state team by California Football Magazine; and tough linebacker Dan McGinn who was all GEL as a soph but for some strange reason was overlooked in his junior season when Sacconi was the only Marauder named to the first 22 places in a year when Jesuit was co-champ . . . the politics of "all" teams.

Nevertheless that trio will form a solid core for Sevier's first team. Traditionally, Big Red has had little trouble with the Cougars but they may be a bit more ferocious this year with a new coach . . . they are the biggest school in the Capital Valley Conference. Take Jesuit and give 8 points.

Tatback Dave Schultz ran 90 yards with the opening kickoff as top-ranked Mira Loma High School beat second-rated Christian Brothers, 28-6, at American River College Friday night.

The Matadors overwhelmed the Falcons in the first half and scored in every period behind third string quarterback Jeff Welker. The junior QB threw two touchdown passes — one 13 yards and another four. The first and second string QB's didn't suit up.

Schultz, who raced 80 yards for a touchdown last week on

the first play from scrimmage, rushed for 78 yards overall to lead Mat runners. Mira Loma had 331 total yards, unofficially, and 16 first downs to the Brothers' 159 total yards and 11 first downs.

The Falcons scored in the third period with 5:43 left when junior QB Jeff Tisdell completed a 16-yard pass to 9.9 sprinter Bob Bingham. Randy McGillvary blocked the attempted point after and the Mats led, 14-6.

It took the Mats' Schultz 12 seconds to run 90 yards for the first touchdown. Mitch Henderson kicked the first of four point-after's.

The first play of the second quarter set up Welker's 13-yard aerial strike to McGillvary as Don Brown Jr., son of the Mat coach, intercepted a Jeff Tisdell pass at the Mira Loma 35 and returned it to the Falcons' 35. It took the Matadors six plays to score.

After CBS' touchdown, the Falcons tried an onside kick. It didn't work.
