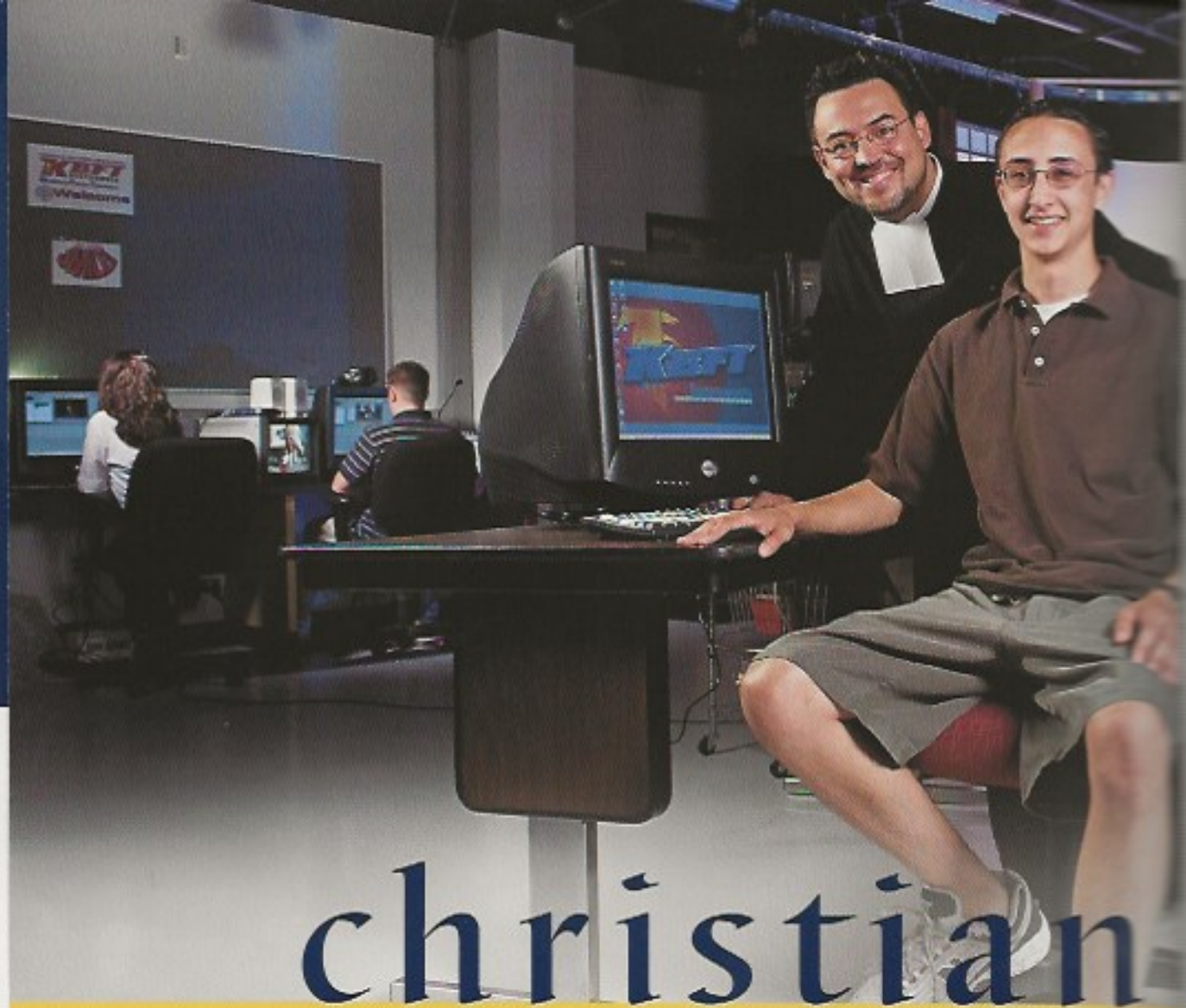

## FAITH, ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE, SERVICE AND COMMUNITY

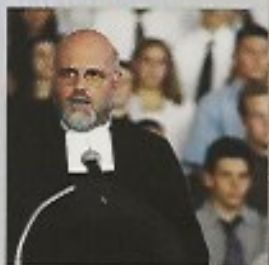
Christian Brothers High School was established in 1876 by the De La Salle Christian Brothers, a lay religious teaching order of the Catholic Church. The long tradition of Lasallian education dates back to 1680 when St. John Baptist de La Salle, a prominent French priest, founded the Brothers of the Christian Schools "to give a human and Christian education to the young, especially the poor."

Alert to the needs of his time, De La Salle was an innovator in the development of teacher training programs, as well as curriculum and pedagogical practices. He recognized that teachers stand in a providential and grace-filled relationship with students. De La Salle regarded the school as a faith community and envisioned teachers as "ministers of grace" who exercise their vocation daily by instructing young people in the principles of the Gospel, as well as rigorous academic programs.



## LIGHTS, CAMERA, ACTION

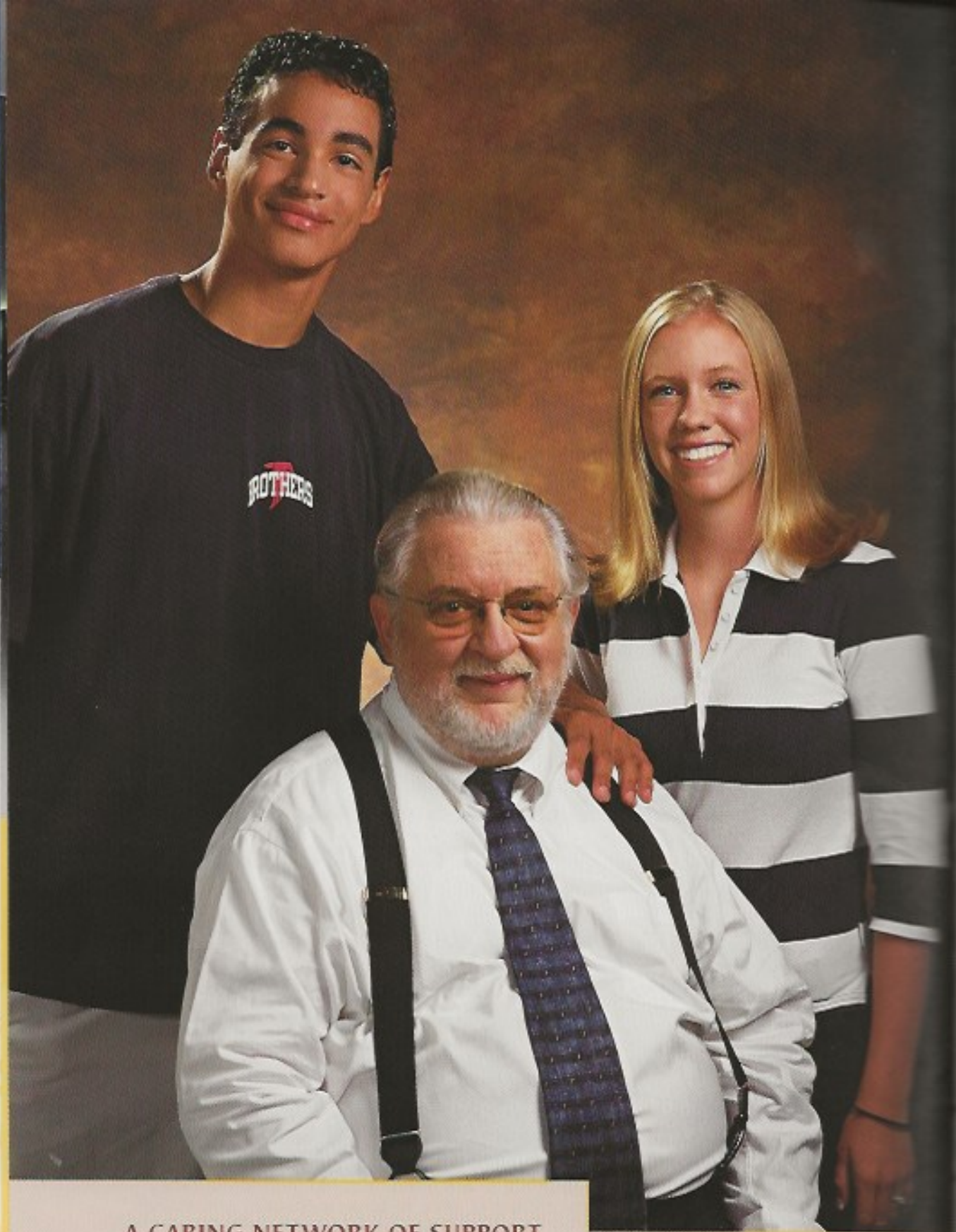

## tradition



John Baptist de La Salle was canonized a saint in 1900. Because of his extensive contributions to education, he was proclaimed the Patron Saint of all teachers of youth by Pope Pius XII in 1950.

For over 300 years, the Lasallian Brothers—who sponsor approximately 1,000 institutions of learning in 84 countries worldwide serving over 1 million students—have built a distinguished reputation of excellence in education, always in a nurturing, faith-filled environment. Christian Brothers continues this tradition of giving students the necessary tools to shape their future. By offering an extensive liberal arts curriculum that exceeds university entrance requirements, graduates have every opportunity to reach their academic and personal goals. Of Christian Brothers' 2002 graduates, 99 percent enrolled in college, including admission to some of the most prestigious universities and colleges in the nation.



## A CARING NETWORK OF SUPPORT

## FACULTY

Christian Brothers' educators see their work as a vocation, not as a job. Working with students who have high goals and high spirits takes preparation, dedication and compassion – the heart of Christian Brothers' educational philosophy. Teachers take time to meet individually with students and parents to answer questions and provide assistance. All teachers keep regular office hours, and their time and patience help every student become a contributing member of the Christian Brothers community.

# leadership

## GUIDANCE COUNSELING

Each student receives strong support from the guidance and counseling department. Four full-time, professionally trained counselors respond to the needs of students in personal issues, academic performance, college and career testing/planning, and substance abuse prevention/education. College exploration and planning resources include an extensive College and Career Center in Br. Edward Hall, including access to Internet-connected computers and site-licensed Web programs such as MyRoad.com, a comprehensive college/career resource.

In addition, counselors visit classrooms regularly with academic and college planning information, present informational evenings for parents at each grade level, and administer and assist in interpreting the COPS, PLAN, PSAT, SAT I & II, and ACT tests. The guidance department hosts a College Fair for students with 60 colleges represented and hosts between 40 and 50 individual college representative visits to the campus each year. Counselors meet individually with students and schedule appointments with parents and students to assist in college planning. The guidance department's section on the CBHS Web site is updated daily with important college news and information. Christian Brothers graduates are regularly recruited by highly selective colleges because of their achievements in academics, the arts, and athletics.

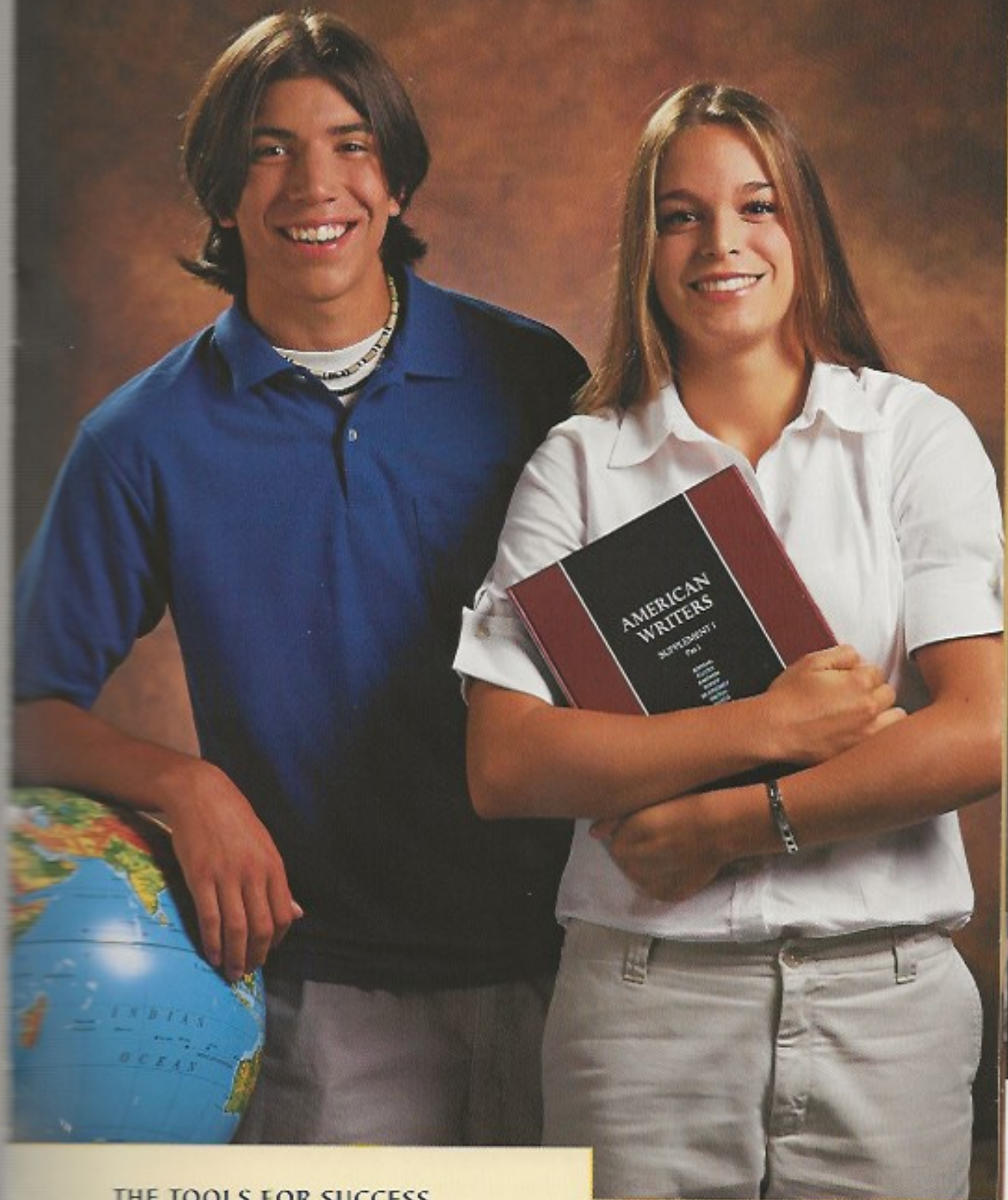

## THE TOOLS FOR SUCCESS

*The core curriculum of Literature, Composition and Social Studies at Christian Brothers puts a strong emphasis on reflective thinking, critical analysis and writing abilities. Possessing the academic skills necessary for success in college, career and lifelong learning enables students to participate in civic affairs and a global society.*

## SCHOLAR PROGRAM

The Scholar Program is for the highly motivated student who has demonstrated academic achievement and continues to seek intellectual challenges.

Students involved in this program continue to develop their strengths and their passions for learning through a variety of opportunities both inside and outside the classroom.

The program focuses on team building, leadership and Christian service, with opportunities to serve the Christian Brothers High School community and greater Sacramento area. Scholars who complete the program receive special recognition at graduation. Transcripts sent to colleges identify Scholar students. Activities which enhance their high school experience and college admission possibilities include:

- Frosh Ropes Course
- Workshop or Guest Speaker – one per semester
- Leadership Retreat
- Partial funding for summer enrichment programs
- Assistance in finding summer internship placements
- Monthly meetings
- Annual Welcome Dinner for parents and scholar students
- Annual Scholar Recognition Dinner

### HOW TO APPLY

Interested students must write a letter expressing interest in the Scholar Program and submit it with their application for admission to Christian Brothers High School.

The student requests letters of recommendation from two 8th grade teachers who can accurately describe the academic merit and potential of the applicant. Teachers send these directly to the Admissions Office.

Once the High School Placement Test results are returned, interested candidates will be contacted to schedule interviews. Interviews are held in late May and early June. Each candidate will be interviewed by the Scholar Program coordinators and by students currently in the program. Candidates are notified of their acceptance into the scholar program by the end of June.

### WHAT IT OFFERS

Through monthly meetings, the Scholar Program provides a supportive learning community for students who have chosen to enroll in this exceptionally rigorous academic program. Older students, as well as faculty coordinators, share their experiences and wisdom with younger students. The activities bring students further opportunities to learn, serve, and lead. Students who complete the Scholar Program are positioned to be highly competitive for admission to the most selective universities in the country.

## SUMMER SESSION

Summer Session is a highly concentrated course of study which offers diverse opportunities for a wide range of students. Pre-high school courses are designed for students completing the 7th or 8th grades who would benefit from additional work in language arts, mathematics, or reading. High school course offerings provide an opportunity for students to earn additional semester units in both core requirements and elective course work. In addition, remediation course offerings fulfill deficient credits and allow students the means to remain on track for completing the required college preparatory curriculum of the regular school year. An Enrichment Program designed for students in grades five through eight combines a morning of academic activities ranging from musical theater and art to math, science, and foreign language, with the afternoon devoted to organized sports mini-camps and games. The summer program also offers prospective athletes a variety of Sports Camps to enhance student athletic performance and ability.

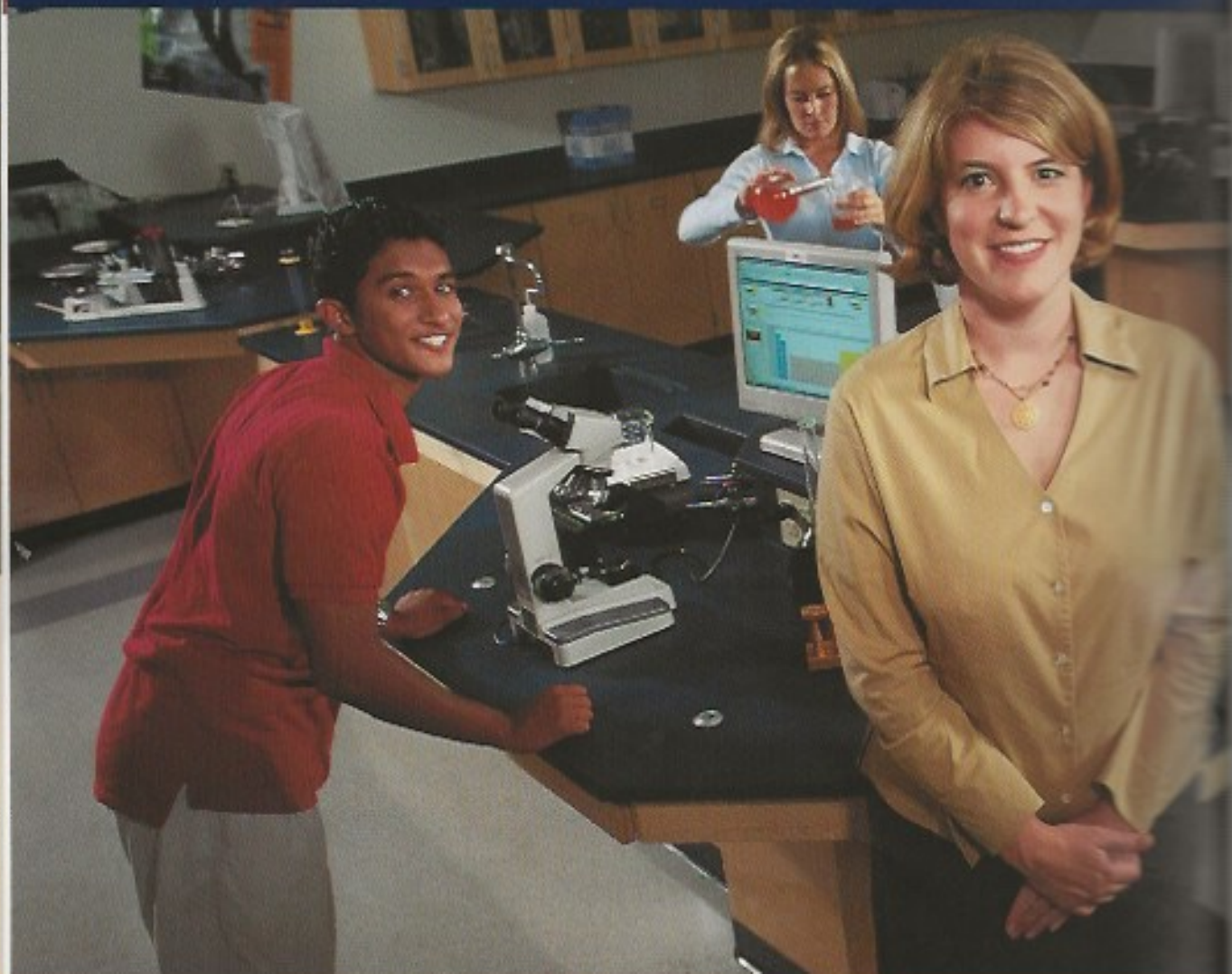


## THE BEST TOOLS FOR LEARNING

*The addition of the new Science, Math and Technology wing provides Christian Brothers' students with state-of-the-art facilities for learning. Biology, chemistry, physics, mathematics, communication technology and computer science are taught in labs that bring students into a new era for learning, research and scientific experimentation.*

## STUDENTS ACHIEVING GREATER EDUCATIONAL SUCCESS (SAGES) PROGRAM

The SAGES program was established to broaden the Christian Brothers' commitment offering struggling students an opportunity to achieve academic excellence. Included in the 285 students admitted to the ninth grade each year is a group of students whose academic skills are below Christian Brothers' admissions standards but who exhibit exceptional motivation and promise. SAGES is not a special educational program, and students do not apply to the SAGES program. Potential SAGES students are identified by the Admissions Team upon review of completed application files. Interviews with students and parents are conducted by the SAGES teachers, who make recommendations for acceptance to the Admissions Team. Only 20 students are admitted each year. With dedicated teachers providing a structured and supportive learning environment, the SAGES program provides 11 months of intense skill development, beginning with the Summer Session prior to the Freshman year. Students must successfully matriculate into the regular Sophomore curriculum in order to continue at Christian Brothers.

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## FINE AND PERFORMING ARTS

Christian Brothers' Fine and Performing Arts Department provides all freshmen with the opportunity to enroll in Introduction to Art, Freshman Choir or a band class. Many students continue refining their skills in advanced courses in studio art, instrumental or choral music and drama.

**THE ART PROGRAM** offers a variety of courses, including an introductory class that develops skills in drawing, painting, composition, design and color theory. Additional art courses focus on advanced techniques. Students may also pursue interests in Three-Dimensional Art and Ceramics. Each fall, Christian Brothers exhibits student artwork at a local coffee shop or gallery. Every spring, the La Salle Art Exhibit is held to showcase the best works of our students. Student art has also been presented in various venues throughout Sacramento, including the Crocker Art Museum and the California State Fair.

**THE THEATER PROGRAM** offers extensive opportunities for students in a variety of performance activities. Throughout the year, students engage in acting, directing and technical work in four major theatrical productions as well as numerous minor productions. Each year a full-length drama, a Broadway-style musical, a compilation of one-act plays, and an entry into the Lenaea Festival competition comprise the busy school year production schedule. Additionally, special events such as "Open Mic" nights provide even more opportunity for student participation. Christian Brothers offers a U.C. accredited drama class to students needing performing arts curriculum.

**THE MUSIC DEPARTMENT** offers classes for both instrumentalists and vocalists. The instrumental programs provide beginning instrument instruction, classical style development and courses that explore the intricacies and complex rhythms of jazz and improvisation. Choral singers learn proper vocal techniques and versatility while singing classical, jazz and pop styles. Class sizes range from small jazz choir to large concert choir. At least three concerts are performed each year for both instrumental and choral groups. Advanced students participate in local, regional and state competitions, such as the Golden Empire Festival.



## A PLACE FOR ARTISTIC EXPRESSION

*Christian Brothers' commitment to the performing arts is evident in its outstanding roster of four school choirs, four school bands, four annual school play productions and numerous art exhibitions both on and off campus.*



## CAMPUS MINISTRY AND CHRISTIAN SERVICE LEARNING

The foundation of the Lasallian educational mission is the spiritual development of students. The God-given gifts and talents of students flourish in the Campus Ministry and Christian Service programs. Campus Ministry provides liturgies, prayer, a four-year retreat program, and a dedicated group of students known as Lasallian Youth who, in conjunction with other students in Lasallian schools throughout the United States, organize and participate in service activities and charity drives at Christian Brothers.

Faith in action and service to God are experienced by serving others through the Christian Service Program. All students complete 25 hours of service each year. Through the opportunity to serve others, students discover their own purpose in life. Becoming intellectually competent while using one's gifts and talents to serve others and build up the kingdom of God are seen as the defining characteristics of a Christian Brothers' education.

## ATHLETICS

The education of our students extends beyond the classroom into the athletic arena. We have a dedicated group of coaches who are committed to enhancing the overall experience of our student-athletes while adhering to strict eligibility requirements. Our coaching staff works closely with athletes and teachers to maintain high standards for all student athletes.

Over the years our athletic programs have established themselves among the area's most competitive. Besides capturing multiple championships in the Sierra Valley Conference, we also recently won numerous Sac-Joaquin Section Titles in both girls' and boys' sports. We expect to strengthen our athletic tradition for many years to come.

Since we encourage all of our students to participate in athletics, we are proud to offer 20 different sports. Many of our student-athletes have been rewarded for their efforts with athletic scholarships. ## ADMISSION

Christian Brothers invites a wide range of students to apply to its college preparatory programs. The 285 students accepted to the 9th grade every year include those who qualify for the Scholar Program, college preparatory courses and 20 students in the SAGES program who will reach the college preparatory level by their Sophomore year. Christian Brothers seeks to admit students from Catholic elementary schools, students of families presently enrolled, those of alumni and those from other religious institutions and public schools. Since applications exceed the space available, each applicant must follow the procedure and timeline noted on this page to increase their chances of admission.

# apply

### CIF OPEN ENROLLMENT POLICY

Enrollment in Christian Brothers High School is open to all students who meet the academic and other admission standards as set forth in the Parent Student Handbook and who make the financial commitment to pay tuition and fees as set by the Administration.

Any student transferring from another school to Christian Brothers High School will have immediate residential eligibility to participate in CIF affiliated athletic activities at Christian Brothers High School subject to the following limitations:

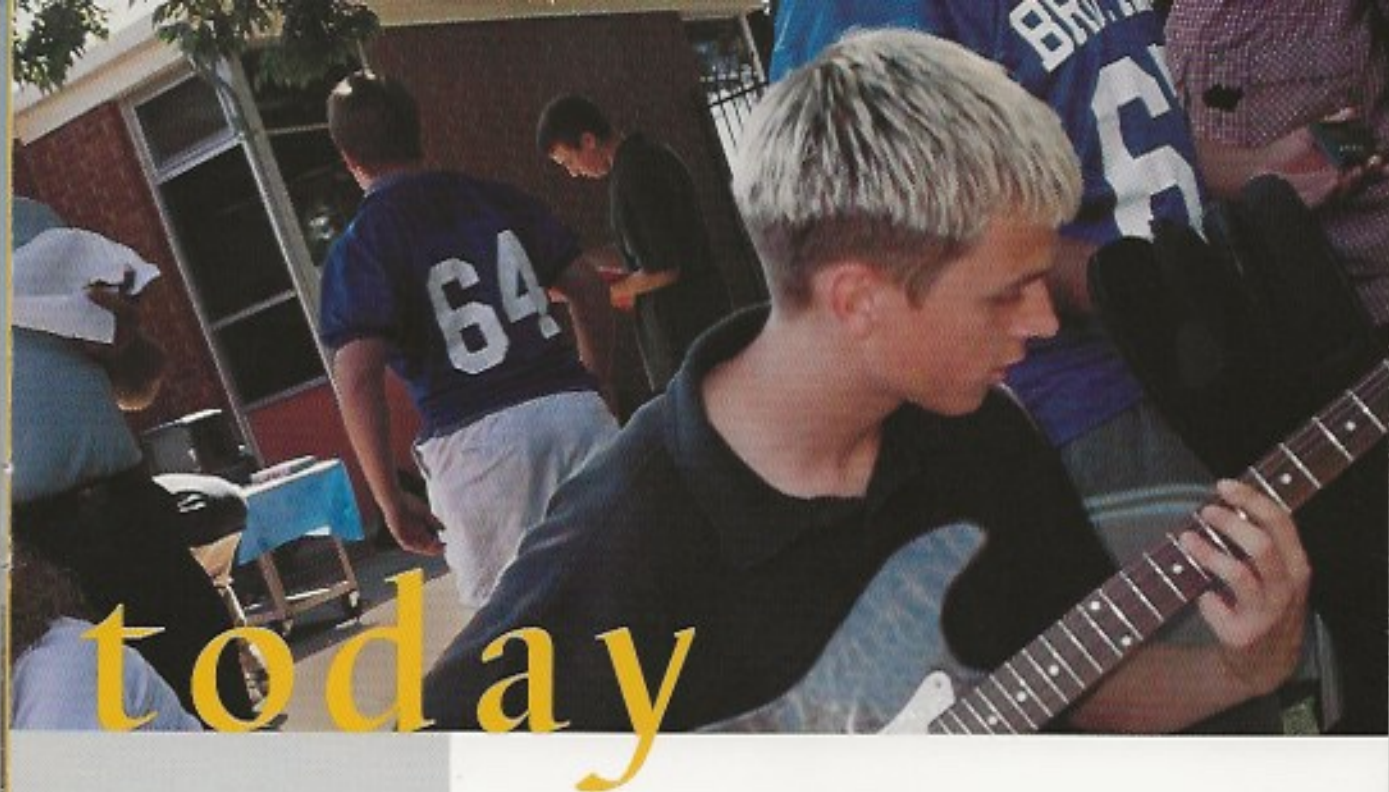
- Only one transfer is allowed during the student's high school career after the initial enrollment as a 9th grader in a four-year high school, or as a 10th grader in a three-year high school.
- The registration process for Christian Brothers High School must be initiated by May 15 of the prior academic year.
- The transfer may not be a result of disciplinary action.
- No consideration will be given to the athletic performance of the student in accepting a transfer to Christian Brothers High School.

If you have any questions regarding our athletic programs or eligibility, please give us a call at 916-733-3670.

*The criteria used for considering a 9th grade student for admission include:*

- High School Placement examination results;
- 6th–8th grade academic, conduct and effort grades, and standardized test results from elementary or middle school;
- a writing sample (completed during the placement exam);
- a confidential teacher evaluation (this form is given to each applicant at the time of the placement examination);
- information provided in the parent and student questionnaires, and interviews where appropriate;
- final 8th grade transcript.

This information is used to determine if an applicant can succeed in the college preparatory curriculum of Christian Brothers. Letters of recommendation are required for those applying to the Scholar Program.



After the admission committee reviews all completed application files, letters of admission are mailed by the first week of April.

Christian Brothers does not discriminate on the basis of gender, race, color or racial or ethnic origin in the administration of its education policies, admission policies, scholarship and loan programs and athletic and other school-administered programs.

## IMPORTANT DATES

- Take the Placement Examination at Christian Brothers, scheduled for **the last Saturday in January**. This examination is required of all applicants for the 9th grade.
- Complete the Application including the Parent/Student Questionnaire and submit it to the Christian Brothers' Admission Office by **the second week in February**. (Applications received after this deadline will be processed on a space-available basis). You can obtain an application at the school office or by mail.
- **Teacher Evaluation Forms and Transcript Request Forms** are distributed to each applicant on the day of the required placement examination. Deliver Transcript Request Forms and the Teacher Evaluation form to elementary/middle school personnel. These forms must be forwarded by the elementary/middle school and received by Christian Brothers by **the third week in February**.
