Falcons Wreck Lions 21-0 Behind Mikacich, Mooney

Jim Mikacich, Dick Mooney and the Bishop Armstrong Falcons, who could go into business as the M&M Wreckers and Company, last night did a 21 to 0 leveling job on the C. K. McClatchy High School Lions before 3,800 football fans at Hughes Stadium.

The win was the third in a row for John Stremple's undefeated parochial prepsters and their second in two seasons over the Lions.

Awesome Display

While the Falcons as a unit turned in by far their most impressive performance, it was the awesome display of power football as presented by Mikacich and Mooney which had a host of Northern Interstate Conference scouts bug eyed.

Armstrong will open its NIC campaign one week from tonight at Edmonds Field against Red Bluff. And Spartan coach Chuck Sharpe and his crew were plenty busy last night.

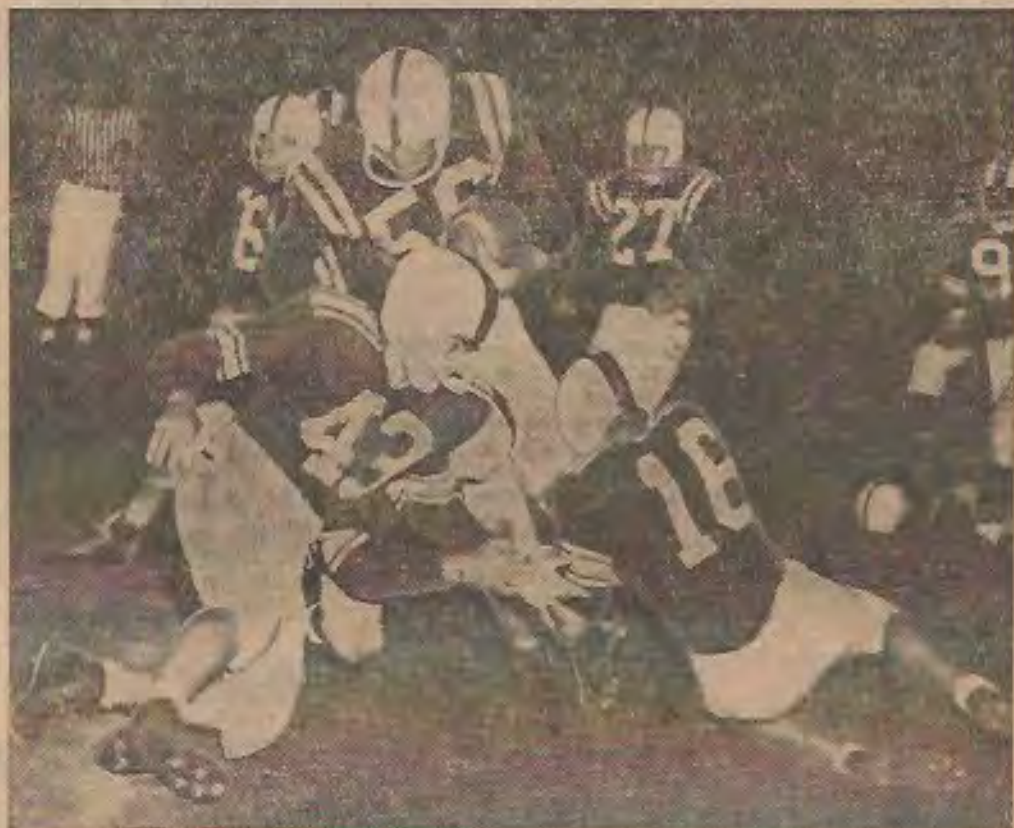
So were the Falcons. A succession of penalties prevented them from scoring in the opening quarter but they rammed over two touchdowns in the second stanza.

After taking over on the Lions' 38 following an exchange of punts, the Falcons went across in five plays. Tom Stinson, who likes the booting play and looks good at it, rolled out to his left and ran for 21 yards.

Draw Penalty

Then it was Mooney, who scored all of the Armstrong touchdowns, pinned for a five yard loss by Finnius Hurdle, but getting six of them back and then two more. Stinson chucked a pass to Mikacich who went over, but the play went over, too, because the Falcons were penalized 15 for holding.

That made little difference as Stinson southpawed a pass to Mooney down the middle on the 15. Mooney headed for the corner and outran three defenders for a 6 to 0 Armstrong edge with 4:52 remaining in the half. Mikacich converted.

The Lions, after gaining a first down, stalled, and kicked back to Armstrong with 1:50 left. Stremple's charges refused to be conservative and struck in just two plays.

Razzle Dazzle Pass

It was a razzle dazzle pass from Ron Garcia, switched to fullback for the one play, to Arlen DiBartolo, which moved the ball 34 yards to the Lions' 34. Mooney, behind good interference, went the next 34 for the touchdown. Again Mikacich kicked the extra point.

The Falcons' final TD came with 1:20 to go in the third period after the Lions fumbled on their own five. Mooney went over from the one and

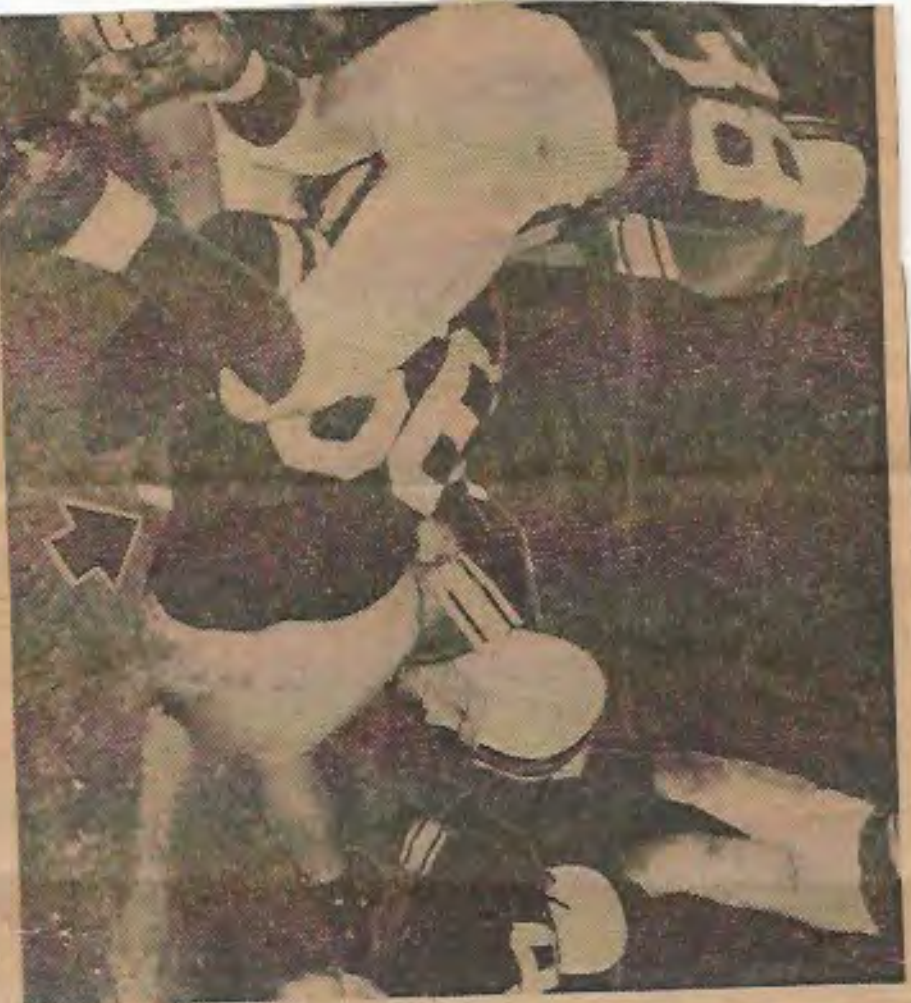
keeper. The mixture of Mikacich on the loose and Bob Galiss' long right arm was

The 205 pound Mikacich, used sparingly during the first half after missing the first two games with a fracture of his thumb, spearheaded a pair of Falcon drives, one of which went all the way for the win-

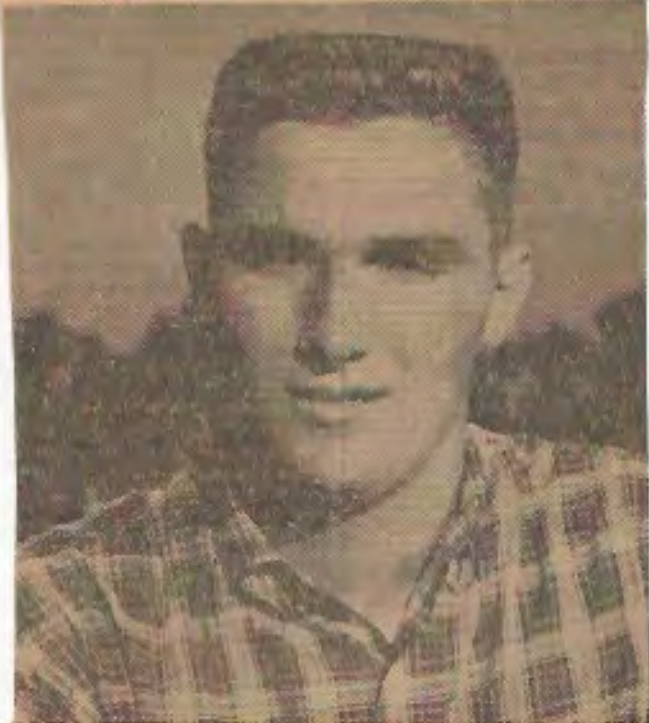

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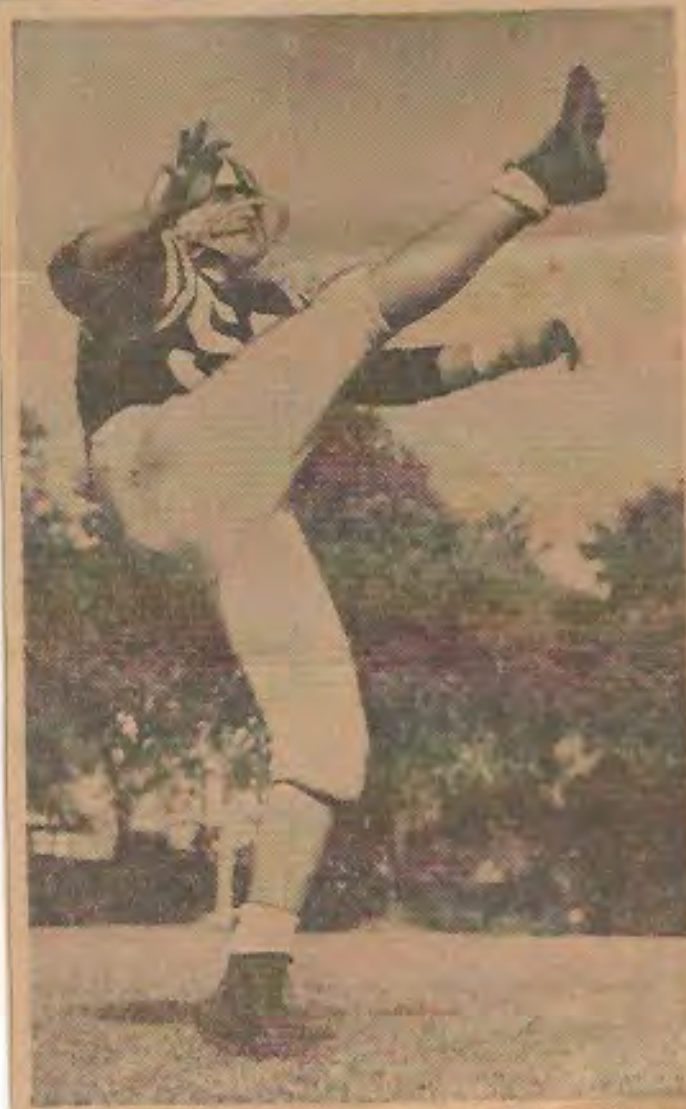

Mikacich Of Falcons Gets Shrine Berth

Jim Mikacich, two time all city fullback from Bishop Armstrong High School, has been selected to play in the seventh annual Shrine Football Game July 30th in the Los Angeles Coliseum.

Other Superior California prep gridlers who will perform for the North squad are tackle Carl Overstreet and end Dave Washington of Oroville and fullback George Pierevich of Jackson.

The players were picked Saturday by sportswriters who comprise the All Northern California Shrine Football Selection Committee.

Excels As Linebacker

Mikacich, 6-2, 205 pounds, is rated as a better than average fullback, but he excels as a defensive linebacker. Although big Jim has gained a modest 694 yards in two seasons, he has been called upon to collect the tough yardage needed for the first down. He averaged better than five yards a crack.

Cocoaches Fred Moffett of Berkeley and Johnny Johnson of Oroville no doubt will have uses for Mikacich besides the fullbacking and linebacking chores. Mikacich, during 1957, made good on 21 of 29 extra point attempts and punted for an average of better than 30 yards.

Jim Mikacich Is Honored As North, South Tie

LOS ANGELES—Sixty-five thousand football fans today know why Notre Dame is giving Sacramento's Jim Mikacich the full treatment in South Bend. The 6-2, 205 pound fullback from Bishop Armstrong High School last night was named the outstanding player in the seventh annual Shrine North-South football game after keying the North to an 8 to 8 draw, the first time in the history of the prep game-or classic.

Big Mik, twice all city as a fullback and linebacker, put on an awesome display of blocking and tackling and was voted the award by sportswriters in the Coliseum press-box.

Biggest Play

His biggest play was the recovery of a South fumble on the North nine in the second quarter. The north had an 8 to 0 lead at the time.

Mikacich, playing the quarterback or blocking back role in a single wing for the first time, looked like the spot was made for him. Defensively he made tackle after tackle from his middle linebacking post.

The game was not the most spectacular of the series, especially in a scoreless second half featured by fumbles and poor punting.

Mikacich Is Surprised And Happy Over Game Award

LOS ANGELES—Jim Mikacich, the outstanding athlete from Sacramento's Bishop Armstrong High School, was surprised he had been judged the outstanding player of the North-South Shrine football game which ended in an 8 to 8 tie.

Mikacich will report Monday to the California Aggies campus in Davis to prepare for the Sacramento Valley All Star football game, August 16th at Hughes Stadium in the Capital City.

Jim, who also played baseball and basketball as a prep, is headed for Notre Dame.

Fred Moffett of Berkeley and Johnny Johnson of Oroville, North coaches, said they were not surprised at anything the South tossed at them.

"They were every bit as tough as we expected them to be," they agreed.

The coaches believe Mikacich deserves his outstanding player award but added the entire defensive unit turned in a strong effort.

They had especially nice things to say, in that respect, about Jackson's linebacker, George Pierovich; Oroville's end, Dave Washington, and Acalanes' tackle, Stuart Busby.

Pierovich, a 205 pounder who tore apart the Mother Lode League last fall, was not too fond of playing the single wing but otherwise he had no complaints. He and Mikacich accounted for the majority of the North tackles.

Scores Early

The North got its score the second time it had possession as the single wing club powered 49 yards in 10 swipes. Jim Josephson, the all America from Bellarmine of San Jose, hit right tackle for seven, tailback Don Kasso of Berkeley collected a first down with three over right guard.

Vallejo end Jim Swindle went for three on an end around, Kasso went for one, and Claude Crabb of Monterey, No. 2 tailback at the game's outset, fired for 21 yards to Ed Whittle of Berkeley for a first and 10 on the 14.

Kasso hammered left tackle for four, Swindle went straight ahead for seven and Josephson tried the same spot for nothing. On second and three Josephson got the snap, looked both ways, then went to his right and found the corner for the TD with 33 seconds left in the quarter.

From the T formation Crabb ran wide to his right for the extra points. The two represented the first double extra point in a major football game as the preps were playing 1958 college rules which will have the two for one gimmick on any conversions scored via pass or run.

Stops Attack

The South, with a three-some of Alan Shields, Harold Tobin and Craig—the all CIF player of 1957—grinding out yardage, went from its own 36 to the North nine before Mikacich took the ball away from the Rebels.

But when Kasso fumbled three plays later, the South was back on the attack and had scored in two tries. Tobin went three yards over right guard to make it 8 to 6.

A pass from Pete Yodar to Kent Peterson knotted the score with three minutes to go in the half and produced the biggest controversy of the game. Peterson juggled the ball and finally let it slip to the turf but it was ruled he had possession.

Ruin Chances

Fumbles by Josephson and Jerry Scatini ruined North in the third quarter. There were no real score threats mustered by either team in the second half.

Other Superior Californians who did their part in the game were George Pierovich, Jackson, who played little fense but was in on defense virtually all of the plays; a Carl Overstreet, Oroville, who played guard and tackle on offense and defense; and Dave Washington, also of Oroville, who played well both ways. Halfback Don Delzer of Los Angeles and Norm McLean, Dunsmuir tackle.

The attendance was 65,000.

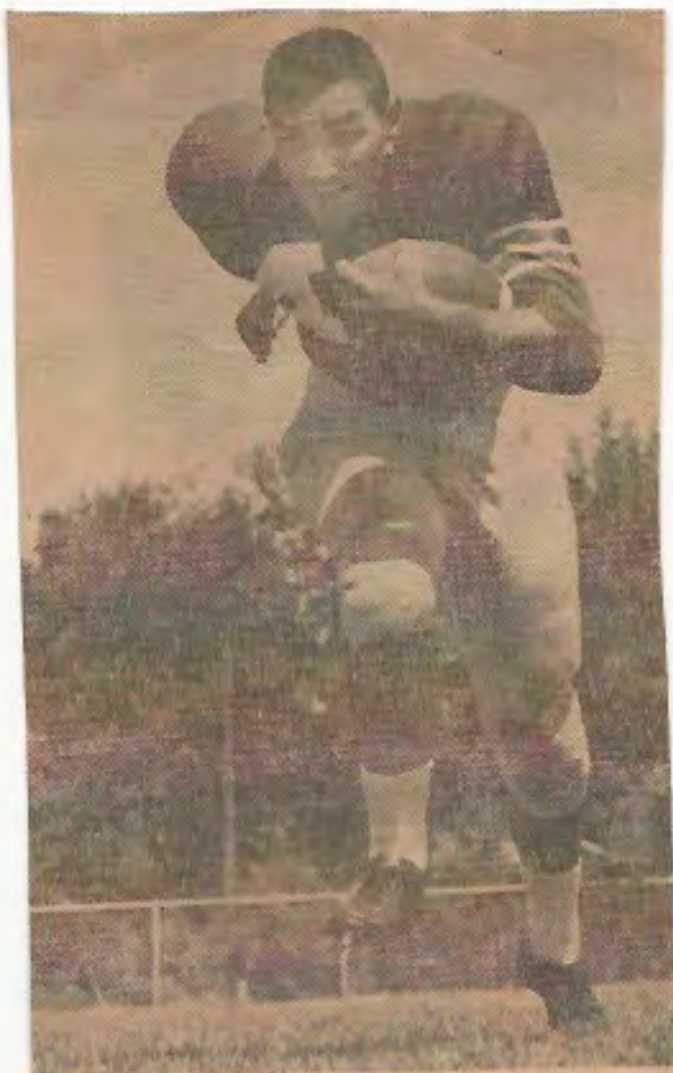
Moffett and Johnson had different ideas on the pass which the South threw for the game tying conversion in the second quarter. It went from Pete Yodar to Kent Peterson, who was ruled to have had possession of the ball before letting it get away from him in the end zone.

"Well, I didn't think the boy had possession," commented Moffett. "The ball was on his fingertips."

Johnson, however, thought Peterson did have possession. The two points on the conversion meant the difference between a tie and a North victory.

To virtually all observers in the press box it appeared the pass was incomplete.

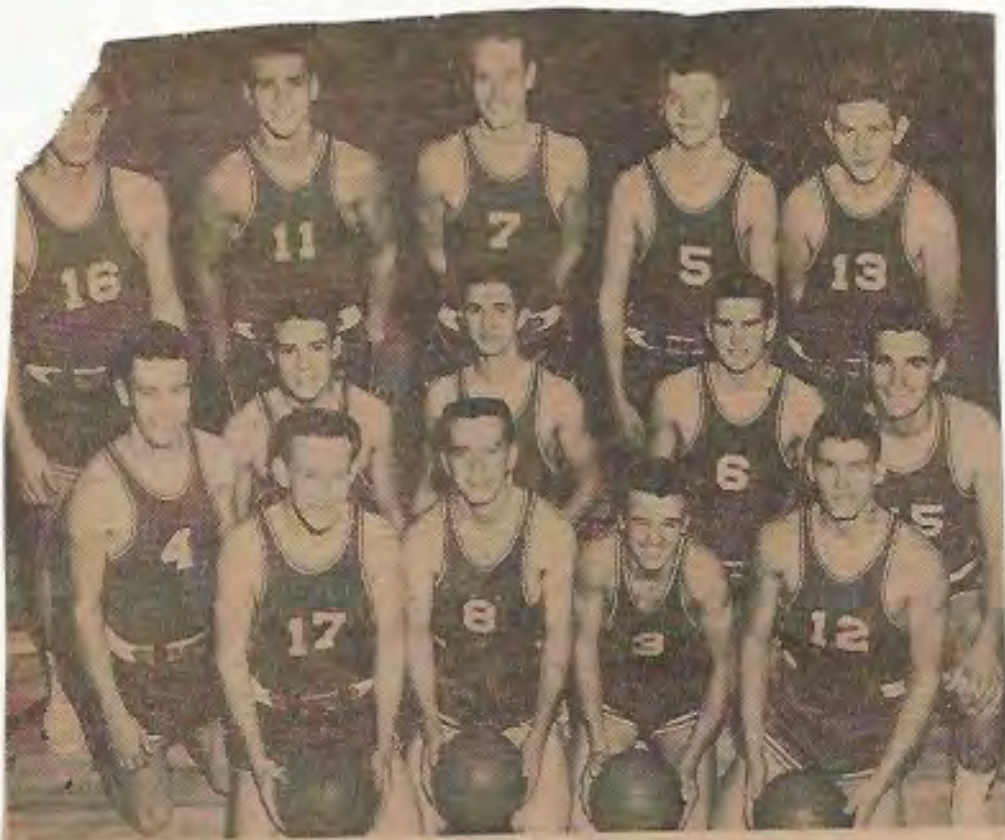

Falcons Edge Into Title Tourney

Late Season Rush Wins NIC Crown 3-Way Tie

Bishop Armstrong's basketball season isn't over after all—the Falcons are tournament bound. The Falcons, because of their spirited late season showing, in which they won eight of 10 games, have been given a bid in the annual Tournament of Champions at Berkeley, a coveted and gilt edged honor for northern California high schools.

But Armstrong had to take the long way around the block to get into the Berkeley tournament.

Because of their 48-44 victory over Shasta to end the regular season schedule last week, the Falcons wound up with a third share of the Northern Inter-State Conference basketball championship.

COACH REGIS Hurley then planned to stow away the uniforms for another year.

But, in a surprise move, the Tournament of Champions' at-large committee decided to make the NIC champion a part of the tournament. Since there were three teams tied the league had to dip into its by-laws to find a way to settle the issue.

They did. One paragraph provided that the winner be judged in case of tie by total points scored in mutual series. Among the three teams, Armstrong came out with a plus 13 points, Red Bluff plus one and Chico minus 14.
