## CBS FACULTY UNDERGOES FACELIFT

*Six Familiar Faces Depart While Twenty Positions Will be Filled by New Faces*

Mr. Kevin Matheny, Director of Development for Christian Brothers High School, will leave CBS after 14 years as a teacher, Dean of Studies, and Director of Development. Mr. Matheny is one of five members of the CBS faculty that will be leaving this summer.

Mr. Matheny, a graduate of the Class of '72, will be assuming the position of Assistant Principal, Director of Development for the Christian Brothers School in Oregon, La Salle High School. Mr. Jack Papin, a science teacher at CBS for 21 years, will retire in June (see page 4), and Mr. Greg Murphy, head football coach for the past two years, will relocate to Las

in Concord, and Brother Jaime Gonzalez, math teacher and yearbook moderator will return to Cathedral High School.

Mrs. Michele Limeberger, who has worked the past two years as secre-

tary to Mr. Matheny, will leave CBS to pursue a teaching career at Holy Cross, where she will teach the eighth grade.

Brother Jesus Lara, Spanish teacher and Foreign Language Department Coordinator, will move to De La Salle High School

where he will be married later this month.

Brother Jon Kampfer has resigned as Director of Student Activities, a position he has held the past five years, to return to teaching math full time. Mr. David Griffith, who has taken a year's leave of absence from his teaching position, has resigned to continue his employment with a local private business.

As part of its agreement with the Diocese, CBS placed a priority on hiring from among the faculty and staff at Bishop Manogue. The result is 16 faculty and staff from Bishop Manogue have been offered positions at CBS. In addition to the new staff members from Bishop Manogue, four other staff have been hired for next year, making a total of 20 new faculty and staff at CBS next fall.

## FIVE WINNERS NAMED IN REGENTS' SCHOLARSHIP COMPETITION

Brother Richard Camara, F.S.C., principal of Christian Brothers High School, has announced winners of the school's Regents' Scholarship Program, a competition which gives scholarships to outstanding students.

Winners of the scholarships, valued at \$1,600 per year, are Michael Boughten, California Middle School and Brenda Breslin, St. Joseph's School. The \$1,000 scholarships were won by Justin Karbowski, Sam Branman Middle School; Patreca Givens, Fern Bacon Middle School, and Karlos Santos-Coy, Albert Einstein Middle School.

The winners of the scholarships, which are sponsored by the school's Board of Regents, are expected to maintain a 3.3 grade point average each semester of attendance.

A recent study of past scholarship finalists has shown these students maintain a much higher average, close to 3.6.

Finalists in the competition were awarded Honors at Entrance and receive a \$100 honorarium. These include: Dino Colucci, St. Mary's School; Joshua Powell, Gloria Dei Lutheran School; David Cunningham, Gloria Dei Lutheran School; Nina Quartuccio, St. Charles School; Aaron Gomez, St. Joseph's School.

Regents Program director, Mr. Patrick O'Brien, estimates the value of the top scholarships to be over \$6,000. Besides these academic scholarships, CBS is setting aside more than \$50,000 to assist needy students to attend the school.

## CBS TEACHER ACCEPTED TO STUDY THE ARTS THIS SUMMER IN POLAND

Mr. Michael J. Hebda, an art and religion teacher at Christian Brothers High School, has been accepted to attend the Summer Session at Jagiellonian University in Cracow, Poland. The Summer Sessions in Poland, which run from July 10 to August 6, is sponsored by the Kosciuszko Foundation, located in New York City. The purpose of the foundation is to encourage the exploration and advancement of Polish culture and arts and sciences in the United States.

Mr. Hebda will be taking one course, "Polish Art, Past and Present," a 43-hour course at the university that earns three credit hours. Enrollment is limited to 20 students based on applications and recommendations. The course includes the study of Polish Art

since the 14th century. It includes seminars with prominent Polish artists, visits to museums, palaces, cathedrals and castles of artistic importance.

During his stay, Mr. Hebda plans on visiting Zakopane, the equivalent of the Sierra in California; an important folk art center; Auschwitz, which is close to the home of some of his Polish relatives; and Czestochowa, the shrine of the Black Madonna of Poland. This image, according to tradition, is a portrait of Mary with Jesus painted by the evangelist Saint Luke.

Mr. Hebda, who says he will be taking enough slides for a five-hour presentation, will be living in a dormitory at the University, which was founded in 1364, making it the second oldest university in Eastern Europe.

## CBS WINS MATH STEEPLECHASE

Christian Brothers High School was invited to send a team to the 1990 Western Slopes Invitational Math Steeplechase, held in May at Ponderosa High in Shingle Springs. Despite not being sure just what a math steeplechase was, Mrs. Lee Wurschmidt, the Mathletes Moderator, and the requested five-person team accepted the challenge. They found out in a hurry. After eight very unusual math oriented problems, such as figuring out the combinations to five locks using inductive reasoning and several cryptic clues, the CBS team captured the first place trophy for the school.

The team was composed of freshmen Constantine Baranoff, Nevin Cheung, Marcus Knutson, Tuan Pham, and sophomore Jimmy Williams.

The problems were located at eight different stations spread around the grounds of Ponderosa High. Each team had 15 minutes at each station and earned points according to how well they did in solving each problem.

The CBS consensus was that the problem asking how many balls of yarn it would take to go from Myers to Placerville was the most difficult. The contestants were given only a road map of the area, a long piece of yarn, a

## MR. O'BRIEN AWARDED FELLOWSHIP

Mr. Patrick O'Brien, Christian Brothers High School counselor, has been awarded a fellowship to attend a summer conference at Dartmouth College in New Hampshire, July 29 to August 3.

The conference, entitled "Preparing for Tomorrow: Educational Opportunities for Minority Students," will enlist an impressive array of educators and presenters to join in exam-

ining the educational issues of critical importance to minority students. It is Dartmouth's belief that higher education has an obligation to make college education both a priority and a reality.

Mr. O'Brien has over 25 years experience in the college counseling field and has been instrumental in assisting minority students at CBS to enter top universities. For three successive years, he has assisted a top minority student in being accepted at Stanford. As part of this effort, he also directs MESA, an organization which promotes under-represented minorities into science, engineering and technical fields.

CBS is one of only two private schools in California which has its own MESA chapter.

The first day of classes for the 1990-91 school year is scheduled for Tuesday, Sept. 4. Student Orientations will be held on Aug. 29 (seniors), Aug. 30, (freshmen), and Aug. 31 (juniors and sophomores).

## JACK PAPIN BEGINS NEW PHASE OF HIS 20-YEAR CYCLES

As Mr. Jack Papin heads into another 20-year cycle in his life, he leaves behind at Christian Brothers High School a legacy of loyalty, dedication, and a genuine concern for the thousands of students with whom he has come in contact in his 21-year tenure at CBS.

Education has changed a great deal in the past two decades, as evidenced most recently by CBS's move to co-education next September, but one thing has remained constant—Mr. Papin's willingness to help students. Mr. Papin, after countless hours tutoring CBS students in science, a little math, and track and field, has decided to spend the next 20 years pursuing his other interests: fishing, bowling, golfing, and scientific research.

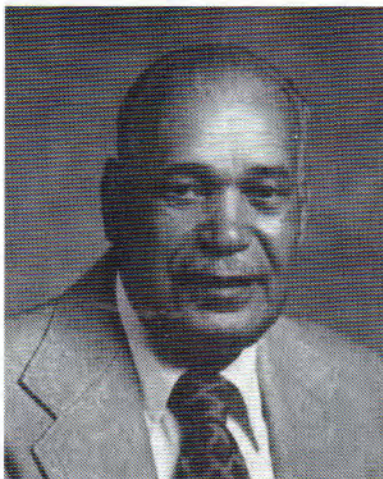
But, as Mr. Papin says, "old teachers never die, they just fade away," and his retirement will not be a complete break from CBS—he will continue to substitute from time to time and assist the track program.

Regarded as a true gentleman by his peers, Mr. Papin brought that quality to the classroom and became a role model for the young men of CBS. Not one to talk about his accomplishments—and they are many—Mr. Papin brought more than civility to CBS; he brought also an extensive background in science and research.

The first "20-year" cycle of Mr. Papin's life began in Iola, Kansas and prepared him for a career in the Army, which, in turn, took him all over the globe. After attending Southern University in Louisiana for a semester on a track and football scholarship, he returned to Kansas and Wichita State for a year before being drafted into the Army to fight in World War II. He was in Europe and fought in England, France, Holland,

Belgium, and then moved into Germany after the Germans had surrendered. Holding a reserve commission, he returned to the U.S. in 1946 and enrolled at Kansas State, from which he earned a B.S. in 1948.

Mr. Papin came to California upon graduation, hoping to get into the U.S.C. dental school, but was recalled by the Army in 1951 to serve in the Korean War, before he could enter the program. But not, however, before he married his wife, Mighnon. They will celebrate their 39th

wedding anniversary this year.

Mr. Papin's itinerant life for the next two decades took him all over the world: Ft. Bragg, England; to Germany; back to Maryland (where he attended Jump School, two different Army schools, and Officers Training); Ft. McClellan in Alabama; Ft. Ord, Calif., and was assigned to assist with the nuclear testing in Nevada, surveying the effects of radiation on the test sites (most memorable was his survey done 45 minutes after the test of "Smokey," a bomb claimed to have caused the most radiation damage.).

After Ft. Ord, Mr. Papin returned to Korea in 1962 and stayed for 15 months. Upon returning he was assigned to 5th Army Headquarters in

Chicago and then to the Yuma Proving Grounds in Arizona, where they were testing nuclear weapons. He retired from the Army in 1968 after 26 years of service. He then went to the University of South Dakota and earned a Masters in Natural Science before moving to Sacramento, Mighnon's hometown.

When Mr. Papin began teaching at CBS in 1969, the last thing on his mind was to become a fixture in the science department. Mr. Papin figured he would move on to a junior college job within a year or two. That, obviously, never materialized.

"Christian Brothers gives you latitude to teach," Mr. Papin said. "They don't hem me in with a lot of regulation, they leave you to do what you want, and you can't ask for much more than that. We used to have a Master Teacher, a brother, who would come to your room that last 15 minutes of class and observe so that he could give you advice at the end of the period, but they stopped that several years ago."

Outside of the military, Mr. Papin has known no other job than teaching science at CBS, but any student who has been on campus knows him for much more than just one discipline. He can be counted on—every day—to have his room open after school until 5 p.m. for students to come in and study, and they did. Rarely was every seat in his room empty, and they weren't just students doing science.

If a student ever had a question about science, Mr. Papin would spend as much time as necessary with the student. "I think any student can learn, providing he's willing to take

## On Campus:

### TEST SCORES, HONG KONG, MOOT COURT, ETC.

The 1988-89 Academic Performance Report shows that for the third year in a row the mean of Christian Brothers graduates came out higher in all areas of English testing than the mean for all other first-time freshmen in the California State University system.

The report, which is issued by the Chancellor's Office of the CSU system, tracks 1988 graduates through their first year at a CSU campus (those who stay the entire year) and compares them with all other freshmen in the system with regard to the English and Math Placement tests.

Also worthy of note is the fact that forty percent of CBS graduates from the Class of '88 were exempt from the English testing because of success on the Advanced Placement exam, the English Equivalency Exam, or high verbal scores on the ACT or SAT.

The comparisons were as follows: Essay Writing—same mean score as other freshmen; Reading—two points higher than mean score; Sentence Construction—five points higher; Logic and Organization—one point higher; Composition (a composite from other tests)—one point higher; Total Mean—one point higher.

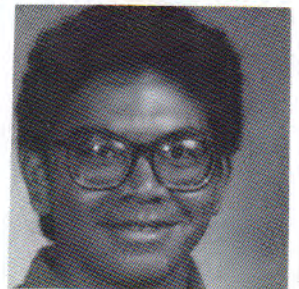
"Often our students complain about the amount of work given to them by the English Department (including Summer Reading)," said Virginia McConnell, English Department Moderator. "But these scores—and reports from other graduates—indicate that the bottom line is: Christian Brothers prepares its students for college-level English programs."

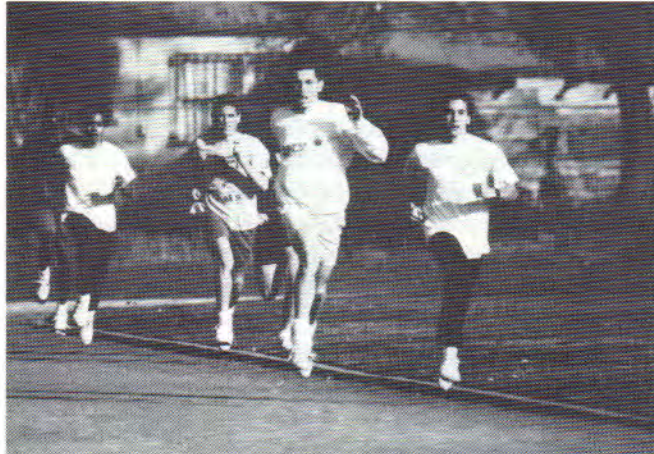

## TRACK TEAM TAKES TITLE

The Christian Brothers varsity track team, after losing its first duel meet to Cordova, captured the Metro League championship at the end of the year by defeating Cordova 159-150.

Some of the key performances were Cornell West and Monty Buckley capturing first and second place in the 400 meters. West also broke the school record in the 400m with a time of 49.4. He also long jumped 21 feet for second place and took fourth in the 200m.

Junior Guillermo Guerrero took a third place in the 800m, third in the 1600m, and fourth in the 3200m. "This was the toughest performance of the entire meet, and the championship could not have been a reality without his performance," track coach Jon Kaempfer said of Guerrero's effort.

The hurdles set the pace early in the meet with Junior Matt Carson and Clarence Phelps finishing one-two. Phelps, only a sophomore, also won the pole vault with a personal-best 13 feet, six inches (which is also the junior varsity school record), and took fourth place in the 300m intermediate hurdles. Carson also won the 300m intermediates, making him the only double gold medal winner for CBS.

Junior Dennis Parino captured the discus with a toss of 156 feet, the second best mark in the Sac Joaquin Section this year.

Junior Carlos Bobadilla took second in the 3200m and fourth in 1600m.

The mile relay team of Buckley, West, Senior Thorston Thorpe, and Carson secured the championship by capturing first place in the final event.

The undermanned JV team had some bright spots with Tuan Nguyen capturing first in the 300m intermediate hurdles and fourth in the pole vault. The mile relay team of Mark Hildebrand, Jarrett Mason, Pat Piacentini, and Brian Johnston took second place.

They will be back, stronger than ever, and add to the talented varsity squad, which is made up mostly of juniors.

## NEW SCHOLARSHIPS ANNOUNCED

The Christian Brothers High School Scholarship Program was the recent recipient of three newly established scholarships.

James Dunphy, Jr. ('41) has established an endowed scholarship in memory of his parents, James L. and Ann (Thielen) Dunphy. James

Dunphy, Sr. was a 1902 graduate of CBS. Mr. and Mrs. Dunphy were active supporters of Christian Brothers for over 60 years. They followed the example set by their parents who were charter members of the movement to bring the Christian Brothers to Sacramento in 1876.

The Robert F. King Endowed Scholarship was established by the King family in Mr. King's memory. Mr. King was a graduate of Archbishop Malloy High School in New York and was a strong believer in catholic high school education. His son, Robert, graduated from CBS in the class of 1989 and his son, James, attended CBS as well.

The William Manogue Gormley Memorial Scholarship was established in Mr. Gormley's memory by his long-time friends, Mr. and Mrs. Jack Vandenberg. Mr. Gormley, a 1940 graduate of Christian Brothers, was Funeral Director of W.F. Gormley and Sons and was well-known throughout Sacramento for his generosity and service to the local community.

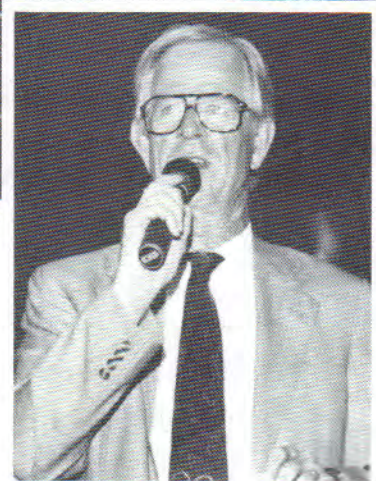

## SCHABER FITS IN FUTURE OF CBS AND SACRAMENTO

Next year's President of the Alumni Association is on the fast track to becoming one of Sacramento's prominent real estate developers. Although he is not the first CBS graduate to pursue a real estate career in Sacramento, Randy Schaber ('79) may be the youngest and he's off to a great start.

In March, Schaber formed The Schaber Co. following five years with two of Sacramento's most prestigious development companies: AKT Developments, owned by Angelo Tsakapolous, and River West Developments, owned by Phil Angelides.

Besides running a start-up business, Schaber becomes President of the Alumni Association next fall, as CBS makes the transition to Sacramento's first Catholic coeducational high school.

"I'm excited about gearing up to meet the challenges next year," Schaber said. "We'll be trying to position the Alumni Association in a fashion that will accommodate the school by broadening on past successes of the CBA."

Those successes include a very successful Christian Brothers Golf Classic, to be held again this year at the Silverado Country Club in Napa, and the group's 3rd Annual Wine Tasting. Both events are scheduled for September, making the first month in office one of the most challenging for the new president.

Schaber, who chaired the second CBA Wine Tasting event in 1989, should be up to the test. He's faced many hurdles during his years in the project management division of River West Developments.

Schaber has worked on nearly all of River West's most important development projects, including Laguna Creek, a 4,500 acre master-

planned community featuring 15,000 homesites; Laguna West, a 1,000 acre project offering a "pedestrian pocket"; and Silver Springs, a 1,100 acre residential development—all located in south Sacramento.

In addition, he has worked on River Plaza, an impressive 336,400 square foot office project destined to overlook the Sacramento River in North Natomas.

Though Schaber is now on his own, he has been retained by River West as a consultant on several projects, including the pioneering Laguna West project, which features the first "pedestrian pocket" development concept in California. His former boss, Angelides, has demonstrated a canny knack for community concern and environmental sensitivity by soliciting input from all sides. The concern hasn't gone unnoticed on Schaber.

"At River West, I have learned how to be environmentally sensitive, to the extent possible with projects, and how to work with the community," Schaber noted. "A project has to work to everybody's advantage. Therefore, as a developer you have to raise your consciousness to understand how the project relates to the environment. We have found that it's worth the effort to try to retain those values."

Schaber has an opportunity to put this philosophy to practice when he

undertakes his company's first project called Clay Station 1200, a 1,200 acre residential development in south Sacramento. He hopes to receive final governmental approvals by year's end, and will begin marketing the homesites.

Schaber decided on a real estate career after completing a business degree with a concentration in real estate and finance at the University of the Pacific in Stockton. He found that the UOP School of Business offered a challenging program that prepared him with a fundamental overview of the development business. Following graduation in 1983, he enrolled in the MBA program at California State University, Sacramento, and advanced to candidacy in one year.

During his last year at CSUS, Schaber sought an internship in real estate with a respected company. His uncle, Gordon Schaber, Dean of the McGeorge School of Law, recommended AKT Development Co. Randy arranged an internship with Tsakapolous' firm, working eight hour days—for free—and taking college classes at night. Immediately after graduation he was hired as a project assistant with AKT. "Working with Angelo and Phil has been worth eight years of college," Schaber marveled.

Looking back just a decade ago, Schaber remembers two key figures at CBS who helped shape his future: Brother Edward Welch and Jim Hughes. Br. Edward's teachings offered a challenging view of the world, while Mr. Hughes was one of the first to recognize and foster Schaber's academic abilities.

the time that's required for him," Mr. Papin. "Some have to put in more time than others, but if they want the grade, they'll do it."

Mr. Papin's most memorable experience at CBS was the Centennial celebration in 1976. "Some of the Masses, the way it was conducted, and the amount of people that showed up—it was all impressive," he said. He then concluded in typical fashion: by putting it into the perspective of how it helps the students. "They gave the Science Department \$10,000 to spend, and I bought dissectoscopes, the same ones that are still in the lab now."

Mr. Papin plans on converting his garage into a research lab so that he can spend more time in that endeavor, and the time he will be able to spend at CBS will be considerably less. Still, while his presence will be missed, his legacy will carry the school into its next 20-year cycle.

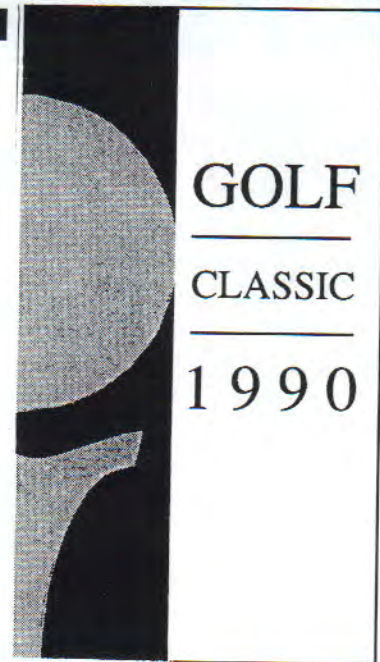
