Holy Week Ceremonies

In order to let the people play a greater part in the Holy Week ceremonies, and to make attending them easier. Our Holy Father has decreed several changes in the liturgy.

On Palm Sunday the Spirit of Triumph will be given greater emphasis. At the beginning of the services, the vestments of the celebrant are in red, symbolizing immortality and the triump of Christ. After the Gos-pel all the people will march in procession. Following the procession the celebrant changes to purple vestments and continues the Mass. The Mass is the same as it was previously, except that the Gospel has been shortened by thirty verses, so that it tells only about the actual Passion of Our Lord.

On Holy Thursday, parishes are no longer permitted to have Mass in the morning. The Mass must be celebrated between 5 and 8 P.M. The change in time was made to coincide with the time at which the Last Supper took place.

The most striking change in the Good Friday service is the permission ot receive Communion. The Mass of the Pre-sanctified must now be offered between 3 and P. M. Those who wish to receive Communion on Good Friday must fast from solid food for 3 hours and liquids 1 hour.

According to the new regulations the Holy Saturday services must be scheduled so that the Mass will begin at midnight. At about 11 o'clock the priest be-




