THE PROSCRIBED HEIR

The play to be presented by the senior class of the Christian Brothers School at their graduating exercises on the evening of June 14, is a melodrama in three acts. The play discourses an intrigue among the nobility in medevial times. The drama has a vein of rich humor running all through it which makes the varied situations highly interesting.

The play centers around the Count d'Anfreville, who has been openly robbed of the title to a rich estate of which he was the rightful owner. He was falsely accused of treason to the king by the intriguer who had assumed the title of Count D'Aspermont, who maliciously misrepresented the rightful owner, had him exiled to a foreign country where he was forced to remain for more than twenty years. Finally the proscribed heir disguises himself and returns to his own country where he meets many of his former friends and reveals his identity to old Nicholas who had been master of the count's estates, and is now an inn-keeper at the hotel of the White Duck where the Count seeks food and shelter.

Through the investigation of the Justice of the Peace and other officers the villany and treachery of the spurious Count D'Aspermont is discovered. The king orders this Charles to be summarily punished and the rightful heir is fully reinstated to the good graces of the court and is once again restored to the rightful possession of his castle and rich estates.

The cast for the play has been very carefully selected, each character is eminently fitted to his role.
