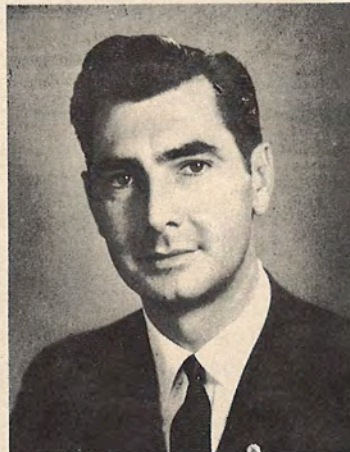

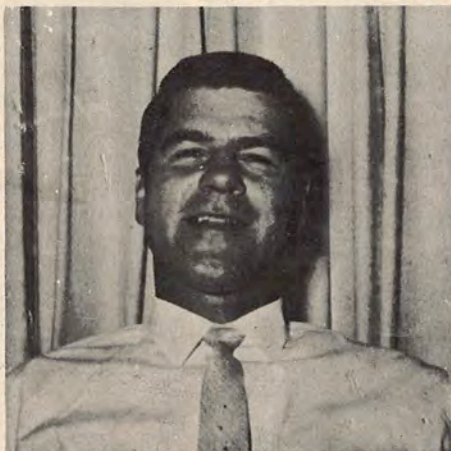
**TAG McFADDEN**  
Head Coach

Tag McFadden, 36 year old head football coach at Corning High School, isn't a poor loser. Neither is he used to losing. In seven years as his own boss Tag's teams have been beaten just nine times while winning 74 for a pretty fantastic percentage of .892.

Last season he climaxed his four years at Corning with an unbeaten team and his first outright Westside League championship. Leading the way was one of Northern California's most exciting players in several seasons, tailback Chuck Ellis.

Ellis, along with his Corning teammates Gary Strack and Fred Hinds will be playing key roles tonight in the stadium as the upstate boys will try to show that their bruising single wing attack is more potent than the city's T offense.

The big North line will be bulwarked by Chico's Chet Hinshaw and Oroville's Roy Jones, who performed in the Shrine Game in Los Angeles two weeks ago. Adding punch to the attack will be such fine backs as Gary Hertzfeldt of Chico, Dean Newby of Oroville and Louis Macon of Placer.

McFadden is a native Oregonian and played high school football for the perennially powerful Grant Generals in Portland. Tag enrolled at Oregon State College, where he lettered as a tailback on the 1942 and 1946 teams under Lou Stiner.

The War interrupted his studies, but Mac was fortunate to be admitted to the Marines' V-12 program and was able to play for the University of Southern California in the 1944 Rose Bowl game with the Washington Huskies.

McFadden says that just getting into the game was the highlight of his playing career.

Tag began coaching as an assistant at Prineville, Oregon, before moving to Ilwaco, Washington on the mouth of the Columbia River. He was an assistant there before taking over as head coach at the beginning of the 1952 campaign. In four seasons at Ilwaco his clubs won 24 of 25 games and Tag was the highest paid teacher in Pacific County.

McFadden's 1955 team at Corning—his first—tied Oregon for a Westside League championship. He rates as his top coaching thrill Corning's 26-7 win over Willows last fall. Willows, almost always the team to beat in the Westside, has been beaten twice in four tries by McFadden's teams.

Tag rates among his best players three from the 1955 club. They are Phil Mase, a top end candidate at California and Roy Harran, a first string guard at San Jose State, along with Bob Flournoy, who didn't continue his football career. Ellis, of course, is one of McFadden's best.

McFadden and his wife Judy have three youngsters—all boys. They are Billy, 8; Peter, 5; and Tim, 9 months.

Assisting Mac tonight will be his line coach Wes Mitchell, a former College of the Pacific great.

# Rheumatic Fever . . .

The greatset killer of children from five to fourteen than all other childhood diseases combined . . . AND WHAT 20-30 IS DOING:

Complete defeat of rheumatic fever, the great crippler and killer of children, is the challenge facing 20-30 International's Rheumatic Fever Foundation.

It was in 1948 that delegates to the annual 20-30 convention adopted unanimously the project to provide funds for the study and prevention of the dread disease. These facts about rheumatic fever helped the Twenty-Thirtians to decide that this project was well worth their time and effort:

1. Rheumatic fever causes almost five times as many deaths in children of school age as the combined total of deaths from all other leading childhood diseases.

2. Rheumatic fever is responsible for most of the heart disease in children and a large share of heart trouble in adulthood.

3. The basic causes of rheumatic fever are unknown, and no "miracle drugs" have been developed to prevent or cure rheumatic fever once it has developed.

4. Sufficient funds for rheumatic fever research were definitely not available.

Rheumatic fever is not a spectacular disease; after an attack, there are no visible marks such as crippled arms and legs, although irreparable damage usually has been done to the heart. For this reason, the average person does not perhaps realize the devastating effects of rheumatic fever and, consequently, very few donations or bequests are given toward this disease.

In 1948 a yearly goal of \$10,000 was established to provide three annual fellowships to doctors in recognized medical research centers throughout the United States. The yearly quota is reached through voluntary contributions made by the 20-30 Clubs from funds raised through individual club projects like the football game tonight. No funds are directly solicited from the public.

In the ten years of the Foundation's existence, \$86,000 has been allotted to rheumatic fever research. There is another \$8,000 in reserve funds in the Foundation's coffers. This is a safety margin since some of the Foundation's grants will cover three-year periods and will be used if annual contributions do not reach the \$10,000 goal.

Research through 20-30 Fellowships was performed at the University of Southern California, the Bowman Gray School of Medicine at Wake Forest College, Tulane University, the University of California Medical Center in San Francisco, the Children's Hospital Society of Los Angeles, and the Rockefeller Institute for Medical Research in New York.

Since 1952 20-30 has placed continuing yearly fellowships at three medical centers, under the supervision of doctors who not only were actively engaged in research, and in charge of research departments of their medical schools, but who are considered the leading men in the field of heart disease. These are Dr. Samuel A. Levine of Boston, Peter Brigham Hospital, the Medical School of Harvard University; Dr. Paul Klemperer, Mt. Sinai Hospital in New York and Dr. Maxwell Wintroppe, College of Medicine at the University of Utah.

In this new program the Foundation is concentrating its efforts upon the basic cause and prevention of rheumatic fever and rheumatic fever heart disease. Although great strides have been made, the answer is still in the future. Each dollar raised and donated brings that answer closer.

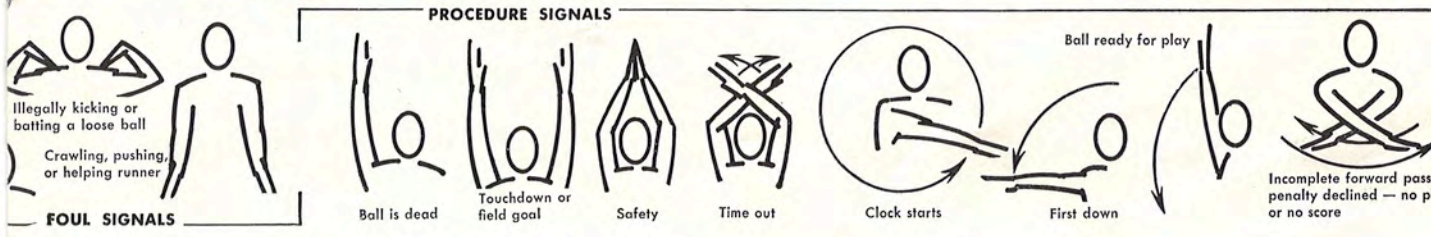

# Sacramento County Coaching Staff



**JACK BROWN**  
Head Coach

Imagine making your head coaching debut in an all-star game. That is exactly what Norte Del Rio High School's Jack Brown is doing tonight. The 27 year old ex-University of Oregon football and track star last spring was appointed as head grid mentor of the Metropolitan League champion Dons, succeeding Ron Siegrist, who returned to Oregon State College as an assistant to Coach Tommy Prothro.

Siegrist originally was named as the County All-Stars Coach, but had to resign since National Collegiate Athletic Association rules forbid college coaches directing prepsters—particularly those who have not committed themselves to attending any one college.

Norte Del Rio officials wasted no time in filling their coaching vacancy and neither did Sacramento Valley All-Star Game officials. Brown, who admits butterflies, will give the fans here tonight a sample of Oregon's split T offense as designed by Coach Len Casanova. Young Jack thinks he has the horses to make the attack go. One of his major problems in training at the University of California at Davis the past two weeks was giving his own Norte Del Rio players their first shot at T formation football, excepting fullback Bob Lazark and center John Far-

rell, who played in the Shrine game in Los Angeles two weeks ago. Other members of the 1958 championship Norte team are tackle Doug York and halfbacks Al Biancani and Johnny Garcia. With such huskies as Sacramento guard Larry Ghilardi, tackles York and Lauren Bock of El Camino up front, the County eleven should move on offense.

Aside from the metropolitan area's leading scorer, rusher and total offense man—Lazark—the County will have good running punch in El Camino's Willie Wixom and La Sierra's Tony Curry and Buddy McKay. Pat Morton, El Camino quarterback, passed for almost 1,000 yards last fall and he will have his favorite receivers, end Steve Nuttall and Jim Clay.

Brown is a graduate of Mt. Diablo High School in the East Bay area. He attended West Contra Costa JC in 1951, spent two years with the Navy and enrolled at Oregon in 1954.

Ineligible that fall, Brown in 1955 was an understudy to Dick James—now of the Washington Redskins—and in 1956 was the starting left half in half of the Duck's games.

Jack's big moment in sports came in the 1956 Oregon-USC game at Portland. With the Webfoots ahead 6 to 0 in the final quarter Southern Cal began a sustained 55 yard march toward the Oregon goal. Then they passed—to Brown, who intercepted in the end zone. The Ducks froze the ball for the next four minutes—to win.

Brown also was a leading sprinter, having run the 100 in :09.5. He had a big double against Oregon State at Bell Field in 1957 when he won the 100 in :09.7 and the 220 in :21.5 around a curve for a track record.

Jack is married and he and his wife, Carol, have two boys, Steven, 7, and Richard, 3½. Assisting Brown will be Will Misquez, line coach for the Dons. Misquez, 28, is a graduate of Chico State and is in his fourth year at Norte.

## Sacramento Valley All-Star Football Game — Superior California's Prep Grid Classic

When you take the 25 best high school gridgers in metropolitan Sacramento and pit them against the north state's top 25, you have the makings of a terrific football game. The 1959 game, third in the series, is the second game to tap an intense, but friendly rivalry between the Sacramento area and Northern California. Last year's game was a hard fought 6-6 tie. And whether you are pulling tonight for the "Country Cousins" or the "City Slickers," remember that all the boys deserve a great deal of credit, not only for their fine athletic ability, but also their citizenship and leadership as well. They have given up jobs and vacations and have practiced hard twice a day for the past twelve days to bring us this great football game in behalf of noteworthy causes. The Northern California team trains at Chico State and the Sacramento County team at California Aggies in Davis.

The coaches are selected right after the regular high school season by sports writers, who screen the possibilities and name the two men they decide did th most outstanding job.

Sacramento County players, of course, are all from within the limits of the County with the exception of James Marshall High School in West Sacramento, which is just a few miles from downtown Sacramento.

The boundaries for the Northern California team are the Oregon and Nevada lines to the north and east, respectively. The Coast Range forms the western boundary and the southerly limits take in all of Napa, Solano, Yolo and El Dorado counties.

In order to be eligible for tonight's game a player must have graduated from high school in 1959, must have retained his amateur standing and must not have attended a college or university.

When sports writers gathered in Sacramento and in Chico this February they were looking for one additional requirement—talent. The Northern California screening committee considered over 250 excellent candidates, the Sacramento County committee over 80. With the assistance of many high school coaches, they came up with the players who you will see tonight—many of them who have promise of being top college and professional stars of the future.
