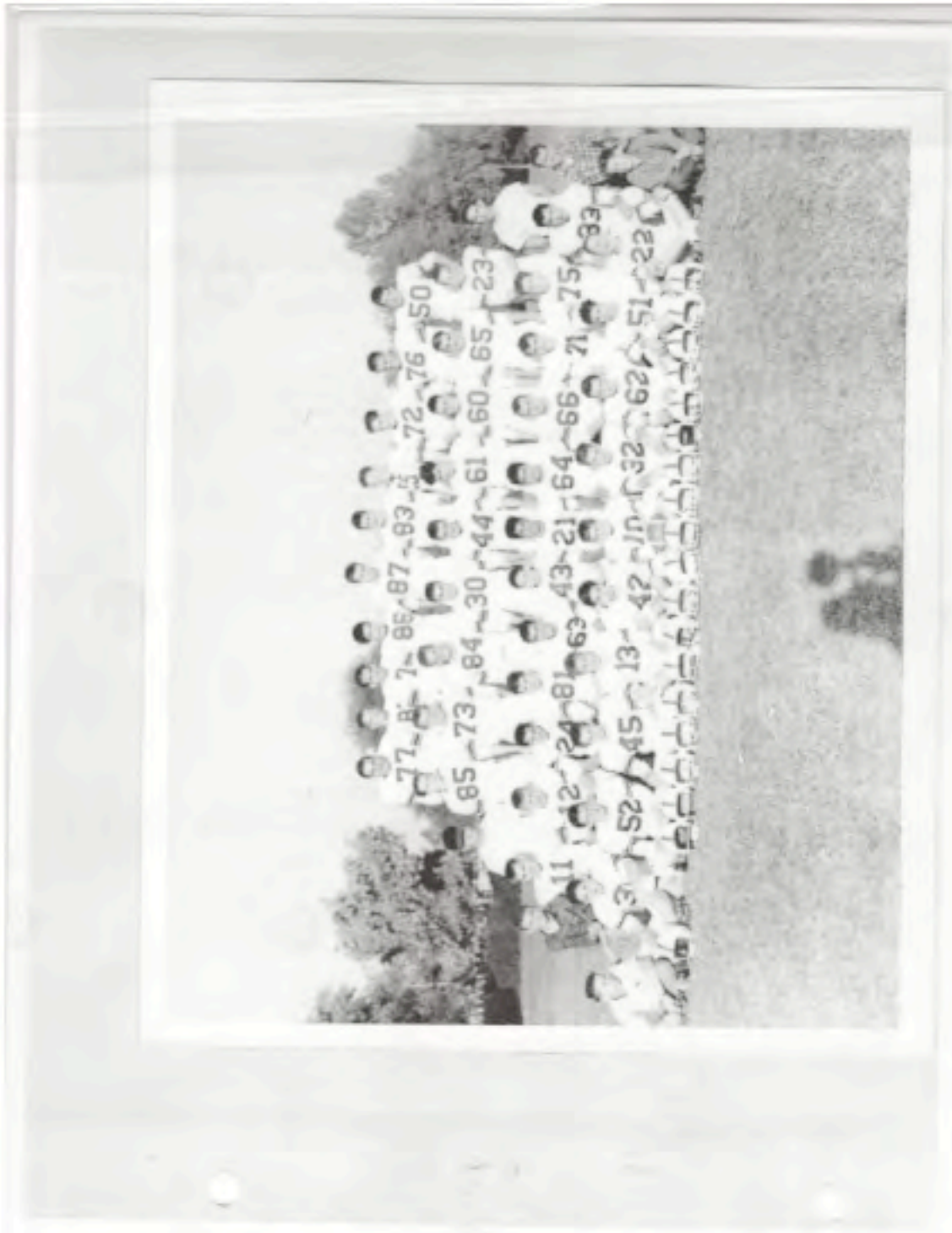

The high point of the sporting year at Christian Brothers in 1968 has to be the football team. C. K. McClintock High School's Metropolitan League champions and the independent Bishop Armstrong Falcons landed four each on the All Stars, while James Marshall, Golden Empire title, and El Camino placed three each on the mythical all city eleven.

Other schools represented are Johnson with two and La Sierra, Norte Del Rio, Grant Union, Sacramento, San Juan and Highlands each with one.

Engaged, named certificates have been prepared for each player, and his prize will be turned over to school officials for presentation at a later date.

Here are head headlines on the all stars:

**Aldrich** . . . just a growing boy at 6-1, 150 pounds and a junior . . . has speed, size and agility and was Armstrong's best defensive man . . . gained 957 yards rushing in eight games . . . colleges already interested.

#### Exciting Player

**Ashcraft** . . . this little guy is probably most exciting and entertaining prep athlete in area . . . earmarked as second stringer at season's outset, he came on to spark best ever El Camino team to 8-2 record . . . caught 16 passes for seven touchdowns, completed three of three passes for two TDs, ran 42 times for 382 yards and is tough anywhere on defense . . . all city in basketball as junior.

**Allen** . . . the kind of hard

**Bell** . . . the heart of James Marshall's defense, a rough and ready linebacker who Coach Jack Byrne mentions in the team breath with Phil Raggen, who was the outstanding lineman in 1959 October All Star Game . . . Bell could make the team just as easily at guard.

**Brown** . . . one of foremost pass receivers in city . . . caught 22 for 368 yards and three touchdowns . . . guarded by Coach Stan LeFronc as good or better than his 1959 and John Martin because of excellent hands . . . good basketball player.

# Falcon Mistakes Help Warriors Squeeze By

Thanks to the erratic play of an offensive line, intercepted passing Armstrong leads, Elmer Johnson's Warriors came out alive with a steady 14-1 win over the Falcons Thursday night in the gray snow at Empire Stadium.

It was a poor showing by the club that is passed as the city's best. The 1947 was sloppy and inconsistent but the vital ball well understood to a remarkable length by Johnson when they can see ahead that they are overtopped but invisible.

The Warriors were said to have a rebounded loss. Elmer Johnson's ruggedly-sifting linebackers held the enemy back in the first half. Johnson's veteran backs were killed as the snow and while they ran hard, a pair of really Falcons performed as well as we have.

## They Were Lucky

Johnson, coach Bert Delaware expressed a no win as stated early. "We were lucky." They were.

Even the first quarter—which was exceptional to the last. Armstrong repeatedly made three-point drives only to have them stalled by penalties, fumbles and interceptions. A few-of-taken snap from center handed the Warriors their first two yards of a safety. A 10-yard playing penalty added upon the next for Johnson's first touchdowns. And Armstrong's sixth fumble of the night revealed the opportunity for the second and third Warriors TD.

How it was the first game, it was expected that the Johnson's Warriors might run and run because of Armstrong's success. That's just what happened in the first half for the Warriors long as to emerge a winner and at the end they were mighty thankful for just that.

## Falcons Was Hard

The important aspect of the game — one might say disappointing — was the slugging play of the Armstrong backs and the unexpected job turned in by a badly-recovered Johnson line.

But for some reason a pass play was called and the Warriors' Jim Trickett took off the signal. It was a foolish move by the Falcons, who had been making good on the ground all the time.

Athletic prowess of the Cima family is not shared by Vic alone. His father, Stan

# Family Football Tradition Upheld At McClatchy

A familiar family name that spanned Sacramento's football history back in the 1920s is being revived by a junior half-back named Tommy Belles—and McClatchy High School partners are thoroughly thankful the Belles name has drifted from Sacramento High to the home of the Lions.



Tommy, five week's Union Prep of the Week, is doing great things for the powerhouse McClatchy club and appears to have all the necessary tools to become one of the city's finest runners. But old-timers who have followed capital football for years aren't really surprised. They look to 1920-1965 and you get a picture of the Belles family that produced three of the sharpest performers any coach could ask for.

The Belles brothers—Rosa, George and Martin—were all star players for Sacramento High and each contributed to further fame as a college athlete. Tommy's father, Rosa, graduated from Sacramento High in 1920 after handling the role of quarterback for the Dragons. He later played three years of first string quarterback for Arizona State at Tempe and helped the Sunbells win two Border Conference championships and one state in the Los Bowl. Rosa is still quite active in grid-iron affairs and is president of the Board of Directors which guides the business of the annual Optimist Sacramento Valley All-Star Game.

George, of course, was head football coach at Sacramento High for 1949 and is now in his third term as athletic director at River Johnson. George graduated from SDS in 1929 and played at Sacramento Junior College in 1928 and '29. Coincidentally George played JC football with George Dixon, McClatchy master who is now Tommy's coach. George then transferred to University of California at Berkeley and was a first string halfback for two years, and left with a reputation as one of the Beavers' best blocking backs Cal had seen.

Martin, now a detective on the Sacramento Police Force, represented his diploma at SDS in 1935 and then played two years for Sacramento JC, earning all-conference honors as a halfback.

So after a 25 year lapse, the Belles name is making football news again. Anyone watching Tommy take the ball this season can see he has inherited more than a small share of the athletic talent that runs in the family. He seems to possess the natural instinct that allows a shifty halfback to cut just at the right moment and shoot through the slightest hole of an opening.

Tommy certainly seems capable of adding a new chapter to a colorful football background.

THE REACTION OF TOMMY BELLES brings to mind other names like Clark Albritch, Jack Nolan, Jim Smith and Don Goolbsy. There are just two of an impressive group of players who promise to supply the capital with a rush of outstanding backs next year.

Belles of Highlands and Colbaugh of McClatchy are capable halfbacks. In fact, Belles has impressed some observers as one of the top leaders in the city this season and could be the MVP of the Metropolitan League in 1965.



Albrecht and Smith are, without a doubt, two of the best players around and both took huge hits in Sacramento County during Clark Friday's games. Albrecht caught 30, 33 and 18 yards for

three touchdowns and added two extra points as Armstrong plattered Willows 34-0. Eylon reeled off a 26-yard TD sprint that gave the Septs a 13-4 win over Great Union.

There are others who will be back next year: Tilley Eiler, Great Union halfback; Ed Gagle, alternate Hiram Johnson quarterback who has looked impressive in recent showings; and McClatchy's stellar defensive end Steve Radick. McClatchy also has a sophomore center, Jim Mills, who could develop into one of the Linn's best boys.

One coach in the area, however, always makes a good point. "People often overrate junkies because they are always thinking how good the kid is going to be next year when he is a senior."

Opposing lineups who must try to stop some of these junior athletes will agree that point.

**FRESH PATER:** It's fantastic! El Cerrito High School has always been just about the most spirited high school in the area when it comes to backing the athletes. But Friday's big battle between the Eagles and McClatchy was a sight to behold. The 3000 capacity stadium was packed before the sophomore game was over and the interest aroused over the whole affair was quite something for a game in the middle of the season. The 8000 to 9000 attendance had some people talking about possibility of enlarging the Eagle plant in the near future. Speaking of El Cerrito, the Eagles' Barry McFadden, a lanky 6'11, 200-pound junior fullback, is expected to hit the 100-foot mark in the shot put next spring. . . . James Marshall coach Jack Brown is pretty high on his great guard Don Bell. In fact, he considers Don almost as good as Phil Eagles, who played at Marshall not many years ago. Jack puts it this way: "Eagles was the best high school football player I ever saw . . . and Don isn't very far behind." Bell has the nice habit of making anywhere from 13 to 20 yards a game for the Wildcats. . . . Galt coach Doug Brown had his reasons to cheer this weekend: Battling Vacaville for chance at independence, the Warriors were penalized 35 yards—twice as much as Galt was penalized in the previous six games combined—and had half-way defensive linemen because of some misunderstanding with the officials. Galt beat 157. . . . Sacramento High will probably wear Reginalds Thursday without services of end Ben Falades, who seemed to work in Woodland game. . . . Great Union isn't winning its third game. Galt coach Jim Natch says it isn't any fault of mine. . . . Coach Jerry Thompson, a whopping 270-pounder. "We must be made of lead against Redlands," Jack reported.

# Falcons Topple Unbeaten Orland Trojans 33-26

**ORLAND, Green Co. —** Bishop Armstrong's Falcons of Sacramento made their second triumph of the season a big one last night as they upset the previously unbeaten Orland High School Trojans 33 to 26.

Defense was at a minimum as Coach Frank Callen's Capital City Falcons plainly and simply gave the West-side League Trojans a lesson in hard-nosed football before an estimated 2,000 partisan onlookers.

### Snap, Whiz, Streak

The three-beat Falcons stopped a 15-gain Orland victory drive, five of the wins having been registered this fall. In posting those five victories Orland had averaged 49 points per game.

For the figure filberts each team had the football for 58 offensive downs, which included four Orland punts and three Falcon punts. The Falcons netted 343 yards as compared to Orland's 258. It is interesting to note, however, that all of Bishop Armstrong's yardage came via land, and 170 of Orland's total yardage came via the airwaves.

Coach Ray Ballock's Trojans struck first and lost. In between the Falcons got into the Orland end nine five times.

The first Orland score came after 2:57 had elapsed when Trojan halfback Gary Walker ran underneath quarterback Bob Miller's pitch for a 25 yard scoring score.

On the second play after the opening kickoff fullback Henry Reynolds slashed off left tackle and ran into the end zone on a 57 yard romp.

Halfback Clark Aldrich put the lid on an eight play, 70 yard Falcon drive which came to a conclusion on the second play of the second quarter. On fourth down from the Orland 48, Aldrich took a pitchout and rumbled end and romped like Trojan secretary to go full the way.

A 99 yard punt by Aldrich opened Armstrong's next push. The scoring drive spanned 30 yards in five plays and was culminated by Reynolds' 11 yard jump over tackle.

### Orland Cross Back

Down 20 to 6 Orland got right back into the thick of things as Walker picked up Zeider's kickoff and reversed to halfback Cory Tommeson at the Orland seven. Threading his way through a mass of would-be tacklers for 15 yards and getting a key block from end Bob Davis, Tommeson simply straddled the Falcons to go all the way.

The score remained at 20 to 12 until 20 seconds before the end of the third quarter when the Trojans closed the gap to one point on Tommeson's three yard four second left end, and Miller's score for the PAT.

### Regain Six Points

On the first play after the

On the final play after the kickoff, which was also the first play of the fourth quarter, Aldrich got those six points back in one swipe—a quick rally as Clark went right up the middle for 45 yards. Peters ran for the PAT.

An overhead theft set up Armstrong's final, game clinching TD which came 3:05 before the end. Zeider skirted right end for the final eight yards of a five play, 31 yard push.

A five play, 73 yard drive resulted in Orland's final score which came on a three yard pitch from Miller to Davis.

Christian Brothers celebrated Orland's joyous 23 to 19 in the preliminary. It was the 18th straight victory for the Gaels and the first loss in 32 games for Orland.

### Close Call

### Top Offense

Like Aldrich, Reynolds is not all offense. He is a tenacious tackler who relishes contact. Whether breaking through a screen to call a punter or catching a misplayed back who has broken free, Reynolds is in on every defensive play.

Armstrong extended its victory string to three straight wins by blanking Norte 14-0 at Grant last Friday. Offensively the Dons were outplayed by the speedy Falcons behind 270 yards to WR Frank Calton's troops wasted no time in moving the ball downfield, marching 61 yards in six plays for a touch-down. After Reynolds drive in from the ten, halfback Ron Peters added the extra point, the score then reading 7 to 0.

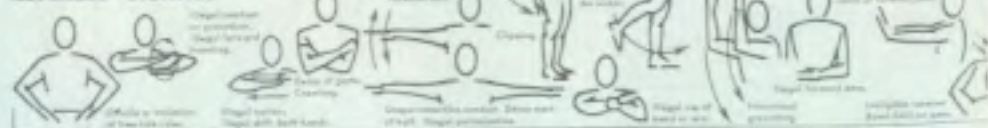

**Aldrich** . . . great all around back, who was able to string off everything and anybody until he was laid low by a broken elbow in the Falcons' sixth game . . . played defensively as pass defender and tackler, and is a smooth and deceptive runner who takes full advantage of blockers . . . gained 517 yards and scored eight touchdowns.

**Cronin** . . . a rugged 200 pounder who doubles as a linebacker on defense in addition to offensive duties as a guard . . . another in a long line of outstanding interior forwards developed by the Lions . . . major factor in team's outstanding record.

**Davies** . . . this husky center-linebacker regarded by his coach Don McCormick as Encina's best ever blocking center . . . averaged better than 12 tackles a game and picked off three enemy punts for team, which won eight of nine contests.

### Pass Number

**Graham** . . . caught more passes per game than any prep in the area, 24 in just nine games . . . his total yardage was 222 and he scored four touchdowns . . . has excellent hands and is stout defensively, and at 6-4 and 175 pounds could be top college prospect . . . a great basketball player.

**Hayes** . . . a teammate of Graham's, Hayes in his first year of football at San Juan impressed as one of the best tackles in the area . . . 6-2, 195 pounder transferred to from San Diego Clement . . . rated by Coach Marshall Lindsay as good college material because of size, speed and maturity . . . played both ways.

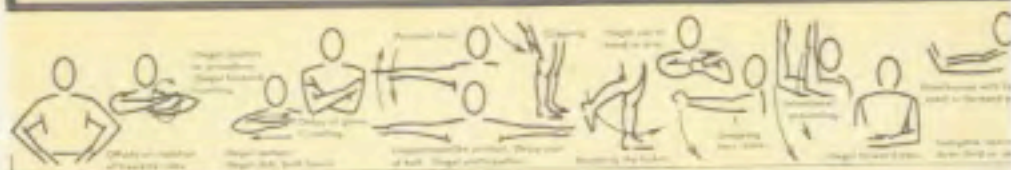

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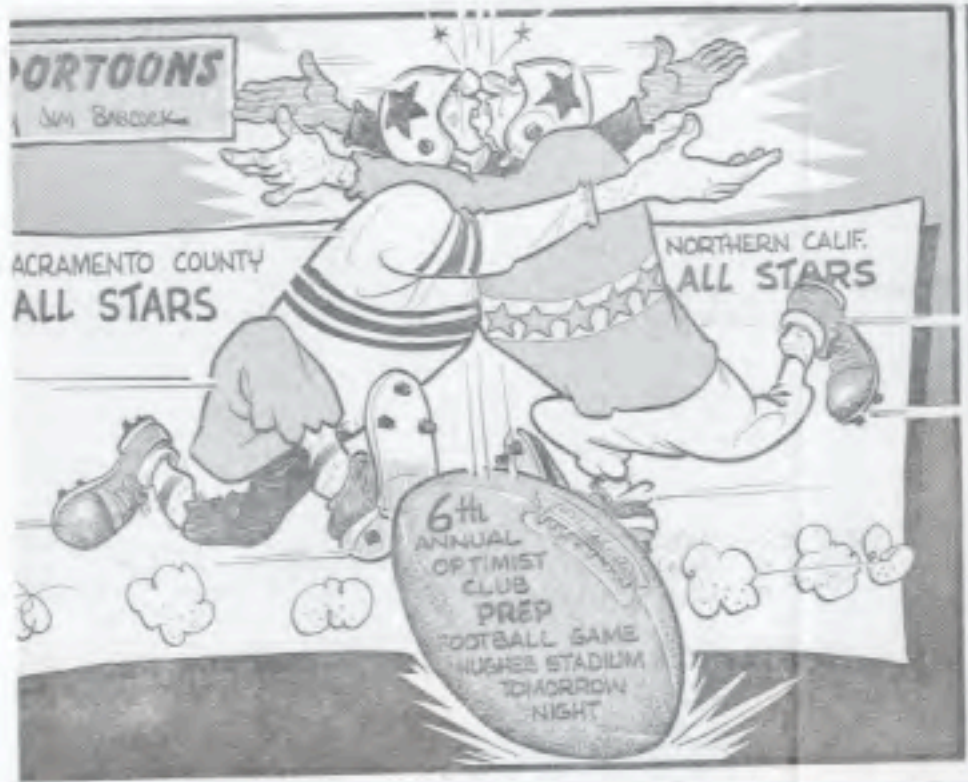

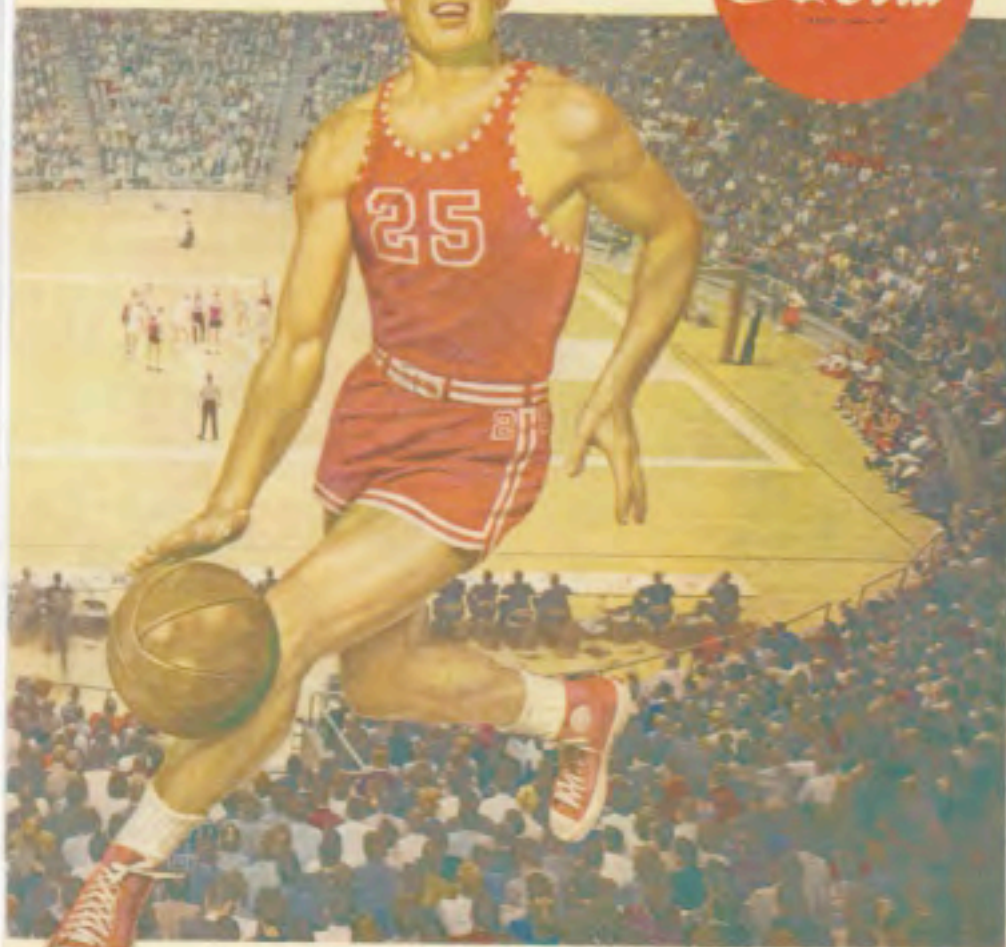

## Change of Pace

### High Hopes for Aldrich

One of the best prep linemen in California and one of the state's brightest college football prospects will view Saturday night's Oregon All-star classic from the comfort seat in the bleachers. He'll sit on the bench and watch the boys go by.

At least that's the emphatic opinion of one Jerry Long, assistant coach at Oregon State and the Beavers' top talent scout in the football world of California. They may state, as you may know, is the life blood of Oregon State's football business and don't let them tell you anything different.

Anyway, Long studies in focus about his horse by Clark Aldrich, a senior fullback at the 194 pound mark of Bobbie Armstrong for two seasons and now a member of the walking wounded at Davis. Long has recruited Aldrich into Oregon State in the place to be and Jerry's current emphasis is on Clark's ability to carry a football and not the unfortunate nature of his previous injuries.

Long, who puts more mileage on his college car this time of year than a freeway inspector, called into Davis Wednesday to check up on what he considers just about his prize piece of recruiting work.

### Only Hurts When Running

What poor Jerry saw was a splendid physical specimen who could barely walk. Aldrich, banged and bruised from start to finish during last year's football season, is still being haunted by bad luck in the form of a frustrating thigh ailment. "It only hurts when I run hard or not at all," Clark says seriously.

Running hard and cutting sharply is what cost Aldrich an 18-week lay-up at Oregon State.

Long, though, is not discouraged by Clark's current condition and, was hardly telling Casey coach Fritz Collins just how he figured Aldrich's high chances could be put back in proper operating order. "There isn't treatment and careful attention for a week or so and he'll be good as new," Long said.

We thought we missed him glancing back-over as he said it. You have to look at Aldrich with respect after learning Long describes on the subject. Jerry was in Los Angeles for the Orange Game, which regularly boasts 50 of the most carefully screened young football stars in the state. He had this to say: "I see the Oregon Game and if I had to make a choice, I'd take Aldrich over Mike Garrett. He took back the South end."

### Big Time Football Material

"This kid has what it takes to play big time football," Long said of the six-foot, 200-pounder. It will be big time football at Oregon State, too, for the ambitious Beavers, coached by the Big Five Class One top guru, are taking on a football schedule this fall including seven inter-collegiate games.

The Northwest boys will meet the likes of Iowa, Northwestern, Michigan, Purdue and Iowa State in the next ten or three years. When Collins is a replacement in 1965, Oregon State battles as best they have Big Ten opponents.

"Clark's getting greater than good size Big Ten money and making some big money," Long enthused. "That's big league football. You go out on that field with the roar of 25,000 people coming from one side of the stadium to the other. It's really good."

Nothing would bother you that Clark Aldrich running up and down the field against the Big Ten power, Long thinks he's capable of doing just that.

### The Man From Woostah

Whenever things begin to drag a bit at Davis, we like to start up a lively conversation with Boston George Gertz, California right-hand man who is an excellent coach of Bobbie Armstrong. We could sit and listen to Boston George for hours, partly because he knows what he is talking about, and speaks his mind and partly because of the way he speaks his mind.

"I've heard President Kennedy has an accent! Boston George makes the President sound like he comes from East Merville!"

"Give you keep in Boston, Boston George?" we asked one day. "Yes!" he exclaimed, seemingly shocked at the mere question. "Yes from Woostah!" he said. "How do you spell that?" "W-O-O-S-T-A-H," "Oh."

"What's Woostah?" we asked, trying not to show our ignorance. "It's middle Massachusetts," George said. "It's bigger than Sacramento," he added.

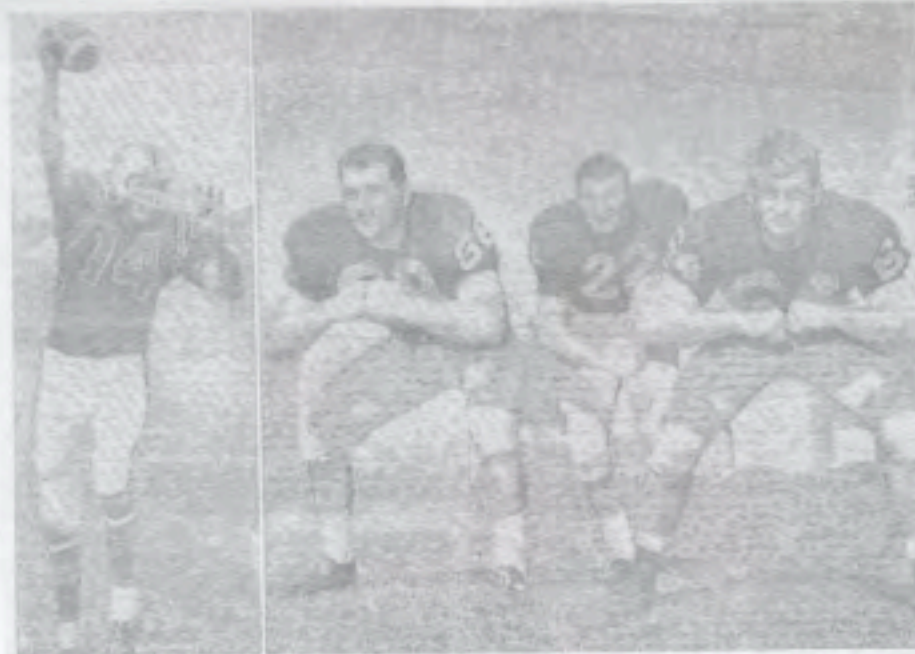

The Hornets learned they will be without Dennis Jones, outstanding halfback from the 1964 team. The 179 pounder will undergo a knee operation.

# Hornets Drop FWU Open

## Miller, Cummings, Falk And Kelly Outstanding

The Hornets gambled with the Nevada Wolfpack last Saturday and lost. The school from Reno put down a fourth quarter two point conversion attempt by the Hornets and

went on to a 10-0 victory before a packed homecoming crowd in Campus Stadium.

The Hornets trailed 14-7 in the final period when Bob Falk came through with a brilliant 49 yard punt return, being dropped on the Nevada four yard line. From there Bob Miller flipped a pass to Dave Cummings in the end zone. Instead of trying the kick for a tie, Hornet coach Ray Clement chose to go for the two pointer with only a minute and a half left in the game. Miller's attempted pass for the conversion was intercepted by Nevada's Ben Hogan and that was the ball game for the Hornets.

Sacramento got the ball again with a half minute left when Nevada was forced to punt, but after two incomplete long bombs, Miller was rushed and fumbled, Nevada and Jim Ludwig jumped on the ball on the Hornet 13. With four seconds left, Wolfpack QB Chris Ault crashed through the line and ran untouched for six more points.

Nevada drew first blood in the opening quarter when Bob passed backs Joe Soback and Earl Mawerent took their first offensive series 48 yards in 12 plays with Mawerent scoring from the two. Cummings, who was outstanding for the Hornets both offensively and defensively, crashed in to block Hogan's attempted conversion kick.

The first margin for the Hornets came on a third down and seven situation from their own 35. Miller conspired a short screen pass to fullback Clark Aldrich who picked up

a few key blocks, broke off several tackles, and went all the way to score. Bill Morrison kicked the conversion for a 7-4 lead.

Late in the third period, Nevada's Bill Gaedler intercepted a Miller pass and returned 14 yards to the 42. The distance to the end zone was closed up in nine plays. The last was a four yard pass from Ault to Dennis Fitzgerald. Ault threw to Jack Schwella for the two point conversion. That two-pointer proved to be the key play when it later provided the victory margin.

The loss leaves the Hornets 0-1 in Far Western Conference competition and it was their seventh loss to the Wolfpack in the last eight years. Nevada leads overall in the series, nine games to three. Sacramento's only recent win was last year's 20-0 rout in Reno.

Halfback Bob Falk and guard Tom Kelly were named recipients of the alumni awards as the outstanding back and lineman of the game. Other outstanding performances were turned in by quarterback Bob Miller and two-way men Dave Cummings who

caught four passes yards and turned in blocks as well as a standing play on a

## Hornets Routed 35-0 By Santa Clara Broncos

Santa Clara scored almost at will in the second half with a brilliant display of running and passing attacks to a 35-0 slaughter over Sacramento State.

Bronco quarterback Ray Czapiga passed for 138 yards and two touchdowns, while his fullback, Bob Miranda, roared for 144 yards, including a 42 yard scoring gallop.

After a respectable 7-0 score at halftime, which included a 18 yard run by Czapiga for the touchdown, the Hornets' resistance fell apart in a span of two minutes and seconds in the final quarter. Santa Clara piled up an amazing 22 points.

Bob Miranda, SCU's Little

All America candidate, started things rolling by plowing through the middle of the SSC line for 42 yards and a touchdown. Tom Kennedy failed next for the Broncos on a one yard pass, followed by scoring passes from Czapiga to Stu Boat covering 17 yards and to Miranda on a seven yard pass.

SCU's next offensive thrust came just before the end of the half as Tim Swan passed to end Bill Conacher for 44 yards to the Santa Clara 44. At that point, the Broncos defense held. The only other brilliant demonstration of the afternoon witnessed by the Hornet faithful was a sky diving exhibition sponsored by the Laura Soudter Company.

While a great deal of planning and work had gone into the April proposal long before the "idea" was introduced to the general student body about a week before the election, and while members of the planning committee maintained that their meetings were always open to any interested students, a considerable minority of students felt that the proposal was being jammed down their throats.

Discontented students filed a four-page advertisement (paid for out of student body funds) that with no exceptions recalled the virtues of what was to become a republican structure rising from what is now the center of campus. Confusion was further heightened by a pamphlet drawn up by the Union Committee that specifically, in square feet, said what was going into the Union. Yet at the same time the committee said we were only voting for the "idea" rather than a specific proposal. The failure of the Hornet to cover alternatives and the evolution of various plans for the Union when they were being discussed by the committee in their files greatly contributed to the total confusion—especially that mistakes will not be repeated.
