Coach George Relles of the Dragons eased up on the boys yesterday and spent most of the afternoon with dummy scrimmage, kicking and passing.

The boys were so anxious to go, Relles had to caution them several times to take it easy.

"We can't afford having anyone injured now," Relles told his charges.

Air Game Looms

There is every probability that the game to-morrow night will be a forward passing affair, both squads devoting much time this week to the air game. Fred Marshall, Dragons baseball pitcher, was aiming them well yesterday from his fullback berth while Joe Bottino, Larry Takai, Bob Templeman, George Yamada and Bill

Stresses Fundamentals

Relles has stressed blocking and tackling during the early practice season and if the Dragons do nothing else to-morrow they will knock somebody down.

The Sacramento High School team has a few experienced players on the team. In the starting line Yamada at end, Art McMillan and Barney Hall at tackles, Bob Lucchesi and Greg Winter at guard and Kelly Wisner at center have had some service under fire. Bowa is the only backfield veteran.

All was well in the Brothers camp yesterday with Coach Jim Flynn spending his spare moments on forward passing and pass defense. The Brothers practically won the game last year through forward flips and Flynn has not forgotten that important part of football.

But George is taking no chances of the Irish sneaking one over on him in his coming out party. He plans to start the toughest eleven boys he can muster together. His lineup will be:

In an after-game statement Jimmy Flynn, who has now coached victories over the high school in the two years he has been at Christian Brothers, credited Ralph Gillette, his quarterback, with being the game hero.

"He did some beautiful blocking, getting their halfback nearly every time, and he called the plays right every time. Ted Gardner also came through wonderfully at halfback."

BROTHERS HUMILIATE

SACRAMENTO HIGH ELEVEN 14-0

Irish Score Twice In Second Half Of Game Between Local Rivals

Sacramento High School Outplays Opposition During First Two Periods But Folds At Finish

The spectators at the football game between the Christian Brothers and the Sacramento High School at the local stadium last night would like to know what Coach Jim Flynn told his Irish between halves. Whatever the message was it fired up the Brothers and sent them to a 14 to 0 victory over the Dragons in the second half. A crowd of 3,001 paid to see the game.

Dragons Start Strong

Sacramento outplayed the Brothers pitifully in the first two quarters. The Dragons made nine first downs to none for the Irish. The Purple and White gridders were pounding on touchdown's door all the time. Once Larry Takai, Japanese halfback, went over the goal-line, but the ball was brought back and the Dragons penalized for backfield in motion.

Flynn could hardly wait to get his boys off the field to talk to them. Flynn's Irish oratory in the dressing rooms is said to have made big tackles cry and little quarterbacks fighting mad. At any rate when the Brothers ran onto the field in the second half they were a different football team.

Dragons Outplayed

The Brothers outplayed the Dragons as badly in the second half as the high school did during the first two quarters. The Irish made eight first downs to Sacramento's five and, what was much more important, made two touchdowns to the Dragons' none.

Leo Bennett and Ted Gardner did most of the manual labor in the first touchdown, but Ralph Gillette had the white collar job. He had to do the thinking for the team and he did a marvelous job. He barked the signals and mixed up the plays so well that after three first downs he called for Bob Lewis to go around the left side of the Dragons for more than twenty yards and a touchdown.

Select Plays Well

It was the mixing up of plays that deceived the Dragons and allowed Lewis to run over the goal line without a hand being laid on him. Bennett bucked the ball across for the extra point. The Irish had driven sixty-two yards after receiving the kickoff.

The Brothers' second drive that resulted in their second touchdown came in the last period. Pete Archerda and Gardner carried the ball right down the field for four first downs after the Dragons had lost the pigskin on downs near the center of the field. Archerda carried the ball across from six yards out and Bennett again bucked across for the extra counter.

Lose Ball On Downs

In the first quarter the Dragons drove to the Brothers' 3-yard line but lost the ball on downs. A penalty and a fumble ruined other threats by the high school in the second quarter. The Purple and Whites carried the ball to the 24-yard line in the third quarter and were dangerously close to the Brothers' goal line when the game ended.

The game was interesting and both teams showed much promise. The Dragons must get a touchdown punch, but their passing game with both Fred Marshall and Bob Libbee throwing the ball will be dangerous to the opposition. Glenn Dufour and Kelly Wisner, centers, and Bob Lucchesi, guard, were outstanding in the high school line. Paul Bowa got off one run of twenty-five yards.

Gillette blocked well for the Brothers and called signals like a master. Dave Simmons, guard, was a tower of strength in the Irish line.

Relles' Debut Draped in Defeat for Season's Start

Small but Courageous Catholic Gridders Pounce on Real Show in Second Half to Win

Coming back in the last half with one of those typical Gaelic finishes after having been played off their feet in the first two quarters, Jimmy Flynn's Christian Brothers school football eleven humiliated big Sacramento high for the second successive year in the stadium last night, whipping them 14 to 0.

It was a baptismal defeat for George Relles, making his debut as coach at Sacramento high.

The victory for the small but courageous Catholic squad from 21st and Y streets was complete and decisive. They rose on their haunches in spine-tingling goal line stands in the first half, then went to work on their own power in the second period and pushed over two touchdowns and two conversions—with no flukes or breaks whatever attached.

Irish Pull Perfect Play

Receiving the Sacramento high kickoff at the start of the second half, after the first had ended 0-0, the Brothers marched right down to a touchdown. Ted Gardner, the "green" halfback, alternated with the veterans Leo Bennett and Pete Archerda to run and plunge the ball for three straight first downs, to the 20-yard line.

Then, on a first down play, Flynn's men pulled one of those perfect plays to score the first touchdown—and really win the ball game. It was a double reverse and with both teams pulled far to one side of the field Bob Lewis, an end, suddenly emerged out of a backfield jumble and ran 20 yards around his own right end for the score.

Plunge for Conversion

It was one of the most deceptive plays seen in the stadium in years. No one knew who had the ball until Lewis was about 10 yards from the goal, then high backs dashed for him, but the diving tackles caught him just as he was going across.

Leo Bennett plunged through center for the conversion.

Next Brothers' score was made in the fourth quarter, resulting

from a dumb Sacramento high play. With five yards to go on fourth down in the center of the field, high eleven tried to run an end to make their yardage.

They were stopped by a line that hadn't been able to crack on the ground all evening and Brothers took possession.

Pete Archerda ripped off four yards, Leo Bennett went four, Archerda 11 more, Gardner six, so on, right down to the goal line. Four successive first downs, finally the touchdown, Archerda taking it over his right tackle for four yards.

Bennett again plunged through for the conversion.

First Half All Dragons

Coach George Relles' boys corked a beautiful passing attack in the first half and rolled up 10 yards to the Brothers' 12, nine first downs to none for the Irish.

They worked the ball to the three-yard line and sent Leo Takai over with a touchdown. Referee Jerry Abbott pulled the ball back, ruling a man was in motion.

Fred Marshall and Paul Bennett tossed short pass after short pass for the Dragons in the first half, completing, together, seven out of 10. Joe Bottino made some good shoestring catches, and Ed Coshow end, snagged a couple of nice ones.

Lewis Plays Fine Play

But the tide changed so abruptly in the second half one would have thought them the superior teams. And the Brothers showed their contempt for the aerial game by not throwing one toss all

"All I hope is that the lights blow out when they start that lateral-passing."

Jimmy Flynn hoping, folks, yes, James of the Irish Flynn's, the same young man who coaches football at Christian Brothers and isn't supposed to be a-feared of anything.

But he is a-feared, and he isn't afraid to admit it. With the second "Biggest Game" of the Brothers' schedule two days away—against Grant Union High in the stadium Thursday night—Flynn is free to admit his fears.

Flynn Saw Plenty

Flynn was at Lodi Saturday afternoon and at Lodi Saturday night. He saw Coach Spud Spalding's Grant Pacers knock out a few six-point gallops at Preston, enough to beat the Ioners, 34 to 0, and he saw Spalding start the same first string lineup against the Lodi High reserves that night, and beat the Flames, 14-0.

"That Henry Hockette is the guy we have to watch. I never saw a high school kid handle lateral passes, throw and receive 'em, like he can. If you thought Spalding had a lateral-pass attack last year, you ought to see him this," said Flynn yesterday.

'No Defense'

"I don't know how we can stop that stuff, either. In fact, lateral-passing has come up so fast in the last few years no one has been able to work out a defense for it, to my knowledge. All I can say is that I hope the lights go out—maybe we'll have a chance."

Discount as much of that as you want, because Jimmy is of course talking for that old underdog position, but it appears the Grant principal and its most ardent rooter, Bill Rutherford, really knew something when he said a week or so ago the Pacers were 50 per cent better than last year's nine-straight-wins eleven.

though Brothers were tied, 7-7, in their first game, by Sutter Creek. They defeated Sacramento high 14 to 0 two weeks ago.

IRISH, GRANT WILL CLASH TO-MORROW

Spud Spalding Names Starting Lineup For Pacers Grid Team

With both teams stressing aerial attacks during practice sessions this week, a battle of forward passes looms in the Sacramento Stadium to-morrow night as the Christian Brothers School and the Grant Union High School football teams come together at 7:45 o'clock.

The Brothers, with a victory over the Sacramento High School in the record books this season, and the Pacers with a pair of wins over Preston and the Lodi Reserves, will carry their hopes for a successful Fall into to-morrow night's contest.

May Stop Laterals

Coach Jimmy Flynn of the Brothers worked his first string on offensive plays last night until after dark in an effort to bolster his running and passing attack. Flynn also has a defense planned to stop Coach Spud Spalding's lateral pass attack, which was the main cog in the team's offensive thrusts last year.

At the North Sacramento field the Pacers were running through their varied array of plays under the guidance of Spalding, who is none too optimistic about to-morrow night's fray.

Carrying the ball in to-morrow night's battle for the Grant eleven when the team gets under way will be Henry Hockett, a last year's veteran.

Three Are Hurt

Ray Baker, Charles Elam and Frank Lindeburg round out the backfield for Spalding. Lindeburg is a veteran of the 1935 outfit, and worked with Hockett last season.

There are two doubtful starters on each squad, with Frank Barbara definitely out for the Brothers and Jack Adee on the ailing list at Grant. Adee was one of the best wingmen in this section in 1935 and if he is unable to go to the post-to-morrow night the Pacers will be weakened considerably. Cliff Russell, Jr., end for the Irish, has a bad ankle and will see the tilt from the bench.

Lineup Is Given

The Twenty-first and Y Streets gridders have an old score to settle with the suburban squad, having taken a 13 to 0 thumping from them last season.

Flynn's Eleven Performs Like Those Rockne Teams of Old; Suburb Attack Stopped

Shades of Knute Rockne and those great blocking teams of yesteryear!

The maestro of football would have beamed assent had he seen Sacramento's little "Notre Dame," the Christian Brothers school eleven, block, pass, charge and run its way to a smashing 24-0 victory over a favored Grant Union high school team in the stadium last night.

He'd have said to Jimmy Flynn, Brothers coach, "My boy, we couldn't have done much better with 'em back at Notre Dame."

Played Great Ball

Because the Brothers turned in a great football contest. They looked good in the second half against Sacramento high, winning that one 14-0 two weeks ago, but they looked twice as good scoring two touchdowns in each half last night and holding the vaunted Grant attack to nothing.

Ted Gardner, the halfback who had never played before this season, paced the scoring by crossing the goal line twice for the Flynnmen, once after catching a pass from Pete Archerda, the second time after a pretty piece of cutback running through the Grant line.

Gillette Stars Again

But it was Ralph Gillette, Irish quarterback, who almost stole the show again, just as he did against the high school, turning in perfect blocking for Gardner and Archerda's many end runs and off-tackle slants. And, to boot, he was all over the field on defense.

Brothers scored in the first three minutes after a sustained 55-yard march, featuring the end runs of Gillette and Archerda, climaxing with Gardner's seven-yard dash off tackle for the score. Neither was converted.

Quick-kick Here!

Spud Spalding, Grant coach, gave his team a pip of a pep talk between halves but darned if the kids didn't come out and, 12 points behind, try a quick-kick on second down. Their kicking hadn't been too hot all evening and Brothers got possession in midfield and started to go.

One line play, then bing! around the Grant left end came Bob (Red) Lewis, Brothers flankman, on that end-around that fooled Sacramento high. Forty-five yards Lewis rambled to a touchdown with nary a hand being laid on him, and the count was 18-0.

An erstwhile baseball player, Ted Gardner, turned gridiron warrior, set the tempo for the Irish and was aided by the best of blocking from his mates, particularly Ralph Gillette, who took two Pacers out of the plays as he led the interference for the Gaels.

The Twenty-first and Y Street gridgers did not waste any time in getting their machine under way. They took possession of the ball shortly after the kickoff and a pass from Pete Archerda to Gardner was good for twenty-five yards and he reced the other five yards to score.

12 To 0 At Half

A Grant back deflected the ball as it was traveling through the air but Gardner leaped into the ozone and was off for touchdown turf.

The score was 12 to 0 at the half way mark as the locals drove in a sustained march down the center of the field for fifty-two yards, with Gardner going over for the score on a seven-yard sweep around the end.

The Brothers tallied a pair of touchdowns immediately after the intermission on an end around play by Bob Lewis, which was good for forty-five yards and completely fooled the North Sacramento outfit's secondary.

The only unbeaten football team in Sacramento cut another notch in its pistol handle at the stadium yesterday.

Coach Jimmy Flynn's Christian Brothers' school eleven whipped a green jerseyed outfit from St. Vincent's of Vallejo, 12 to 0, before a handful of fans who got their voting done early and came out to watch a strictly non-political contest.

It was the fourth straight shut-out victory for the Brothers, who have not been beaten or scored upon since they went up to Sutter Creek on three days' notice and played a 7-7 tie with foothillers in the first game of the year.

St. Mary's Next

Saturday in the stadium Flynn sends his men out again, this time against St. Mary's High of Stockton. If they get over that one they will become the first undefeated Sacramento team in several years.

The Brothers scored twice in the second period yesterday and that was the ball game. They held the upper hand all the way, with the visitors unable to gain any ground at all against the big first-string line, which played airtight ball.

The Touchdowns

Opening touchdown was scored on a straight march downfield, with Bob (Red) Lewis, left end, putting the ball in position for score with an 11-yard end-round. Pete Archerda, halfback, took it over.

Brothers kicked off to St. Vincent's, who fumbled the catch and Brothers recovered on the 25-yard line. A few effective line thrusts, then the Brothers scored again when Archerda passed to Ted Gardner for a touchdown. It was a nifty flat pass down the center for about eight yards.

Lewis, Brothers' captain for the day, playing with one finger in a cast, put on a great defensive performance as did Vic Martinelli.

Archerda had his "hottest" day of the season at halfback, tearing off several runs of over 20 yards, while Henry Petois, opening fullback, and Ralph Gillette, quarter, did excellent blocking.

Frank Barbaria, Tackle, Returns To Brothers Team

Frank Barbaria, veteran tackle, returned this week to the Christian Brothers School football squad and may see action at Grass Valley Saturday. Barbaria was slated for a first string tackle berth this season, but he has been hampered by a bad knee and saw action for but two minutes in the Sacramento High School game.

Barbaria also is a capable punter and will aid the Brothers in their first game against the Miners, if Coach Jimmy Flynn elects to send him in the contest.

A major shift has been made in the Brothers reserve squad, with the moving of Pat Tappan, a halfback, to the fullback post. The shift was necessitated by the injury to Harold Petois, second string fullback, who will be out for the next two weeks with an injured leg.

Brother Albert said the Gaels increased their football attendance by \$70,000 last year over 1935 despite losses in two games—Idaho and Temple.

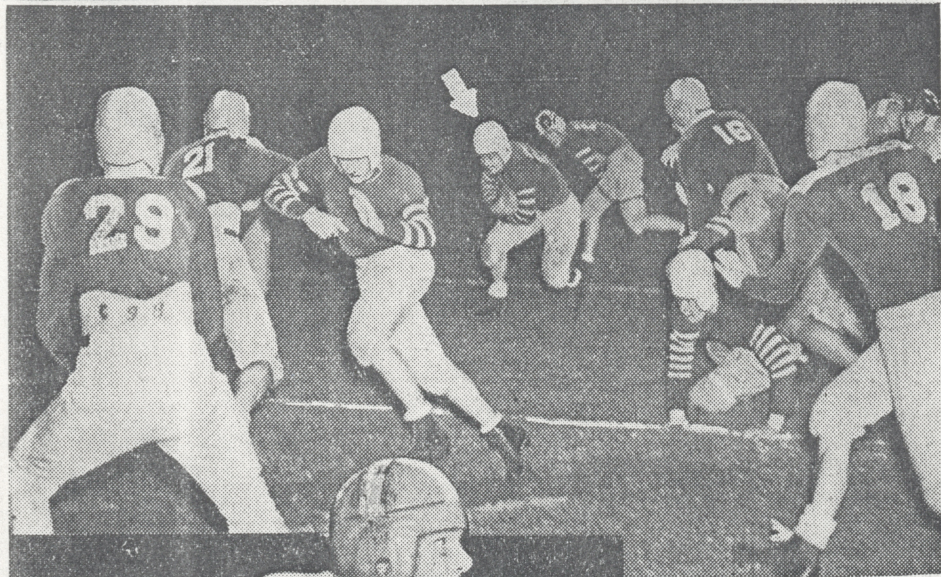
