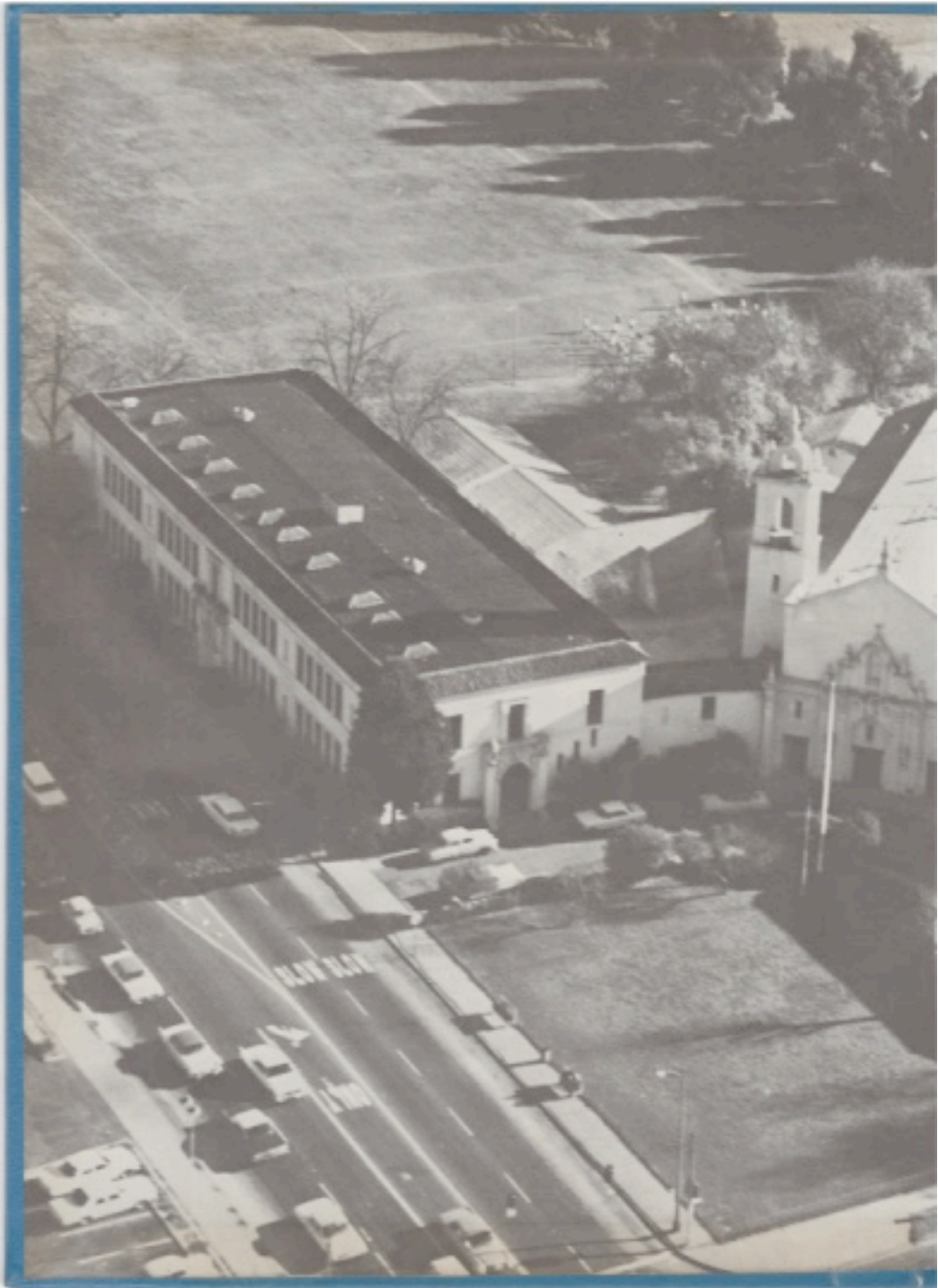
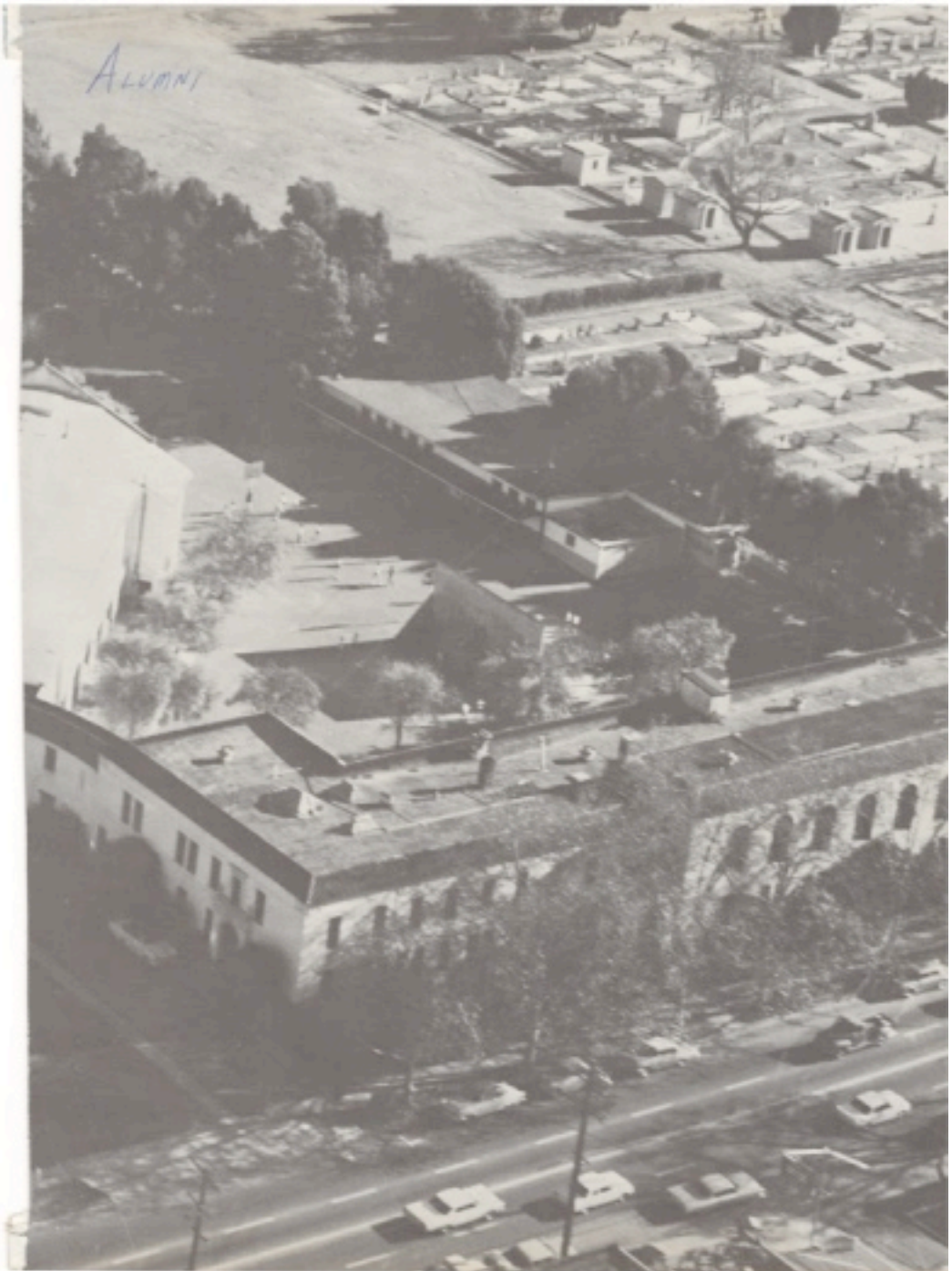

Dear Students:

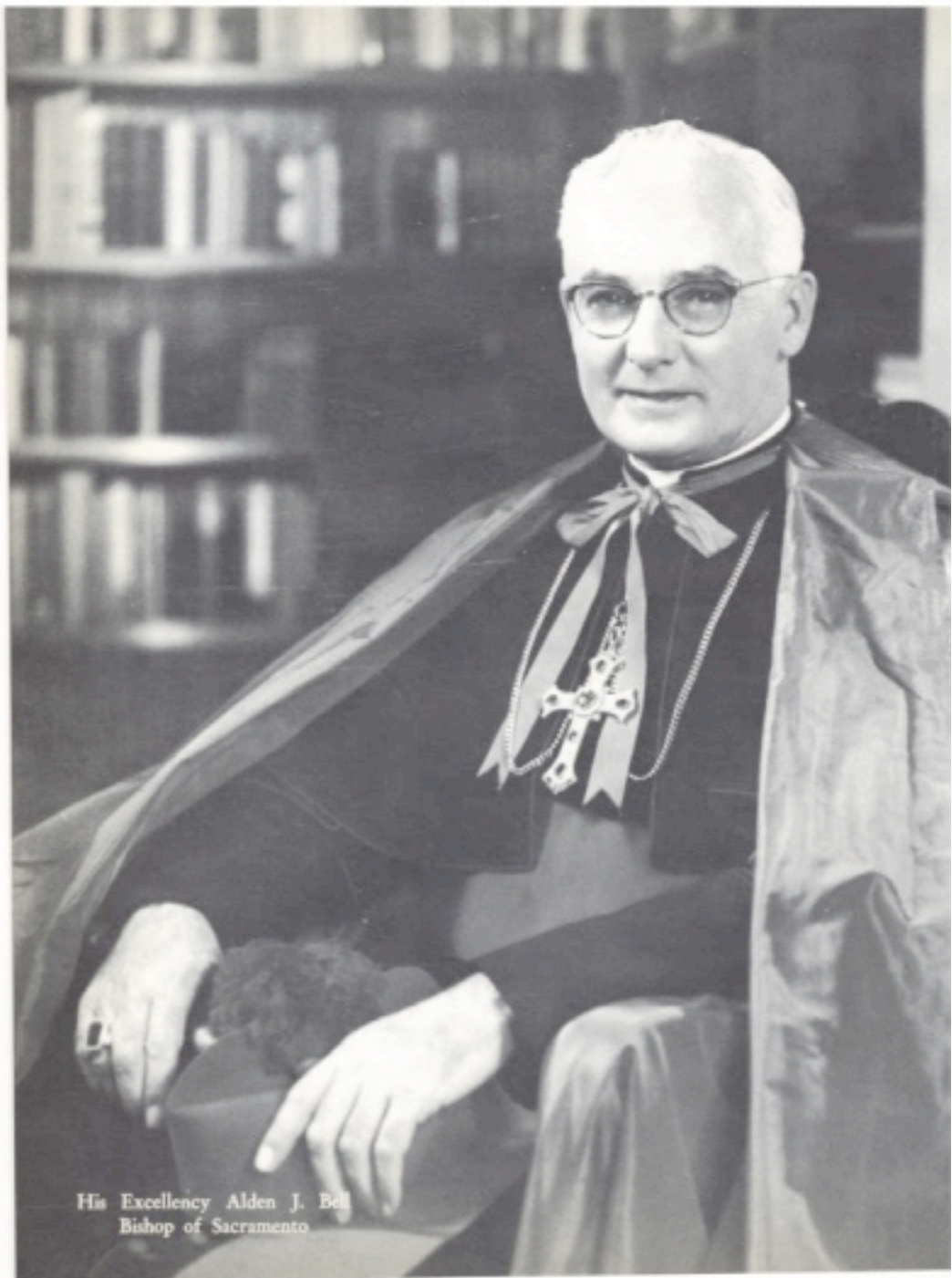

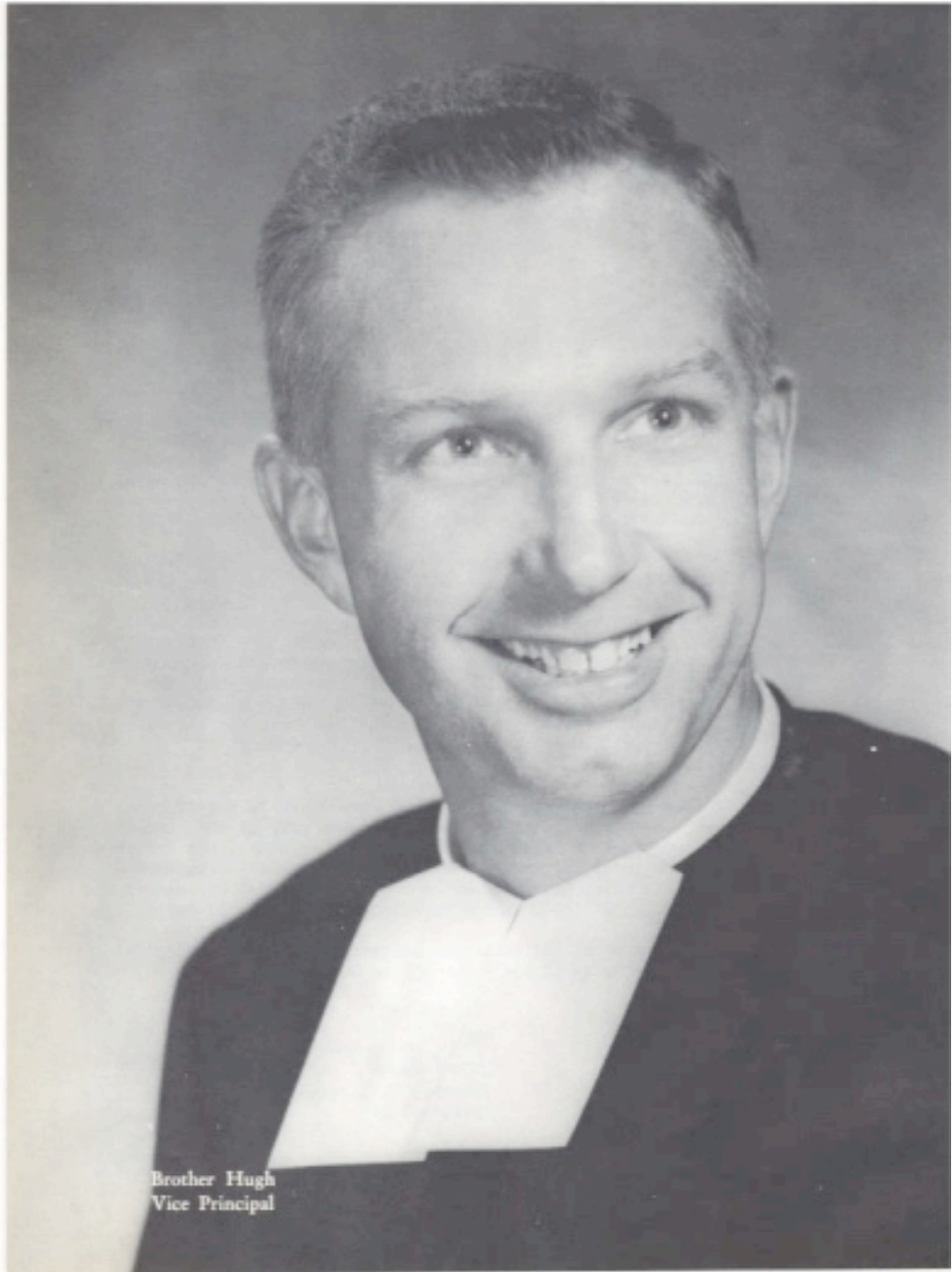

Soon, this will be one of the largest Catholic boys' high schools in all of California. In this modern setting -- named in honor of Bishop Armstrong, the friend, benefactor and affiliated member of the Christian Brothers Congregation -- the work of the Brothers will be continued and extended for the greater benefit of the boys of the Diocese of Sacramento.

For all of us, Christian Brothers School is not a place; it is not an address. It is a delightful remembrance of things past and a constant pledge of the good future.

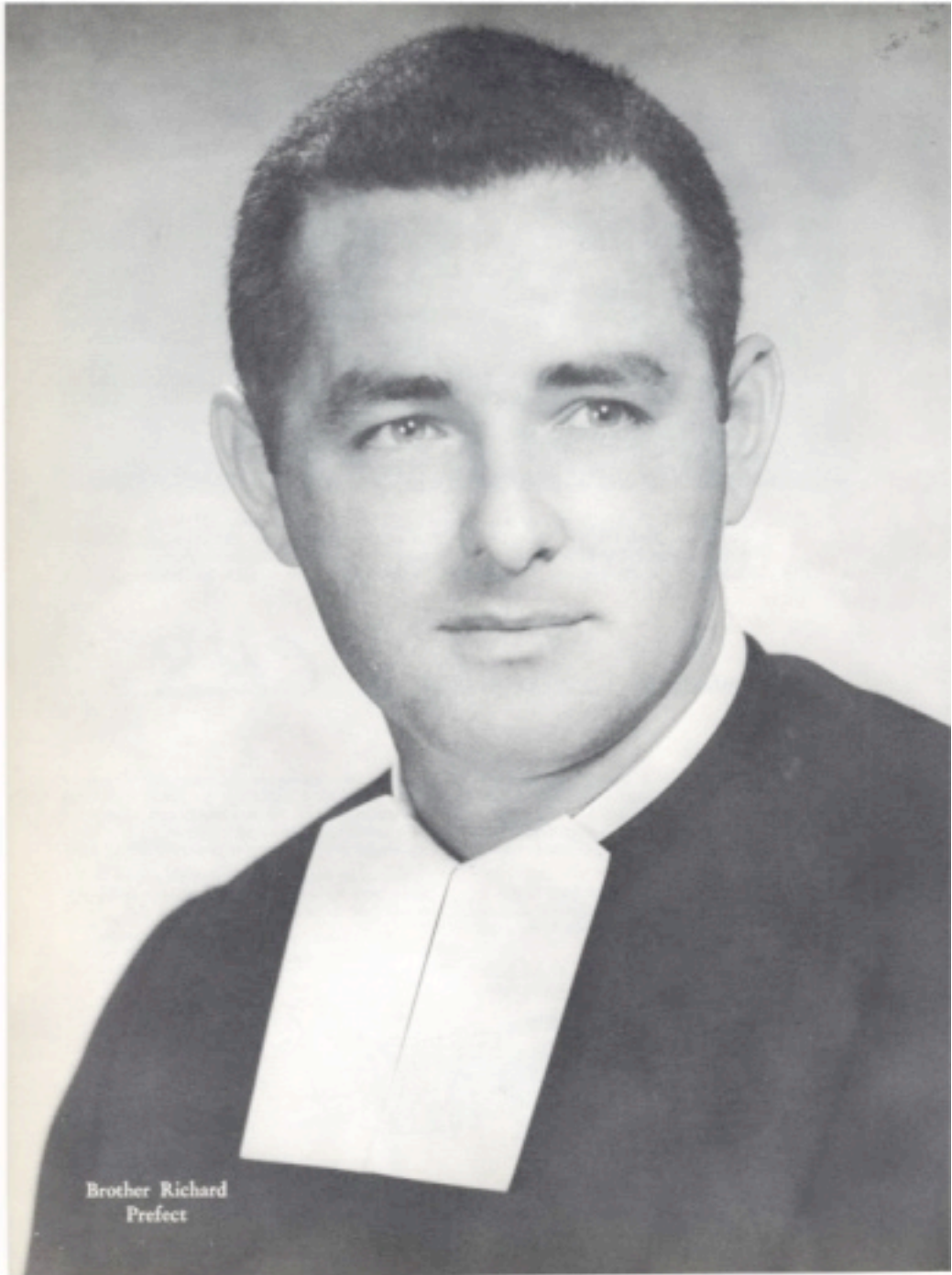
We are a part of all we meet; this is the great reward of teaching. Because of this our life is richer

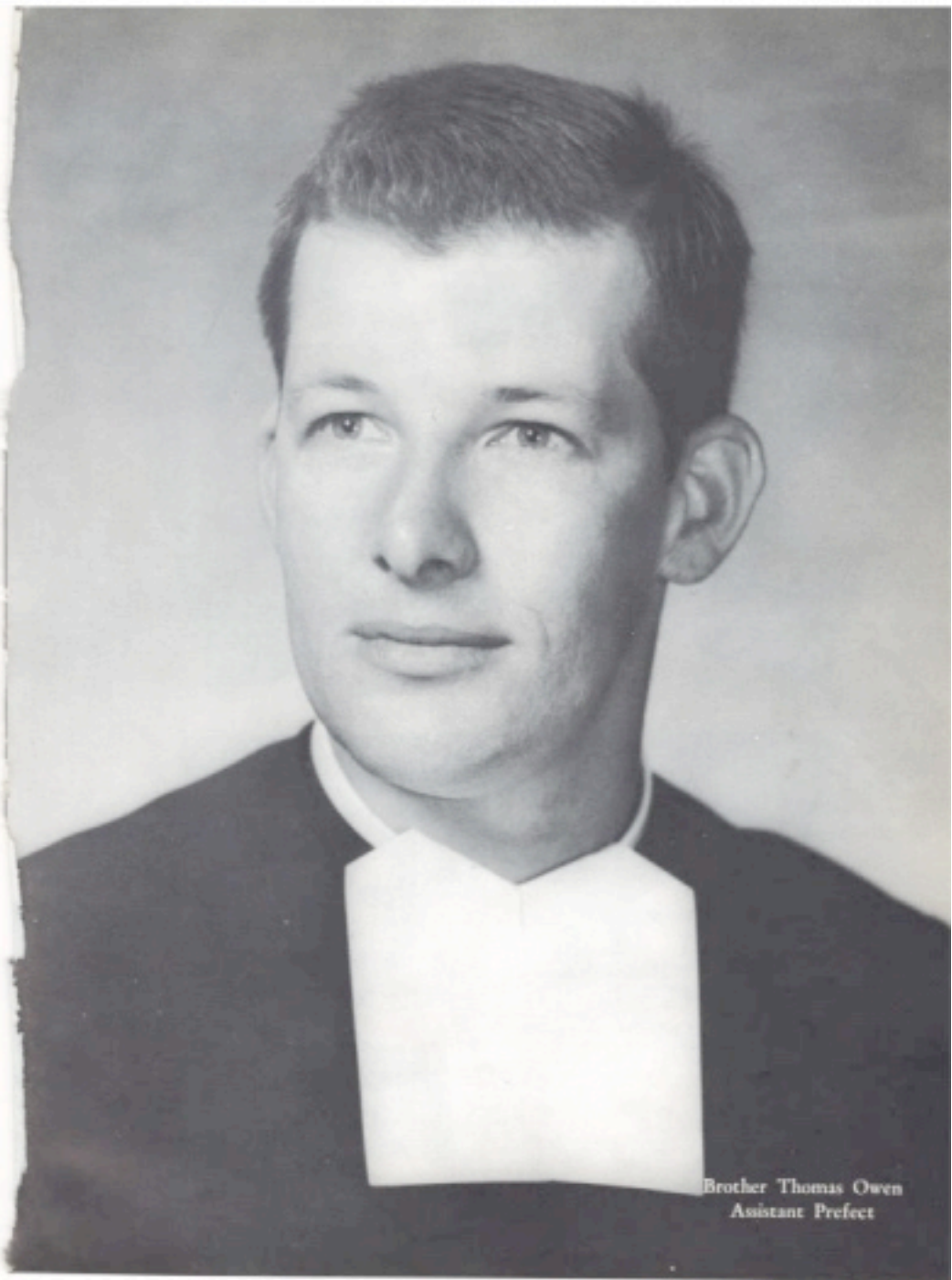
But, as no one can deny the sweet sorrow of last looks, may we for a moment borrow a melancholy phrase from John Keats?

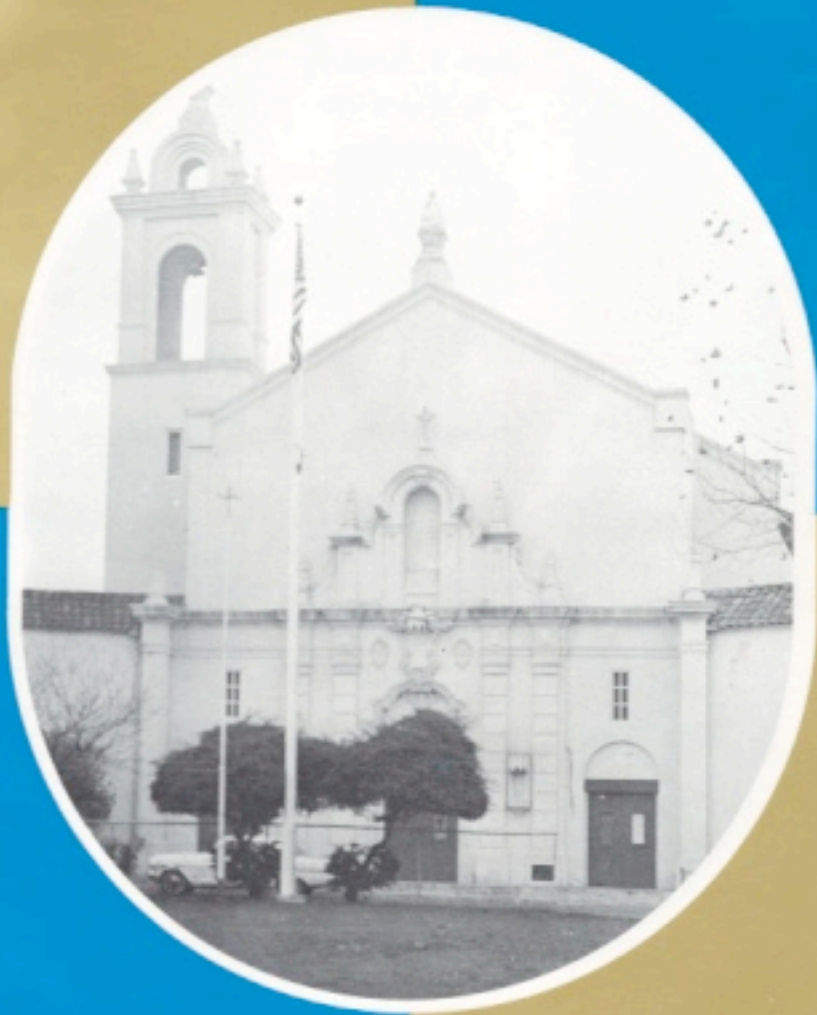

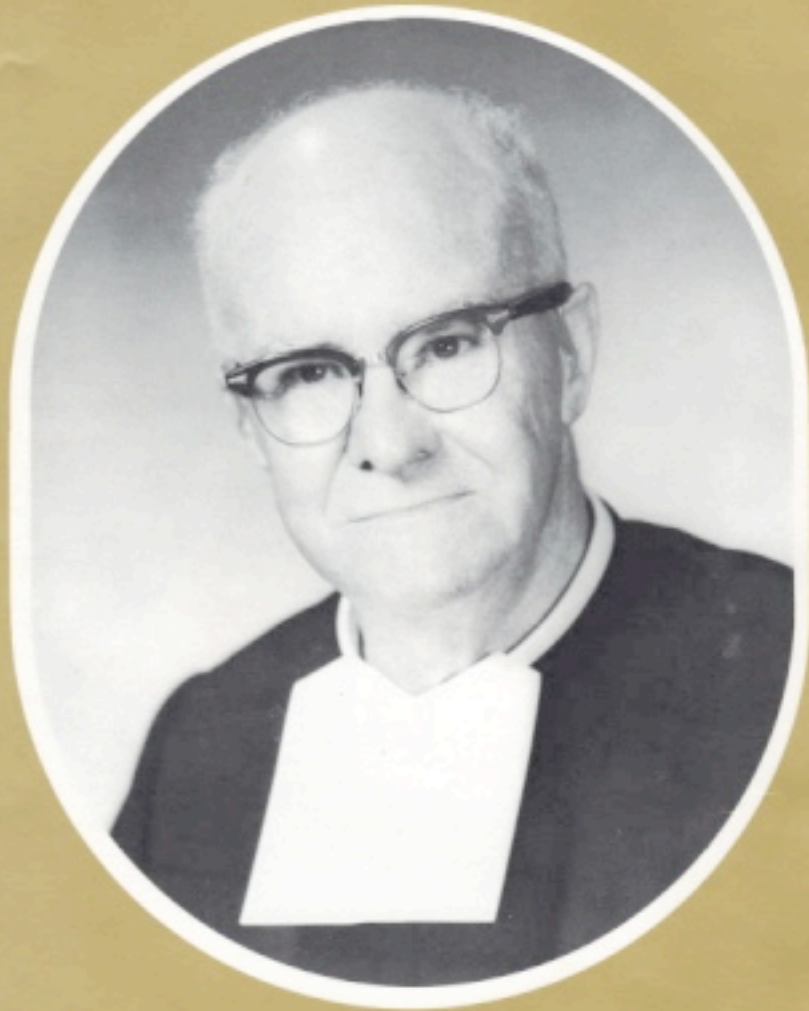
So little can be said at a time such as this. Whatever is expressed is incapable of conveying adequately confused and turbulent inner passion.

Was a Man of Action



St. John Baptiste de LaSalle

Born of a noble parentage at Rheims on April 30, 1651, John Baptist de LaSalle manifested such piety and love of learning at an early age as to seem to be destined for a higher life.

As the eldest in the family, however, he should normally follow his father in the legal profession and continue the family line and tradition. This obstacle, however, was overcome because of the Christian mentality of his parents.

At the age of sixteen, he was made a canon of the cathedral chapter at Rheims, a truly signal honor. Having finished his preparatory studies, he entered the Seminary of St. Sulpice in Paris where he became a model to his companions.

However, before he could complete his course his father and mother died in rapid succession and he, as eldest, was in duty bound to return and take care of the household.

In the meanwhile, he continued his ecclesiastical studies and was ordained on April 9, 1678. His first Mass was marked by extraordinary fervor. Contrary to the custom of his time, he held firmly to the absolute necessity of daily celebration of the Sacrifice of the Altar.

He became involved in educational work in an entirely providential manner. A certain M. Nysl came from Rouen to establish free schools for boys in the city of Rheims. Canon de LaSalle found himself taking an even greater interest in the work, especially the formation of the masters. He had them for a while eating in his house, much to the disgust of his highborn relatives.

Eventually, he gave up his canonry and with the advice of his confessor, Father Barre, his entire patrimony in the famine of 1684. Having placed himself on a level of equality with his teachers, he was able to lead them along the path of complete abandonment to Providence.

The first school to be founded with the assistance of St. de LaSalle was St. Maurice in Rheims in September, 1679. In 1684, after a general meeting to decide on rules, regulations and customs in the new society, twelve Brothers and St. de LaSalle took the vow of obedience for one year.



For forty years, the work of founding schools and training Brothers continued. During this long period, there was opposition from all quarters: from Bishops, priests, writing masters and similar vested interests.

St. John Baptist de LaSalle was a man of action rather than a writer. Nevertheless, he left to his Brothers some very valuable works: Rules, Management of Schools, The Rules for Politeness and Christian Civility, The duties of the Christian, Collection of Various Treatises for the use of the Brothers, Meditations for Sundays and Principal Feasts and several other writings. He died on Good Friday, April 7, 1719. Immediately the people acclaimed his sanctity which was officially recognized at his canonization on May 24, 1900. Pope Pius XII proclaimed him the "Patron of All Teachers" and his feast day is celebrated on May 15th each year.



Christian Brothers School

Our Heritage

Completing eighty-eight years of service to the cause of Catholic education in the Sacramento Diocese, Christian Brothers School moves to Bishop Armstrong High School and will continue the distinguished traditions of the Christian Brothers.

Founded by Brother Justin in 1876, under the title St. Patrick's Institute, the school was first located at 12th and K Streets and soon reached an enrollment of 250 students with 10 resident students in the boarding department. The first building was dedicated by the pioneer Archbishop of San Francisco, the Most Reverend Joseph Sadoc Alemany, O.P., D.D., on July 15, 1876.

Even though the school was named St. Patrick's Institute, it was called Sacramento Institute and this name remained until 1896. For a number of years it was called Christian Brothers College.

During 1925-1924, the school was temporarily located at 39th and J Streets.

On September 15, 1924, Most Reverend Edward J. Hanna, D.D., Archbishop of San Francisco, dedicated the school at its present location at Twenty-first and Broadway. The articles of incorporation of September 24, 1924, officially changed the title to Christian Brothers School. Final addition to the school was an up-to-date gymnasium-auditorium dedicated on January 24, 1927.

This year 1964 marks the historic closing of Christian Brothers School.

Our eyes and hopes are now focused on Bishop Armstrong High School who receives the obligations of continuing the spirit of Christian Brothers School entrusted to her.

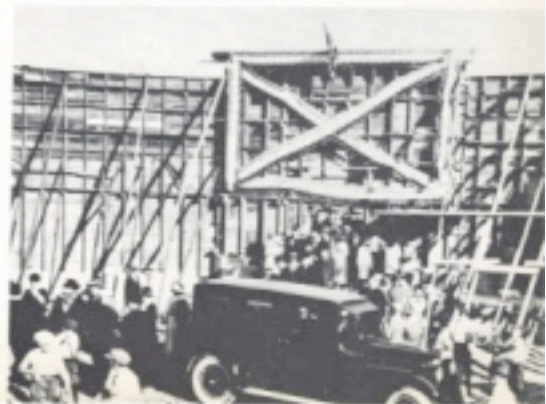


Location at 12th and K Streets
