



Westlake, Waldon "Wally" T.

Waldon "Wally" T. Westlake, the 2nd oldest living Major League Baseball player (98), passed away, Thursday, September 5,2019, at his home in Sacramento.

Wally was preceded in death by his wife Ricee (62 years) and his oldest daughter Patricia. He will be dearly missed by his daughter, Connie (Angelo) Feliciello, his son Wally (Donna), daughter Cathleen (Tim) Corr, and son, Joe. He had four grandchildren, Mike Van Voorhees, Mollyrose Corr, Amy Corr, and Kaley Corr, and great grandchildren, Danielle Van Voorhees and Brennen Van Voorhees.

Wally came from a humble beginning. He was born November 8th, 1920 in Gridley, CA. His parents were Helene and Waldon "Wes" Westlake. The family moved from Gridley to Sacramento when Wally was 5 years old. He was taught early on honesty and integrity, love of the land, and a strong faith in God. He lived these values his entire life. He was a man that never spoke ill of another person and lived by his father's rule of thumb, "a man is only as good as his mouth."

He had friends from the west coast to the east coast. He was still receiving daily baseball fan mail and was contacted often for an interview. Wally was not only a loving husband, father, and grandfather, but an avid hunter and fisherman. We know he's enjoying a good dove season in heaven. He was a graduate of Christian Brothers High School and was inducted into the Christian Brothers Hall of Fame and the La Salle Club Hall of Fame.

Wally had a 10-year MLB career, 1947 – 1956 with many highlights; 1948-1949 two-time cycle



hitter, 1947-1951, 103 HR's with 417 RIB's, 1951 NL All Star, 1954 Indians AL Champs and World Series, In 10 seasons, 272 batting average, 127 Homeruns, 539 RBI's, and seven grand slams.

After returning to the West Coast and playing for the Oakland Oaks, Portland Beavers, and Sacramento Solons, he retired from baseball in 1956. Wally was inducted into the Sacramento Hall of Fame in 1974.

Wally's employment history included; Tidewater Od, Larchmont Homes, Aerojet (10 years), and Teichert Construction for 16 years.

The family would like to thank his caregiver, Sammy, he was a perfect fit. Sammy was his angel. The care, compassion, friend-ship, and love he provided was a true blessing to Wally and the family. We would also like to thank the Sutter Hospice team.

Westlake was a member of the 1954 Cleveland Indians team, who were swept by the New York Giants in the 1954 World Series. He played in two games of the Series, batting 1-for-7 (.143) with one walk. Following the death of fellow teammate Hal Naragon, Westlake was the last surviving player to play with the Indians in the 1954 World Series.

In 958 regular season games played, Westlake hit .272 with 127 home runs and 539 RBIs. He played 738 games in the National League, and 220 games in the American League. He played 834 games in the outfield, and 34 games at third base (all of his games at third were with the 1951 Pittsburgh Pirates).

On August 26, 1947, Westlake became the first white batter hit by a pitch from a black pitcher - <u>Dan Bankhead</u> of the Brooklyn Dodgers at Ebbets Field.^[4]

Personal life

Westlake graduated from Christian Brothers High School in Sacramento. His brother Jim Westlake was also a major league player.

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Career

Born in Gridley, California, Westlake played for the Pittsburgh Pirates, St. Louis Cardinals, Cincinnati Reds and Philadelphia Phillies of the National League, and the Cleveland Indians and Baltimore Orioles of the American League. He primarily played as an outfielder, with some appearances as a third baseman.

Westlake hit for the cycle twice in his career (both while playing for the Pirates), coming almost a year apart; July 30, 1948, against the Brooklyn Dodgers, [1] and June 14, 1949, against the Boston Braves. [2]
