They were varsity players as freshmen on a team that did not qualify for the postseason. As they capped their high school careers with the state championship, they embraced each other after being dog-piled by teammates.

"Just having her as a best friend, like a sister, and having her with me my whole life and having this last year with her and our team end in such an amazing way," Nelson said. "You couldn't ask for more."

Separated by just nine days at birth, they have been inseparable since the Deterses moved in next door 14 years ago.

"I know I'm going to look back and tell my kids about this," Deters said. "I know Taylor and I will remain best friends throughout our lives. Maybe we can move in next to each other when we're older and have our kids play volleyball together."

But first there's college. Nelson didn't have to think long about her choice of Cal Poly, where her parents excelled in athletics, mom, Vera, in volleyball, dad, Rich, in baseball.

"I've wanted to go there for as long as I can remember," Nelson said. "My parents took me there when I was 5. We were all there in all of our Cal Poly gear. Ever since then, I fell in love with the campus and couldn't see myself anywhere else."

"I am just excited to see her go through all the things we did," Vera Nelson said. "College athletics is amazing, and (she) will find some amazing friends there."

Nelson, an honors student with a 3.92 grade-point average, graduated from Granite Bay last Friday, so she can enroll at Cal Polynext month.
