A MESSAGE FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Dear Parents,

Welcome to the 2013-14 academic year at Christian Brothers High School! We are delighted to begin another year of excellence in teaching and learning, partnering together with you in providing a human and Christian education for your children. This year brings many new and exciting innovations to our rigorous college preparatory curriculum and we are ready for a splendid year!

Let's talk about the biggest change we are embracingthe implementation of our iPad program. Many of you
may have watched the amusing clip from Germany that
has been going around the internet the past few months.
It shows a daughter and father in the kitchen and the
daughter asks (in German), "So papa, how do you like
the iPad we got you?" He answers positively. However,
no one needs to know German in order to understand
the daughter's look of both horror and bemusement as
she realizes that her father is using the iPad as a cutting
board for vegetables, then takes it to the sink and rinses it,
and finally loads it into the dishwasher! It is a humorous
reminder that change, for any generation, can be difficult.

We realize that increased technology does bring changes for both students and teachers this year. Our teachers began training with the device in the summer of 2012. Their enthusiasm and willingness to explore and create wonderful opportunities to enhance learning and the overall classroom experience has been inspiring. Students will utilize the iPad for a wide variety of class activities, as a research tool, creative apparatus and a catalyst for out-of-class interactions. In addition, students will use Schoology, a learning management system, as a means of keeping track of course information and expanded communication with teachers.

In terms of the iPad as it relates to textbook use, currently, approximately a third of our school texts are in digital platforms. We fully expect this number to increase well into the future. Unfortunately, many publishers do not yet have digital versions of their texts and some digital

versions are actually more expensive than their print counterparts. Our teachers were instructed to make book choices with the best interests of our students and families in mind. You may be familiar with Adam Bellow's vision of "The Last Backpack Generation," with students having all needed resources in devices that store data in the cloud. That day is coming, but it will take time.

Thomas Friedman (author of The World is Flat and That Used to be Us) recently shared that our children are hyperconnected and are growing up in a fundamentally different world than when we were in school. While that is true, other truths remain - and that is the connection of relationships. Christian Brothers is the place to be for rigor - students graduate college-ready; relevance students learn 21st century skills that prepare them for careers not even invented yet; but most especially relationships. Our Founder, St. John Baptist De La Salle, shared with teachers that "To touch the hearts of your students is the greatest miracle you can perform." We are committed to touching the hearts of the students entrusted. to our care - your children. While the iPad provides an important tool to enhance learning, nothing replaces the precious relationships we build together as we proclaim Gospel values and encourage faith and morals at our Catholic, Lasallian school. It is an honor and a privilege to collaborate with you in this vital endeavor. Thank you. Here's to a fantastic year together!

Feast of the Assumption of Mary......On November 1, 1950, Pius XII defined the Assumption of Mary to be a dogma of faith: "We pronounce, declare and define it to be a divinely revealed dogma that the immaculate Mother of God, the ever Virgin Mary, having completed the course of her earthly life, was assumed body and soul to heavenly glory." The pope proclaimed this dogma only after a broad consultation of bishops, theologians and laity.

For Catholic Christians, the belief in the Assumption of Mary flows from our belief in and understanding of Mary's Immaculate Conception. We believe that if Mary was preserved from sin by the free gift of God, she would not be bound to experience the consequences of sin and death in the same way that we do. We believe that because of the obedience and fidelity of the Blessed Virgin Mary, at the end of her earthly life, she was assumed both body and soul into heavenly glory.

Mary is a model for each of us, and her Assumption into heaven reminds us that there is hope for you and me. What happens to the Virgin daughter of Nazareth at the end of her earthly pilgrimage will happen to each of us if we are faithful and obedient as she was.

Taken up into heaven, Mary shows us the way to God, the way to heaven, the way to life.

She shows it to her children baptized in Christ and to all people of good will. The Queen of the world reveals to individuals and to nations the power of the love of God whose plan upsets that of the proud, pulls down the mighty from their thrones and exalts the humble, fills the hungry with good things and sends the rich away empty (Luke 1:51-53).



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Year 138 is off to a great start

recent article in the Sacramento Bee reported a downward trend in private education and growing enrollment in area charter schools. At Christian Brothers, we are bucking that trend, with a 4.5 percent increase in enrollment over last year and our largest freshman class in five years.

As we begin our 138th year of Catholic, Lasallian education in Sacramento, the hard work, planning, yearlong teacher training, and infrastructure investment paid off on August 16 when 1,100 iPads merged onto CB's new superhighway without a hitch. The world is opening to our students in ways we never dreamed possible 20 years ago. And yet, many of the traditional rites of passage are holding strong - Frosh Lock-In, a Community Mass, the Blue and Red Scrimmage, Back-to-School Night and this month's Holy Bowl. Maybe that is the magic of CB, continued educational innovation and excellence built on a foundation of tradition, community and faith.

Our international student community has grown from 12 students last year (the program's first year) to 18 students this year. We are grateful to the families who have welcomed these young men and women into their homes for an enriching, cultural adventure. I encourage those of you who might be interested in hosting a student next year to contact Patricia Gallagher, our International Student Program Director.

The Victor and Phela Vesci Strength and Conditioning Center opened at the end of August. This new cardio and core conditioning room will enhance the strength, agility and safety of all student-athletes, improve the health and well-being of all of our 1,045 students, and ensure that all teams are in top physical condition when they take to the court, the pool or the field.

Thanks to the generosity of many alumni, parents, and friends, The George Cunningham '40 Performing Arts Center is still on schedule for spring performances. If you haven't contributed to this project, there is still time to purchase naming rights for a seat in the Thea Stidum Theatre!

We are grateful to you for entrusting us with the sacred responsibility of preparing your sons and daughters for success in college and beyond. Our Principal, Mary Hesser, faculty members, and staff work hard to ensure your confidence in Christian Brothers is well placed. As parents who invest considerable resources in your children's education, please know that we take our fiscal and educational responsibilities seriously. We have worked hard to keep tuition increases to a minimum. Over the past four years our tuition increases have averaged 1.3%, compared to 3.9% for all northern California Catholic high schools. And we are proud to lead the region in tuition assistance. In 2013-14, we are distributing \$2.15 million in need-based tuition assistance to 392 deserving students (37.5% of our students.) We are able to do so thanks in large part to the generosity of our benefactors who support our annual fundraising efforts and who have donated to our endowment over the years.

COUNSELING AND GUIDANCE DEPARTMENT

Welcome to Christian Brothers, all new and returning families! Counselors are busy assisting students with resolving personal issues, helping them plan strategies for academic success and providing college planning information. Each grade-level counselor in grades 9-11 is scheduling individual conferences with each of his/her students, so all students will be seen by their counselor this semester for one-on-one counseling. Mr. John Riley-Portal is having all freshmen complete the "Learning Styles Inventory" on Family Connection. The freshmen are now all able to access this very important website for college and career planning and personal awareness. Mr. Armando Diaz has the sophomores taking "Do What You Are," a personality profile/career interest survey. In addition, Ms. Melissa McClellan and Mr. Kirk Purdy are visiting junior English classes to discuss college planning and the resources available to students in our College Center, on Family Connection and on our school website. Ms. McClellan has already visited all of the senior classes to give very specific information on how the counselors will assist in the college application process. Mr. John Higgins is the long-term sub for senior counselor, Mrs. Blaire Moskat (who is out this semester on maternity leave) and he has already visited the seniors to introduce himself. The department will be hosting College Night for Seniors and Their Parents on Wednesday, September 11 (7:00 pm, CB Cafeterla) to present important and timely college information to seniors and parents. On Wednesday, September 18 (7:00 p.m., CB Cafeterla). our entire department will be hosting Frash Parents Guidance Night for all parents of freshmen students. We will give parents a preview of what to expect from the Counseling & Guidance Department over the next four years and we will discuss important issues concerning Academic, Personal and College Counseling.

College Exploration for Seniors

The early weeks of the senior year are a time when college exploration will continue and it is time to narrow down a "short list" of those colleges and universities that match up with desired characteristics identified by your son or daughter as important to their educational ambitions and needs. Unlike the junior year and earlier, this year is one that will be influenced by deadline dates and other milestones when tasks must be completed. The soundest piece of guidance you can give your senior student is to create a "things to do" list as the new school year begins, to see their counselor(s) and to utilize Family Connection. An orderly approach to all of the admission and financial aid applications tasks will ensure they do not become a distraction to the important things that must continue to happen in the classroom.

Reminders for everyone: School is in full swing! Monitor these early weeks of school and make certain your son or daughter attends to the following tasks:

- Launch the year determined to be as successful as possible. Don't allow the college exploration, decision-making or application process to become a distraction.
- Review the courses on your child's current schedule and make certain they are pointing toward her or his college goals.
 Plan ahead for next year's classes. Also look at upcoming testing dates and their registration deadlines.
- Juniors and seniors should schedule visits to the colleges they haven't seen to this point. Revisit those where unanswered
 questions exist. Seniors will soon be refining their list of colleges and initiating the application process.
- Make sure your child listens to the daily announcements and KBFT, and checks the CB website in order to hear about
 college evenings presented by specific colleges/universities and the dates and times for our college application and
 essay writing workshops. Remind them to sign up for any of the 30-40 college rep visits on our campus and to attend
 the College Fair that CB co-hosts with the other Catholic high schools. This year, it will be held at St. Francis High School
 on Tuesday, September 24, from 6:30-8:30 pm.
- Juniors should begin to map out a long-range strategy for college exploration. Sometime soon, each student must
 identify those characteristics that she or he is looking for in a college and now is the time to begin thinking about those
 criteria. Initial exploration can involve general college guides and videos or the more specific information presented by
 colleges on their websites. Juniors should plan on taking the SAT or ACT March or later of the 2013-2014 academic year.
 Each junior has received information that allows them to log on at our college planning website, CB's Family Connection.
 If they have not already done so, juniors should complete "Do What You Are" and the "Career Interest Profiler".
- Some eager sophomores may want to become more engaged in the high school-to-college transition, but this is a time
 for them to concentrate on the classroom and do the best job they can do to bring home good grades in challenging
 college prep classes.

God of Strength, comfort and console us, strengthen us in hope, and give us the wisdom and courage to work tirelessly for a world where true peace and love reign among nations and in the hearts of all.

"FREEDOM is not only a gift, but also a summons to personal responsibility. Americans know this from experience – almost every town in this country has its monuments honoring those who sacrificed their lives in defense of freedom, both at home and abroad. TEST PREP FOR SAT AND ACT:

There are now three ways at Christian Brothers to do test preparation prior to taking the SAT or ACT exam.

- Saturday SAT prep class with our own English and Math teachers (9 am-1 pm on four consecutive Saturdays beginning September 7). Cost of the course is \$150.
- Revolution Test Prep for the SAT (new this yeart). This course will be taught six consecutive Thursdays leading up to the November 2 SAT. Classes will run from 3:15-6:15 pm oncampus (18 total hours of instruction). The Standard Group course costs 5:599. The Hybrid Course costs 5:899 and includes four hours of private tutoring and an online Virtual Tutor. Financial Aid is available for the Standard Group course. Call your grade-level counselor or Ms. McClellan for details.
- PrepMe on CB's Family Connection can prepare a student for either the SAT or the ACT exam. This is free of charge to all CB students. Juniors may also use this to prepare for the PSAT, which will be given on October 16.

We feel that this offers distinct choices that will fit every family budget and provide vital and timely preparation for these important tests. MANDATORY PARENT EVENING - On Tuesday, October 1 and Thursday, October 3, Christian Brothers will host a mandatory parent night. Over the next four years we would like to form a partnership with our parents over some of today's most pressing issues: Teenage Drug and Alcohol Use: Mental and Emotional Health, Sey and Sexuality and



You Can Feel It in the Air...

In the Admissions office we can definitely feel a change in the air, a shifting in temperature, a change of color in our gardens. The first leaf has fallen, the sun rises later and sets earlier. Our children are choosing to wear pants instead of shorts, sweatshirts instead of t-shirts. At CB we also sense a change. We feel an increased level of excitement and enthusiasm, of energy and expectation. Something is afoot here at Christian Brothers.

One reason may be because of the changes in our physical plant. Mr. Barsanti and his crew have certainly been busy this past year. When giving tours, we have many new sites to visit. The International Languages wing is now complete, and when walking through it on a quiet day we can hear French, German, Spanish and Mandarin, the languages of the United Nations. The vista from the eastern second story window of the SMAT wing is of the George Cunningham '40 Performing Arts Center where one can often find Mr. Barnes enthusiastically inspecting the previous day's construction progress, his shoes lightly coated with dust. Wending our way along the path towards the newly built Counseling Center our senses are tantalized by the scents of various plants and flowers, their colors vibrant despite the lateness of a dying season. Stopping in front of our new Counseling Center, one can see reflected in the glass of the window Mrs. Heine's "Peace Garden," a place of sanctuary and retreat. It is to this garden many of our students go to replenish after exhausting themselves on the various cardio machines in our newly-dedicated Vesci Fitness Center.

Another reason is perhaps because we were able to speak at length with parents at the New Parent Ice Cream Social Orientation Night and Back to School Night who spoke of their satisfaction with their choice of high school and of their gratitude that "CB has more than delivered on what was promised at Frosh Welcome Night." These parents spoke of the alacrity that our teachers, administrators, and support staff demonstrate when responding to parent emails and phone calls, of their willingness to give their time 'outside of the school day at all hours of the day and night." One comment in particular stands out from a parent who stated "her daughter felt loved by her teachers, that she felt more like a daughter than a student." Perhaps this is why we have so few students transfer out of CB, and why so many transfer into CB.

Perhaps it is because of the exciting iPad program launched this August after eighteen months of infrastructure upgrades and extensive professional training for our teachers. Certainly teaching and learning has seen a paradigm shift reflecting the use of technology in the classroom. Chalkboards have been replaced by screens, paper and pencil by devices and keyboards. Gone are the images of students as beasts of burden overloaded with pounds of books on their backs. Many books are now stored electronically on the iPads. Far from diminishing contact between student and teacher, the iPads actually stimulate interaction as teachers and students collaborate in exploring the use of technology in the classroom.

Or, perhaps it is because for the first time we here in Admissions have freshman daughters who share with us their emotions and experiences. Our inquiries as to 'how their day went" are rewarded with responses of depth and volume, personalizing for us the experience that is now shared by the hundreds of applications we reviewed last year in crafting the Class of 2017. We have been nourished by their comments about how much they like their classmates, how much like siblings they've become, how much it feels like family here at

Whatever the reason for this sense of change, it is definitely there, strong and palpable. We feel it on campus, on the field, on the court. Something is most definitely afoot here at CBI

COUNSELING AND GUIDANCE DEPARTMENT

TESTING DAY:

Wednesday, October 16, is an important day for students at C8. Testing Day is a half-day of school that involves the sophomores and juniors in college admission testing and career planning. For SOPHOMORES and JUNIORS school begins at 9:00 am and will be dismissed no later than 12:15 pm (FRESHMEN report to their on-campus Frosh Retreat at 8:45 am and are dismissed at 12:30 pm). Coordinated by the counselors, the teachers administer the following assessments to students:

- · Juniors will take the PSAT/NMSQT Exam (preliminary SAT). This test is great practice for the SAT, and also allows high achieving students to qualify for participation in the National Merit Scholarship Program
- Sophomores will take the PLAN exam (practice ACT.) This is an opportunity for 10th graders to experience what the ACT test is all about. (The ACT is continuing to grow in popularity at CB, in California and throughout the nation). The PLAN also includes a career component and invites students to self-report college plans and academic strengths and weaknesse
- Most seniors will be given the day off (some will be on campus facilitating the Freshman Retreat); however, this day is a great opportunity for college visits. Each senior should be ready to begin applying to college in October and if he/she has not visited local or regional colleges yet, this mid-week day is a perfect time to schedule a tour and find out more about a college while it is in full swing. In addition, remember that seniors are allowed two days. per year for college visits, but the procedure to request the day(s) as excused must be done in advance of the visit (forms are available in the CB Counseling Center or may be downloaded at the CB website - go to the Student Forms folder in the Guidance/College section and you will find the "Request to Visit a College" form). There is no need to fill out this form for October 16. It is also important to note that the Dean of Admissions of St. Mary's College in Moraga will be here on the 16th to interview seniors who have applied to SMC. These appointments will begin at 11:00 a.m. and will run throughout the day. A signup sheet is posted in the Counseling Center. Space is limited.

Please mark your calendars for this important day! Here are some tips to help students do their best on the exams:

- Remind your child to get plenty of rest the night before the
- Students should eat a nutritious breakfast the morning of the test and bring a healthy snack for the break (the cafeteria will not be open that day, so students who will be staying on campus for sports practices, etc. may want to bring a sack lunch).
- Students received information and material about the PSAT & PLAN from their counselor. For juniors, this included a PSAT Official Student Guide with a practice exam. Please encourage your child to prepare for the test by taking the practice exam at home before Testing Day. Students may also prepare for the exams by utilizing the PrepMe program on their Family Connection. This program can be performed on a PC. We are currently working to make sure that we are able to have students use this program on their IPads.

- Remind your child to bring two sharpened #2 pencils and his/her calculator.
- Encourage your child to develop long-term ways to prepare for college admission exams. These include extensive reading and writing (for pleasure, beyond homework) as much as possible, developing strong study habits, increasing vocabulary, and utilizing free preparation materials.

Results of the exams will be returned to students by their counselor in January/February, 2014. If you have any questions, please call the Counseling and Guidance Department at 733-3680.

International Student Program

Mr. Dale Milton currently teaches World History 2, Economics and Civics. He is also Department Chair for Social Studies. In his 10th year of teaching at CB and as one of CB's favorite teachers, Mr. Milton has some interesting insights into the world of ISP.

During the 2012-2013 school year, Mr. Milton taught three ISP students. Mr. Milton and his family previously hosted an Italian student from Milan so Mr. Milton has some familiarity working with international students experiencing a foreign culture in the home, and the struggles of second language acquisition while working with the rigor of a college preparatory school.

When asked about his experience with the international students, Mr. Milton had a lot to say. He expressed that first and foremost, international students are like any other CB student. "We must meet them where they are and then move forward together." Mr. Milton describes newly arrived international students, as "middle of the road" students because they follow directions, work for everything they want and, too often, go unnoticed because they are quietly doing what is espected. Mr. Milton equates their beginning work to climbing a mountain as they master the English language, our CB culture and American ways. At some point, the ISP student hits a plateau and then maneuvers through hills and valleys of mastery of curriculum the remainder of the year. What impresses him is that some of our international students come at such a young age and plan to stay either three or four years with CB.

Mr. Milton thinks that international students are exemplary. He believes that these students bring value to our American students. "They bring new values, new modalities and new techniques as they give us an appreciation of other rules and other political systems. Our international students are global citizens, they are excellent students and this helps our (American) students."

Mr. Milton knows that our international students will do well at CB. If they 'get involved in the CB community (sports, arts, events), they will love it (high school) and make it their own experience." Mr. Milton looks forward to teaching International students again soon.

"It's easier to organize and store, because before we just had a big black folder with torns of papers in it and it was hard to find which piece was with what," she says. "On the iPad it's always neat".

Alyse predicts that the iPads will greatly prove their value during the spring when concerts held outside will be performed. Wind, which has been a huge disruption to performances in the past, will be hindered by the iPads' sturdy nature. "Performances will probably be better and easier because you won't lose your music," Alyse states. "Part of the performances is turning the page – now with the iPad, page turning is not an issue".

With this school year just beginning, Mr. Maslen is sure to find even more uses for the iPad throughout the year. "Yesterday we were talking in class about some version of a song they had found on YouTube," he says.

This unpredictable use of the iPad not only gave Mr. Maslen insight for the correct song to perform for an upcoming school illusty, but also demonstrated one of the many changes the iPad will continue to add to his clasuroom.



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FALL SPORT UPDATES

Cross Country

Christian Brothers XC is off and running. With four meets under our feet, the Falcons have proven themselves to be worthy opponents to some of the area's best teams. At the Lagoon Classic in Vacaville, the Falcons finished 1st in the Frosh Boys' race, 2nd in the Varsity Boys' race and top ten in each of the other races. In the Hornet Invitational hosted by CSU, Sacramento, the CB Boys' varsity was able to capture 9th place in what was solidly a large school race. Our next two races will take the varsity teams to Stanford University and Clovis in Fresno to compete against some of the top schools in the state. It should give us a preview of this year's state finals and let us now where we currently stand among those storied programs.

Girls Volleyball

Varsity: Women's varsity volleyball is entering its 3rd week of sonconference action. The team had an outstanding stretch where they beat 5 successive opponents who were ranked in the Bee top 20, including wins over Rocklin and Oak Ridge which moved the Falcons into the #3 ranking. They are working hard to continue their streak when they face the Bruins of Ponderosa and St. Francis in the annual Holy Court. The team is looking forward to this weekend's "Founders Classic Tournament" to be held at Sacred Heart Cathedral High School in San Francisco. The girls will be spending the day on Friday at one of two service projects in San Francisco, working either with "Mission Girls" (an afterschool program targeted to Latina girls) or the "Kenya Ministry" by the Daughters of Charity (an organization that is a training center for young women who did not finish high school or who are single mothers). On Saturday, the girls will compete in matches with fellow La Sallian schools - host Sacred Heart Cathedral, St. Mary's Berkeley and La Salle, Oregon.

JV: A highlight of the JV volleyball team's early season was winning the championship at the Vista Del Lago tournament. The squad has exhibited good balance in posting additional impressive wins against strong opponents such as Rocklin, El Camino and Rio

Freshmen: The Girls Frosh volleyball team currently has a record of 5 wins and only 1 loss against powerhouse Rocklin High School in pre-season matches. All 11 team members bring their strengths onto the court during each match and are looking forward to the start of league play against Oakmont High School on Oct 2. They are currently getting ready to being a part of Holy Court when they play against St. Francis.

Boys Water Polo

Varsity: The Varsity water polo team has had a very heavy frontloaded schedule. CB has played some of the top competition in the Sacramento and Central Valley area. If your family is like mine, now is the time to pull out the warmer clothing and perhaps head out to the nearest mall or other clothing stores to buy some new seasonal fashion items. 

Young Superstars On Varsity Volleyball

Playing any sport requires bringing the player's best efforts to the table, regardless of age. The coaches not only look for who meets the skill level, but who will fit best with the team and make them

Freshmen are no different from the sophomores, juniors and seniors. They have to fight for their playing time just as any other player would.

"The playing time is based off of the coaches' decisions, who they think has worked hardest in practice, and who brings out the best in the team," Palorna says. It think the amount of playing time I get is fair because everyone earns their playing time through great effort and executing the skills they have."

VOCATIONS

Lincoln Snyder is a Christian Brothers composite, traversing CB as a student, faculty member, and now as the chairperson of the Board of Trustees. When in his twenties, Lincoln felt that vocation was defined by a person's job, like his brother James. James alivays wanted to be an actor/entertainer, which has biossersed into a career where he has shown passion and penistence. As such, James' career has defined his adult identity. Lincoln's calling(s) had a few more twists and turns.

After graduating from Georgetown University's School of Foreign Service (199), Lincoln accepted a job in Poland. Using his skills for languages and relationship-building, he embarked on a career in multinational corporate business, but the wear and tear of 180,000 r miles in the air each year, and the needs of a growing family, got Lincoln thinking about a different kind of lifestyle. An invitation to teach a summer school social studies class at CB in 2002 was his opening. This built of fate led to two years of full-time teaching at his alma mater, an experience which deepened his commitment to the Lasallian charism and gave him a lasting appreciation for the craft of teaching. Teaching, however, was not to be his final vocational stop. With family ties to Foland through his wife Aga, and a former boss begging for his return, Lincoln set out again for Poland and corporate business. God was still working-the-clay that would become a vocation for Lincoln. Naturally the demands and pressures of corporate life had not changed, but in 2007, his vocational pieces began to fall into place. Lincoln was invited by his father to join the family real estate business and make another transcontinental move. Shortly thereafte, Kevin Valine 73 asked Lincoln to serve on the Christian Brothers Board of Trustees, bringing him back to CB again.

With a sense that he will be doing even more in the future involving the Lasallian world, Lincoln is participating in the District of San Francisco's Discerning Leadership Program. Through the program he has gained a deep appreciation of the example set by St. John Baptist de la Salie as a person who strove his entire life to solve very human problems, rather than viewing images of the ethereal saint of his school years. "The grateful to have the opportunity to serve Christian Brothers High School. Focusing on the needs of the school and working with the dedicated men and women of the Board of finistees to ensure that CB is here to serve future generations of students has really been a gift so me. I plan to be of service for as long as CB will have me."





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A MESSAGE FROM THE DIRECTOR OF CAMPUS MINISTRIES

ear Parents and Families,

As the holiday season begins to kick into full gear, I am challenged to take pause and reflect on the gift of Advent. The word Advent, from the Latin, means "coming" or "arrival." For Christians, Advent is the four week period of preparation before Christmas. Advent is one of those Church seasons that I think we could do better. So often we tend to want to jump ahead to the celebration of Christmas, rather than simply being present in the season of Advent. Advent invites us to slow down, reflect, quiet ourselves, and to patiently wait. All of these things, it would seem, stand in direct opposition with the world in which we live. As we begin this Advent season, I'd like to invite all of you to join me in considering two important elements of Advent---waiting and preparing. While I busily enjoy all of the secular aspects of the season, I am intentionally reminding myself of the importance of waiting and preparing my heart to receive the Christ child at Christmas.

Let's start with waiting....we all do it but few of us do it well and without angst. Waiting well is a lost art in the fast-paced, instantaneous pace of life that we are now accustomed to. Smart phones, GPS, drive-thru's, high speed internet, online shopping with overnight delivery....all of these things have helped us become a more impatient people. Having to wait in the line at the supermarket or for longer than 10 minutes for a table or for a file to download, or for a red light to change can all be for us a source of major irritation. By and large, we do not like to wait. Of course, there are some things we must wait for that are beyond our control. In our own Christian Brothers community, we have those who have waited for the arrival of a new baby, those who wait patiently at the bedside of a loved one who is dying, those who wait for a medical diagnosis, those who wait for peace and understanding as they struggle with senseless loss, those who have applied to college and now must await. decisions. All of us must wait- but we all have the ability to choose whether we will wait in hope or wait in dread and frustration. Perhaps the season of Advent is inviting us to find blessing in the waiting. Perhaps when we slow down and practice more patience we may glean glimpses of peace and greater understanding of the meaning of

Let me say a few words about the second primary element of Advent- preparing. At this time of year, most of us busy ourselves with making preparations for our Christmas celebrations. We prepare travel itineraries and reservations...we prepare lists for finding that perfect gift, we prepare our homes with decorations of lights, garland, and trees, we prepare our favorite holiday dishes and desserts to share. All of these preparations are important and good but Advent calls us to focus on another equally important and necessary preparation- the preparation of our hearts. Advent allows us time to pray and reflect on the place that we are preparing for the Christ child to once again enter our lives. We are invited to journey with Mary as she prepares to birth the greatest gift of the season, Jesus. We are invited to journey with Joseph as he prepares to accept God's will for his life. We are invited to journey to the humble stable where our journey of faith begins. This is not a hurried journey, meant for us to merely "make it through" until next time. We are all invited to prepare, not only our homes, but also our lives to receive the ultimate gift given for us.... "For God so loved the world, that he gave his only Son." (John 3:16). My prayer for us all is that Advent will not be lost for us in the rush to bring on Christmas. Somewhere in the midst of the thanksgiving turkey, mad shopping rushes, bright flickering lights, and Santa sightings, may we find moments to pause...to breathe....to prepare....to wait and to remember the real reason for the season. One of the old adages my mom always told me was "good things often come to those who wait..." Could this be any truer knowing what Christmas will bring?

May your Advent time of waiting and preparing be fruitful and may your Christmas season be filled with blessings of peace and love!

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About College Entrance Exams

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ost colleges and universities require a college entrance test score as part of the application process. The two national tests are the ACT (American College Test) and the SAT Reasoning Test (given by the College Board). ALL four-year colleges and universities will accept either score. Both tests are offered at local area high schools 6-7 times throughout the year. Christian Brothers is a test center for both the ACT and the SAT - we administer both exams on dates in October and May.

Research indicates that students often perform differently on the ACT and SAT. The tests, while considered equally for admission, are different in the material covered. The ACT test content has our areas: English, Math, Reading, and Science Reasoning. The goal of the ACT is to measure academic achievement in the four ireas and contains analytical and problem-solving exercises related to what has been learned in class in addition, the ACT recently began offering an optional Writing section (which must be taken if applying to the University of California). The SAT determines critical reading, math, and writing skills, and is designed to measure academic aptitude in analytical skills, umeric reasoning, and writing. Current juniors should use the next few months to prepare for the SAT and/or ACT and plan on taking it for the first time in the spring.

Though the trend seems to be to begin taking these tests earlier and earlier in a student's high school career, we do not see any significant benefit to this action. Since Christian Brothers has all sophomores take the PLAN test (the practice ACT exam) and all juniors take the PSAT (the preliminary SAT exam), we have avenues for students to explore the testing experience. There is never a penalty for taking a test early, however, or for taking a test more than once. Colleges will see every score (unless a student chooses SAT score choice, which we do not recommend), but always take the highest score. The UC system takes the best score from one sitting; many private colleges and the CSU system will take a student's highest score from each section from different sittings and combine them into the highest possible score (superscore).

Since colleges will accept either the SAT or ACT and take the highest score, we recommend that students consider taking both tests at least once. It will help to compare results from the PLAN and the PSAT and see which score is stronger to help predict your score on either test. By taking both exams, students increase their chances of achieving a successful score.

SAT Subject tests are subject area tests that UC and a few selective private colleges either recommend or require. Currently, the UC system encourages taking tests in subject areas in which a student hopes to major in college, but these tests are not required. Students who plan to apply to highly selective colleges should check the school's website to see how many Subject Exams are required. It is important to register and take these exams by fall of the senior year. We recommend juniors take the tests in the spring of their junior year. They will then have time to take the tests again in the fall of their senior year If they wish to improve their scores. Seniors should not take the tests into 2014, as these test dates are too late to be submitted with other application material. Students should register for the SAT test online at www.collegeboard.com and the ACT at www. actstudent.org

Admission test scores are only one piece of information a college looks at when considering applications. A student's GPA, number and rigor of college prep courses completed, and other factors are also considered. These factors include cocurricular activities, the college essay, community service, and other aspects of the individual that make him/her distinctive. Teacher and counselor recommendations are also important when applying to private colleges.



appy New Year! As we begin 2014, there is much to look forward to at Christian Brothers High School. In April, we will open the doors of the George Cunningham '40 Performing Arts Center, home of the 350-seat Thea Stidum Theatre. It has been rewarding to see the building take shape and envision the generations of students who will grace its stage. The Cunningham Center culminates more than seven years of planning and work on the Building on the Tradition Campaign - Phase II which began in April 2007, and also brought us the field house and has grown our tuition assistance endowment.

I am profoundly grateful that we have accomplished all of this without taking on debt. These school improvements, and the addition of the Science, Math and Technology wing which opened its doors in 2002 as part of the Building on the Tradition Campaign - Phase I, have been funded with donations from generous alumni, parents, families and friends of the school.

Now as we look ahead, we are working to develop a new Campus Master Plan that addresses the needs of the future and the ways in which our facilities can best serve our students. Throughout the process, we are guided by five key principles: community, identity through affordable design, flexibility and collaboration, environment for learning, and sustainability. Much more than a collection of buildings, our campus is the hub of activities and a gathering place for the CB community. As stewards of not only the environment but our finances, we will embrace today's sustainability standards while making economically appropriate choices to reduce operating costs and improve our community and environment.

In November, we gathered a group of parents, students, alumni, prospective families, faculty, staff and friends to help us craft a vision of CB's campus in the next 10 to 15 years. Over the past few weeks, our architects have been working on different concepts to present to CB's Campus Master Plan Steering Committee (five CB administrators and seven friends of the school with experience in construction, facilities, etc.) The architects and Steering Committee will go back and forth on concepts, narrowing the focus with each step. In early 2014, we expect to have a Campus Master Plan complete with project priorities and estimated costs. The plan will be used by school leadership over the next several years to determine the sequence in which projects will be undertaken. Timelines of implementation of the projects are contingent on our continued successful fundraising.

Providing students with facilities and programs that allow them to explore and develop their God-given gifts is essential. Facilities are important; however, the students are the reason CB exists. I am grateful to all who have contributed to the Building on the Tradition Campaign - Phase I (1999-2002) and Phase II (2007-2014). This generosity allows us to continue the 138 year tradition for teaching and caring and ensures that CB is the place to be for generations to come.

COUNSELING AND GUIDANCE

Parents, if your child has D's or F's on his/her report card, PLEASE READ THIS!

As pages 12 and 13 of the CB Parent/Student Handbook emphasite, "Fs" and "D's" are bad news on report cards it is important for you and your student to understand that neither "D's" nor "Fs" are acceptable. "F" grades must be repeated for credit in order to graduate from Christian Brothers High School. "D" grades, though worth 5 credits towards graduation, are NOT accepted by four year colleges and universities. All California State University campuses, University of California campuses, and most private institutions require a "C" or above in ALL core courses (core courses are approved History, English, Math, Lab Science, Foreign Language, Visual and Performing Art, and Elective courses - also known as the "a-g" list of approved courses - see below for a chart of these requirements). If students have "D's" on the transcript in any a-g courses and do not remediate them they are not eligible to apply for admission to CSU and UC, and therefore are seriously limiting their choices for college.

If your child would like to keep his/her options open and remain eligible to apply to a four-year college, the Counseling & Guidance Department highly recommends that he/she remediate (repeat for credit) any "D" grades earned in a-g approved courses. Students may enroll in a variety of classes during the 2014 CBHS summer school session in order to remediate a grade. While previous grades are never removed from a student's transcript, if a student completes the course in summer school with a "C" or above, his/her transcript will reflect the new credits and the new grade will be used when calculating the grade point average.

For example, if your child is currently enrolled in Biology and received a "D" the first semister, he'she should consider repeating Biology this summer. If he'she is currently enrolled in a Math course or foreign language course and received a low grade the first semister (D or F), it is important to receive a "C" or above at the end of the spring semester. CSU and UC will "validate" (count as successful) the whole year of a Math course or a foreign language course if the student shows marked improvement the second semister (Le., goes from a "D" to a "C" B", or "A"). Therefore, students have a choice—work very hard this semester and bring the grade up, or repeat it in summer school to raise the grade. Since a full four years of English is a basic requirement for eligibility, any "D's" in English

should be remediated. One year of World History is the minimum requirement for eligibility, so students should be sure to have a "C" or above for at least two of the four semesters of Frosh/Soph World History. Any US History "D's" should also be remediated.

Please contact your child's counselor if you have questions about remediating grades. If you intend to register for summer school, registration forms will be available on-line. Check the CB website in February for further information.

If you wish to view the approved a-g course list for Christian Brothers, go to the CB website, click on ACADIMICS and "Course Catalog" where you can view the CBHS CSU/UC a-g List and other important information.

ATTENTION PARENTS OF JUNIOR STUDENTS: Cotlege Night for Juniors and Their Parents will be held Wednesday, January 15 at 7:00 p.m. in the CB Cafeteria. Important information regarding the college planning process will be presented by Ms. McClellan and Mr. Purdy (grade-level counselors).

PLAN (10th grade) and PSAT tests (11th grade) will be returned to students during classroom visits in January and February. Counselors will go over results with students by explaining and analyzing their scores and will also assist students with pre-registration for classes in the 2014-2015 school year. Please ask your son/daughter to see his/her exam results (you may also check the scores on Family Connection, as they have already been posted). Look for a mailing regarding pre-registration in early February.

ATTENTION SENIORS AND PARENTS: Please remember to turn in copies of your admission and scholarship letters to Ms. Heine, Ms. McClellan or Mrs. Moskat in the counseling office as you receive them. It is also very important to update your admission status on Family Connection.



That, to me, is a great example of the Catholic, Lasallian community at Christian Brothers.

At the heart of our mission as a Catholic, Lasallian school is that sense of community and mindfully creating a learning environment where students are safe in discovering and fostering their God-given gifts. As we do so, we are grateful to work in partnership with families as we prepare our young men and women for success in college and even more so, in

We recognize that you make tremendous sacrifices to send your children to Christian Brothers. Recently, the Board of Trustees approved a tuition increase of 3.3 percent. Tuition for 2014-15 will be \$12,250 and the registration fee \$625 for a total of \$12,875. Our tuition remains below the average for Catholic high schools in Northern California and a recent tuition review revealed that most Catholic high schools in Northern California will be passing along tuition increases that average 4 percent. Our constant challenge is balancing mission-centered excellence with affordability. Please know that we work hard to invest your resources well in your children's education and to improve efficiency, maintain distinction, and control costs.

In terms of practical matters, we will again be facilitating student registration online and coordinating tuition payments through SMART Tuition. In March, you will receive an email that will include instructions on accessing the registration website and completing the process.

We also recognize that the cost of Catholic education is prohibitive for some families. Our Catholic, Lasallian mission calls for us to serve the poor. We embrace this opportunity. In 2013-14, we are distributing \$2.1 million in need-based tuition assistance to 393 students. That is more than onethird of our student body. We expect these numbers to be similar in 2014-15. Tuition assistance comes from three sources: endowment earnings, fundraising efforts, and the operating budget. We are grateful to all of our parents, alumni and friends who support our fundraising activities. Your ongoing support is critical to our mission!

Thank you for entrusting us with the gift of your children. We are working diligently to ensure that the sacrifices you are making for your children today - tuition, time, and example - will reap rewards long into the future

Featuring Dr. Bill Iliff

"Looking back, I clearly think the seeds to my vocational path were planted during my days as a student at CB. The central theme always seemed to keep coming back to one of service. The first ideas I had about vocation came from a career day at Christian Brothers when I sat in on a presentation about the healthcare professions. It just seemed like a really interesting career possibility." These impressions led Bill lift for volunteer at the UC Davis Medical Center to further explore different careers in the medical profession. Undergraduate studies at UCLA were followed by admission to their dental school, which, over time resulted in marriage, family (two CB grads), and a long career in dentistry.

For many, it may seem like a big leap of faith from running a dental practice, which he still does, to teaching biology at CB part-time. However, as with many vocations, it is not necessarily a straight line path. "I'd been coaching baseball for some 20 years and had noticed that the kids from CB just always seemed so enjoyable - their positive attitudes and willingness to work and learn new things. Comments I made to a school administrator years ago about this caused him to suggest I consider teaching someday. Things kind of fell into place, first substitute teaching for a couple of years and then joining the science department. I consider myself incredibly fortunate."


Bill expressed that a vocation can sometimes find you rather than the other way around, and that long term success rarely comes from just natural ability. Success comes from persistence. 

A MESSAGE FROM THE DIRECTOR OF MEDIA. VISUAL. AND PERFORMING ARTS...

According to Archbishop Desmond Tutu, the African term "Ubuntu" provides an overarching philosophy that in order for any one individual to reach his or her full potential. all others must also achieve their potential. It means that all of humanity is inextricably linked; we are all a part of a global fabric. When one achieves greatness, we all benefit. When one suffers, we all suffer. It suggests that global empathy exists on a cellular, spiritual level.

It is the spirit of Ubuntu that I witness every day at Christian Brothers High School. Whether it's a student who sits next to someone who is alone during lunch, a student who holds the door for another (something that anyone who has visited our campus has likely witnessed), or a teacher who just listens to someone who is struggling with something in his or her life, the Christian Brothers High School community truly embodies the ideals of Ubuntu.

Leonard Bernstein wrote: "The key to the mystery of a great artist: that for reasons unknown to him or to anyone else, he will give away his energies and his life just to make sure that one note follows another inevitably....The composer, by doing this, leaves us at the finish with the feeling that something is right in the world, that something checks throughout, something that follows its own laws consistently, something we can trust, that will never let us down." - The Joy of Music.

So how does one connect Desmand Tutu, the philosophy of Ubuntu, and Leonard Bernstein? Desmond Tutu, in his book "No Future without Forgiveness", suggests that "[h]armony, friendliness, community are great goods. Social harmony is for us the 'summum bonum' - the greatest good". His use of the word 'harmony' brings the two together. Ubuntu presents the possibility of a world in harmony, in which beauty and greatness is revealed through the altruistic actions of all human beings, and dissonance is replaced with consonance: in which people recognize their contributions as being infinitely valuable, to the benefit of all.

In less than one month, the George Cunningham Center for the Performing Arts will open, giving many groups of

students the opportunity to learn, discover, create, design, build, perform and display their talents. Musicians will sing and play songs that move audiences and inspire the soul. The sonorities created will leave the audience and performers "with the feeling that something is right in the world. Artists will allow the contrast and complement of colors and textures to manifest in a visually harmonious way that is thought provoking, emotional and captivating. The beauty and power of word and motion, on stage and in film, in the form of a play, student-written one act, musical, dance, student-created film or student-directed broadcast, will give voice to the gifts each of our students carry in their hearts and minds every day. In short, Christian Brothers High School students will be finding ways to reach their full potential. They will be contributing to the greater good and manifesting the spirit of Ubuntu in their words and actions.

I feel truly blessed to be a part of such an amazing community. In a world where it could be easy to overlook the wonder that resides right in front of our eyes, Christian Brothers brings it into focus and magnifies it for the world to see. Each student is infinitely valuable, a physical manifestation of the image of God. It is through this lens that students are seen, and it is through this lens that their gifts are projected.

I welcome you to come to one of the performances in our beautiful new facility. It certainly is beautiful. But more importantly, you will have the opportunity to witness our talented, empathic, inspiring students in their element, achieving greatness, discovering their potential, and becoming an outward expression of Ubuntu, for all to live, breathe and experience.

CB Students Achieve Highly!

The National Merit Scholarship Program is conducted by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation in conjunction with the College Board, and is a competition open to all high school juniors who take the Preliminary SAT (PSAT) test. Winners of scholarships are chosen on the basis of their abilities, skills, and accomplishments. In October of each year, approximately 1.5 million high school juniors in some 22,000 high schools take the PSAT/NMSQT. Of those, students who achieve significantly high scores are selected by the NMSC to enter the National Merit Program. Approximately 50,000 students achieve commended status in the program, and approximately 16,000 are named Semi-Finalists and 13,000 are named as Finalists. The class of 2014 boasts seven students with National Merit Commended status, and one student who achieved National Merit Finalist status. The commended students are:

Lenten Reflections for March.... Journey to the Cross This coming Wednesday, March 5th, we begin our Lenten journey with our celebration of Ash Wednesday. On this important day, we recall our humanity and our sinfulness so to better examine our spiritual hearts and minds. This 40 day journey invites us to examine how we are living our lives relative to the Gospel message of Christ. From the first day of Lent, the Ash Wednesday readings make God's call to us clear: "Return to me with your whole heart." "A clean heart create for me, O God," Psalm 51 offers. "Give me back the joy of your salvation." That is exactly what our loving God wants to give us, the joy of salvation. God is inviting us on a journey...a journey to the cross....a journey to return home. Yet we spend so much time trying to think of how to return and what to say, how to begin the conversation. It's only when we finally appear after so much time away, embarrassed and confused, that we understand we don't have to say anything. We only have to show up. Look up there on the road ahead of us: our loving God is jumping up and down for joy. The invitation to us has been heard. We have returned home! But, wait... What stops us from this great reunion? What keeps us from accepting this invitation to something deeper in our lives with God? We feel in our hearts that there are things we should say first: "wait... but... if anly" and finally, "If God really knew about me..." It doesn't matter. None of it matters. Only the joy that we have turned to God and that like a loving father or mother, God is smothering us with embraces and joyful cries. We have returned! Come back to me, with all af your heart. Our acceptance of this call, this appeal to our hearts is simple if we can only get beyond the fear. All we have to do is say to our Lord, "Tim here. Where do I start? Yes, I want to be with you." Our hearts have been opened and we have taken the first step toward the rejoicing parent on the road. No explanations are necessary, only to pause and picture in our hearts the joyfully loving and unblinking gaze of God that falls on us. What's the next step on our journey hame? We could take the earliest moments of our day, before we have gotten out of bed to thank God for such a loving invitation and ask for help in opening our hearts to it. We could remember throughout the day the invitation that has moved our hearts: Come back to me, with all of your heart. And we can rejoice along with God. We could take a moment at the end of each day to reflect on how well we journeyed with Jesus that day. This is the invitation of each day of Lent. Today is the day to accept it. The Path to Citizenship

Two CB sisters realize the American Dream By Madison Winn - Talon Staff Writer

In January of 2014, Victoria (15) and Maria Paula Linares (16) ended the long, grueling process of becoming an official American citizen

Born in Valencia, Venezuela, the sisters, their parents, and younger sister moved to the United States in 2003. For Victoria, then age 6, and Maria Paula, then age 5, their life in the U.S. first began in Corpus Christi, Texas.

However, this taste of American life was short, as they moved back to Venezuela later that year, but they returned to the States in 2005. They have been here in Sacramento ever since.

The transition for the sisters was hard as they had to learn a new language, culture, make new friends, and leave their family behind.

"Here [in Sacramento], we got better at English, but it was really sad because we didn't have any of our family,"Victoria says.

This transition took about three years, and they finally became comfortable and fully American, but they were still not citizens.

The Linares family obtained green cards when they moved here, but after enjoying their lives in America, they decided to obtain full citizenship. In order to become an official American citizen, one must endure the process of naturalization.

This process for minors consists of living in the U.S. for eight years and the parents of the children must pass a test. Once the test is passed, the family becomes officially American.

Victoria describes earning her citizenship as like, "winning a Grammy." However, younger sister Maria Paula thinks it "doesn't feel any different because we have been here for so long."

Though differing on their opinions, both sisters are very thankful for their naturalization as they will be legally able to vote in the next election among many other American rights.

"I can eat French fries now and feel completely American!" Victoria says jokingly.

"[It's] cool having an American passport on top of our Venezuelan and Spanish passports," Maria Paula. "Just traveling and being able to hold that passport. It's really special."

Even here at Christian Brothers, students are realizing the American dream and the many



freedoms and privileges we have here in the U.S.

INTERNATIONAL STUDENT PROGRAM

Kate Haroldson and her three daughters Maliah '16, Makena '17 and Mierra (future Falcon) are hosting Liwen Luo '15 from China. Liwen arrived in Sacramento in August 2012. Kate thoughtfully describes the anticipation they felt driving to the airport to meet Liwen. They wondered if they would recognize her as she approached them as they eagerly awaited her arrival. They did. Together, they journey an international life here in Sacramento learning about culture, language and each other. Kate notes that dinner is their favorite time when they are usually all together. It is when they exchange ideas and talk about different and like attitudes of American and Chinese culture. Liwen is currently in her second successful year with the Haroldson family and will be welcomed back for her senior year in the fall. Liwen has become a part of their family and Kate is proud of the work Liwen has done to ensre her success as an exchange student in their family for the past two years. Life gets crazy among four girls and Liwen has been able to roll amidst the busy schedules. They have learned much about each other and look forward to another year together.

I asked Kate why she signed up to host a student. Her first response was "I believe in the program." She also quickly stated that "every child should live abroad at some point in their lives. I hope while my girls are in college they will have the opportunity of living abroad." She views the International Student Program here at Christian Brothers as an opportunity for our international students and Kate wanted her family to help make the international experience positive. Kate expressed that one could equate cultural lives to cars. "We are all in different cars (cultures) heading to the same place." Kate believes that this journey with her family (and in the winter her father George joins the household) is giving everyone involved an opportunity to make the world smaller and better.

Kate offered some advice to anyone considering hosting an International student. She stated the number one reason to consider hosting is that Christian Brothers has a program in place. Students are vetted and chosen to attend CB just as Admissions has a process to invite students to apply to attend CB. Our students from China come through a contracted Agency with offices in Boston, Los Angeles and throughout China. All of our International students pay their own tuition, they pay for their own books, iPads, activities, clothing, and medical insurance. All of our host families are reimbursed through a monthly stipend which defrays the cost of food, transportation and additional expense of adding a person to your home. What are a host family's responsibilities? Of course, first and foremost - keep the students safe. Make sure they get to school daily, that they get proper rest and nourishment, that they practice English as much as possible and that one treats them as you would want someone to treat your own child in another country.

We are always looking for great families affiliated with Christian Brothers to take a journey with an international student. If you are considering hosting but just unsure if you are ready to make the commitment, consider taking

The National Merit Scholarship Program is conducted by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation in conjunction with the College Board, and is a competition open to all high school juniors who take the Preliminary SAT (PSAT) test. Winners of scholarships are chosen on the basis of their abilities, skills, and accomplishments. In October of each year, approximately 1.5 million high school juniors in some 22,000 high schools take the PSAT/NINSQT. Of those, students who achieve significantly high scores are selected by the NMSC to enter the National Merit Program. Approximately 50,000 students achieve commended status in the program, and approximately 16,000 are named Semi-Finalists and 13,000 are named as Finalists. 

A MESSAGE FROM THE PRINCIPAL Dear Parents:

A imost everyone wants schools to be better, but almost no one onts them to be different." This quote from educational leader Ray McNulty sums up the conundrum facing us as we strive to be 21stcentury teachers and learners. Stability is a necessary anchor in our lives. If change were all that we ever experienced, we would probably go mad. Given our human nature to seek stability, it doesn't seem like we would be wired to accept or adapt to change. Most people I know do everything they can to keep things predictable—thinking that if we can predict things, we can deal with them, never minding that things are not perfect, and content with knowing at least we can cope with the known. This is a universal concept-Shakespeare wrestled with the natural tension between predictability and the unknown some 400 years ago when he wrote these lines from Hamlet: "That dread of something... undiscovered... makes us rather bear those ills we have than fly to others we know not of" (Hamlet III.178-82). Or, as Henry Ford said, "If I had asked the public what they wanted, they would have said a faster horse."

We do all we can to maintain stability; we share the proverbial "fear of the unknown." However, while keeping things as they are may be comfortable, it also prevents needed growth and improvement. As a school, it is especially important to realize this human tendency. Clinging to traditional practices often stifles required growth and improvement. "That's the way we've always done it" is the opposite of necessary adaptation to changing times in a changing world.

One of our core principles as a Catholic, Lasallian school is providing a "Quality Education." What does that look like in 2014? Well, to begin with, our children live in a completely different world than the one we grew up in. Information is at their fingertips – and the devices they hold in their hands each day connect them to over 1 billion websites. Today education is moving from teaching students content to teaching students how to learn and discorn among the millions of choices of content available to them. While we still value stability, control, and standardization, it must be mixed with uncertainty, ambiguity and disruptive thinking in order to be

Making a better 20th Century School is not the answer – It is not about overlaying digitalization on old practices. We here at CB are in the business of transforming lives – and that means not only looking holistically at each individual student entrusted to our care to provide academic excellence, opportunities for moral and faith formation, and addressing adolescent developmental issues – It also means using the best available resources to meet their needs in understanding and succeeding in a very different landscape and future when it comes to college and careers. It is about becoming different not just better.

While initiatives such as our iPad program may seem like the new different, the devices are only the beginning of a much more profound approach to empowering and equipping our students. Using researched-based best practices is important, but for true transformation a mixture of BEST and NEXT practices is needed. This concept, which is reflective of the direction needed in modern education, is a reconsideration of the old 3 Ri: readin, writin, and 'rithmatic, which have given way to the new 3 RS—Rigor, Relevance, and Relationships. Rigor, relevance, and relationships are not only key words on the forefront of most educational initiatives; they also ring true from the perspective of our faculty, who are embracing change in order to transform lives.

The three R's must work in concert. College preparatory schools often promote increasing levels of rigor but at times neglect the very important need of relevance—relevance to the student in the context of the real world. Relevance makes rigor possible. Our new Pathway to Engineering program that will begin in August is an example of making learning relevant to our students, since studies show STEM careers to be the fastest growing - jobs, that require deep educational qualifications and specific skills in the areas of science, technology, engineering and mathematics. And as for the third R, though we have known this intuitively for a long time, brain research increasingly indicates that positive relationships are a crucial component of learning. St. John Baptist relationships are a crucial component of learning. St. John Baptist de la Salle recognized this need, which has been a vital element of the Lasalian charism from its beginnings in the 17th century.

Innovative learning models today must prepare students to be both college and career ready. In order to accomplish both goals, learning must combine rigor and relevance in an environment of positive relationships. This is just a brief snapshot of where we are headed in terms of teaching and learning at Christian Brothers. Creativity and innovation, Critical Thinking and Problem Solving. Communication and Collaboration, all in the context of Caring and Accountability, are the order of the day. As scholar John Schaar said, "The future is not some place we are going to, but one we are creating. The paths are not found, but made, and the activity of making them, changes both the maker and the destination."

Graduating Seniors have been receiving letters of acceptance to colleges and universities across the country. Congratulations to the class of 2014! As many seniors already know, this has been a very competitive year for college admission. Since the class of 2014 is one of the largest graduating classes in American history (over 3 million), the number of students applying to colleges has seen exponential growth.

In addition, a new trend has developed that has more seniors across the country applying to more colleges than ever in order to "hedge their bets," Many private colleges have reported that they have had a 30% increase in applications this year over last! This has resulted in record numbers of applicants pools. Since most campuses have from 45,000-65,000 applicants to fill freshmen classes of approximately 4500, one can see how difficult decisions have been for admission offices in 2014. In fact, for the fourth year in a row, many UCs have instituted a "wait-list" for stellar students who were not admitted. It is difficult to know to what extent the wait-lists will be used and as a result, there have been disappointments - not only among our own students, but for tens of thousands of other California seniors.

Thankfully most of our seniors planned well and applied to not only 'reach' schools, but 'rarget' schools and 'safety' schools. As a result, CB students have options for next year and are able to begin their college careers at great schools. If any seniors are still grappling with final decisions, remember that Mrs. Moskat and Ms. McClellan are available to assist and support you. Seniors who will be attending community college should be applying right now and visiting the school to take your placement tests. Students who will be attending a CSU should be registering for ELM/EPT tests on the CSUS website (see Testing Center) if they are required to take them. Students attending a UC (and needing to satisfy the Entry Level Writing Requirement) should be receiving information on the May 10 Analytical Writing Placement Examination (AWPE).

The good news is that many of our students have been admitted to several prestigious universities and programs, including Stanford, Pomona, Northeastern, University of Chicago, UCLA, LMU, Santa Clara, Seattle University, Saint Mary's, etc., and many more too numerous to list. All of the colleges that our students have been admitted to will be listed in the graduation program.

Parents, be sure to have your senior go to the CB Family Connection website (see the letter mailed home to senior parents for details) as soon as possible, but NO LATER than APRIL 11 for scholarships and awards and by MAY 5 for college admirtance. Students need to list ALL colleges to which they have been admitted and ALL scholarships, awards, etc. We must have this information in order to accurately recognize your child at the Senior Family Litungy on April 27 and at graduation on May 23.

Our two informative college information evenings were very well attended by Juniors and their parents in January and March. Seniors, please mark your calendars for Wednesday, April 30 at 7:00 p.m. in the CB Cafeteria, We will hold one last meeting

for the class of 2014. The topic will be Transitioning to College. There will be general information about the practical issues related to going off to college, as well as break-out sessions. One breakout session will be for parents with a panel of CII panents of college students discussing "Letting Go" of your college-bound child; the other will be for students and consist of a student panel of CB alumni currently attending college who will share "what I wish I had known" before heading off to college.

Summer will be here before we know it! Summer is a wonderful time for students to expand their horizons, enrich their lives with fascinating experiences, and improve their readiness for college through academic pursuits. Sophomores, if you are completing a course you feel you have done well in (for example, AP World History, Chemistry, etc.) and want to take an SAT Subject exam, be sure to register to take the June 7 SAT Subject Exams (the registration deadline is May 9; go to www.collegeboard.com to register). Juniors, if you did not yet registered to take the May 3 SAT Beasoning exam, please know that the regular registration deadline is April 4. The next ACT exam is June 14 - the registration deadline is May 9. Go to www.act.org to negister.

Reflections for April....

Last month we began our Lenten journey together. With only a few weeks to Easter we are given the opportunity to do a self "check up" for how we have been doing along the way. As we continue our journey to the cross, we can see that the strupples and falls that Jesus endured while bearing the weight of the wood are not unlike our own feelings of fear, doubt, struggle and worry that we all encounter. The notion of standing by and watching a loved one die, as Mary did at the foot of the cross reminds us that we, too, must put our faith in God who has surely promised resurrection for those who believe. We know that the Spirit of Christ lives on in our hearts as we try our best to live lives that are hope filled and life-giving. As we continue along this journey, we do so together. The plentitude of amazing individuals living the Lasallian mission throughout our world and the recollection of many a grace-filled moment are enough to sustain us even when the road gets tough. So as we prepare to embark on the journey of Holy Week, I offer you these reflections to consider.

On Sunday, April 13, the Church will celebrate Palm Sunday to celebrate the occasion of Jesus' arrival in the city of Jesusalem. What do I celebrate most about Christian Brothers and the experiences it has provided to me? To my famils?

The Paschal Triduum, often called the Easter Triduum or simply the Triduum, consists of Holy Thursday, Good Friday, Holy Saturday. This includes the Great Easter Vigil, the high point of the Triduum. The word Triduum comes from the Latin word meaning "three days." The Triduum celebrates the heart of our faith and salvation: the death and resumection of Christ, and is thus the high point of the liturgical year.

On Holy Thursday, April17, we celebrate the Institution of the Eucharist and we commemorate the Last Supper where Jesus became servant by washing the feet of his disciples. How have I "washed the feet of others"? How have my feet been washed by members of this CR community?

On Good Friday, April 18, we mark the final moments of Jesus' life through our recollection of the crucifixion. What feelings of loss, sadness, worry, or devastation om I feeling? How can I best acknowledge what pierces my house?

On Holy Saturday, April 19, we acknowledge the day that Jesus lay in the tomb. Are there things I must let go of and prepare to leave behind?

On Easter Sunday, April 20, we celebrate the Resurrection of Christ-Jesus' triumph over death and renewed hope for life in the Spirit. What moments of grace have blessed me? What am I hopeful for in the future? What gifts of life, hope and renewal am I most thankful for?

As we continue this journey together, know of my prayers for you. The hope and gratitude that fills my heart as I work and minister at Christian Brothers blesses me as I continue this amazing journey! Blessings for a Joyous Easter-

Color Coded

The real story behind CB colors, which code a key aspect in CB's school culture.

Blue, Red, White: the colors that identify the Christian Brothers Falcons. Colors are a large part of what identify CB, but what's the story behind this color scheme?

Ms. Kristen McCarthy described how these colors were adopted. Back between 1900-1910, CB utilized the image of the Boston Red Sox. However in the 1920s, St. Mary's College began calling themselves the Gaels, and CB experienced a change as well.

"We were given their cast off uniforms," Ms. McCarthy said. "We adopted the colors of St. Mary's because we used their uniforms. We became the Falcons."

Our primary blue is what truly identifies Christian Brothers as the Falcons.

"Back in the '70s and '80s, we were a little more red than blue, but now we are primarily our blue," the Director of Communications explained.

As the CB community has grown, blue has become the more dominant color. Many find the combination of blue and red appealing, but the blue is what really makes CB known.

"The focus on the blue identifies us. We stand out as a result of that." Mr. Tom English says.

"When you look up from the field at Holy Bowl and you see that sea of blue, you know that's Brothers' blue, "Ms. McCarthy eloquently articulated.

Colors have a greater significance than people often realize. On a deeper level, Christian Brothers' colors contribute to the community.

"They are a form of cohesion. When you talk about the blue and the red, people automatically think of this school," Mr. English described.

"Our brand is important. The blue helps unite us all," Ms. McCarthy said. A likely reason for the blue dominance is the red and white dominance of CB's rival schools. St. Francis and Jesuit.

The fact that Christian Brothers has specific, precise colors down to what web colors, spot colors, and process colors must be used, is not something that everyone knows.

According to the Graphic Standards Manual of Christian Brothers High School, 'use of the official colors is essential to the consistent presentation of ALL Christian Brothers publications.'

CB may have strict guidelines, but they are crucial for CB to be CB. One guideline outlined in the Manual is that blue should always be the dominant color.

"I love our school colors. I love the blue, I think it just pops," Ms. McCarthy expressed.

She added that the blue, white, and red are All-American and represent Falcon Pride.

"I love the fact that it connects back to our history and takes us into the future," she says.

Having the foundation of school colors provides a starting place for identifying with the school. Perhaps that is why all schools have set colors – so they can form a greater sense of bonding and community between the students.

Mr. English enjoys the dominant blue, followed by red and white as "they are traditional and they blend well together."

Color is a large part of what holds people together, so recognizing and appreciating the code is key. Keep an eye out for that Brothers Blue!

International Student Program

We have treated our (international' family's success. We have treated our (international' and third to consider how we would want our biological children treated if they were in the same circumstance. We always strive to create a home not (a place like) a dorm room. We have had our issues but we talk it out just like we do with our biological children. It all boils down to respect. I feel the parent must initiate the respect cycle. Once started, just like a bike, it needs constant attention if you want it not to stall!"

On another note, the stories of the rewards of cultural diversity continue. Mr. Barsanti recounted a classroom experience not long ago wherein curriculum in the AP Economics class became a conversation of real life experiences. Andrea from Spain was able to talk about the effect of high unemployment and Spencer from China was able to respond to the economic effects of the one child law. As Mr. Barsanti explained, the ability to discuss global economics in the classroom with real life experience brought the curriculum to life.

The Brothers in Memphis also continued to fuel his interest in wanting to be a Lasallian teacher. Immediately after receiving his BA, Mr. Guro went to the University of St. Thomas in St. Paul, MN for his Masters of Arts degree in Theology, While there he also had the opportunity to work at another Lasallian high school, De La Salle High School in Minneapolis, as a substitute teacher and Lasallian teacher. In the summers of 2011 and 2012, Mr. Guro returned to Sacramento and taught an Algebra 1 summer school course at CBHS. Following summer school in 2012, Mr. Guro was providentially hired as a full-time religion teacher at CB. Now in his second year as a religion teacher, Mr. Guro finds his return to CB as exciting as he thought it would be, and has found fulfillment in what God had originally called on him to do for his vocation.

VEN-A-VER....COME AND SEE

Ven-a-Ver is a social justice immersion that means "Come and See". Three immersions were offered during the 2013-2014 school year. For one week participating juniors live simply in community and work full days of service. This last school year Ven-a-Ver participants traveled to Los Angeles, CA, Browning, Montana, Tucson, AZ and Nogales, Mexico. Ven-aVer is powerful and transformative. Here are some of the students' comments about their experiences.

Los Angeles, CA: Our students stayed at Mission Dolores and worked with the children at the school. They got up at 5:00 a.m. and served breakfast to the homeless. They also met Father Greg Boyle who wrote the bestseller Tattoos on the Heart. They toured Homeboy/Homegirl Industries and heard the personal stories of former gang members who had a conversion of the heart and turned toward a better life with the help of Father Greg. The immersion ended with a trip to the Museum of Tolerance.

"It was the experience of a lifetime and has truly been life changing for me as many of my thoughts and perspectives have been expanded or changed; also this trip has been all I have thought about since we got back." Madison Winn, participant

"Since the trip, our group meets each Friday for lunch. We don't want to forget our incredible time there." Natalie Maas, participant

Browning, Montana: Twelve students traveled to our de-Lasalle Blackfeet (DLSB) school in Browning. Each morning we drove 15 miles to the school and helped the Lasallian volunteer teachers in their classrooms. DLSB has only 80 students, many of whom are dealing with chronic poverty. Our students also had the opportunity to listen to tribal elders tell their stories of growing up on the reservation. They also hiked an area in Glacier National Park in 10 degree snowy and

'In 2012, 40% of the children were born with Fetal Alcohol Syndrame, up from 20% from 2000. The town is in despair. Most people, especially kids, spend every day thinking only

about survival - nothing is more pressing. Their mortality is omnipresent."Nick Garcia, participant

Tucson, Arizona/Nogales, Mexico: The immersion is also called Otro Lado: 'The Other Side'. Students traveled to Arizona and Mexico to gain a better understanding of immigration issues. Moderators Ms. Anna Fernandez, Spanish Teacher and Religious Studies Teacher Mr. Thomas Guro accompanied the students.

"Ven-a-ver Otro Lado was a unique and amazing experience that I am glad CB has to offer to the students. Learning from textbooks about the immigration issues from a historical legal and moral perspective is one thing. However, actually being able to experience it first hand with all the senses, being able to meet people involved with the issue on all sides, and being able to align it with a Lasallian influence is priceless. Knowing the issue from experiencing it first hand and living it is more impactful than knowing it as book smarts from reading. I know CB students found a sense of community throughout the week with one another, as well as with the students from San Miguel High School who joined us. It was a way of living in community and being able to live and learn about the issue in the safest way possible." Thomas Guro, moderator

"This year I had the privilege to also take two ISP students on this immersion. Not only did they learn about a topic that they were not aware or familiar with, but we also got to learn about their country in relation to this topic. They were able to teach us the similarities and differences on immigration in China versus the United States. It was impactful to see how much they had learned and grown within a week." The Ven-a-Ver experience teaches our students to live out the gospels of social justice and to realize they truly can be the change they want to see in the world.

Local High School Teams Argued Constitutional Rights Case

The student attorneys raised some serious civil rights questions in court. Did authorities violate a student's rights after accusing her of vandalism and searching her backpack? Did they violate her constitutional rights when they removed her artwork from a public display?

After extensive deliberation, a panel of judges hearing the fictional case ruled that the Christian Brothers High School (Team 2) attorneys made the most convincing arguments and ruled that team was the winner of the 2014 Gordon D. Schaber Moot Court competition.

The Moot Court competition is an appellate-level proceeding in which high school students prepare and argue a case before a three-judge panel. The judges evaluate participants on the quality and persuasiveness of their legal reasoning and presentation, as well as their unscripted responses to spontaneous questions from the bench. The competition provides students the opportunity to learn about constitutional law and develop crucial public speaking and debate skills.

Katherine chose CB because she wanted the weather of California, she wanted to live close to Berkeley, and she wanted a strong academic school. When asked if she feels that she made a good choice, Katherine replied yes, because I now understand so much and am used to the American school system as I prepare for college." Katherine knows that coming to CB has helped her language skills tremendously. When she first arrived, she followed what the teachers were teaching but had trouble with the details. Now, Katherine says,"I catch the details." Katherine intends to return to CB next year and graduate. She admits that the idea of college applications sounds daunting. She has her sights set on Chemical Engineering and, hopefully, UC Berkeley. The intent to take four AP classes next year (Math and Science) makes sense. I asked Katherine what advice she'll give students coming in next year and she said, "Til tell them to get involved in sports." Does Katherine have any regrets? Yes, she has only one. Her regret is that she came to CB as a sophomore instead of one year earlier as a freshman. Katherine will be among the students in our first International graduating class of 2015. Katherine is one of many examples how CB has successfully embraced, taught, and nurtured our International students. Katherine is currently living with the Hagelis family in Davis.

Liwen Luo comes from Nanchang, China and she also arrived in August, 2012. Why did Liwen choose CB? "I wanted to be part of a new International program and in a school where there were only a few Chinese students. Mr. Kirrene was friendlier than the others interviewing me and that mattered." When asked if she's still happy with her choice to attend CB, Liwen said, "yes, because the teachers understand our obstacles, I've met good people (American students) and the counseling department has helped us a lot." Liwen's host family, the Haroldsons, have been instrumental in guiding her outside the classroom. "Kate and Mr. Purdy helped me understand that getting into the right school (university) is more important than the name of a university." She's not going to worry

about where she's going to university any more. Instead, Liwen has decided to try and enjoy being on CB's campus every day until graduation. Liwen knows that her English has improved significantly while at CB. "The first two months were difficult because I couldn't express myself and people were speaking so fast!" Liwen wanted us to know that "Chinese students are not used to starting conversations, but we are very good at answering questions." Liwen said that she is learning to speak out but: it isn't natural for her. "So if you want to have a conversation with an International student, approach us, ask a question, and a conversation will begin."

These two experiences opened my mind to the idea. Later, I began to substitute teach and was introduced to Susannah Nelson who needed a substitute for her classes at Loretto. I was then hired as a full time teacher, and so began my teaching career. These experiences prove the theory that vocation is a kind of calling that one increives throughout one's life.

My favorite parts of the job are the interactions with the students and the relationships that I can build. No two days are alike. The students keep me young and laughing. I hope that they learn from me, but I end up learning a great deal from them.

Wherever you go, wherever you end up, bring passion to your job and infuse your own joy and love for that work and your days will be filled with peace and satisfaction.



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
